Within 15 days prior to the date of the annual meeting, all board members and members-election shall be notified in writing of the date and time selected for the meeting.

BACKGROUND: To be valid or to constitute an enforceable obligation against the district, education code 17604 requires that all contracts must be approved and/or ratified by the board of trustees. This requirement is met in several different ways, depending on the value of the requisition, the types of services or materials being procured, and the advance notice staff has in procuring the services or materials. Routine requisitions less than \$5,000 are ratified on the consent calendar when the board approves the warrants list. Except when specific exceptions are detailed in board policies and procedures, requisitions greater than \$15,000 are submitted as action items for board pre-approval. Also, Special Services and advice in financial, accounting, engineering, legal or administrative matters pursuant to Government Code 63060 meet the requirements.

Approve Assembly Vendors and Site Assembly Utilization Calendars

BACKGROUND: To be valid or to constitute an enforceable obligation against the district, education code 17604 requires that all contracts must be approved and/or ratified by the board of trustees. This requirement is met in several different ways, depending on the value of the requisition, the types of services or materials being procured, and the advance notice staff has in procuring the services or materials.

RATIONALE: School site assemblies require pre-approval to ensure three different documents are in place: an approved contract; a certificate of insurance; an endorsement letter naming the district an additional insured. In addition, all assemblies are reviewed to ensure the content is appropriate for student audiences, and that conflicts do not occur with other school site or district events.

To that end, the attached list of vendors has met all of the criteria to provide assemblies at TUSD sites, and their presentation has been deemed appropriate for TUSD students. Additionally, the attached calendar of events has been reviewed to ensure the date and time of the event does not conflict with other site or district events.

This list will be updated monthly and presented to the board for approval.

BACKGROUND: : Schoolwide programs (SWPs) are a cornerstone of the vision for school reform as defined in Title I of the federal No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001. Research shows that in order for the lowest achieving students in the highest poverty schools to meet high standards of performance, the school's entire instructional program, not just a separate Title I program, must be substantially improved. Since no separate student eligibility process is required for participation in a SWP, the advantage to a school becoming a SWP is that the SWP educational program serves ALL students. Fiscally, NCLB allows schools to consolidate or blend funds. SWP schools may then use their consolidated federal, state, and local funds to reform their entire educational program. Title I schools often choose to change their status from targeted assistance to SWP status in order to better meet the needs of their students.

RATIONALE: During the 2008-2009 Villalovos School was identified as the next school within Tracy Unified School District to qualify as a Title 1 School. This determination is made based upon the number of students at each site who qualify for free and reduced lunch. To be eligible to operate as a SWP school, schools must have a concentration of students living in poverty of at least 40 percent in the initial year of the SWPs. To become a SWP school, eligible Title I schools must submit a request for Authorization to be Schoolwide Program to the California Department of Education

FUNDING: There is no cost to the District.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve the Request to the California Department of Education to Authorize Villalovoz School as a Schoolwide Title 1 Program

BACKGROUND: In April 2006, TUSD was awarded a grant from First 5 San Joaquin to provide a comprehensive school readiness program to children (age zero to five) and their families living within the attendance boundaries of North, Central, McKinley, and South/West Park Schools. A cornerstone of the PLAY Program is a preschool for families who do not qualify for subsidized programs. BACKGROUND: On August 11, 2009, the Board of Trustees adopted Resolution No. 09-05 in Support of a Joint Petition for Reorganizations of a Portion of the Tracy Joint Unified School District to Form a Lammersville Unified School District; and in support of the School District Reorganization Study and Implementation Plan to Form the Lammersville Unified School District. Simultaneous with the Joint Petition, an agreement between the Tracy District and the Lammersville District (the "Pre-Unification Agreements") was drafted setting forth the obligations and rights of the Lammersville District and the Tracy District in relation to the formation of the Lammersville Unified School District.

The San Joaquin County Committee on School District Reorganization has initiated the process of conducting hearings in response the Joint Petition; however, the Governing Board of the Mountain House District has also expressed an interest in the Unification of the Lammersville District and passed Resolution No. 2009/10-5 in support of the Joint Petition and the Unification on October 22, 2009. The Resolution expressed the Mountain House Board's desire to reorganize and become a Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the future Lammersville Unified School District.

RATIONALE: In response to Mountain House Board's desire to withdraw from the Tracy Joint Unified School District as a Thompson Bill component of the Tracy District; Addendum No. 1 to the Joint Petition has been prepared, a Pre-Unification Agreement between the Tracy Joint Unified School District and the Mountain House Elementary School

District has been prepared and Resolution No. 09-13 in Support of the Mountain House School District's Reorganization to become a Thompson Bill District of the Future Lammersville Unified School District has been prepared to cooperate with the Mountain House District's reorganization efforts.

