Tracy High: Xiomara Fonseca reported that Tracy High has had college

presentations and workshops. SATs were given on October 8<sup>th</sup> and PSATs were given on October 18<sup>th</sup>. The Seniors won overall for homecoming including the power puff game against the

West High: Pauline Montemayor reported that this past week was their homecoming and was the first one at their new home stadium. The Seniors won the powder puff game. The overall theme was "Home Sweet Home". Seniors won overall. The King and Queen were Nicole Sterni and Madiagne Sarr. The Seniors also won the class float completion. Key Club cleaned up afterwards. The Tracy v. West football game was held October 3<sup>rd</sup> and West won. The volleyball

team started their league games and the soccer team has their final game today. Golf won TCAL league and the cross country team has a meet on Friday. Parent/teacher conferences went well. API participated in a cultural competition against other API groups around the county. SATs will be given this Saturday. Representatives from UCs and UOP will be visiting the campus.

Superintendent will bring donuts for the leadership classes at Tracy High and West High.

Stein High: Ricardo Ruiz reported that the first quarter ended. They held an assembly today and students received awards for their academic achievements. Last week they students had testing. Career Day will start tomorrow and will learn about different types of jobs. Students are preparing to take the CAHSEE next week. On Friday, they have a field trip to Delta College. They will take a tour and enjoy a play. On Thursday the students will participate in a mock election. The art display in the lobby of the DEC has artwork from Stein students.

### Recognition & Presentations:

**9.1** Recognize North School and the Boys' and Girls' Club for the New Garden at the School

Dr. Franco presented a certificate the Boys and Girls Club and North School. The crops planted in the North School garden include lettuce, chives, cauliflower and broccoli. The donation of these vegetables will help provide opportunity for people to eat healthy and fresh vegetables.

For the next three months students will take care of the garden and learn about botany, entomology and leadership as older students team up with younger classmates to care for the food. The garden is a great place for students to research, experiment and solve real life gardening problems. Holly Watts and Rob Payne represented the Boys and Girls Club. Principal, Fred Medina, and Assistant Principal Khush Gill, represented North School.

#### 9.2 North School Site Update on Achievements & Activities

Principal, Fred Medina and Assistant Principal, Khush Gill, presented a power point which showed their school improvement plan. North had a 34 point gain in their API score. Some of their challenges include their mobility rate, ELL growth, demographics and the free and reduced lunches have increased almost 55%; The neighborhood also poses certain challenges. They work with the City of Tracy and police department. They have scheduled training in cultural diversity with the CTA. They have a newcomers class, Kindergarten intervention, small group instruction, and focus time for grade 6-8. They support their staff with direct instruction training coaches and instructional tours. A direct instruction coach, Nathan Allen, spoke about the tremendous impact this has had on teachers. He teaches 7<sup>th</sup> grade ½ day. He has noticed great improvement and the students are more engaged. He believes that this is the way of the future and it will greatly improvement test scores. Mrs. Gill reported that they have provided a lot of

opportunities for the students such as family science night, the garden, reach for the stars and sports, which make kids want to be a part of the school. They also have community partnerships with the Boys & Girls Club, Costco and the City of Tracy.

Mr. Rob Payne spoke about the Boys and Girls Club at North. They average about 155 kids per day. They worked together with on the garden project. They also have a volleyball team, soccer and basketball. They have a money matters class which teaches the students budgeting and the importance of handling money. The Community Service group helps students understand what life is about. He is also working with Mr. Medina to plan teen nights. They also have a drama club, a newsletter, choir, art and science. He thanked the Board for opportunity to have a Boys and Girls Club at the North site. The band, led by Mr. Williams, played 2 songs. There are over 85 students in the band. Tonight, a group of 8<sup>th</sup> graders came and played.

Trustee Crandall passed. Trustee Lewis attended the Tracy High and West High homecoming games. There was a lot of spirit. The Monte Vista band at the West High parade played exceptionally well. He attended the West High parent conferences. He encourages parents to attend and be informed on their student's progress. Also CSU mentor online can send scores to all colleges you apply to for free. Trustee Hawkins attended the opening of the new Tracy High building. It was a great event and inside the building was beautiful. He received great comments from old time Tracyites. They felt that this was exactly what the Board said would be done with the bond issue. Next Friday is the Tracy High football game and the last concession stand. Trustee Swenson made some phone calls for Measure S last night. He feels the same about the Tracy High School opening of the classroom building. It's nice to have short speeches and guides. At last week's CIF meeting they discussed having boys' volleyball and girls'

wrestling. They may limit practice to 3 hours a day or 18 hours per week. Next year is a realignment year. The basketball playoffs will go from 8 to 16 teams. He is working on nominating Wayne Schneider for the Sac San Joaquin Hall of Fame. Trustee Guzman attended the city schools liaison committee. Denise did a presentation about joint use. **BACKGROUND:** On October 14, 2008, the Board of Trustees received a report concerning significant changes to the district Transportation system. A significant increase in ridership is expected in the Mountain House area, changes to high school boundaries will create new needs, and additional Severely Handicapped (SH) classes will cause additional routes.

As directed by the Board, a committee was formed to review transportation needs and to make a recommendation for the 2009-10 school year. The committee consisted of Ted Guzman (Board Member), John Heerema (Director of Transportation), Cheryl Domenichelli (Principal of Kimball High School), Janet Skulina (Program Specialist for the Special Education Department), Gordon Lindquist (Vice Principal at West High School), and Casey Goodall (Associate Superintendent for Business Services) met on October 21 to formulate options, and again on October 30 to reach consensus on recommendations.

