On behalf of our Governance Board, administration and faculty, we are pleased to present this annual report, summarizing highlights from the 2021-2022 school year.

At Woodlands Christian, we strive to equip leaders - spiritually, intellectually, creatively, physically and socially - to fulfill God's purpose for each of their lives. Through His transforming power, we believe that students can find their unique aifts and talents and reach their highest potential. Thus, we offer a rigorous Christian college-preparatory curriculum taught by an engaging faculty that delivers the personal mentoring and encouragement necessary to help our students succeed and develop a love of learning. Whether in the classroom, at an athletic competition or on the mission field, we challenge our students to become servant-leaders for Christ, capable of making an eternal impact for His kingdom.

This was another exciting year at Woodlands Christian as we achieved record student enrollment, completed a new state-of-the-art STEAM lab on the third-floor of the Micah Academic Center, renovated and enlarged our locker rooms in the Daniel Student Life Center, and expanded our fine arts programs to include vibrant performances and exhibitions of student-created art. Our students attained stellar scores on AP, SAT, PSAT and ACT exams with our seniors receiving the highest amount of merit-based college scholarship offers in our school's history.



Across all sports, our student athletes enjoyed strong athletic seasons. We also commenced a capital campaign to construct a fine arts education building and have received 47% of the gifts and pledges necessary to begin construction.

We value our responsibility as financial stewards. Tuition and fees cover 100% of our operating expenses, enabling us to use additional fundraising dollars to enhance our campus and programs. We have received clean, unqualified audits for each of the past 13 years, and debt service is less than 2% of our operating expenses.

We hope you enjoy the annual report, in which we focus on our previous year's achievements and on the annual report of gifts. We are, as always, grateful for the contributions of time, talent and treasure that we receive from the families and friends of Woodlands Christian.



Distinguished School

Woodlands Christian has once again been named an Apple Distinguished School through 2024. This marks the third time that TWCA has received this designation. Apple Distinguished Schools are centers of innovation, leadership, and educational excellence. They use Apple technology to connect students to the world, fuel creativity, deepen collaboration, and make learning personal.

STEAM director, Mrs. Tanya Sharron, shared the heart behind the program, "We seek to empower our learning community to be collaborative and creative with technologies, enabling one another to apply critical thinking and problemsolving skills while pursuing knowledge and understanding. Our hope is that our students and faculty will use this technology responsibly to personalize learning and experiences in creative and innovative ways as they prepare to impact our world as global citizens."

We are humbled by this achievement and believe it is a testament to our commitment to innovation as we prepare Warrior students for the 21st century.

Get to know Devin Gauthier, Director of Safety & Risk

What did you do before coming to TWCA? Any notable or interesting past jobs?

I was a Criminal Investigator/Special Agent for the Department of Homeland Security for 20 years. Prior to 9/11 and the government reorganization that occurred shortly thereafter, I worked as a Special Agent for the Treasury Department targeting criminal organizations violating Federal laws. Before becoming a Federal Agent, I was employed at the state level as a Juvenile Crimes Investigator for the Louisiana DPS&C doing court ordered investigations and parole supervision of troubled youth.

How long have you worked in safety & security/law enforcement?

I worked in law enforcement for 25+ years. Twenty of those years was in the SWAT/Special Response Team (SRT) realm doing high-risk tactical operations across the nation. Before retiring in December 2021, I served as the Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Houston Field Office SRT Commander for 6 years and was assigned to support other high-risk events, such as U.S. Secret Service details (presidential primary assignments, World Olympic sporting events, G8 summits) or national security events (Super Bowl, Final Four, etc.) during my career.

What is your mission in your role here at TWCA?

As the Director of Safety and Risk, I am responsible for the strategic development, implementation and oversight of a comprehensive, forward-thinking program that ensures the ongoing safety and security of TWCA students, staff, guests and physical property.

What attracted you to TWCA and what's been the best part so far?

After serving my nation and community in law enforcement, I decided that protecting children in education was the next worthy calling God had in store for me. All the many innocent, smiling faces around TWCA make my day every day!


How do you see God working in you or at TWCA?

I pray God uses me as a physical and spiritual Warrior on campus each day striving to make Woodlands Christian a safer learning environment amid all the chaos and evil of our current world.

Get to know John Crowley, **Middle School Assistant Principal**

What did you do before coming to TWCA?

Before coming to TWCA I served in various capacities at Charlotte Christian School in Charlotte, NC. I taught 8th grade US History, served as a team lead, was our Global Knights Coordinator (new schoolwide initiative to impact our school culture for Christ), a prefect mentor, and National Junior Honor Society Advisor, as well as coach and student life facilitator.

How long have you worked in education?

I have been in education for 10 years. Prior to my calling in education, I served at Wells Fargo in the loan department.

What attracted you to TWCA?

Trio Appointed to Military Academies

Three seniors from the class of 2022 were accepted to military academies — Austin Benigni (United States Naval Academy), Chanse Perkins (United States Military Academy West Point) and Stuart York (United States Military Academy West Point).