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE MOUNTAIN HOUSE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT'S REORGANIZATION TO BECOME A THOMPSON BILL DISTRICT OF THE FUTURE LAMMERSVILLE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT; APPROVING THE FORM OF AN AGREEMENT CONCERNING THE ACCOMMODATION OF HIGH SCHOOL AGE STUDENTS RESIDING WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE MOUNTAIN HOUSE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT; APPROVING AN ADDENDUM TO THE UNIFICATION PETITION; AND CONFIRMING THAT THE CONDITIONS TO THE PETITION FOR REORGANIZATION HAVE BEEN SATISFIED

WHEREAS, Tracy Joint Unified School District ("Tracy District") is a unified school district serving grades Kindergarten through 12th within the boundaries of the former Tracy Elementary School District, the former Delta Island Elementary School District, and the former Holt Elementary School District as well as serving grades 9th through 12th within the territory that it shares in common with Banta Elementary School District, the New Jerusalem Elementary School District, the Jefferson Elementary School District, and the Lammersville Elementary School District ("Lammersville District") within San Joaquin County and the Mountain House School District ("Mountain House District") within Alameda County;

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the Lammersville District has expressed an interest in reorganizing the Lammersville District into a new unified school district serving grades Kindergarten through 12th for students within the existing Lammersville District ("Unification"), with such unified school district to be referred to as the Lammersville Unified School District ("Lammersville Unified School District");

WHEREAS, to that end, the Tracy District and the Lammersville District adopted Resolution Numbers 08-43 and 08-09-18, respectively, declaring their support for the proposed Unification of the Lammersville District;

WHEREAS, thereafter, the Resolution and Petition for Reorganization -School District Reorganization Study and Implementation Plan to Form the Lammersville Unified School District (the "Joint Petition") was prepared by the Lammersville District and the Tracy District and considered by the Governing Boards of the respective school districts at public meetings held by the Boards;

WHEREAS, contemporaneous with the Joint Petition, an agreement between the Tracy District and the Lammersville District (the "Pre-Unification Agreement") was drafted setting forth the obligations and rights of the Lammersville District and the Tracy District in relation to the formation of the Lammersville Unified School District, including, but not limited to, administrative arrangements and agreed upon procedures to accommodate students and programs, interdistrict attendance of pupils who are residents of the respective districts, the procedures and processes to carry out the Unification consistent with Education Code sections 35700 through 35785, and the equitable division of resources following the Unification;

WHEREAS, the Board of the Tracy District adopted Joint Resolution Number 09-05 in support of the Joint Petition on August 11, 2009;

WHEREAS, the Tracy District's Board's support of the Joint Petition was conditioned on additional terms contained in an addendum to Resolution Number 09-05, including, but not limited to, an amendment to a mitigation agreement between the Tracy District and Trimark Communities, and its successors (i.e., Shea Mountain House, LLC);

WHEREAS, the Board of the Lammersville District adopted Joint Resolution Number 09-10-03 in support of the Joint Petition, on August 13, 2009;

WHEREAS, the San Joaquin County Committee on School District Reorganization has commenced the process of conducting hearings in response to the approval of the Joint Petition by the Boards of the Tracy District and the Lammersville District;

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the Mountain House District has also expressed an interest in the Unification of the adjoining Lammersville District;

WHEREAS, similar to Lammersville District, the Mountain House District is a Thompson Bill component school district as provided for in Education Code section 35542;

WHEREAS, in support of the Joint Petition, the Board of the Mountain House District adopted Resolution Number 2009/10-5 in support of the Joint Petition and the Unification, on October 22, 2009;

WHEREAS, the Mountain House District's Resolution Number 2009/10-5 also expressed the Mountain House Board's desire to no longer be a Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the Tracy District and instead, to

reorganize to become a Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the future Lammersville Unified School District;

WHEREAS, in response to the interests of the Mountain House District as expressed in its Resolution No. 2009/10-5, an addendum to the Joint Petition has been prepared, entitled Addendum No. 1 to the Lammersville Unified School Reorganization Study and Implementation Plan ("Addendum No. 1 to the Joint Petition") and presented to the Board of the Tracy District;

WHEREAS, contemporaneous with the preparation of Addendum No. 1 to the Joint Petition, a Pre-Unification Agreement between the Tracy Joint Unified School District and the Mountain House Elementary School District has been prepared and presented to the Board of the Tracy District; and

WHEREAS, by way of this Resolution, the Tracy District intends: (i) to express its support for the proposed reorganization by the Mountain House District as described in Addendum No. 1 to the Joint Petition, (ii) to approve Addendum No. 1 to the Joint Petition, and (iii) to approve the Pre-Unification Agreement between the Tracy Joint Unified School District and the Mountain House Elementary School District.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education hereby finds, determines and orders as follows:

- Section 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.
- Section 2. Tracy District's Support of Mountain House District's Reorganization. The Board hereby approves of and supports the efforts of the Mountain House District to withdraw as a Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the Tracy District and to reorganize to become a Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the future Lammersville Unified School District for purposes of providing high school educational services to high school age students residing within the Mountain House District's boundaries. Further, the Board authorizes and directs Tracy District staff to prepare materials and data and to cooperate with the Mountain House District's reorganization efforts.