At the time of agenda preparation, the recommendations are being considered by the Superintendent and his Cabinet. A presentation of the options will be made on November 18<sup>th</sup>, with approval of a plan to be requested on December

**RATIONALE:** Because transportation issues are expensive, yet so vital to many of our students, the issue will be considered over two board meetings.

**BACKGROUND:** On August 12, 2008 the Board authorized the Associate Superintendent of Business Services to enter into an Agreement with School Site Solutions, Inc. to develop a report on the potential impacts of the possible unification of the Lammersville Elementary School District (LESD) on both TUSD and LESD.

**RATIONALE:** Jim Bush, from School Site Solutions, Inc., formerly the Assistant Director of the California Department of Education School Facilities Planning Division, has prepared a comprehensive review of the report prepared by Art Thayer on behalf of the LESD as presented to the TUSD Board on June 24, 2008. He has also consulted with experts who are knowledgeable about the unification process and the financial and educational impacts that should be considered as part of unification.

FUNDING: School Site Solutions, Inc. contract is funded by developer fees.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Receive Report on Lammersville Elementary School District Unification Study as Prepared by School Site Solutions, Inc.

Background: Providing Early Mental Health Prevention and Intervention services for the young children in Tracy Unified School District is important to their overall well being as well as enhancing each student's ability to achieve academically. Many of the elementary schools in TUSD have joined forces with Vinewood Center for Children and Families to accomplish this goal.

Rationale: Working in partnership with Vinewood Center for Children and Families (formerly known as Tracy Mental Health Center), many TUSD students have greatly benefited from early mental health initiative services. Since 2005, approximately 800 students in grades K-3 have had the opportunity to participate in the Primary Intervention Program (PIP) on our local school sites. Recently, Second Step, a violence prevention program, was funded by the state, allowing even more students an opportunity to have positive school adjustment and improve their ability to cooperate and collaborate with their peers.

Vinewood Center is also conducting a series of Parenting Classes for parents with students of all ages which will be offered during the 2008-09 school year at South West Park and North School. These parenting classes are offered in English and Spanish. Each of these unique programs support District Goal #2: Provide a safe environment for students and staff that is conducive to learning and Goal #7: Develop and utilize partnerships that contribute to the achievement of District Goals.

**School Readiness Program** 

BACKGROUND: In April 2006, TUSD was awarded a grant from First 5 San Joaquin to provide a comprehensive school readiness program to children and families living within the attendance boundaries of North, Central, McKinley, and South/West Park Schools. A cornerstone of the PLAY Program is a preschool for families who do not qualify for subsidized programs. In addition to preschool services, TUSD partners with Family Resource and Referral Center and Sutter Tracy Community Hospital to provide a continuum of parenting, health and social support services. The PLAY Program was funded through the end of the fiscal year 2011 in the amount of approximately \$4.5 million.

When Holt School District was consolidated into Tracy Unified in 2007, TUSD took over a portion of the Holt/New Hope School Readiness grant from the San Joaquin County Office of Education and renamed the program the Delta Island School Readiness Program. This grant was funded for three years (July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2010) in the total amount of approximately \$416,810. The Delta Island School Readiness Program grant was used to expand the school readiness services available in Tracy through the PLAY School Readiness Program to the Delta Island School attendance boundaries.

As the third year of the PLAY Program and the second year of the Delta Island program begin, staff looks back with a sense of accomplishment and forward with a desire to continue to provide quality services that meet the needs of the families in Tracy. TUSD staff is requesting the opportunity to highlight progress toward accomplishing program milestones through collaboration efforts.

**RATIONALE:** An update on the progress on the PLAY School Readiness Program and the Delta Island School Readiness Program will be presented to the Board. This agenda item meets Strategic Goal #7, Develop and utilize partnerships that contribute to the achievement of District Goals.

FUNDING: There is no cost to the District; the District will receive grant money from First 5 San Joaquin to provide the PLAY School Readiness Grant (approximately \$1,916,220 for the period July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2009) and the Delta Island School Readiness Program (approximately \$416,810 for the period July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2010).

California *Education Code* Section 1240 requires that I visit schools identified in our county, review information in the areas noted below, and report to you the results of my visits and reviews. I am pleased to provide, for submission to your governing board at a regularly scheduled November meeting, the annual report for fiscal year 2008-2009 as required by *Education Code* section 1240(c)(2)(B) pursuant to the Williams Settlement. This report presents the results of my visits and reviews at Tracy Unified School District.

The purpose of these visits as specified in California Education Code Section 1240 was to:

- 1. Determine if students have "sufficient" standards-aligned instructional materials in four core subject areas (English language arts, mathematics, history/social science and science), including science laboratory equipment in grades 9-12 and as appropriate, in foreign languages, and health;
- 2. Determine if there is any facility condition that "poses an emergency or urgent threat to the health or safety of pupils or staff";
- 3. Determine if the school has provided accurate data on the annual School Accountability Report Card related to the sufficiency of instructional materials and the safety, cleanliness, and adequacy of school facilities, including "good repair" and
- 4. Determine the extent to which pupils who have not passed the California High School Exit Examination (CAHSEE) by the end of grade 12 are informed that they are entitled to receive CAHSEE intensive instruction and services for up to two consecutive years after completion of grade 12 and the extent to which pupils who have elected to receive services are being served.

