A lot has been happening around school recently which I am excited to share in this report. Unfortunately I am not able to be here in person, but I will do my best to fill you in!

Foley TASC Talk & Run:

Members of the James Foley Legacy Class at the high school put together a TASC talk for members of the field hockey team as well as boys and girls soccer. During this TASC talk, the Legacy Class provided a contextual background for the James W. Foley Freedom Run. At the talk, Jim's life inside and outside of KRHS was talked about. And the historical context on the Syrian Civil War was provided. (Enclosed is a copy of the flyers that were handed out at this TASC talk). This year's run had the greatest amount of participation from current Kingswood students. We would like to thank the girl's field hockey and soccer teams as well as the boys football and soccer teams for participating in this amazing event. Whats happening at LRTC November

We held our Career and Technical Student Organization induction ceremony on Oct. 12th. We successfully inducted 61 students into their perspective CTSO's. We hosted the Wolfeboro Fire Department for a My Career My Future presentation in October and will be hosting 603 Motorwerks in November.

Marketing Education: Participated in the Chili Cook Off for the Kingswood Youth Center. They also painted pumpkins to share with their business partners and will deliver them by taking a courtesy ride on Molly the Trolley. Lastly they are looking to have upwards of 30 students attend their state leadership conference on Oct 26th.

Health Science: Students volunteered at the Kingswood flu clinic. They have also been preparing for clinics to start at the beginning of November.

Collision Technology: First level students have been working on vehicle identification. Second level students are working on corner cab and rocker panel rust removal and restoration for local members of our community.

Agricultural Science: Have been traveling to compete in the woodsman's competitions at fairs and the UNH fall interscholastic. They finished 3rd overall at the Deerfield Fair and tied for 3rd place with Co Brown at UNH. Student's earned 1st place in Wood Splitting, Log Scaling and Tree Identification.

Precision Manufacturing: Students are working on machine processing. They were able to take a field trip to tour the Rochester Turbo Cam facility which they found super motivating and informative. They have been assembling their new plazma cam and are looking forward to putting it to use as soon as the computer is connected.

Automotive Technology: Students have been working on gaining proficiency in the inspection process and brake jobs. Level 2 students are working on learning electrical problem solving. When students are finished with their main learning objective for the day Mr. Sanborn is slowly introducing them to marine technology to see what interest we might have.

Careers in Education- Students are in full swing and loving every moment. The level one students spend two days off campus at The Wolfeboro Area Children's Center. Our students assist in classrooms and have the opportunity to work with children 3 years of age up to 12 years. They also get opportunities to work with the Magic Moments Preschoolers here on campus. The level two careers in education students travel 3 days a week to Carpenter Elementary School. These students have the opportunity to work with Kindergarten, second and third grade students. This gives our students the ability to see the amazing growth in education from a five year old to a nine year old.

Culinary Arts: The Skylight dining room is in its 2nd week and going great! Friday teacher meals to go are going awesome as well and teachers love not having to cook on Friday night.

Graphic Design: Students are working on their design thinking, craftsmanship and familiarization of the creative process. They are also gaining knowledge of design briefs. Finally they started a collaborative project with our Marketing class to create new program campaign posters.

MultiMedia- Students have been producing weekly episodes of Knightwatch. They have been covering event happenings at Kingswood and LRTC, sports, gaming, dad jokes, the weather and more. Please check out their episodes on youtube.

Theater StageCraft-

Computer Technology: Level one students are learning the details on how to build computers. They will start learning how to troubleshoot and problem solve computer issues in November. Level two students are working on learning how to work with IPV6 which is the updated way to assign internet addresses.

After a few practices, the senior and junior girls went head to head coached by Kingswood football players in the 3rd annual Dig Pink Flag Football game. The seniors came out on top, ending the game with a score of 26-22. We were ultimately able to raise almost \$300 for breast cancer awareness.

Boys Soccer:

Kingswood Boy's Soccer battled their way to the Division II State Championships. Led by Coach Eric Nelson and captains Brayden Rapoza, Caleb Russo, Noah Silva, and James Yarling, they played a well fought game against Oyster River. Ultimately, they walked away with the Division II runner-up title. Congratulations to all of Kingswood boys soccer on a well played season.

 journalist, or his choice to stay in Aleppo to help in the hospital, or even when he asked
 his captors for food despite the consequences but not for himself, for the rest of the
 captives. Jim was selfless and that is the heart of his legacy, doing the right thing always,
 no matter what.