Section 3. Approval of Addendum No. 1 to the Joint Petition. The Board hereby approves Addendum No. 1 to the Joint Petition, attached hereto as **Exhibit A** in substantially final form, to become an addendum to the Joint Petition previously approved by the Board and on file with the San Joaquin County Committee on School District Organization. The Tracy District's Superintendent and the Associate Superintendent of Business Services is entitled to make such insertions, revisions, corrections, or amendments as are necessary to Addendum No. 1 to the Joint Petition as long as such modifications are consistent with the terms and conditions of this Resolution, consistent with the Pre-Unification Agreement

between the Tracy Joint Unified School District and the Mountain House Elementary School District, and consistent with the Joint Petition.

Approval of the Pre-Unification Agreement. The Board hereby Section 4. approves the form of the Pre-Unification Agreement between the Tracy Joint Unified School District and the Mountain House Elementary School District, attached hereto as Exhibit B in substantially final form, concerning the obligations and rights of both districts upon the reorganization of the Mountain House District to become a Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the future Lammersville Unified School District. Such obligations and rights include, but are not limited to, administrative arrangements and agreed upon procedures to accommodate students and programs and the interdistrict attendance of high school age pupils who are residents of the Mountain House District. The Board further authorizes and directs the Superintendent and the Associate Superintendent of Business Services of the Tracy District and their designees ("Officer"), and each of them individually, for and in the name of the Tracy District, to approve, execute, and deliver such agreement in substantially the form presented to this meeting, with such changes, insertions, revisions, corrections, or amendments as shall be approved by the Tracy District Officer executing the agreement for the Tracy District.

Section 5. <u>Transportation Service for High School Age Students Residing</u> within the Mountain House District. Consistent with the Mountain House Resolution Number 2009/10-5, the Board hereby declares that upon the Mountain House District's withdrawal from the Tracy District and reorganization to become a Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the future Lammersville Unified School District, the Tracy District shall no longer be obligated to provide transportation services to the high school age students residing within the boundaries of the Mountain House District. Such obligation shall thereafter be the responsibility of the future Lammersville Unified School District.

Section 6. <u>Satisfaction of Conditions to Support of Joint Petition</u>. The Board hereby finds that the conditions to the Tracy District's support of the Joint Petition, set forth in Addendum No. 1 to Joint Resolution No. 09-05, have been satisfied. As a result, the Tracy District states its unconditional support for the Joint Petition and the Lammersville District's Unification efforts.

PRE-UNIFICATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TRACY JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND THE MOUNTAIN HOUSE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT

PRE-UNIFICATION AGREEMENT

By and Between

TRACY JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

and

MOUNTAIN HOUSE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT

This Pre-Unification Agreement (hereafter, the "Agreement"), dated ________, 2009, is made and entered into by and between the Tracy Joint Unified School District (hereafter the "Tracy District") and the Mountain House Elementary School District (hereafter the "Mountain House District"), collectively the "Districts," both school districts organized and existing under the laws of the State of California, and is predicated upon the following:

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Mountain House District is a non-unified district serving grades kindergarten through 8th;

WHEREAS, the Tracy District is a unified school district serving grades kindergarten through 12th within the boundaries of the Tracy Elementary School District and serving grades 9th through 12th within that territory that it shares in common with the Banta Elementary School District, the New Jerusalem Elementary School District, the Jefferson Elementary School District and the Lammersville Elementary School District (the "Lammersville District") within San Joaquin County and the Mountain House District within Alameda County (a map of the boundaries of the Tracy District is attached hereto as Exhibit A);

WHEREAS, the Mountain House District is an independent, Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the Tracy District with boundaries that touch portions of the Tracy District boundaries;

WHEREAS, high school age students residing within the Mountain House District currently receive high school educational services from the Tracy District;

WHEREAS, on October 22, 2009 the Mountain House District passed and adopted a resolution in support of the efforts of the Lammersville District to reorganize to become a unified school district serving grades kindergarten through 12th, with the goal of constructing its own high school, and to be referred to as the Lammersville Unified School District (the "Lammersville Unified School District");

WHEREAS, the governing board of the Mountain House District, with the support of the San Joaquin County Office of Education and the Alameda County Office of Education, desires to withdraw as a Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the Tracy District and to

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reorganize as a Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the future Lammersville Unified School District in conjunction with the unification of the Lammersville District;

WHEREAS, the Board of the Tracy District supports the concept of the reorganization of the Mountain House District to become a Thompson Bill component elementary school district of the future Lammersville Unified School District, subject to agreement by the Districts to certain conditions as set forth herein;