The law further requires that the county superintendent:

- 1. Annually monitor and review teacher misassignments and teacher vacancies in schools ranked in deciles 1-3 (2006 Base API) and
- Receive quarterly reports on complaints filed within the school district concerning insufficient
  instructional materials, teacher vacancies and misassignments, emergency or urgent facilities
  issues, and CAHSEE intensive instruction and services under the Uniform Complaint
  Procedure.

Before proceeding with the report, let me define some basic terms:

- "Sufficient textbooks or instructional materials" means each pupil, including English language learners, has a standards-aligned textbook, or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home.
- A school facility condition that poses an "emergency or urgent threat: is a "condition that poses a threat to the health or safety of pupils or staff while at school."
- "Good Repair" means the school facilities are clean, safe and functional as determined
  pursuant to the school facility inspection and evaluation instrument developed by the Office of
  Public School Construction [Facility Inspection Tool (FIT)] or a local evaluation instrument
  that meets the same criteria. Each school district that receives state funding for facilities
  maintenance is required to establish a facilities inspection system to ensure that each of its
  schools is maintained in "good repair."

District [ ] SHALL; [ X ] SHALL NOT reimburse Contractor for out-of-pocket expense incurred during Contractor's performance of the services, including: mileage, meals an lodging in the district rates not to exceed those currently in effect for employees of the District Reimbursement of expenses shall not exceed those currently in effect for employees of the District. Reimbursement of expenses shall not exceed \$ for the term of the agreement.
c. District shall make payment on a [ ] MONTHLY PROGRESS BASIS, [ X ] SINGL PAYMENT UPON COMPLETION OF THE DUTIES and within thirty (30) working day from Contractor's presentation of a detailed invoice or on a claim form provided by District Original paid receipts are required for lodging, air fare (passenger coupon or ticket stub automobile rental, and parking. Claims for unusual expenses, such as teaching material photocopying, etc., must be accompanied by original paid invoices.
4. The terms of the agreement shall commence on November 19, 2008, and shall terminate on June 30 2009.
5. This agreement may be terminated at any time during the term by either party upon 30 day written notice.
6. Contractor shall contact the District's designee, <u>Janice Bussey</u> at <u>(209) 830-3232 ext.1551</u> with an questions regarding performance of the services outlined above. District's designee shall determine and when Contractor has completed the services described.

The parties intend that an independent contractor relationship be created by this contract and District assumes no responsibility for workers' compensation liability. District likewise assumes no responsibility for liability for loss, damage, or injury to person(s) or property resulting from, or caused by, the contractor's activities during or relating to the performance of service under this Agreement.

# Contractor agrees to hold harmless and to indemnify District for:

Any injury to person or property sustained by Contractor or by any person, firm, or corporation employed directly or indirectly by the Contractor or by any of the individuals participating in or associated with him or her, however caused; and any injury to person or property sustained by any person, firm or corporation, caused by act, neglect, default or omission, of Contractor, or any person, firm or corporation directly or indirectly employed by Contractor upon or in connection with this Agreement, or any of the participants arising out of or in the course of their term of this Agreement, and Contractor at his or her own cost, expense, and risk, shall defend any and all actions, suits or other legal proceedings that may be instituted against District for any such claim or demand, and pay or satisfy any judgment that may be rendered against District in any such action, suit or legal proceedings or the result thereof. Nothing herein provided shall be construed to require Contractor to hold harmless or indemnify District for liability or damages resulting from the negligence or willful act, or omission of District or its officers, agents, or employees.

- 8. This Agreement is for the personal services of the Contractor and Contractor may not assign the performance of the services to any person or persons who are not parties to this Agreement except for employees of Contractor.
- 9. Contractor certifies that his or her current employer, if any, is fully cognizant of this Agreement and that payments hereunder are not in conflict with any federal, state, or local statutes, rules or regulations or with any policies of Contractor's current employer.

District shall become the owner or, and entitled to, exclusive possession of all records, documents, graphs, photographic or other reproductions of any kind produced in the scope of services performed and no other uses thereof will be permitted except by permission of the District. Proprietary materials will be exempted from this clause.

BACKGROUND: District staff has evaluated the need to adopt sole source products for various systems specified for new construction and for the purchase of replacement items for old or non-functioning items. Currently, the District has a number of different products in our schools. It has become difficult for maintenance staff to repair or address programming issues because of the vast array of products currently being used. Much of the District's existing equipment has become obsolete and cannot be repaired. At some campuses, items are non-operational and were not replaced when they became older or obsolete. As the District moves forward with a number of new construction and modernization projects, as well as deferred maintenance and emergency repair projects, it is important to incorporate items that can uniformly be programmed, serviced, maintained and repaired.

RATIONALE: The District's Architects, Construction Managers and Director of Technology have recommended that the District standardize items that are to be purchased or replaced to maintain uniformity. Standardizing systems will help the District better maintain the health and safety of our students by being able to service and maintain equipment in a more timely and cost effective manner. Staff is recommending standards for a video surveillance system. Staff has evaluated the items recommended for standardization indicated in this Resolution.

FUNDING: No funding implications from this Resolution. Projects using District standard items will be funded by a number of different funding sources including: Deferred Maintenance, ERP, SSFP, Developer Fee, and General Fund.

**RECOMMENDATIONS:** Adopt Resolution 08-10 of the Board of Trustees of the Tracy Unified School District Adopting a Declaration of Sole Source Products.

