They started running again. A week after placing second in the Class 3 State Championships, these road warriors are back at it. Junior Sam Vaughn says, "It's all about the off-season." Senior Keith Vance says, "If you don't train in the offseason, you're not going to be good when it comes time to race." Vance and Vaughn rounded the 5k (3.1 miles) cross country course at Gans Creek in Columbia in 16:40 and 16:50, respectively. On their heels was sophomore Nate Wright at 16:59. All three were awarded medals for finishing in the top 25. The speedsters hoped for back-to-back Class 3 State



Championships, but the top five runners from Fr. Tolton Catholic High School were a tick faster.

Head Coach Kyle Davis said, "How great of a program do we have if we're disappointed in taking second place?" Vaughn says, "I think there could have been little things done by everyone, pick up (pass) a person here and there." Vance says he still gets upset if he spends time thinking about the race. Yet his words are delivered flatly, without emotion. It's as if he's squirreling away an acorn of motivation for the cold winter months ahead. In his next breath, the senior talks about

his new goals during the spring track season, like running the 800 in 1:55 and the mile under 4:20.

On the girls' team is his sister, senior Raven Vance. She was the 23rd fastest on race day as the Lady Blackcats finished eighth out of the 16 teams that qualified for the race. When asked why she started running cross country in middle school she replied, "(Coach) Jim Kasten told me to." That suggestion turned into a lifestyle. She won't be on a team next year in college, but she will always be a runner.

During the November Board of Education meeting, the Dunklin R-5 Board of Education approved placing a \$13.5 million No Tax Rate Increase bond issue called "Proposition S" on the April 2023 ballot. If Prop S is approved, your property tax rate will remain the same, but we'll be able to make several improvements to our schools. The possible projects include: Safe and Secure entrances at Pevely Elementary and Senn Thomas Middle School, a new High School competitive gym with a storm shelter, theater lighting, sound upgrades, and a turf football field. In addition, the district will be able to improve, renovate, furnish, and equip new and existing school facilities. Secure school buildings, space to grow, district pride, fiscal responsibility, and the same tax rate for a better district is a win for the entire Dunklin R-5 School District. We have a very supportive community, and this is another chance for us to showcase this overwhelming community support which is key for a successful school district. After the holidays, I will meet with teachers and community groups to ensure everyone is informed of this amazing opportunity for our students and community.

PROPOSITION S

Shall the Board of Education of the Dunklin R-V School District of Jefferson County, Missouri borrow money and issue its general obligation bonds in the amount of \$13,500,000 to acquire, construct, improve, renovate, furnish, and equip new and existing school facilities, including the Taylor Early Childhood Center, Pevely Elementary, Senn-Thomas Middle School and Herculaneum High School buildings? Projects may include but are not limited to the construction of secured entryways and installation of security upgrades at the elementary school and middle school, and the construction of a high school gym with a storm shelter. If this proposition is approved, the adjusted debt service levy of the school district is estimated to remain unchanged at the current levy of \$0.9500 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation of real and personal property.

The simplicity of the idea undercuts its tremendous value. Bring together student leaders in high school with elementary students who could use a little more support. Blackcat Buddies was suspended for two years because of the pandemic, but it's back to the delight of everyone involved. The counselors at Pevely chose the elementary students that might benefit the most. They may talk too much in class, or they're timid. They may have trouble following directions or need a little motivation.

Senior Belle Milojevic says her buddy was really shy at the beginning and a little rough around the edges, but that changed after a couple of meetings. She says, "We are now getting along, and he calls me his friend, and he tells his classmates to come meet my friend Belle." Milojevic figured out her firstgrader quickly. She says, "He likes attention but doesn't know how to ask for it, but I can give it to him in the right way. He doesn't have to misbehave to get it."

Sophomore Gabe Moore says, "It reminds me of when I was in first grade, and I think it's pretty cool and just giving the tips on how to get through it. He likes superheroes a lot, and that's a topic I enjoy talking about, so I use that to communicate." Senior Ella Hoskins loves her buddy. She says, "I look forward to seeing Mattie, and she always tells me how excited she is to see me and that she always waits for me. I feel like an older sister to her. She made me a bracelet last time, so that made my day."

Sophomore Jill Jarvis says she normally wouldn't go out of her way to talk to little kids, but her buddy is special. "I'm very shy, and sometimes I might not talk because I don't know what to say or I haven't really met you," the little girl told Jarvis. That didn't last, as Jarvis took the time to get to know her buddy and

get her out of her comfort zone. These little transformations happen frequently.

