## ELLIS ISLAND

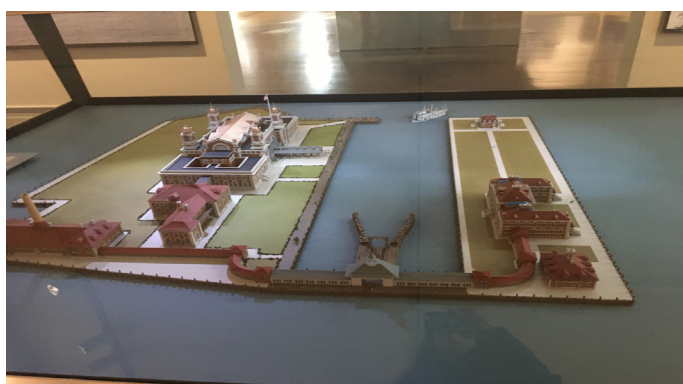
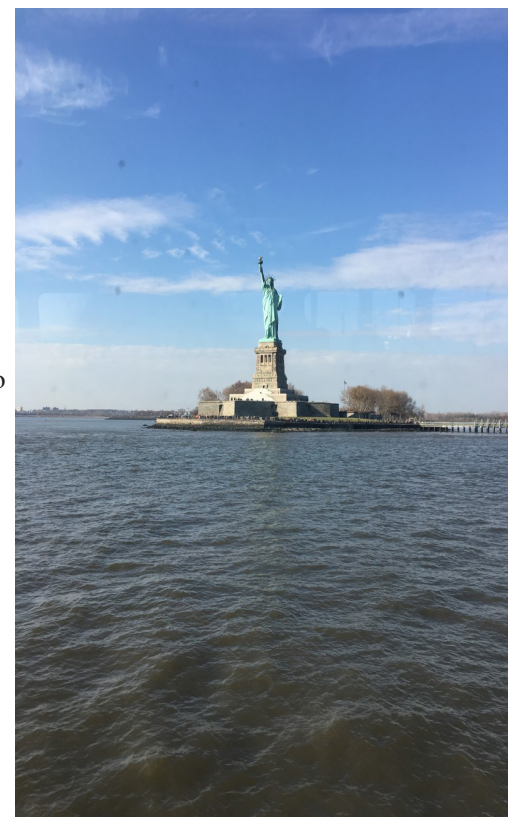

## WHY SCHOOL UNIFORMS ARE GOOD FOR US

During the 2015-2016 school year, about one in five US public schools (21%) required students to wear uniforms. To some people school uniforms are a bad idea, but is it really? School should require students to wear uniforms.

One reason is that school uniforms make the morning process easier. For example, there is no pressure on the student to decide what to wear each day. The peer pressure is minimal, relieving tension and stress from morning routines. In fact, over 90% of U.S. school officials believe that school uniforms “eliminate wardrobe battles in families” and America make it easier to get kids ready in the morning. Schools like Summit Academy believe that “schools with a uniform policy have students who are able to organize their routines better and are able to sleep more because of the quicker routines”.

With quicker mornings, and other reasons, school uniforms can improve attendance. Crystal Ayres, who wrote 18 Significant School Uniforms Pros and Cons for Vittana.org, thinks that the uniformity caused by uniforms lessens tension, bullying, and violence. Less bullying, tension, and violence makes it

easy to move through the hallway quickly to class. At Youngstown State University, an assistant professor’s study concluded that schools with uniform policies have a higher attendance rate. In fact, a study at the University of Houston discovered that absence rates in middle and high schools decreased by 7% after a uniform policy was initiated. Since students have an easier time getting to class, they are less likely to be absent or tardy. The

Expensive clothes cause schools and children so much trouble. Uniforms keep students focused on their education and prevents theft. Students whose families have less money may steal from students with more expensive clothing. Amelia Jimenez agrees “they prevent thefts because of more valuable clothing” she told Huntsville City Schools Consider School Uniforms, Survey Parents through Robocalls, . Thefts can even become dangerous for the victim. “In Detroit, a ten-year-old boy was ... shot for his shoes” Bill Clinton explained to Challen Stephans, Huntsville City Schools Consider School Uniforms, Survey Parents through Robocalls. This is why we need uniforms. Crystal Ayres agrees that “instead of children focusing on clothing brands, uniforms help them focus on the learning environ-

ment”. Marian Wilde, who wrote “Do uniforms make schools better?” for Great schools.org, agrees. Uniforms “help students focus on education and not buying trendy clothes.”