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the District to have consistency between new and modernized facilities, and existing facilities, where it promotes increased efficiencies and/or economics.

**BACKGROUND:** In March of 2006 an audit was conducted of Board policies and administrative regulations. The audit identified the status of specific policies and regulations, and detailed requirements to bring these documents into compliance with guidelines with the California School Boards Association (CSBA). Recommended changes ranged from adding required policies, to making minor changes, to adopting language already in place, but for which no adoption date is identifiable.

A matrix of Competitives Sales Laws and Regulations, showing the agencies governing school competitive sales, the related laws and regulations, and detailing the specific limitations prescribed by each agency is included to better explain sales of items competing with the formal lunch program.

**RATIONALE:** BP 3551, AR 3551, BP 3554 and AR 3554 include language which was approved earlier but is modified to comply with CSBA recommendations. Additions are highlighted in bold lettering. Deletions are marked with a strikethrough.

**FUNDING:** Not Applicable.

#### California Legislature: California Education Code Sections 49430-4931.7

#### State Board of Education:

Title 5 of California Code of Regulations Sections 15500 & 15501

#### Governs Student Organization Sales

Regulations ONLY apply to student organizations

The governing board of a school district may permit a student organization of a school with a kindergarten to sell not more than one food item per sale when ALL of the following conditions are met:

- the specific nutritious food item is approved by governing board
- 2. the food sales do not begin until after the close of the food service period.
- 3. the sales during the day are not of food items prepared on the premises.
- 4. there are no more than 4 such sales per year per school.
- 5. The food item is a dessert type food, such as pastry, ice cream, or fruit.
- 6. The item sold is not one sold in the food service program at that school during that school day

High Schools & Junior Highs (also K-8 and Middle Schools) may permit an student organization to sell food items during or after the regular school day if

- a. The specific nutritious food items are approved by the governing board.
- b. A student organization or organizations may be approved to sell food at any time during the school day, including the regularly scheduled food service period as approved in 1 or 2 below:
  - 1. Only one such organization each school day selling no more than three types of food or beverage items such as confections, popcorn, nuts, fruit, or soft drinks; and/or
  - 2. Any one or more student organizations may conduct no more than four food sales of any food items during a school year in each school, but such sales shall be held on the same four days for any and all organizations.
- c. The sales during the regular school day are not of food prepared on the premises.
- d. The food items sold during the regular school day are not those sold by the district in the food service program at that school on that school day.

United States Legislature: Child Nutrition & WIC Reauthorization Act of 2004

Governs all districts participating in National School Lunch, School Breakfast, or Special Milk programs

Prohibits sales of Competitive Foods of Minimal Nutritional Value during a school lunch or school breakfast meal period

The sale of other competitive foods may, at the discretion of the State agency and school food authority, be allowed in the food service area during the lunch period only if all income from the sale of such foods accrues to the benefit of the nonprofit school food service or the school or student organizations approved by the school. State agencies and school food authorities may impose additional restrictions on the sale of and income from all foods sold at any time throughout schools participating in the program.

Appendix B lists foods of Minimal Nutritional Value

[Note: California laws and regulations are more restrictive than this regulation.]

### FOOD SERVICE OPERATIONS/CAFETERIA FUND

Tracy Unified School District has an established checking and savings bank-account at Bank of Stockton, Tracy Branch, for cafeteria activities. Said account shall be known as the "Cafeteria Account of Tracy Unified School District."

The Board authorized the Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent for Business Services, Director of Financial Services, and the Accounting Supervisor. At least two signatures are required on each check.

# Expenditures form the Cafeteria Account

- 1. Salaries: Salaries of food service personnel shall be paid from the general fund and reimbursed from the cafeteria account. The personnel and payroll procedures for cafeteria workers shall parallel those for all other employees.
- 2. Maintenance and Replacement Costs: Maintenance and replacement costs for food services shall be paid from the district general fund and reimbursed from the cafeteria account.
- 3. Food and Supplies: Costs of food and supplies shall be paid directly from the cafeteria account.
- 4. Other expense: All other expenses for food service shall be paid from the food services account of the general fund unless the Board of Education authorized payment from the cafeteria account.

#### **CONTROL OF CASH RECEIPTS**

Daily cash reports should be prepared for all meals served and for all monies received and deposited. Any difference in cash collections reported and actual cash receipts should be entered in the accounting records as "CASH OVER and SHORT". Significant and/or continuing differences should be investigated.

# **Legal Reference:**

# EDUCATION CODE 39890 et seq. Cafeteria, funds and accounts

The Governing Board intends that, insofar as possible, school food services shall be a self-supporting, nonprofit program. To increase cost effectiveness, the Superintendent or designee shall centralize and direct the purchasing of food and supplies, the planning of menus, and the auditing of all food service accounts for the district.

Meals may be sold to students, district employees, Board members, and employees ormembers of the fund or association maintaining the cafeteria. (Education Code 38082)

### FOOD SERVICE OPERATIONS/CAFETERIA FUND

In addition, meals may be sold to other individuals and organizations that are on campus during meal times for a legitimate purpose, such as classroom volunteers, parents/guardians, or student siblings.

The Superintendent of designee shall recommend meal prices for students and nonstudents for approval by the Board. Students who are enrolled in the free or reduced-price meal programs shall receive meals free of charge or at a reduced price in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Any meals served to nonstudents shall not be subsidized by federal or state reimbursements, food service revenues, or U.S. Department of Agriculture commodities.

Program financial reports shall be presented regularly to the Board.

