SAYREVILLE MIDDLE SCHOOL

The Sayreville Middle School was featured in the Suburban Newspaper for their 6th Annual Pink Out. Inspired by the struggle of a student's mother, Ms. Lynn Taylor, Health and Physical Education Teacher at the middle school, decided to establish Pink Out as a way to educate students about breast cancer. On the first Friday in October, every Sayreville Middle School student participated in a breast cancer walk around the football field during physical education class. The field was lined with large informational signs about breast cancer

prevention and the importance of early detection. In addition to the walk, the entire middle school community was encouraged to wear pink to show their support for those diagnosed with breast cancer. The Class Act Committee, a group of middle school teachers who work to encourage character building, had Pink Out shirts available for sale for the students and staff. Proceeds from this sale, as well as the donations from the walk, will go to Gilda's Club. Gilda's Club is a nonprofit organization that offers free support groups, workshops and lectures to people diagnosed with cancer.

BOARD BEGINS BUDGET, INCREASES TRANSPARENCY

The Board of Education has launched its 2015-16 budget development process and overhauled the Board review cycle to provide greater opportunity for public transparency as well as greater Board involvement. In past years, the detailed budget review process was conducted by the Board's finance committee in all day workout sessions with members of the administration. This year, the entire Board will be using each of its public meetings through March for a presentation by the Superintendent and his leadership team on a different aspect of the budget and allow input and discussion by the Board and the public.

As the annual budget is really a blueprint for a community's vision for its school system, this process will give the public greater insight into how the funding correlates to the specific educational programs which are planned to drive student achievement. We encourage the public to attend and participate in our Board of Education meetings as we embark on this new process.