The high school students participating are in student council and are taking a leadership class. With guidance, they prepare activities designed to help their little friends. Pevely School Counselor Jessica Rekate says, "Our students really look forward to meeting with their buddies. The excitement of meeting with a special person carries over into the work the elementary students are putting into the activities that the high school students have prepared."

First Grade Teacher Brittney Marshall says, "My students eat lunch with their Blackcat Buddy, and one of my students told me that her buddy wants her to be good in class and listen to her teacher. It has helped so much already. I wish the high school buddy could come every day!"

Coach of the Year

Herculaneum High School's Cross Country Coach Kyle Davis was named "Coach of the Year" by the Missouri State High School Activities Association and the National Federation of State High School Associations. It's so rare that Davis didn't know anything about the award. Only one boys cross country coach in Missouri is chosen for the honor. The sport has six classes, resulting in six state champs, so that alone won't bring the plaque to your doorstep.

One week Davis was asked to attend a Friday night football game. He expected Activities Director Jason Gillman to present him

with some minor award as a half-time filler. Then Davis saw MSHAA's Assistant Executive Director Lou Mazzocco. As a state official responsible for football, cross country, and track, Davis wondered what Mr. Gillman did to cause Mazzocco to show up. Davis says, "I did not know until I walked out to the 50-yard line." The announcer started talking about the highest honor you can receive as a high school coach. Mr. Mazzocco walked onto the grass field to present the honor. Soon they were shaking hands during the surreal moment. Davis says, "It's really cool. It's an awesome honor. I honestly didn't know that MSHSAA gave anything like that. That's how unfamiliar I was with it."

Over the next few days, as the excitement faded, the meaning began to grow. Davis says, "You know, education is hard. It's a hard field." As word spread of the honor, alums started contacting Davis. Some former runners hadn't spoken to their high school coach in years. Davis says, "It gave me a sense of – a renewed kind of purpose that it's worth it. It's worth it to do this."

Davis appreciates the history of the cross country program at Herculaneum High School. He says, "The tradition is fuel. It's fuel to me. I didn't create it. I just keep it going." This fall, the boys' team took second place in the Class 3 State Championship, and the girls' team finished eighth among the teams that qualified. Both teams have several runners returning next year.

The future of the program can be seen at the middle school. Davis is well aware of the talent at Senn-Thomas. He says the girls have solid numbers, and that group has the potential to do something special. The boys have fewer numbers, but Davis sees them as being very productive as they get older. Before a fun run at Herculaneum City Park, a slim 6th-grader, whose personality is too big for his body, bragged that he was going to run like Sam Vaughn. When 6th-graders at the middle school know the names of varsity runners at the high school, it's obvious that the cross country program has roots.

On the same day that the boy's cross country team competed in the state championship, and the football team fell short during a district semifinal game, another team was impacting their sport. The

Herculaneum esports team participated in a competition at Southeast Missouri State University. These unknown high school gamers from Herculaneum effectively planted the Blackcat flag to announce their arrival in the virtual world of esports.

In the college arena, there were rows and rows of computers set up for the teams. Jack Shadowens says, "We were all a little nervous when we got there because we've never done anything like that." Matt King says, "You could see them. You could see your competition. It was way different." Soon the computers came to life, competitors put on their headsets, and they were off. Payne Hawkins says, "We were always talking to each other, like telling each other what to do." Game after game, Herculaneum was racking up victories." It didn't surprise Steven Stenzhorn. He entered the competition with confidence, knowing they could triumph. He says, "Teamwork is how you win games." When only a handful of teams were left in the competition, the crowds got larger. Drew Helms says, "We got a lot of weird looks and questions about if we were a team that wasn't registered for a while... if we were actually a one-year team."

SEMO had some members of their college esports team provide play -by-play as the electronic games unfolded. They admired the Blackcats' skill and strategy, eventually saying, "I've got to meet these players from Herky!" Among the 25 schools that participated, Herculaneum took second place in playing Rocket League as well as Overwatch. Hawkins says, "We are definitely in the top tier for competition in high school esports." King says, "We got beaten by Fox, but we'll be doing more tournaments where we will face them again." Herculaneum has always been competitive on a track, field, or court. We can now add the virtual world to that list.