#### Cafeteria Fund

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a cafeteria fund independent of the district's general fund.

The wages, salaries, and benefits of food service employees shall be paid from the cafeteria fund. (Education Code 38103)

Contracts with Outside Services/Providers

With Board approval, the district may enter into a contract for management consulting services related to food service.

#### **CASH COLLECTIONS**

All money received should be entered into the account books and records and a change fund should be established. The daily receipts should be deposited intact. Each site is issued starting cash to establish the change fund. At the end of the year, the starting cash is returned to the Food Service Office for deposit. Change should never be made by withholding a portion of the previous day's cash receipts.

California sales tax is applicable to all cafeteria adult sales and sales to pupils that are identified as the "Snack Tax" effective July 1991. It is suggested that the gross daily sales, including sales tax collections, be credited to the appropriate income account in the Cash Receipts Journal. Sales tax will be identified as an accounts payable entry.

Claims for reimbursements are to be prepared from the daily records of meals served in accordance with instructions provided and within the required timelines.

#### **CONTROL OF CASH DISBURSEMENTS**

#### **Processing Invoices**

Any payment should be supported by properly itemized invoices listing the name of the vendor and made out in the name of the district kitchen site. All available cash discounts should be taken. Where necessary, vendor's invoices subject to discount should be processed for payment in advance of invoices not subject to discount.

Before payment is made, vendors' invoices should be checked as to Purchase Order number, receipt of foods, verification of prices and extensions, and authorization of payment.

### Disbursement by Check

All cash disbursements should be made only by check. Checks should be pre numbered and have the legally required name of the cafeteria bank account printed on them. The date, and number of each check, including the amount, name of payee, and account distribution, should be recorded in the cafeteria.

Checks should not be signed unless drawn on the basis of itemized invoices for approved, legal expenditures relating to goods or services actually received.

Checks reimbursing the General Fund for wages, salaries, and benefits should be based upon amounts prescribed by the Governing Board. Each check should be drawn payable to a named payee.

Voided checks should be made non-negotiable by having the signature space cut out; these checks should be kept on file. In this way, an accounting may be made for each check. The number of each voided check and the fact that it is void should be recorded in the Cash Disbursement Journal. The resources in the cafeteria bank account should be used only for disbursements relating to the Food Service Department.

## **CONTROL OF PURCHASES**

Numbered Purchase Orders will be used to control all purchases. These are signed by the Director of Food Services.

Where a centralized system of purchasing is used, warehouse requisition forms are used as the basis for issuing food and supplies from stock. The purchase of perishable commodities delivered frequently on a continuing basis by a vendor may be controlled through the use or open purchase orders covering a specific period of time.

Orders should be placed promptly when notices of available surplus commodities are received from the Office of Food Distribution. Opportunities to reorder should be taken whenever additional supplies of surplus commodities may be used advantageously.

Purchased items received should be inspected by a person qualified to determine their conformity to specifications ordered by the school district.

Travel and expense forms for Food Service employees are processed usually every two months. See Business Services for appropriate form.

### **INVENTORIES**

Separate inventories of cafeteria food and supplies are taken at the end of each month on inventory forms which provide information relating to description, quantity, cost per unit and total cost, date of inventory and signature of the person recording the inventory. Detailed inventory information is needed for financial accounting and for review by the Child Nutrition Division of the Department of Education.

The costs of handling and shipping should be allocated to surplus food commodities for the purpose of determining inventory values of surplus items for other than Food Services activity.

Inventory control should assure that information is available to personnel responsible for purchasing. This is done so orders for replenishing the supply of required items are placed promptly.

# NON-INSTRUCTIONAL OPERATIONS

Food Service Program: Responsibilities

Employees of the school cafeteria are subject to same regulations, which govern other classified employees.

The Director of Food Services is employed on a monthly basis and may be paid either from the general funds or the Food Service Fund.

The Director of Food Services shall be responsible to the Assistant Superintendent for Business Services and shall report and give updates on all changes in services and programs.

### Site Administrator: Responsibilities and Duties

The site administrators shall be responsible for the conduct of pupils in the lunchroom, scheduling meal services so that they are available at the most advantageous times and necessary custodial services in the kitchen, serving and eating areas.

### NON-INSTRUCTIONAL OPERATIONS

# Food Services Program: Facilities

Any school or community use of the school cafeteria facilities (kitchens and/or multi-purpose room) shall be approved following guidelines as set by policies under Facility Use Section 3515, business and non-instructional operations—facility use.

The District procedure requires the school or community use of a kitchen and/or cafeteria facility to complete a Request to Use Public School Facilities Form (See Section 3515 for a copy of the form).

If use of a kitchen is requested, the Food Service Director has the authority to give final approval for use of kitchens. It is mandatory that a district food service employee be present. The school or community group will be billed for the total cost of the employee by the Food Service Department. The food service employee is there to see that the equipment is used properly and safely and that all utensils, etc., used are returned to their proper place. It is the responsibility of the user to have a cleanup committee to clean and wash tables, scrub pots and pans, wash trays and to leave the kitchen in the condition they found it. The food service employee may assist the clean up committee.

Breakage, damage or loss or equipment shall be paid by the organization using the Food Service facilities. Any such incident must be reported immediately to Food Services where cost shall be established and organization invoiced by the Food Services Department.

A custodian also is mandated for use of a kitchen facility to clean after use of the kitchen. The cost of a custodian is billed by the Facility Use Department. See Section 3515 for further information.

