

# St. Anthony's Centering Prayer

Centering Prayer is a method of meditation used by Christians placing a strong emphasis on interior silence. It is also an ancient form of meditation with roots in monastic traditions of St. Teresa of Avila and St. John of the Cross. We begin with a prayer, are silent for 20 minutes while returning our focus to God, and end with a prayer. This takes 20-25 minutes and we meet at 12:30 on Wednesdays in the Chapel. 



Pergolesi Magnificat

St. James Choir & Strings

The Magnificat is a hymn expressing joy and thanksgiving, sung by the Virgin Mary.

Francesco Durante composed two versions of his Magnificat in B Flat - the four-part version that we will sing, and a more elaborate five-part version featuring two sopranos. The composition date of either version is unknown, but both likely were written in the 1740s. Some controversy surrounds the Magnificat. Although scholars traditionally agree that Durante composed this Magnificat, in 1910 musicologist Giuseppe Radicciolli attributed the work to Giovanni Battista Pergolesi, Durante's talented pupil. That myth has followed the work ever since.

# What is Compline?

In short, Compline is a sung prayer service. Compline consist of psalms, short passages from scripture, an office hymn, canticle, litany, collects and additional prayers. The offering of prayer in the evening, by laity or clergy, has sometimes been described as the "goodnight prayer of the church". It rounds off the day and prepares us for a quiet night. Compline is offered when the work of the day is completed, and the quietness of evening settles over the hearts and minds of those who have come together in thankfulness for the blessings of the day, and in anticipation of God's gift of a new day.

#### A Junior-Senior Moment: Interview with Seminarians Drew Downey & Stephen Pecot

Drew and Stephen are students at Virginia Theological Seminary and sponsored by St. James. Stephen is a Senior and will graduate next May. Drew began seminary in August and is currently a Junior (the name for first-year students) and will graduate in 2025. Virginia Theological Seminary, located in Alexandria, Virginia is the largest of the accredited seminaries of The Episcopal Church and was founded in 1823.

# What has this year of seminary been like so far? What does the rest of the year look like? Stephen:

This year includes hands-on experience, discussions with our diocese, and preparing to make the entry into ordained ministry. I have continued an internship at a local church (Aquia Episcopal Church in Stafford, VA). But the best thing of all has been having my wife Travis with me for senior year. In the first week of January, I will take the General Ordination Exams, or GOEs. It is three days of exams covering six subject areas such as theology, liturgy, ethics, and scripture. During the spring, I will be attending our diocesan convention in Pensacola as well as finishing my last semester of classes. God willing, I will be ordained as a deacon just prior to graduation in mid-May (with ordination to the priesthood later in 2023). After graduation, Travis and I will pack up and head back home. No doubt there will be many a tearful goodbye to the friends we have made here over our three years.

#### Drew:

It is hard to believe that Chris and I are finishing our first semester, and it has been a time rich with community and spiritual growth. This new chapter has been difficult and yet rewarding. I say difficult because it meant leaving our family and friends to relocate north – I am told Virginia is considered "the south" but no one has heard of Conecuh Sausage so I'm still unsure. It is rewarding because we are living, worshiping, and growing our spiritual formation in a community with students and staff from different states, countries and even continents. Each week I join a small small formation group at a professor's home where the students alternate preparing a service of prayer and snacks. It is a beautiful way to grow closer to God and the people around all of us. In the spring semester I will continue some 2-part classes such as Old Testament, New Testament, and Contemporary Witnesses. I am also looking forward to taking some new classes such as "Evangelism" and "The Inklings." The latter class will discuss themes found in the works of C.S. Lewis, J. R. R. Tolkien, and Dorothy Sayer. I will also be gearing up for my Clinical Pastoral Education assignment over the summer months where I will be serving as a chaplain at a local hospital. I hear it is a tough, but rewarding opportunity.

#### What has it been like for your spouse?

#### **Stephen:**

Travis (Youngblood Pecot) stayed in Fairhope until now for two reasons: our youngest son James was still in school and because of the pandemic. With James in the US Navy and with the Covid pandemic abating, we felt the time was right for Travis to join me at VTS. We live in a lovely apartment on campus with our cat Josie and dog Piper, and Travis works at the campus pub and coffee shop. With her background in hospitality, she has found joy in fulfilling her personal ministry by showing people warmth, love, and a welcoming spirit. She has thoroughly enjoyed being part of the community here. As many of you know, she loves horses and has found friends and fun in the equestrian community in nearby Maryland. There is tremendous value that VTS offers which, with the support of St. James, has made this one of the best years of her life. She does miss her St. James family as well as Fairhope.

#### **Drew:**

Chris is working for a local bank called Burke and Herbert and is enjoying his new role as Assistant Branch Manager. He is learning new policies and procedures and is enjoying making new friendships among his coworkers. Thanks be to God for Chris for all his patience with me, and his help in making our new apartment feel like home. While I was in class during August term he was unboxing, assembling and arranging our household items. Some days he is able to make it home to attend evening worship with me. He also attends functions outside of the classrooms where we seminarians are able to "let down our hair" and enjoy some time of fun and fellowship. We have been a support team for each other and I am thankful each and every day for the amazing love he shows not only me, but also the community in which we live.

