## National Cricket Champions!

Our U13 Boys' cricket team were crowned National Champions at the end of last term.

They qualified having beaten MGS, the Lancashire winners, St Peter's, the Yorkshire winners and Sedbergh, the Cumbria champions, to be crowned Northern Cup Champions.

The final saw King's take on Dulwich College in a very tight encounter watched by a huge crowd of parents and friends. A last ball thriller saw



the talented U13 team snatch a victory to lift the prestigious David English, Bunbury National Schools' Cup. King's is the first school in Cheshire to win a National Cricket Cup for over 40 years!

## Pupils' **Egyptian** adventure!

In October, around 100 pupils in Years 3 to 6 from Broken Cross Primary, Wilmslow Prep, Whirley Primary, Parkroyal and Upton Priory spent an art and history enrichment day with King's pupils. The Jackson Hall was covered in artefacts from Ancient Egypt, along with a cornucopia of wildlife, including snakes, lizards and owls.

The special day dedicated to the wonders of Ancient Egypt saw a range of experts from Macclesfield Museum, including Egyptologist Bryony



Renshaw, talk to the children about social conditions in ancient Egypt along with the culture, customs and art. Pupils then used their new knowledge as the inspiration for their own artwork for an art competition, with the winning entries put on display in Macclesfield Library.

Talented artist Samantha Baguley and Mrs Cookson judged the competition, selecting Nola from Whirley Primary as the overall winner.

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#### **HEAD'S UPDATE**

**HE** start of this term saw us celebrating some excellent external exam results and we are very proud of our pupils for gaining some amazing grades against a back drop of disruption to their courses over the last two years. More than a fifth of all grades at A Level were at A\* grade. And 53% of all grades were at A or A\*. Almost four 4/5ths of these pupils joined their firstchoice university.

At GCSE level, almost two thirds of all grades were 9-7. Half of all pupils had nine subjects with grades of 7 and above. CAGs and TAGs of the pandemic years aside, this represents our strongest performance in external exams stretching back for eight years.

Music at King's has continued to rebuild and we have been treated to several tea time and scholars' concerts already across all Divisions of the school. At the time of writing, preparation is well advanced for our Autumn Concert, which promises to be a wonderful spectacle. It's also been very exciting to see the progress of our first cohort of Year 4 pupils to begin instrumental tuition. All pupils in Year 4 will now have instrumental lessons as part of the normal curriculum during the academic year in our new initiative to build from the bottom and plan for the future in this crucial area of school extra curricular life.

Parents may also have noticed that King's has become the new home for the Northern Chamber Orchestra, a professional group with a national reputation. I hope to see many of you at their concerts in the Jackson Hall in the future.

School trips are also well and truly 'back on the map', with a particular recent highlight being the Year 6 residential trip to

York, which was experienced with plenty of energy and enthusiasm. Visits during the half term break to Paris and also a history trip to Berlin were very popular. More details are included in this magazine. It's wonderful that our pupils have the opportunity to broaden their horizons and learn outside the classroom. We now look forward to trips at Christmas, including the ski trip and back to Germany for a Christmas market trip.

There is much more detail on a whole host of successes

contained within this edition of King's Colours and I trust that you will enjoy reading about them. Thank you for your continued support of School.

#### **UKMT** Maths Challenge

King's has recorded a magnificent seven Gold Award winners in the UK Senior Maths Challenge and a superb 'Merit' in the demanding Olympiad Challenge.

The Gold Award winners now progress to the even more puzzling Kangaroo Maths Challenge as they pit their wits against the best young brains nationwide.

For Owen Braithwaite, who wants to study Mathematics at Cambridge, his chosen subject is quite simply "the language of the universe." Ben O'Donnell, who wants to read Biology at Oxford, added: "Maths holds the key to communication across the Cosmos and underpins all we achieve on this world."

Maths teacher Mr Robinson, said: "Traditionally King's has always done well in the UK Maths Challenge, but with seven Gold Awards and a Merit, this is a truly exceptional year."



#### **Remembrance** service

King's remembered its fallen heroes as it rededicated its War Memorial plagues in a very moving service on Armistice Day, Taken down from the old Cumberland Street site two years ago, the brass plagues naming pupils who died in the two world wars were immediately added to the Jackson Hall, but Covid

prevented a large scale gathering to rededicate them. In attendance were number of special guests, including former pupils who have served in the armed forces, former staff and Governors and Rev Martin Stephens who conducted the service. Two special guests included Major Rupert Johnson and Captain Chris Howell, who are currently serving in the army and laid the wreaths in a poignant act of remembrance.

Major Johnson, who left King's in 2002, and

has served in Northern Ireland and Germany, said: "I remember looking at the memorials when I was a pupil with my friends and thinking that could easily have been me, or anyone of us. They are a hugely important reminder of what duty really means."