The cost for a food service worker during regular work hours will be charged at the cost of \$15.00 per hour. Time worked over an eight hour day or Saturday, Sunday or school holiday will be billed at \$45.00 minimum charge to cover two hours and \$22.50 for every hour over the two hours.

The number of different items and quantities stored may be great enough to require a continuous record of the inventory of food supplies. This is accomplished through an inventory software program.

Adequate, secure storage facilities should be provided to permit advantageous purchase in quantity and to protect supplies against theft.

#### **FOOD STORAGE PROVISIONS**

Storage of food and supplies shall be done so as to prevent waste, spoilage or pilferage. The issuance of food and supplies shall be restricted to purposes of the food services program and school organizations.

## A. Purpose and Scope

Meals shall be sold to students, district employees, Board members, and individuals and organizations that are on campus during meal times for a legitimate purpose, such as classroom volunteers, parents/guardians, or student siblings.

### B. General

With the exception of students who are eligible to receive meals at no cost, students or their parents/guardians may pay on a per-meal basis or may submit payments in advance. The Superintendent or designee shall maintain an account indicating payments received from each student or his/her parents/guardians for the purchase of school meals, and the expenditures charged for food items purchased.

These account balances shall be made available online to students and parents/guardians, or account balances may be obtained by contacting the Food Services Department.

## **Food Storage Provisions**

Storage of food and supplies shall be done so as to prevent waste, spoilage or pilferage. The issuance of food and supplies shall be restricted to purposes of the food services program and school organizations.

### **Charge Policy**

For students in the Kindergarten through fifth grades, if the account balance is insufficient to cover the cost of a purchase, the student will be allowed to charge one lunch. After one charge the student will receive an alternate lunch, which consists of one twin-pack of crackers, one ounce of cheese, milk, and one piece of fruit or a vegetable choice. Breakfast cannot be charged and there is no alternate for breakfast.

Students in sixth grade through twelfth grades are not allowed to charge for food items. Students can "earn" a lunch by assisting in the meal service or

cleanup. Students assisting will receive the same meal that is being served on that day. The meal will be entered as an earned meal and their account will not be debited.

Students qualified and approved for reduced meal benefits that exceed the credit will be provided a lunch, in accordance with CDE <u>Bulletin #USDA-SNP-01-2008</u> and Education Code 49550.

#### Cafeteria Fund

All proceeds from food sales and other services offered by the cafeteria shall be deposited in the cafeteria fund as provided by law. The income and expenditures of any cafeteria revolving account established by the Governing Board shall be recorded as income and expenditures of the cafeteria fund.

The cafeteria fund shall be used only for Board-authorized expenditures necessary for the operation of school cafeterias as defined in the California School Accounting Manual or appropriately reported to the California Department of Education. (Education Code 38091, 38101)

Any charges to, or transfers from, a food service program shall be dated and accompanied by a written explanation of expenditure's purpose and basis. (Education Code 38101)

#### Contracts with Outside Services/Providers

The term of any contract for management consulting services related to food services shall not exceed one year. Any renewal of the contract or further requests for proposals to provide such services shall be considered on a year-to-year basis. (Education Code 45103.5)

A contract for food service management consulting services shall not result in the supervision of food service classified staff by the management consultant, nor shall it result in the elimination of any food service classified staff or position or have any adverse effect on the wages, benefits, or other terms and conditions of employment of classified food service staff or positions. (Education Code 45103.5)

Health criteria established by the district for classified staff shall be applicable to all persons providing food service management consulting services. (Education Code 45103.5)

The site administrators shall be responsible for the conduct of pupils in the lunchroom, scheduling meal services so that they are available at the most advantageous times and necessary custodial services in the kitchen, serving and eating areas.

FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM: FOOD SALES OTHER THAN NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH
PROGRAM

For all schools participating in the National School Lunch Program, categories of food minimal nutritional value per federal regulations (Title 7, Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 210.2, 210.15b, 220.2 and 220.12) cannot be sold from the beginning of the school day, (defined by the USDA—as the time when students return to their classes as opposed to the time when the cafeteria stops selling lunches). In addition, food items offered for sale must be nutritious as defined by the Torres Legislation.

Competitive food sales in the elementary schools may not be conducted until after the last lunch period. There may be no more than one food item sold per sale and not more than four food sales per year. The food items may not be prepared on the premises and may not be an item sold in the food program that day. Items must be approved by the governing board.

Competitive food sales in the high school may not be conducted by more than one student organization each year. The organization must be approved by the board. The organization can sell no more than three types of food or beverage items, which cannot be prepared on the premises and may not be sold in the food service program that day. Other students organizations may conduct no more than four food sales of any food items as long as the items are not prepared on the premises and not sold in the food service program that day. Such sales must be held on the same four day for any or all organizations.

The Governing Board believes that sales of foods and beverages at school during the school day should be aligned with the district's goals to promote student wellness. Any food sales conducted outside the district's food service program shall meet nutritional standards specified in law, Board policy, and administrative regulation and shall not reduce student participation in the district's food service program.

The Board authorizes the Superintendent or designee to approve the sale of foods and beverages outside the district's food service program, including sales by student or school-connected organizations, sales through vending machines, and/or sales at secondary school student stores for fundraising purposes.

When vending machines are sponsored by the district or a student or adult organization, the Superintendent or designee shall determine how and where vending machines may be placed at school sites, district offices, or other school facilities.