#### How does seminary compare with the typical college experience?

#### Stephen:

It has a college feel, and yet it doesn't. Since I went to a large state school more than 25 years ago, I find that a campus with less than 200 students—and with faculty also living here in community—results in a more family-type experience. We ascribe to the model of "Chapel, Class, Lunch": we attend daily services in our chapel, go to class, and eat lunch as a community. Most students live on campus, though there are some commuters. Many other things are typical college: we have study groups, meet with professors, and participate in committees.

#### **Drew:**

Seminary is quite different than my undergrad college experience. Truly living in a community means I not only study, worship and eat alongside my fellow students but also the teachers. It is not uncommon to have the Dean of Students, or one of the professors to sit down across from me at a table during lunch. At first it was a stressful experience, but once I realized they were not going to grill me on parsing a Greek sentence, or the eschatological themes in Mark I began to relax. Instead we talk as friends would about where we were from, our family, what brought us to the Episcopal Church, and how the weekend/week treated each other. One of the reasons I decided to attend VTS is their main purpose is driven by formation and the education of future leaders of church. There are other divinity schools that are tied to colleges with an undergrad presence, but I was looking for a school whose attention was to the church. My parents can attest I enjoyed my time at Auburn – maybe a little too much.

#### A Junior-Senior Moment: Interview with Seminarians Drew Downey & Stephen Pecot

#### What about outside of class? Are you involved with any activities and programs?

Stephen:

There is no shortage of things to do around DC and on campus. Aside from being minutes from the Smithsonian and the vast array of museums and exhibits, the region is steeped in history. On campus, many students take on pet projects throughout the year which anyone can plug into. Currently, we have a Christmas Angel Tree program. In March, VTS will host its second annual Out of the Darkness Campus Walk (which I started with a classmate and professor) to raise public awareness about issues surrounding mental health. Last month, VTS students worked with a local church to pack over 10,000 meals for local food banks. We even have a proper fall formal, called the Advent Affair, where Travis and I are looking forward to dressing to the nines, sipping wine, and dancing the night away as classes end for the fall semester.

#### Drew

I am currently staying active in a few clubs and societies around campus. I am the treasurer for the Student Aid Society which helps assistant seminarians who may need financial help for any sort of need such as broken computers, vehicle repairs, plane tickets home, or medical bills. I am also on the Cultivate VTS Committee which helps bring attention to the calling we as Christians have for being proper stewards of the bounty God has entrusted to us. I am coordinating the raised garden beds on campus that faculty and students to use. I am also involved in the choir and a bell ringer for the call to worship.

#### What has been most surprising? The most challenging?

<u>Stephen:</u>

The most surprising part of seminary was learning about the diversity of The Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion. There are classmates from India, Israel, Kenya, Liberia, and Mexico as well as most of the USA; I work for a professor who is a Baptist preacher; classmates are Episcopalian, Roman Catholic, Unitarian, and Lutheran; at a service you might hear multiple languages spoken. It has been enriching to be exposed to the many ways people around the world are oriented to the message of Christ. As far as challenging, it was building community remotely at the beginning of seminary (which we called "zoominary"). It is easy to build connections in the same room; but what about over video? Creating sustaining connections is vital in education, and it was difficult—though not impossible—to do so in my first year. It just required much more creativity and flexibility. But from those challenges comes a lot of resilience and ideas that I will bring back to our diocese.

#### **Drew:**

One of the big surprises I realized was not being able to do all the assigned readings. De, Forbes, and Amanda each gave me this advice. I can now report their advice was accurate. The amount of reading material we are given are substantial. I have learned the material not only guides us in our in class learning, but they also serve as a source of knowledge to take with us when we graduate. For me the most challenging part of seminary is being away from home during the holidays and major moments in our lives. For the majority of our lives, Chris and I, have been able to celebrate Thanksgiving and Christmas with our family and friends. While we have been able to wish our loved ones "happy birthday" or "happy Thanksgiving" via face-time and phone calls nothing beats being able to hug your mama. It is going to be different not being home for Christmas, but we will still be surrounded by our VTS family. We do look forward to the time when we will be able to come home and visit with everyone.

#### Any last words for the St. James community?

Stephen:

This journey of ministry and discovery was inevitable but made infinitely more possible with the prayers, kind words, and financial support that the St. James community showered upon us over the past three years. I want to thank all of you from the bottom of my heart. If you are in the Alexandria area before May, get in touch with us! Lastly, to know that St. James has been blessed with Amanda Dosher's presence and ministry has made the connection between St. James and my own seminary experience even more rewarding. I am constantly amazed at the myriad ways in which God works in our lives, and the best is yet to come. God is good, all the time. All the time, God is good.


#### **Drew:**