King's new team of student leaders are leading from the front and developing key cross-divisional initiatives such as pupil mentoring and coaching.

One of the two newly appointed School Captains in Year 13, sportsman, sailor and academic, Nick Reynolds, said: "Much of our role is representing the school at external events and interacting positively with staff and the wider community."

Nick, who wants to read Chemistry at Durham, added: "However, now we are all on one campus, we all feel there is great opportunity to become mentors and coaches to the younger pupils." The newly implemented mentor programme is running with Year 5 and 6 pupils, who are being mentored by Sixth Form pupils.

## Meet our new School Captains

Fellow School Captain, Jess Burton, added: "We want to make the transition between divisions seamless and ensure the younger ones, in particular, feel the older ones are approachable and will help them with any difficulties."

Jess, who wants to read History and Politics at either Leeds or York, concluded: "The mentoring scheme is already operational and the early feedback is excellent."

Supporting Nick and Jess are four Vice-Captains: Grace Slack, Anna Warham, Rory McCabe and Ben O'Donnell. Together, they lead a team of 26 Prefects with wide-ranging responsibilities including Wellbeing, Ecology, School Council and School Houses.

In Year 11, Senior Division School Captains Elijah Willcock and Angel Wale-Akinlua will lead a team of over 20 Prefects looking after pupils in Years 7 to 11.

Keen cricketer Elijah, who wants to read Medicine at university, and Angel, who wants to study Aeronautical Engineering at University, are keen to help ensure that all pupils feels comfortable and happy at school, and know they can come and speak them at any time.

That theme was echoed by Vice-Captains, Lucy Hancock, Sebastian Fitzgerald, Freya Ambrey Brosnahan and Eben Cooper.

Helen Broadley, Principal, said: "We have in this group of pupils a strong leadership team who have embraced their roles and the opportunities presented. They have been selected because we felt they were compassionate, strong-minded and full of good ideas."



## Linguistics Professor talks to Sixth Form students

Emeritus Professor of Linguistics at the University of Essex, Professor Bob Borsley, laid bare some of the extraordinary puzzles and patterns of the English language in a talk for Sixth Form students.

Speaking to Year 12 and 13 English Language students, Bob said: "Ordinary speakers of a language have an unconscious

knowledge of grammar which we use all the time whether we are speaking, understanding, writing or interpreting; we know how words go together."

"Standard English will use accepted



norms and students learn to use Standard English when writing their essays, but what they say to their friends is a very different matter."

"Some rules for example are just foolish; for centuries we have been told not to

split an infinitive, but it is just an artificial rule." He added that linguistics is also very relevant to psychology because language is one of the most important aspects of the human mind.

Student Niya Alias, who is applying to study Linguistics and Psychology at Oxbridge, said: "It gave me a valuable insight into university material and

helped me learn more about syntax."

Annalise Timms added: "It was interesting to discover how factors such as social class have an impact on grammar."

# Foreign travel is back!

This term has seen a welcome return of overseas school trips, the first since before the Covid pandemic.

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#### Pupils SEB FITZGERALD and ARIARNA GORDON in Year 11 enjoyed a fabulous trip to Germany in October 2022 and here's their review:

On the last Friday of term, 33 Year 11s along with Miss Hughes, Mr & Mrs Williams and Ms Berzins set off for a three-night History trip to Berlin, arriving just after midnight.

The next morning, we left the hotel to meet our excellent tour guide for the day, Shaun, and embarked on two walking tours around the city. We started with a visit to the Reichstag and then walked on past the Brandenburg Gate towards Berlin's famous Holocaust memorial.

This was a moving experience which allowed us to pay our respects to all communities affected by the Holocaust. We were then let loose in the famous Alexander Platz to try some local German cuisine. After lunch we visited the DDR museum, an interactive museum where we learnt all about life in East Berlin during the Cold War. Our second walking tour focused on the Cold War and we went to see remains of the Berlin Wall, learning about all the attempts to cross the wall during the cold war.



Later that evening, we headed out into Berlin once again for dinner before going bowling at the Mercedes Platz. On Sunday, we had an early start for a trip to Sachsenhausen concentration camp. This was an eye-opening experience, which taught us first-hand the horrors of the holocaust and the profound effects it had upon people's lives. That afternoon we headed back into Berlin to a Stasi prison. Our tour guide had spent a year and eight months in 1979 as a prisoner, this gave us an understanding of the awful

conditions prisoners endured during the Cold War. To finish off a fascinating day, we went to Germany's political capital, the Reichstag. We were shown around the German parliament, and were talked through the various political parties in Germany and how the parliament operates. We then walked up the dome of the Reichstag, which gave us great views of Berlin skyline, and also great Instagram opportunities! It was the perfect end to the trip; and many students named the Reichstag visit as a 'core memory'."