FOOD AND BEVERAGE SALES ON SCHOOL CAMPUSES
SUMMARY OF THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION'S ADOPTION OF THE
CHILD NUTRITION ADVISORY COUNCIL'S RECOMMENDATIONS

The State Board of Education adopted the Child Nutrition Council's Report, "Food and Beverage Sales on School Campuses," as amended. The following is a summary of the recommendations contained in the Report, as amended.

- 1. Amendments to the State Education Code
  - a) Amend Section 48931 to address sales sponsored by adult organizations, so that any restrictions affecting student organizations would also apply to adult organizations.
  - b) Amend Section 39610 to require districts to provide an adequate are for all students to eat their lunches, not just those bringing their lunches.
- 2. Subsequent Amendments to California Administrative Code, Title 5 Regulations Pursuant to legislative amendments described above, amend state regulations (California Administrative Code, Title 5, Division 15, Chapter 1, Article 1):
  - a) Amend Section 15500 (Food Sales in Elementary Schools)
    - 1. The food item sold would have to be "nutritious" as defined by Ed code 39876; but would no longer have to be a "dessert type food".
    - 2. The same restrictions that currently apply to student organizations would apply to adult organizations.
    - 3. No other <u>changes</u> recommended regarding types of foods sold or frequency and timing of sales.
  - b) Amend Section 15501 (Sales in High Schools and Junior High Schools)
    - 1. The same restrictions that apply to student organizations would apply to adult organizations.
    - 2. No student or adult organization would be allowed to sell-food until after the end of the last lunch period.
    - 3. No other changes recommended regarding types of foods sold or frequency and times of sales.

### A. Purpose and Scope

Any food sales conducted outside the district's food service program shall meet nutritional standards specified in law, Board policy, and administrative regulation and shall not reduce student participation in the district's food service program.

### B. General

Food and beverage sales outside the district's food service program shall comply with applicable nutritional standards specified in Education Code 4931, 49431.2, 49431.5, and 49431.7.

### C. Forms Used and Additional References

### D. Procedure

At an elementary school, the sale of foods or beverages that do not comply with the standards in Education Code 49431 and 49431.5 may be permitted, as part of a fundraising event, only when the items are sold by students of the school and the sale meets either of the following conditions: (Education Code 49431, 49431.5)

- 1. It takes place off and away from school premises.
- 2. It takes place at least one-half hour after the end of the school day.

At a middle, junior high, or high school, the sale of food items that do not comply with the standards in Education Code <u>49431.2</u> may be permitted in any of the following circumstances: (Education Code 49431.2)

- 1. The sale takes place off and away from school premises.
- 2. The sale takes place on school premises at least one-half hour after the end of the school day.
- 3. The sale occurs during a school-sponsored student activity after the end of the school day.

Beverage sales that do not comply with the standards in Education Code 49431.5 may be permitted at a middle or junior high school as part of a school event under either of the following circumstances: (Education Code 49431.5)

- 1. The sale occurs during a school-sponsored event and takes place at the location of the event at least one-half hour after the end of the school day.
- 2. Vending machines, student stores, and cafeterias are used later than one-half hour after the end of the school day.

Additional Requirements for Schools Participating in the National School Lunch or Breakfast Program

The sale of foods outside of the district's food service program during meal periods in food service areas shall be allowed only if all income from the sale, including the sale of approved foods or drinks from vending machines, accrues to the benefit of the school, the school food service program, or the student organization(s) sponsoring the sale. (7 CFR 210.11, 220.12)

No foods of minimal nutritional value, as listed in 7 CFR 210, Appendix B, and 7 CFR 220, Appendix B, shall be sold in food service areas during breakfast and lunch periods. (7 CFR 210.11, 220.12)

In a school with any of grades K-8 that is participating in the National School Lunch and/or Breakfast Program, the Superintendent or designee shall not permit the sale of foods by a student organization except when all of the following conditions are met: (5 CCR 15500)

- 1. The student organization shall sell only one food item per sale.
- 2. The specific nutritious food item is approved by the Superintendent or designee.
- 3. The sale does not begin until after the close of the regularly scheduled midday food service period.
- 4. The sale during the regular school day is not of food items prepared on the premises.
- 5. There are no more than four such sales per year per school.
- 6. The food sold is a dessert-type food, such as pastry, ice cream, or fruit.
- 7. The food sold is not one sold in the district's food service program at that school during that school day.

In junior high and high schools, a student organization may be approved to sell food items during or after the school day if all of the following conditions are met: (5 CCR 15501)

- 1. Only one student organization conducts a food sale on a given school day and the organization sells no more than three types of food or beverage items, except that up to four days during the school year may be designated on which any number of organizations may conduct the sale of any food items.
- 2. The specific nutritious food items are approved by the Superintendent or designee.

- 3. Food items sold during the regular school day are not prepared on the premises.
- 4. The food items sold are not those sold in the district's food service program at that school during that school day.

**BACKGROUND:** On February 5, 2008 McFadden Construction, Inc. submitted the apparent low bid for the Tracy High School Modernization – Science Classroom Building Project; an agreement was signed on February 12, 2008 awarding the project to McFadden Construction.

On October 10, 2008, the District received a letter from McFadden Construction requesting substitution of the listed plumbing subcontractor, Roman Plumbing. The reason provided was that Roman Plumbing was insolvent and refuses to perform its subcontract. McFadden Construction requests substituting Roman Plumbing with McFadden Construction.