Blackcat Hall of Fame



A humble teacher and a star athlete have joined the list of legends in the Blackcat Hall of Fame. Alumna Barbara Hill was voted "Best Athlete" by her classmates, but teaching was her calling. Alumnus Bruce Thomas was vice president of the National Honor Society but was known as a gifted athlete. Their accomplishments were celebrated during this fall's induction ceremony into the Blackcat Hall of Fame.

Hill credits her career to a phone call and a car ride. Growing up, she got a job working in the St. Joseph Lead Company cafeteria for 35 cents an hour. She was 13 years old at the time and would continue through high school. While serving meals, she met Walter Govreau, an electrician who also served on the board of education. Knowing that Hill wanted to go to college, Govreau offered to give her a ride to Southeast Missouri State. She was intelligent, graduating fifth in her class in 1957, but there was no money for college. He said they would work it out. Govreau called and made an appointment with the college president and got Hill a job in a dorm cafeteria to cover her room and board. Her

meager savings and a barbecue fundraiser allowed for the purchase of books. She would be the first in her family to graduate college.

She began her career teaching science in the Fox School District. During her morning commute, Hill heard a radio interview that changed her career trajectory. The United States military needed educators overseas to teach the children of service members. Hill was soon headed to Bermuda for her first teaching assignment. That was followed by Portugal, Germany, Iceland, Okinawa, Japan, Canada, and several cities across England. By then, Hill was working as an assistant principal and business manager. She says, "It was all because of "Govey" calling the president of Southeast Missouri State and getting me a place down there. I never will forget that." There is a delightful memoir penned by Hill named Shout Gratitude! The Life of Barbara Hill.

Growing up, everyone in the Thomas family played golf. However, most evenings, he and his brother would shoot hoops. He says, "There was nothing on television because we didn't have a television." His promotion to the varsity basketball team happened halfway through his freshman season. The center was injured, so they called upon the tall, red-headed kid to take his place. Over time, Thomas became dominant on the court, scoring 2,106 points before graduating in 1965. The Blackcat was selected First Team All-State as a junior and senior.

Thomas earned a four-year basketball scholarship to Oklahoma State University. The coach there wanted a good defensive team. He says, "We could have a three-hour practice, and we wouldn't touch the ball for two or two and half hours." It wasn't fun anymore. Fortunately, Thomas also played golf for the Okies as a walk-on. He transferred his basketball scholarship to a golf scholarship and graduated in 1969. A year later, he had a master's degree from the same institution in economics and finance. For the next 30 years, he worked in the home office of General American Life Insurance Company, retiring in 2001. Along the way, Thomas married Catherine Bond, and they had three children; Elizabeth, Rachael, and Matthew.



This year's Emerson Excellence in Teaching Award goes to Physical Education Teacher Audrey Meda. She says, "I'm honored and humbled that I was even nominated." The alumna remembers being a student in the same gym where she teaches at Pevely Elementary School. Meda was a 1983 State Champion Track Team member at Herculaneum High School and played volleyball at North Alabama. She was teaching in the Carolinas when her husband landed a job at Scott Air Force Base. They moved back to Missouri, and she was hired at Herculaneum High School. In addition to her teaching duties, she spent the first 15 years at Dunklin coaching one or more sports.

Watching Meda with her elementary students, pitching a kickball game while reviewing the rules between plays, you'd say she was a wonderful mix of patience and youthful energy. In some ways, it defies logic, but she says, "I'm such I'm a type A personality. I'm always ready to come back after Christmas. I'm always ready to come back after summer vacation. I love what I do; I really do. I'm just not ready to hang it up." Meda is by no means old, but the median age of Missouri teachers is only 38, so by comparison, she has plenty of experience.

Meda is almost bashful when it comes to being praised, but she will stand up for her specialty. She believes teachers who work in a gym instead of a classroom are often overlooked. She says, "I feel like what we're doing as physical education teachers has a direct impact on all the other classes." Meda argues that healthy students are more likely to do their math or reading assignments. She says, "It all starts here."

Principal Katie Dunlap says there is more of a crossover between gym class and traditional studies than you might think. "It is not uncommon to hear students in Coach Meda's class solving multiplication facts during a team building game in the gym as they work towards a common goal or reading site words around the gym to score more points," says Dunlap.

As the Dunklin R-5 School District's Emerson award winner, Meda will attend a banquet in St. Louis and be gifted a crystal apple by Tiffany.