## RAPH SHERRY in Year 9 provides us with his reflections of the Paris trip:

"Without sparing too many words for a journey with a total travel time of roughly 15 hours, I will only say that several hours after watching a dazzling sunset from the coach window, we arrived at our party's accommodation. Settling into my bed on the first night, my primary thought was the three days that I would soon be spending sightseeing and socialising.

Highlights of the trip were the stunning art that was displayed both in the Palace of Versailles and the Louvre. Regarding this, it seems that the rumours were true - the Mona Lisa really is rather small.

Of course, the primary monument that comes to mind when considering Paris shall not be ignored: I am lucky to say that the weather was remarkably clear when we did see the Eiffel Tower (if that is not too much an English thing to focus on).



Other notable mentions would include experiencing the breath-taking grandeur of the Arc de Triomphe at the head of the Champs Elysées, the view of the Parisian landscape from the top of the Tour Montparnasse and, undoubtedly, the fun and creativity that went into the trip's photo competition (the winning picture being a well-angled shot of the Eiffel Tower reflected in a nearby puddle).

What cannot be forgotten, is a thank you all those involved in making the King's Paris Trip possible. Whether it be the members of staff who kindly volunteered to take us, the array of coach drivers that allowed us to get to and back from France safely, or our helpful French host and tour-guide, Julie, I thank you all for taking the time to be part of such an event."



#### Over the October half term, three Sixth Form students travelled to Ghana to undertake the volunteering element of their Gold Duke of Edinburgh Awards.

Anna, Cordy and Georgia spent two weeks in the town of Busua in the western region of Ghana, helping out at the local school, teaching lessons and playing with the children.

Anna also helped at a hospital and explains her experience: "I helped in the local hospital's mental health ward. As an aspiring clinical psychologist, this was the perfect experience for me to see the stark contrasts of how the treatment differs between Ghana and the UK.



I was lucky enough to go on the community home visit trip when in the mental health ward, where I got to see the treatment first hand, in the patients' homes. I also gained experience in the A&E department and the maternity ward and had



the opportunity to see a C-section. I loved experiencing the healthcare system, seeing the difficulties that people face and meeting the amazing people trying to a make difference to their local community." In their free time, Anna, Cordy and Georgia we were able to delve into lots of activities including surfing, volleyball, visiting rainforests and local stilt villages. Anna adds: "Getting to know the community and culture has been a lifechanging experience for us."

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#### **RUGBY**

This appears to be shaping up to be the most successful rugby season ever! The 1st XV remain unbeaten in 9 matches and will contest the Cheshire Cup Final and have already secured a National Cup Quarter Final having defeated rivals Stockport GS (42-10 W) under the lights at MRUFC and twotime-champions Bromsgrove School (26-27 W) with the final kick of the game. There were also impressive victories versus QEGS Wakefield (23-12 W), Lancaster RGS (33-10 W) and a flawless performance versus Sandbach School (0-30 W). The squad have been magnificent with a devastating and virtually unstoppable driving maul, whilst fly half Finlay Usher and centre Toby Wilson are also in devastating form in the back division. This has been the first time the Senior side have reached the County Final in 7 years, the longest unbeaten run in 12 years and an equal-best in the National Cup (last 8).



Elsewhere, there has been a 73% win rate from 75 games across all age-groups, putting King's on track to produce the best ever season. The U15s remain unbeaten in 9 matches and have also reached the last 8 in the National Cup; they hope to get closer to glory this season having made the last 4 last time. The U13s also remain undefeated and although there are no cup competitions at this age-group, they will be a force to be reckoned with in the future. We have thoroughly enjoyed welcoming

touring sides from Buenos Aires and Edinburgh, and look forward to our own travels later in the season to Cardiff (U13), New Zealand & Malaysia (U18).

King's are also handsomely represented within Sale Sharks DPP (47 players selected) and with several involved at Junior and Senior Academy Level. Congratulations to Haydn Keogh and Finlay Usher, who have been selected for Cheshire Rugby U18s and Harrison Milner, who has been selected for Lancashire U18s.

#### **HOCKEY**

The U19, U13 and U15 Girls are all still in the Independent Schools Plate Competition and progressing to the next round. The U16 and 18 Boys have recently competed in the North West Indoor Tournaments held at MGS where they put on some great performances.

against Merchant Taylors', St Anselms, Birkenhead and King's Chester. The U14, U16 and U18 Boys teams are currently competing in the County Cup and have enjoyed some solid wins so far. The U14s have been victorious against Cheadle Hulme, Wellington and Lymm and now sit top of their pool.