A hearing was held on October 30, 2008 in the District Education Center with Casey Goodall, Associate Superintendent of Business Services and duly authorized officer representing the District, and Denise Wakefield, Director of Facilities Development, along with Roman Plumbing and McFadden Construction and both their legal council. After hearing both sides, the District representative approved of the substitution request.

**RATIONALE:** Prime Contractor can request substitution based on the Public Contract Code §4107.a.2 – when listed subcontractor becomes bankrupt or insolvent and/or §4107.a.3 – when the listed subcontractor fails or refuses to perform his/her subcontract.

FUNDING: No funding necessary for this agenda item.

TIMING: The proposed changes will become effective upon approval of the Board.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TRACY JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ORDERING FORMATION OF SCHOOL FACILITIES IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 3 OF THE TRACY JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, on February 26, 2008, 2008, the Board of Trustees (the "Board") of the Tracy Joint Unified School District (the "School District"), located within the County of Riverside San Joaquin (the "County"), adopted a resolution entitled "A Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the Tracy Joint Unified School District of Intention to Form a School Facilities Improvement District" (the "Resolution of Intention"), stating its intention to form a school facilities improvement district (the "School Facilities Improvement District") proposed to be named the School Facilities Improvement District No. 3 of the Tracy Joint Unified School District pursuant to Chapter 2 (the "SFID Chapter") of Part 10 of Division 1 of Title 1 of the California Education Code (the "Education Code") and setting April 8, 2008 as the date for a public hearing to be held on the formation of the School Facilities Improvement District; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Resolution of Intention, notice of such public hearing was published in the *Tracy Press* on March 5, 2008, and March 12, 2008, in accordance with the SFID Chapter; and

WHEREAS, on this date, the Board conducted and closed said public hearing; and

WHEREAS, at the hearing, the testimony of all interested persons, including any persons owning lands within the School District, or in the proposed School Facilities Improvement District, on the formations of the School Facilities Improvement District and matters set forth in the Resolution of Intention was heard;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Board of Trustees of the Tracy Joint Unified School District as follows:

**Section 1.** All of the above recitals are true and correct.

Section 2. The School Facilities Improvement District is hereby ordered formed for the purposes and with the boundaries described in the Resolution of Intention pursuant to the SFID Chapter.

Section 3. The School Facilities Improvement District is hereby named "School Facilities Improvement District No. 3 of the Tracy Joint Unified School District."

Section 4. The estimated cost of the school facilities, furniture and equipment, and land proposed to be financed, as described in the Resolution of Intention, from bonds of the School Facilities Improvement District is \$75,000,000, including costs incidental to the creation of the School Facilities Improvement District, the conduct of a bond election and the issuance of the bonds.

Section 5. The boundaries of the territory included in the School Facilities Improvement District are described in the map (the "Boundary Map") showing the exterior boundaries of the territory included in the School Facilities Improvement District on file with the Clerk of the Board. The Clerk of the Board is hereby directed to sign the original Boundary Map and to file a copy of this Resolution and the Boundary Map with the County Auditor, the County Assessor, and the County Superintendent of Schools, and to file the same with the State Board of Equalization and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, no later than December 1, 2008.

Section 6.	This Resolution shall be effective from and after its date of adoption.

BACKGROUND: The Superintendent's Diversity and Equity Advisory Committee, which consists of administrators, teachers, union representatives, parents, students, city representatives, and Tracy city business owners, have worked collaboratively to research root causes, best practices and possible solutions to ensure a positive climate of diversity and equity to close the academic achievement gap. Currently TUSD has an achievement gap of approximately twenty points difference between its ethnically diverse student population and this gap continues to increase each year. The District and Equity Advisory Committee believes that some of the root causes are the lack of multicultural curriculum, lack of teachers that look like and identify with students; the training of existing staff and giving them the resources and tools to reach these students; and ensuring that all district policies, program operations and practices reflect this.

RATIONALE: The Superintendent's Diversity and Equity Advisory Committee recommends that a board policy be established that will ensure that the districts' future endeavors focus on the commitment to fairness, equity and inclusion as essential principles of our school system and to their measurable integration into all district policies, programs, operations and practices. This supports the following strategic goals: Strategic Goal #1 – Provide a variety of learning opportunities through standards based curriculum and assessment and research based instruction that ensures that all students meet or exceed grade level standards and results in closing the achievement gap. Strategic Goal #5 – Develop and support a high performing work force including hiring and retaining fully credentialed CLAD certified teachers. Strategic Goal #6 – Provide training and staff development opportunities that are designed to improve knowledge and skills of all employees.

### Multicultural Education B.P. 6146.6

It is the policy of the Tracy Unified School District that multicultural education shall be integrated across the curriculum. Multicultural education shall recognize the contributions of diverse people to the history and culture of this community, as well as to the state, country, and other nations. The curriculum shall reflect the perspectives, experiences, historical events, and achievements of the diverse student population represented in our community.

Students shall receive instruction designed to develop pride in their own identity and heritage; to understand, appreciate and respect the identity and heritage of others; and to recognize that dignity and worth are common to all people; regardless of physical differences or disabilities, ethnic, cultural, or religious backgrounds, gender, gender identity, or sexual orientation.

The District recognizes that the existence of an ethnically diverse staff is central to its ability to provide a multicultural education and shall strive to employ staff representative of the community it serves. The District also recognizes that all staff shall be given the resources and tools to achieve these goals.

The District is therefore committed to fairness, equity, and inclusion as essential principles of our school system and to their measurable integration into all district policies, programs, operations and practices.