WHEREAS, in order to accommodate high school age students from within the future Lammersville Unified School District and the Mountain House District on a long-term basis, the future Lammersville Unified School District seeks to construct and operate a Lammersville Unified School District high school (the "New High School") within its boundaries;

WHEREAS, in the event of voter approval of unification of the Lammersville District, construction of the New High School is anticipated to commence in the summer of 2013 and anticipated to become operational following the conclusion of construction. Even though the planning of New High School will commence immediately, the exact dates of commencement of construction and completion are merely estimates, and are not known with certainty;

WHEREAS, the Districts acknowledge that Education Code section 46600 authorizes two or more school districts to enter into an agreement for the interdistrict attendance of pupils who are residents of the respective districts;

WHEREAS, an agreement between the Tracy District and the Lammersville District (the "Pre-Unification Agreement") was drafted setting forth the obligations and rights of the Lammersville District and the Tracy District in relation to the formation of the Lammersville Unified School District, including, but not limited to, administrative arrangements and agreed upon procedures to accommodate students and programs, interdistrict attendance of pupils who are residents of the respective districts, the procedures and processes to carry out the Unification consistent with Education Code sections 35700 through 35785, and the equitable division of resources following the unification;

WHEREAS, reorganization of the Mountain House District will require a variety of administrative arrangements and agreed upon procedures in order to accommodate high school age students residing with the boundaries of the Mountain House District and programs for such students at Tracy District high schools prior to the construction of a suitable high school facility within the Lammersville Unified School District;

WHEREAS, the Tracy District and the Mountain House District intend to adopt the Pre-Unification Agreement between the Tracy District and the Lammersville District as a mechanism for setting forth such administrative arrangements and agreed upon procedures for the provision of educational services to the high school age students residing within the Mountain House District following the reorganization of the Mountain House District;

WHEREAS, the Districts further acknowledge that those procedures of the Education Code governing in part the process for unification of school districts, namely Education Code sections 35500 through 35785, provide further guidance and authority for the anticipated

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reorganization of the Mountain House District, and it is the intent of the parties to this Agreement to delineate certain procedures, and agree upon certain approaches to carry out the process for reorganization as contemplated by the parties hereto. The procedures set forth in the Education Code sections 35500 through 35785 shall hereinafter be referred hereto as the "Unification Law";

WHEREAS, the Districts additionally wish to provide for an orderly transition, while ensuring the availability of adequate facilities for high school students of both Districts; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Agreement to set forth the rights and obligations of the Districts in relation to the application of the Unification Law and the reorganization of the Mountain House District.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements set forth herein, the Districts do hereby agree as follows:

AGREEMENT:

- 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. Provision of High School Educational Services. The Tracy District and the Mountain House District agree that the terms and conditions of the Pre-Unification Agreement between the Tracy District and the Lammersville District shall govern the relationship between the Tracy District and the Mountain House District with respect to the reorganization of the Mountain House District, subject to the exceptions set forth herein. As a result, as of the Unification Date (defined in Paragraph 2.G of the Pre-Unification Agreement) high school age students residing within the Mountain House District shall have the same rights and be treated in the same manner as high school students of the future Lammersville Unified School District, and shall be allowed to attend Tracy District high schools on a space available basis. Further, as of the Unification Date, the Tracy District and the Mountain House District shall have the same rights and obligations, as the Tracy District and the Lammersville District, respectively, have under the Pre-Unification Agreement.
- 3. <u>Mountain House District Reorganization</u>. The parties acknowledge and agree that references in the Pre-Unification Agreement to the "unification" of the Lammersville District shall mean the "reorganization" of the Mountain House District in the context of this Agreement.
- 4. <u>Alameda County Office of Education</u>. The parties further acknowledge and agree that references to the "San Joaquin County Office of Education," especially with regard to approvals and support of the unification and reorganization process, shall include the "Alameda County Office of Education" in the context of this Agreement.
- 5. <u>Petition for Unification</u>. Pursuant to the Unification Law, the Tracy District and the Lammersville District prepared, and their respective governing boards approved, the Resolution and Petition for Reorganization School District Reorganization Study and Implementation Plan to Form the Lammersville Unified School District (the "Joint Petition").

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The Joint Petition has been amended and approved by the governing boards of the Tracy District and the Lammersville District to include the impact of the Mountain House District's reorganization on the Tracy District and the future Lammersville Unified School District.