Although uniforms have many benefits, there are some holdbacks. For example, Marian Wilde argues that for parents who pay taxes for free education, it can be considered an unfair expense. After all, they are already paying for their child’s education. Why must they spend more money for some “unnecessary clothing”? Plus, parents should be free to help choose what their children wear to school without government interference. “[A]llowing students to choose their clothing is an empowering message from the schools that a student is a maturing person who is entitled to the most basic self-determination.” Stresses the ACLU of Nevada to Huntsville City Schools Consider School Uniforms, Survey Parents through Robocalls.

Uniforms have many benefits and drawbacks, but many people have chosen to take a side. Although some people think uniforms aren’t good, requiring students to wear uniforms is something that should be done. School uniforms are efficient and safer than regular brands and clothes. So encourage your school to

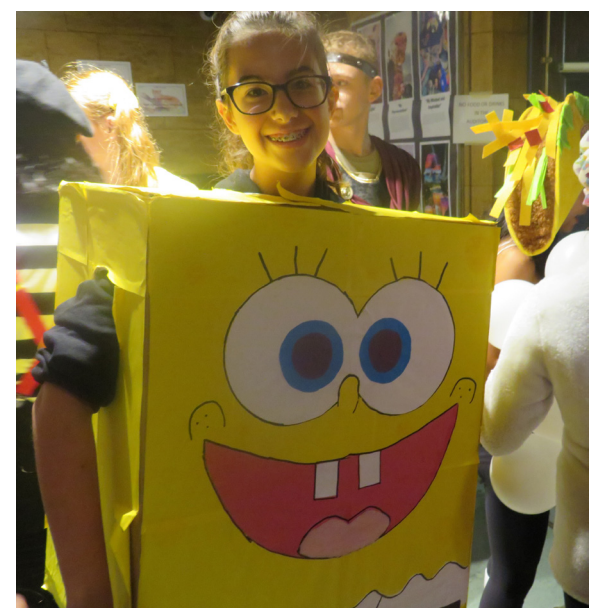

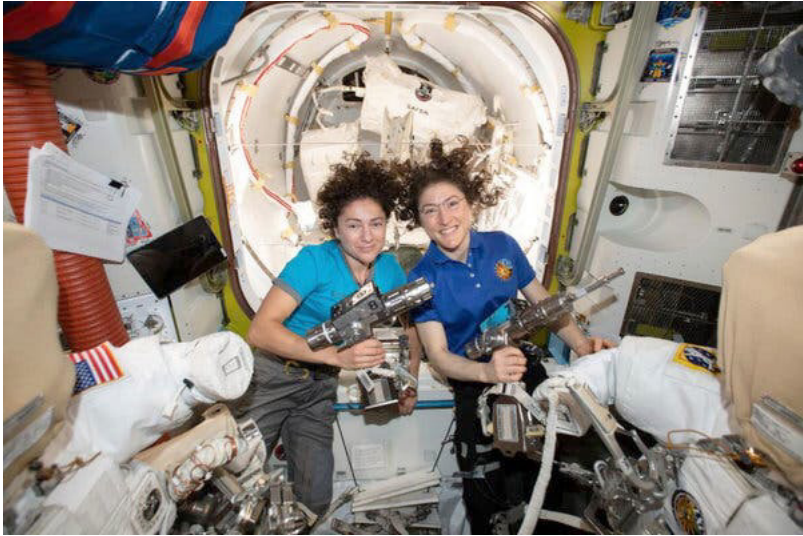

## WOMEN IN SPACE

Just a couple of weeks ago, there was another first for women. On October 18, 2019, astronauts Christina Koch and Jessica Meir went on the first all-women spacewalk in history. Meir was not originally scheduled to be on the spacewalk. The walk was supposed to happen in March with Koch and Anne McClain, but McClain's spacesuit did not fit properly and it could not be fixed in time for the mission.

During the spacewalk, the astronauts replaced a battery that was not working in the International Space Station's outside structure. The spacewalk took about seven hours. You could tell the astronauts apart because Koch had red stripes on her spacesuit. This was Koch's fourth spacewalk and Meir's first. They were the 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> women ever to go on a spacewalk.

When asked about the importance of the spacewalk, Koch said, "In the past, women haven't always been at the table... There are a lot of people who derive motivation from inspiring stories of people who look like them, and I think it's an important story to tell."

The next milestone for female astronauts is to put the first woman on the moon by 2024!

On August 24, 2019 at 3pm, Hurricane Dorian was classified as a tropical depression off the North East Coast of South America. Tropical depression is the lowest storm category. With winds at 35 mph, this storm didn't seem like much of a threat. This false sense of safety did not last long. Just 6 hours later, the storm had increased its wind speed by 5 miles and was categorized a tropical storm. It continued to travel up the coast. By the time the eye of the storm hit the Bahama Island Abaco on September 1st, it had sustained winds up to 185 mph, and was a category 5 hurricane.

