Freshman Riley Wilson said, “You can spread ideas quicker through the internet. Research is easier using the internet, which makes communication easier and



# Learning How to Achieve in Class

## Academic Styles At Silver Creek High School

Learning methods, or styles, are the different ways people learn, according to TopHat.com. According to an article from livebinders.com written by Cynthia L. Miller, who has a Ph.D. in Family and Consumer Sciences Education, there are seven main learning styles: visual, musical/auditory, physical/kinesthetic, verbal, logical/mathematical, social, and solitary.

The visual learning style consists of pictures, diagrams, and spatial understanding. Kids.frontiersin.org states, "We use spatial thinking to understand the location (position) and dimensions (such as length and size) of objects, and how different objects are related to each other." A teacher may implement this by putting up diagrams of the body. A student may implement this by using charts in their notes.

"When I was a student, I loved independent practice and visual aids. I still incorporate these into my teaching today," said credit recovery and algebra teacher, Mrs. Brittany Edrington.

Freshman Aiden Grider said, "I'm a visual learner, so seeing things works best for me."

"Describing certain topics in videos or pictures helps me the most in processing information," said junior Claire Kirchgessner.

According to an article on livebinders.com written by Cynthia L. Miller, who has a Ph.D. in Family and Consumer Sciences Education, the auditory, or musical, learning style consists of listening to music, words, or rhythms. A teacher may give lectures to make use of the auditory learning style. A student may listen to a book they are reading in class.

"Typically I prefer a simple explanation of things, and the availability to ask questions works wonderful-

ly," said sophomore Aidan Spalding.

Freshman Zoie Rushing said, "I enjoy learning by listening to lectures."

The physical, or kinesthetic, learning style consists of using a physical learner's hands, body, and touch to learn. A teacher may implement physical learning by having students feel fossils or perform a lab, and they might even have students act out sections of a book. A student might build a pyramid out of paper to see the geometric net or do a science project at home.

"Hands-on things, something tangible that I can do to help my brain physically see the information and learn it," said senior Ali Hammond.

The verbal learning style consists of using words verbally, in writing, and in reading words. A teacher may have students rewrite what happened in a story, or have students give a verbal presentation. A student might make flashcards or re-read passages of a story.

"I work/focus best in a more quiet environment with a good amount of light. The best way for me to learn is to review through notes and make flashcards for studying. For learning, I love to highlight information and really make the key points stick out, so I know that I need to remember the information that is being taught to me," said freshman Riley Wilson.

"Verbal is hard for me sometimes," said senior Greyson Durick, "I often need to see it on paper."

The mathematical or logical learning style consists of using logic, reasoning, and sequences to learn. A teacher may give students a logical procedure to go through. A student may use bullet points or analytical graphs.

The solitary learning style is a style usually paired with other learning styles and is used when people prefer their own company to learn. The solitary learning style consists of working alone. Teachers may tell students to work on assignments individually. A student may self-study or read alone.

"As someone who isn't very comfortable when talking to new people, it

can be extremely difficult to work in a group setting," said junior Kylee Hughes.

The social learning style is a style usually paired with other learning styles and is used when people prefer the company of other people to learn. The social learning style consists of working with other people. A teacher may group students up to work on a singular project together. A student may form a study group.

"I like to use discussion-based methods. I find I create a better relationship and the students can tell me more if we're just having a conversation," said English teacher Mrs. Brandi Eaton.

Freshman Kileigh Rojas said, "I like working in group activities, or ones we can move around in. We get tired and bored sitting and being quiet for so long, we lose focus and get tired."

A person may use more than one of these learning styles, that is called a combination learning style. A teacher may draw a visual graph on the board, while their students work on a physical lab project. A student may listen to an e-book while taking notes on the book.

"I learn best by taking notes and actually doing something," said senior Jana Reese Cannon, "I can focus better when I can listen to music while doing school work."

"I try to model concepts for the students and I also like to have the students work in groups on topics we discuss," said math teacher Mr. Michael Day.

Sophomore Josiah Burton's opinion: I personally believe that learning styles are very important for a student's academic growth. It is very important for a teacher to offer a variety of learning styles to their students so each student is able to learn in a way that fits them best. I work the best with the solitary and verbal learning styles; I prefer to read from a textbook by myself. I feel that it would be best for teachers to give their students flexibility in their learning styles, or at least give them several different options to choose from.

"While I don't think that Walter would ever do something to hurt anyone, accusations can be made at any time -whether they are true or not. I would have to pay for an attorney to defend myself, and, again, my personal property would be at risk."

She continued on to say, "Silver Creek School Corporation's administration and school board members have been huge supporters of Walter, but, unfortunately, our corporation's insurance provider will not allow the corporation to be the primary insurance holder."

"Due to the situation, he is not going to be able to ever

return. It breaks my heart that Walter can't come to school anymore. He just brings so much joy and comfort to everyone when he's around."

Mallory Coffman, senior, was a library aide last year. She said, "Seeing Walter was just such a comfort. When I am at home, I love my dogs and they make my home feel like a home and seeing a dog at school made me feel so much safer and comfortable.