- 6. <u>Costs</u>. In consideration of the Tracy District providing educational services to high school age students residing within the Mountain House District following its reorganization, the future Lammersville Unified School District shall pay to the Tracy District funding received for such students from Federal, State and local sources of revenue as set forth in the Pre-Unification Agreement between the Tracy District and the Lammersville District at Paragraph 5. Notwithstanding Paragraph 2 above, for purposes of this Agreement, the Tracy District acknowledges that it does not expect to receive developer school impact mitigation fees to serve the high school age students from the Mountain House District.
- 7. <u>Transportation</u>. Notwithstanding Paragraph 2 above, after the Unification Date, the Tracy District shall no longer have any obligation to provide transportation to the high school age students residing within the boundaries of the Mountain House District.
- 8. <u>Special Education Services</u>. The parties acknowledge and agree that references to the "San Joaquin County Office of Education Special Education Local Plan Area" shall mean the "Tri-Valley Special Education Local Plan Area" in the context of this Agreement.
- 9. <u>Notices</u>. All notices that are required to be given by one party to the other under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been given if delivered personally or enclosed in a properly addressed envelope deposited in a United States Post Office for delivery by registered or certified mail addressed to the Districts at the following address:

- 10. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the Districts as to the subject matter herein. This Agreement supersedes any prior or contemporaneous negotiations, representations, agreements, and understandings of the Districts with respect to the subject matter herein.
- 11. <u>Choice of Law</u>. This Agreement is made under and will in all respects be interpreted, enforced, and governed by the laws of the State of California, without regard to rules regarding conflict of interest law. Any litigation by either District to enforce or interpret the terms of this agreement shall be brought in San Joaquin County, California.
- 12. <u>Construction</u>. This Agreement has been jointly negotiated and drafted. The language of this Agreement shall be construed as a whole according to its fair meaning and not strictly for or against either of the Districts.
- 13. <u>Enforcement</u>. If there is litigation of any kind by either of the Districts to enforce the provisions of this Agreement, each party shall be responsible for their own fees and costs incurred in connection with such litigation or appeal thereof.
- 14. <u>Severability</u>. If any term, provision, covenant or condition of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remainder of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

BACKGROUND: On or about November 13, 2009, a claim was received by the Tracy Unified School District in which the claimant stated that a loss or injury occurred on or about August 3, 2009. The District's insurance providers reviewed the claim and determined:

a. The information provided to date does not suggest that there is a liability on behalf of the School District.

The District's insurance providers recommends a rejection/denial of this claim by the Board of Trustees.

The amount of the claim is noted as exceeding \$66,000.00.

RATIONALE: District's insurance advisors, legal advisors, and District staff recommend rejection/denial of this claim. This is standard practice in order to protect the District from future litigation.

FUNDING: District insurance account covers costs up to the Board approved deductible amount.

RECOMMENDATIONS: All claims December 8, 2009 and after are hereby denied/rejected.

SUBJECT: Certify 2009-2010 Fiscal Year First Interim Report

BACKGROUND: Education Code Section 42130 and 42131 require that the superintendent of each school district shall submit two reports to the governing board of the district during each fiscal year. The first report shall cover the financial and budgetary status of the district for the period ending October 31. The second report shall cover the period ending January 31. Both reports shall be approved by the district governing board no later than 45 days after the close of the period being reported. All reports required by this subdivision shall be in a format or on forms prescribed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction, and shall be based on standards and criteria for fiscal stability adopted by the State Board of Education pursuant to Section 33127. The reports, and supporting data, shall be maintained and made available by the school district for public review.

The governing board of each school district shall certify, in writing, within 45 days after the close of the period being reported, whether or not the school district is able to meet its financial obligations for the remainder of the fiscal year and, based on current forecasts, for the subsequent fiscal year.

In addition to the AB1200 oversight responsibilities generated in 1992, additional oversight responsibilities were added in 2004 with AB2756 requiring the San Joaquin County Office of Education added an additional requirement that the Tracy Unified School District board review the assumptions supporting the multiple year projections. The review associated with these two levels of review will be included with the First Interim Report document.

It should be noted that labor negotiations have not been completed for the current year, nor have any impacts caused by negotiations on the current or subsequent year budgets been included in this budget analysis.

Furthermore, the district is experiencing declining enrollment of approximately 100 students per year, and in the midst of facing the largest budget cuts ever proposed for TUSD. While the depth of further reductions are not yet known, the state's estimated shortfall, as announced by the California Legislative Analyst on November 18th, is a staggering \$14.4 billion per year, with half of the recommended cuts, \$7.2 billion, most likely coming from K-12 education. This statewide \$7.2 billion cut to K-12 education might lead to additional cuts of approximately \$18.7 million to TUSD for the current school year. The impact of these reductions will become clearer when Governor Schwarzenegger proposes his state budget in January.

The First Interim Report confirms a qualified review in which the district will be able to meet current obligations, but not the obligations of any future years.

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FUNDING: The first interim report generates no cost. It is merely a reporting of all projected revenues and expenses in the current and next two fiscal years. This report and the actions required to implement the changes will ensure the district is able to meet its financial obligations for the remainder of the fiscal year and, based on current forecasts, for the subsequent three fiscal years.

RECOMMENDATION: Certify 2009-2010 Fiscal Year First Interim Report.