Hurricane Dorian was the most devastating hurricane in history to hit the Bahamas. The hurricane barely moved, so it pummeled the poor islands for more than 2 days. Not only that, but it had a storm surge up to 23 feet. The islands were decimated. Repairs are out of the question, the buildings need to be completely rebuilt. The Bahamas needs the start over, but many aren't in a position to do so, thousands have been evacuated. Across the Grand Bahama and Abaco Islands an estimated 70,000 people need shelter, food, and fresh water. The water they do have is contaminated with debris and worse, dead bodies. Matthew Taylor, a resident of the Abaco island said, "It's unlivable. After the water is gone, what do you do? You know, you have bodies contaminating the water and stuff like that, so the water is undrinkable. That's where the panic is now." Most shelters had been flooded out for the few weeks after Dorian, so many people were displaced. Also, most hospitals were unusable because of damage. As of now, the total death count is 56. And many more are still unaccounted for. Families have been split up while evacuating, people have been swept out by the water, or crushed by buildings.

The Red Cross has sent hundreds of volunteers to the Bahamas in order to help reconstruct, and salvage the islands. They also provide food, water, and shelter to survivors. The U.S. government and other organizations have already donated millions of dollars to help with repairs. However, it will take billions of dollars and time for the islands to completely recover. That's where you come in. Highlands has already raised money for the islands selling bracelets. But you can do more, charitable organizations such as the American Red Cross, Global Giving, and Operation USA accept donations and volunteers for the reconstruction effort. Even if you can't donate yourself, spreading the word and making people aware of the hardships survivors in the Bahamas are going

through, may encourage them to

help.

However, while food and supplies are greatly appreciated, we need to save our planet in order to avoid tragedy in the future. Global warming is becoming an increasingly drastic problem for our green planet. Not only are the arctic polar caps melting, but it's effecting our weather too. Global warming puts more moisture in the air which in turn, creates more rain and helps hurricanes grow. In addition, the increase of temperature in our oceans also helps empower hurricanes, since they originate with moisture over seas. Furthermore, the effect global warming has on the forward speed of hurricanes isn't completely understood. However, a study done by NOAA's James Kossin in 2018 discovered a 10% global decrease in forward speed of tropical cyclones since 1949. You can do your part to help stop global warming by recycling, using renewable energy, and driving with gasoline powered vehicles less.

Hurricane Dorian came at the Bahamas long and hard, setting new records and destroying everything in its wake. Many lives have even forever changed because of this monstrous hurricane, and many need help to get back on their feet. Over time, the victims will recover, but many more hurricanes increasing in rainfall and power will occur if we don't care for our planet.

## BUCKOUT ROAD

To us, Westchester's residents, our county seems quite normal, about a 45 minute drive from NYC, nothing crazy. Little do many of us know, Westchester is the home of the most haunted roads in America; Buckout Road. Its history goes back hundreds of years; mysterious happenings, and murder. It is the place where a dark mansion once stood, lurking in the shadows. But for this, we'll start back in the mid to late 1600s.

At the time the land where Buckout Road and West Harrison now is belonged to a Native American tribe called the Siwanoy. They are responsible for the first known legend of the area.

During a full moon the land would be visited by a mysterious white, glowing deer which would bring good fortune to whomever saw it.

In 1666 Peter Disbrow and John Budd, both of whom came from Connecticut, purchased the land from the Natives. However, they didn't keep the land long and 1695 the Natives resold the land to a quaker named John Harrison. Local lore claims that Disbrow and Budd's lives became hell as soon as they bought the land and sold it to, "rid themselves of the devil like burden."

After a much longer run with the the land, John Harrison sold the Buckout Road area to a group of Quakers who didn't waste time and built a church. The church in question was later burned down and replaced with a cemetery.

The Quakers did not believe in slavery and so in the years between 1773 and 1783 they freed slaves and gave them land to live and farm on not far from the road.

The Buckhout family first arrived in America in Europe around 1663 and originally lived in Sleepy Hallow. They later moved to the Quaker area and became members of their church.

Now, you're probably wondering, how is that at all scary?

Well, it's about to get interesting. A descendant of the original Buckhouts, a man named Isaac Buckhout, committed murder.

One day while casually playing cards with his wife and close friend, he became very defensive when they started teasing him over his card skills. Months later when the group came together for another round, he killed both his friend and wife before escaping town with his neighbor Ira Miller. He was eventually caught and arrested in Tarrytown, NY by Constable Alfred Lawrence. Upon being interviewed, he claim his wife had cheated on him with his friend and she was a terrible person for doing so. He was later imprisoned and, after several trials, sentenced to death by hanging. During his imprisonment people say he lost his mind, chanting things in the night, and tried to kill himself several times, claiming he wanted to "sacrifice himself."