Acceptance to a military academy is extremely selective, with only 9.8% of applicants getting accepted. The real winnowing process is the application itself. In addition to submitting the standard items required by most colleges and universities — SAT/ACT scores, writing samples, transcripts, etc. — academy applicants must garner a nomination, pass physical fitness and medical exams, and go on a series of panel interviews. Nominations are perhaps the most unique component of the application process and must come from an authorized nomination source such as an elected official or high-ranking veteran.

Amy Rowe, Director of High School and College Advising, assists all high school students through their individual application process. She enhances the experience for academy applicants, facilitating mock application interviews between students and staff. "There is much to navigate but we are very familiar with the steps and our process has become a well-oiled machine," she said. "We continue to see rising interest in service academy attendance and we want to be sure they are prepared for all that it entails."

Both Chanse and Austin received nominations from Congressman Kevin Brady. They will continue their athletic careers as members of the basketball team at their respective schools. While playing for the Warriors, Coach Tanner Field witnessed the drive and dedication both Chanse and Austin possess, saying, "it is important to note that these guys worked just as hard in the classroom as they did on the court. 


Hands-On Learning Applied in Pre-K


Gearing Up for New Courses in High School

- DAY 1 Depart Houston
- DAY 2 Arrive in Madrid, 5-night homestay in Salamanca with host families.
- DAY 3 Language and culture classes. Walking tour of Salamanca.
- DAY 4 Language and culture classes. Spanish cooking class: learn to make tortilla de patata, paella and crema catalana.
- **DAY 5** Walking tour of the city center. Explore Catedral Vieja and Catedral Nueva, two cathedrals built side-by-side in contrasting styles - Romanesque/Gothic and Renaissance.
- Language and culture classes. Flamenco dance lessons from local dancers.
- DAY 7 Language and culture classes. Travel to Toledo, capital of La Mancha. This World Heritage Site is a cultural fusion of Christian, Arab and Jewish traditions from the Middle Ages. Dinner at a local restaurant.

- DAY 8 Walking tour of Toledo. Attend Mass at Toledo Cathedral. Visit Sinagoga del Tránsito, as Toledo is the capital of Sephardic Judaism. View exhibits. tombstones, costumes and sacred objects at the adjoining Museo Sefardi. Travel to Madrid, capital city of Spain, and have dinner at a local restaurant.
- DAY 9 Walk through Plaza de España. Tour Palacio Real, a huge palace, built in 1738. Spend time in Plaza Mayor. Explore the Prado, one of the world's finest art museums. Señor Broughton and Mrs. Cromack (TWCA nurse and chaperone) treat the group to a tapas dinner at a local restaurant and then have final reflection and discussion.
- DAY 10 Beg Señor Broughton to stay one more week. Depart Madrid and return to Houston.

What did you learn?

Obviously, my Spanish improved. I also got to dive into Spanish culture and experience the atmosphere rather than just reading about it.

What was the toughest part?

Communicating with my host. She spoke zero English, which forced me to practice my Spanish. I tried my best and she was very understanding.

What's your favorite memory?

Seeing the historical architecture. My favorite was in Segovia, where we got to see ancient Roman aqueducts and learn the history of the castle there.

How did Spain impact you?

What is a fun or interesting fact about you? I spent a month in Tokyo, Japan performing West Side Story. We opened a brand new theater there in the center of Tokyo.


Dance Program Kicks-Off

What is your mission as a teacher?






Freshman Retreat

Mrs. DeLeon no longer exhibits active signs of disease, but continues to crochet. Keeping her hands busy, she would crochet during Success Time. When students saw her making angel wings for Josiah's Project, an organization that matches parents of miscarriage/stillborn babies with a crafter who can make a memory blanket, wings and hat for their baby, they were intrigued. They asked if she would teach them to crochet and she said, "yes," marking the start of the club.

"I believe God sends us through trials for a reason and I wanted to use the skill and talents he gave me while ill to help others."

The purpose of Crochet Club is to provide a place for fellowship and an escape from the stress of high school and life. Club members started out making personal squares for a group blanket so everyone could develop and improve their skill. This first blanket was donated to the Auction & Gala to help raise money for the school.

The club's mission comes from 1 Peter 4:10-11 - "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good





stewards of God's varied grace: whoever speaks, as one who speaks oracles of God; whoever serves, as one who serves by the strength that God supplies—in order that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ. To him belong glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen."

Club members are using their newfound talent to bless others. They have made and donated several little blankets to the Ronald McDonald House. Parents can hold these blankets inside their shirts and leave them with their babies while staying in the NICU. Crochet Club also donated handmade goods to an organization in Alaska that works with children in foster care. One club member personally delivered them while on a mission trip over the summer.

The club consists of 18-24 ladies and gentlemen. They meet weekly during Success Time to work on projects and learn new techniques. Though there are varied skill levels, the students who are more advanced help the beginners. Everyone walks into the weekly meeting humming to the tune of "Hooray, it's Crochet Day"! Students love that they are developing a new skill and way to de-stress in the middle of the busy school day!





Our brand new summer program - RISE - Recharge In Summer Enrichment - launched in June 2022, with offerings for students in PreK-12th. 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

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

Operating Revenues



Long Story Short