BACKGROUND: On October 13th and 27th, 2009, the Board of Education reviewed a new policy governing Community Support Organizations. The policy represents best practices recommended by the California School Boards Association. Advisory groups were added as an additional set of groups covered by the policy.

RATIONALE: Bold items in the attached Administrative Regulation reflect recommended changes. Formatting will be corrected once changes are completed.

FUNDING: There is no cost to name these facilities.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt Board Policy 1230 Community Support Organizations (Third Reading – Intent to Adopt)

COMMUNITY SUPPORT ORGANIZATIONS

The Governing Board recognizes the importance of having parent support/booster clubs that enhance and assist in furthering the educational opportunities of students.

Community support organizations (CSO) such as Parent Teacher Clubs, Parent Teacher Associations, Athletics Boosters, Band Boosters, Advisory Groups, and any other organizations approved by the Board to promote, encourage, and support the approved academic, co-curricular, and extra curricular activities of the district. All CSO's are directly responsible to the respective building principal who must operate under the laws of the State and administrative guidelines of the district.

The Board recognizes that school-connected organizations are separate legal entities, independent of the district. However, in order to help the Board fulfill its legal and fiduciary responsibility to manage district operations, any school-connected organization that desires to raise money to benefit any district student shall submit a request for authorization to the Board, in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall establish appropriate internal controls for the relationship between school-connected organizations and the district.

The Board encourages school-connected organizations to consider the impact of fundraising activities on the overall school and district program. School-connected organizations may consult with the principal to determine school needs and priorities. Activities by school-connected organizations shall not conflict with law, Board policies, administrative regulations, or any rules of the sponsoring school.

BACKGROUND: On October 13th and 27th, 2009, the Board of Education reviewed a first reading of proposed changes to Board Policy 33452 governing Student Activity Funds. The policy represents best practices recommended by the California School Boards Association.

BACKGROUND: On May 28, 2008, the Board of Education adopted changes to Administrative Regulation 1330.1 governing management of the District Facility Use policy. Since that time, additional changes have been recommended

RATIONALE: Bold items in the attached Administrative Regulation reflect recommended changes. Formatting will be corrected once changes are completed.

FUNDING: There is no cost to name these facilities.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt Revised Board Policy 3452 Student Activity Funds (Third Reading Intent to Adopt)

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STUDENT ACTIVITY FUNDS

The Governing Board recognizes that student organizations can provide students with an opportunity to conduct worthwhile cocurricular activities beyond those provided by the district can help students learn about effective financial practices. To that end, student organizations may raise and spend funds to support activities that promote welfare, morale, and educational experiences of the student body.

Generally, there are two types of Associated Student Body (ASB) organizations. ASBs in high schools and middle schools are called "organized ASBs" since the students, organizing their activities around student clubs and/or a student council, have primary responsibility for the ASB, with the assistance of an adviser. In elementary schools, the ASB is "unorganized" because there is no student council and the principal or designee usually oversees the fund-raising and spending decisions, with more limited involvement from the students.

Fundraising events

At the beginning of each school year, each principal or designee shall submit to the Superintendent or designee a list of the fund-raising events that each student organization proposes to hold that year. The Superintendent or designee shall review the proposed events and determine whether the events contribute to the educational experience and are not in conflict with or detract from the school's educational program. When reviewing proposed events, the Superintendent or designee shall consider the effects of the activities on student health and safety, evaluate the risk of liability to the district, and ensure that the proposed activities are in compliance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Management of funds

The Education Code requires the district to provide for the supervision of all funds raised by any student body organization or student organization using the name of the school. Consequently, student body funds shall be managed in accordance with law and sound business procedures designed to encourage the largest possible educational return to students without sacrificing the security of funds.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop internal control procedures to safeguard the organization's assets, promote the success of fund-raising ventures, provide reliable financial information, and reduce the risk of fraud and abuse. These procedures shall detail the oversight of activities and funds including, but not limited to, the appropriate role and provision of training for staff and students, parameters for events on campus, appropriate and prohibited uses of funds, and accounting and record-keeping processes, including procedures for handling questionable expenditures.

STUDENT ACTIVITY FUNDS

The principal or designee shall be responsible for the proper conduct of all student organization financial activities. The budget adopted by the student body organization should serve as the financial plan for the school year and shall be submitted to the Superintendent or designee at the beginning of each school year. The Superintendent or designee shall periodically review the organization's use of funds to ensure compliance with the district's internal control procedures.

Funds derived from the student body shall be disbursed according to procedures established by the student organization. All disbursements must be approved by a Board-designated official, the certificated employee who is the student organization advisor, and a student organization representative.

The Board shall provide an annual audit of student accounts by a certified public accountant or licensed public accountant. The cost of the audit shall be paid from district funds.

BACKGROUND: Under the law, students in California's public schools may raise money and make decisions about how they will spend this money. Student organizations that are established to raise and spend money on behalf of students are called Associated Student Body organizations or ASBs. ASBs must be made up of current students. The funds that are raised and spent by student organizations are called associated student body funds or ASB funds. ASB organizations and management of ASB funds represent an opportunity for students to not only raise money, but also to learn some of the principles of operating a small business and to learn leadership skills, while making a contribution to their school and fellow students. Student organizations may raise a surprisingly large amount of funds in a year.

RATIONALE: The governing board of the school district is ultimately responsible for the appropriate activities of student organizations. Under Education Code section 48930, the governing board has the authority to approve the formation of a student body organization, to establish the parameters under which the organization will operate. The board establishes policies and regulations specifying how the student body organization will be established, how the organization's activities will be supervised and how the organization's finances will be operated and managed.

One tool for managing ASB funds is the annual operating budget, which is a financial plan for the school year. The budget allows the ASB organization to estimate at the beginning of the year where it will be, in financial terms, at the end of the year. The budget must include estimated revenues, estimated expenses, and estimated ending reserves and carryover.

Budget monitoring is the process of comparing the actual revenues and expenses at a point in time to the budget to determine whether the revenues are being received as expected and that the expenses are not exceeding the projected amounts.

FUNDING: Annual approval of ASB Budgets and Constitutions allows the Board of Trustees oversight of the annual plans of the ASB organizations. The ASB Accounting Guide has been reviewed and updated and will be used to provide consistent guidance to individuals involved in managing ASB funds.

BACKGROUND: On August 11, 2009, the Board of Trustees ratified a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that was previously executed by the Associate Superintendent of Business Services between the Lammersville Elementary School District and the Tracy Joint Unified School District. The intent of the MOU is to serve as an agreement to satisfy the County Treasurer and to allow for the payment of costs of legal services fees and unification consultant fees for both Districts to be paid from the Mountain House Developer Fees held in a Tracy District account. Both Districts agree that the unification of the Lammersville District is directly related to the planning and construction of a high school; and, agree that the costs of preparing and planning for the unification of the Lammersville District are an eligible and proper expenditure of Mountain House Developer Fees.

RATIONALE: This is the final version of the MOU that was adopted by the Lammersville School District Board of Education. This version is substantially the same MOU that was ratified by the TUSD Board on August 11, 2009. The MOU will be re-executed by the Associate Superintendent of Business Services after the December 8, 2009 TUSD Board of Education meeting.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING By and Between TRACY JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT and LAMMERSVILLE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Lammersville District seeks to become a unified district, to be known as the Lammersville Unified School District (the "Lammersville Unified School District"), serving grades kindergarten through 12th;

WHEREAS, in order to accommodate high school age students on a long-term basis, the future Lammersville Unified School District seeks to design, fund, construct and operate a Lammersville Unified School District high school (the "Mountain House High School") within its boundaries;

WHEREAS, the Tracy District has been collecting developer mitigation fees (the "Developer Fees") under a School Facilities Impact Mitigation Agreement dated November 19, 1998 by and between Trimark Communities and its successors in interest, including, but not limited to, Shea Homes, Inc., and the Tracy District to finance the costs of development and construction of a high school to serve the development project located within the boundaries of the Lammersville District and the future Lammersville Unified School District, commonly known as Mountain House (the "Mountain House Project");

WHEREAS, the Developer Fees are held in a Tracy District account with the San Joaquin County Treasurer (the "County Treasurer");

WHEREAS, planning for and accommodating a new high school facility to serve the Mountain House Project is directly related to the unification of the Lammersville District, and the focus of the efforts to date by the Districts regarding the unification has been on planning for the funding and construction of such a high school, and the Districts therefore agree that the costs of preparing and planning for the unification of the Lammersville District are an eligible and proper expenditure of Developer Fees;

WHEREAS, both the Tracy District and the Lammersville District have retained consultants to assist with the preparing and planning for unification; and

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WHEREAS, the Districts wish to set forth a mechanism by which such consultants hired by the Tracy District and the Lammersville District may be paid from the Developer Fees.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements set forth herein, the Districts do hereby agree as follows:

AGREEMENT:

- 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. <u>Purpose</u>. It is the intent of the Districts that this MOU shall serve as an agreement between the Districts to satisfy the requirements of the County Treasurer and to allow the Lammersville District's costs of legal services fees and unification consultant fees to be paid from the Developer Fees held in a Tracy District account. It is the additional intent of this MOU to clarify the Districts' ability to pay for other costs and expenses arising out of the Lammersville District's unification efforts with Developer Fee funds.
- 3. Term. The term of this Agreement shall commence upon the date first written above and shall terminate upon the July 1 following an election by eligible voters to approve the unification of the Lammersville District (the "Unification Date"). After the Unification Date of the Lammersville District, the Tracy District shall transfer the Developer Fee funds to a Lammersville Unified School District account with the County Treasurer.
- 4. Payment of Lammersville District's Legal Fees. The Lammersville District has retained legal counsel (the "Legal Counsel") to provide legal services in connection with the Lammersville District's efforts to unify. Legal Counsel shall invoice the Lammersville District directly for legal services in accordance with Legal Counsel's regular billing practices. Such invoice may be for services rendered both prior to and subsequent to the date of this MOU as set forth above. The Lammersville District shall review and approve (or deny) the invoice, in whole or in part, in accordance with its regular accounting practices. Upon approval of the invoice, the Lammersville District shall forward such invoice to the Tracy District. After also reviewing and approving the invoice, the Tracy District agrees to promptly forward such invoice to the County Treasurer along with a requisition for disbursement of Developer Fee funds in an amount equal to the amount of the invoice. The Tracy District shall thereafter transfer such amount of Developer Fee funds to the Lammersville District for payment of Legal Counsel's invoice.
- 5. <u>Payment of Lammersville District's Unification Consultant Fees.</u> The Lammersville District has retained Joel Kirschenstein of the Sage Institute, Inc., in conjunction with the Tracy District, as the Districts' joint unification consultant (the "Consultant") to provide impartial advice and guidance to both Districts in connection

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with the Lammersville District's efforts to unify. Both Districts agree to each pay fifty percent (50%) of the Consultant's fees. Accordingly, the Consultant shall invoice the Lammersville District for its portion of such fees, in accordance with the Consultant's regular billing practices. Such invoice may be for services rendered both prior to and subsequent to the date of this MOU as set forth above. The Lammersville District shall review and approve (or deny) the invoice, in whole or in part, in accordance with its regular accounting practices. Upon approval of the invoice, the Lammersville District shall forward such invoice to the Tracy District. After also reviewing and approving the invoice, the Tracy District agrees to promptly forward such invoice to the County Treasurer along with a requisition for disbursement of Developer Fee funds in an amount equal to the amount of the invoice. The Tracy District shall thereafter transfer such amount of Developer Fee funds to the Lammersville District for payment of the Consultant's invoice.

- Other Costs and Expenses. The Tracy District and the Lammersville District acknowledge that prior to the date of this MOU and from time to time after such date, other costs and expenses related to the Lammersville District's efforts to unify will arise. Further, the parties agree that such costs and expenses, including but not limited to the costs of the Tracy District's legal and unification consultant fees, may be paid from the Developer Fee funds held in a Tracy District account with the County Treasurer. Upon receipt and approval of an invoice or other proof of such costs and expenses, the Tracy District shall promptly forward such invoice to the County Treasurer along with a requisition for disbursement of Developer Fee funds in an amount equal to the amount of the invoice. As applicable, The Tracy District shall thereafter transfer the requisitioned amount of Developer Fee funds to the Lammersville District for payment of its costs and expenses.
- 7. <u>Prior Legal and Consultant Fees</u>. The Tracy District and the Lammersville District further acknowledge and agree that the Tracy District's legal and consultant fees related to the Lammersville District's unification efforts that were previously paid from the Developer Fee funds were proper and valid expenditures of such funds.
- 8. <u>Meet and Confer.</u> In the event of a disagreement between the Districts regarding the use of Developer Fee funds, the Districts shall meet and confer within two (2) weeks following notice of the disagreement.
- 9. <u>Notices</u>. Any notice to either party shall be in writing and given by delivering the same to such party (a) in person; (b) by sending the same by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, with postage prepaid; or (c) by delivering any notice by nationally recognized overnight delivery service (such as Federal Express) for next business day delivery to the following addresses:

Service shall be deemed complete on the date of actual delivery as shown on the addressee's return receipt. The addresses to which notices and demands shall be delivered or sent may be changed from time to time by notice to the other party.

- 10. <u>Binding Effect</u>. This MOU shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto and their respective heirs, successors and assigns.
- 11. <u>Legal Effect</u>. All obligations of the Tracy District and the Lammersville District are expressly made conditions of this MOU.
 - 12. Time Is of the Essence. Time is of the essence in this MOU.
- 13. <u>Severability</u>. If any term, provision, covenant or condition of this MOU is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remainder of the provision shall remain in full force and effect.
- 14. Entire Agreement. As of the date of this MOU as set forth above, this MOU constitutes the sole and only agreement between the Districts concerning their rights and duties in connection with the matters specified herein. Any prior agreements or representations between the Districts regarding those matters are null and void unless expressly set forth in this MOU.
- 15. Governing Law. This MOU shall be construed in accordance with and governed by the laws of the State of California. Any action to enforce or interpret this MOU shall be brought in San Joaquin County, California.
- 16. <u>Counterparts</u>. This MOU may be executed in counterparts and all counterparts so executed shall constitute one agreement binding on all the parties hereto. It shall not be necessary for each party to execute the same counterpart.
