A Message From WBSD Superintendent Dr. Dania Bazzi: STRATEGIC PLANNING

One of my top priorities
as the new superintendent
of West Bloomfield School District is

to spend time in the classrooms and at our schools as much as possible. This time in the buildings with students and staff has helped me form relationships and see firsthand our strategic plan and objectives being rolled out.

The creation of the strategic plan was a collaborative effort from staff, administrators, students, community members, parents/families, and the Board of Education. The strategic plan will serve as a five-year guiding map that clearly articulates our priorities for ensuring the academic and social-emotional success of all students.

WBSD has built a solid foundation and we are committed to building upon that foundation. The strategic plan focuses on the five areas listed below, with an update thus far on each area.

Academics/Programs

Strategic Goal Statement: WBSD will provide engaging, meaningful, inclusive, and rigorous opportunities and extracurricular programs.

WBSD will provide engaging, meaningful, inclusive, and rigorous opportunities through a guaranteed and viable curriculum that is

> standards-driven and focused on higher-level thinking. WBSD is in the process of implementing proficiency scales in teacher planning and instruction to ensure a guaranteed and viable curriculum across the District.

Proficiency scales provide a clear road map and

progression of learning for every content area. Assessments, feedback, student goal setting and reflection, and high-quality learning experiences will all be aligned to these proficiency scales.

All students will be placed in the driver's seat, as they will have a crystal clear understanding of how to move forward with their learning path. WBSD has supported teachers in this work by providing a three-day teacher leader workshop and multiple professional development sessions related to this work.

Learning Environment/Culture

Strategic Goal Statement: WBSD will provide a positive, safe, and

inclusive environment where all students' diverse learning needs are met.

WBSD has been engaged in ongoing professional learning in the areas of equitable and inclusive classroom practices, and implicit bias training including the Harvard Implicit Bias Test (Race IAT). We have partnered with the Zekelman Holocaust Center to host Restorative Practice Training for WB staff members.

WBSD continues to work with the Greater West Bloomfield Community Coalition to offer programs targeted to meet the social-emotional learning (SEL) needs of students across the District.

Personnel and Leadership

Strategic Goal Statement: WBSD will recruit, develop and retain highly qualified, diverse staff at all levels that is reflective of our student population.

WBSD will be moving our posting system to the Oakland Schools Human Resources Consortium. This will allow us to access a wider, more diverse applicant pool. It will also allow us to actively recruit highly qualified, diverse applicants for open positions within the District.

Communication and Community Involvement

Strategic Goal Statement: WBSD

will create systems for consistent and effective methods of two-way communication and engagement for all stakeholders.

WBSD is in the process of reviewing and analyzing the current communication methods, tools, and processes utilized. The District is currently surveying all stakeholders. Once data has been collected, the information will be analyzed and the District will begin working on an updated plan.

Operations and Finance

Strategic Goal Statement: WBSD will create long-term master operations and facility plans to support the District's vision and ensure that resources are equitably allocated.

The District created a work group to facilitate the creation of a long-

term facilities recommendation for the Board of Education's consideration. This work group, the Building Futures Committee, consisting of parents, teachers, administrators, and professional partners began their work in September of this school year and presented their recommendations to the Board of Education in November.

Like our previous strategic plans, our most current plan has identified a number of strategic objectives WBSD will strive to obtain to continue fulfilling our mission (To support each student's needs by providing the opportunities, experiences, and educational tools for their journey) and remain a destination District for so many. Our buildings have been asked to provide progress updates regarding their objectives at the regular Board

meetings on a rotating basis and our District-level administrators will be providing updates to the Board of Education on a quarterly basis starting in December.

I am very excited about WBSD's overall direction. Our pursuit of academic excellence, optimal learning environments, education equity, and social-emotional well-being are conveyed in this plan and we are committed to continuous improvement through proactive and creative thinking. As we move forward with the plan, we will make necessary adjustments to ensure we meet our vision for the future.


Star Certificates

MARISSA BEATTY WBHS Class of 2012

ince graduating from WBHS in 2012, Marissa Beatty has embarked on a notable career as a research scientist. She started at Michigan State University where she obtained her Bachelor of Science degree, then went on to Columbia University where she obtained her Master of Science and Master of Philosophy degrees. She also recently completed her Ph.D. in chemical engineering.

Her field of focus is electrochemistry, where she develops cutting-edge technologies to decarbonize hydrogen and fuel production using renewable energy. During her doctorate, Marissa worked at various institutions including the Office of Naval Research, and even spent a year at Lawrence Berkeley National Lab performing experiments at the Advanced Light Source - a high-energy particle accelerator. There, she performed experiments that measured chemical changes on an electrode's surface while the device was running - some of the first measurements of their kind.

She also had the opportunity to participate at the UN Incubator "UNLEASH" in Shenzhen, China, where selected talent from across the globe came together to develop solutions for tackling sustainable development challenges in a number of crucial areas.

Following her Ph.D., Marissa applied to and was granted the highly competitive Activate Fellowship, which provides two years of support for research scientists to transition their work out of the laboratory and into a commercial product. She now is the founder and CEO of her new company, Turnover Labs, which develops inexpensive devices to capture and convert "dirty CO2" from industrial waste back into valuable chemicals to be reused in chemical processes.

How has WBHS helped Marissa on her current path?

Marissa credits her success to the teachers that supported her love and acuity for science. She recalls that she started her freshman year with less-than-ideal grades, but through hard work and the dedication of teachers who cheered her on, she

turned her performance around and started excelling in her academics. As a member of the marching band, she also found a close-knit group of students who made her feel accepted and who helped her to come out of her shell socially. She states how important it was for her to feel like she was a part of a community and a group of people all striving toward a common goal, where successes and failures are shared amongst a team. Overall, Marissa feels that without the belief of her teachers and her peers she would not have gotten to where she is today.

Marissa's advice for current WBHS students

"One bad semester can feel like a death sentence – especially with how picky colleges can be – but as old and overdone as this advice is, it is true that determination beats talent any day of the week. I was never the smartest kid in the class with the best grades, which often made me feel like I was deluding myself by wanting to be a successful scientist. Even in grad school at Columbia, the thought

would still creep into my mind that I didn't belong there because I wasn't the best. But it's not a competition, and your ranking doesn't actually matter to anyone but yourself. What matters is that you care about what you're doing so that you stick to it through thick and thin. You

have to find something that you are willing to fight for, not focus on how you compare

to others, and find people who will champion and believe in you every step of the way. You don't have to be the best, and you always have the power to change your story."





ALL-STAR ATHLETES

AVE you heard of Elizabeth Eichbrecht? She is a remarkable freshman swimmer from WBHS. Eichbrecht is currently ranked number one in Michigan high school swimming and number one in Division One swimming.

Recently, Eichbrecht won two state titles, the 200 Freestyle and the 500 Freestyle, enough to give her All-American status.

She has also:

- Broken the 13-14 Girls 200 Free state record
- Broken a 42-year-old Oakland County Championship meet record in the 500 Freestyle
- Broken the OAA League records in the 200 Freestyle and 500 Freestyle at the league meet
- Broken five (5) varsity records
- Broken four (4) home pool records

Her favorite things about being on the team are "the team breakfasts and team bonding while traveling on the bus to the dual meets."


"I am excited because we made the state cut for the 400 free relay and it shows the entire team has worked hard throughout the season," she said.

GENERAL FUND AUDIT RECAP FOR THE SCHOOL FISCAL YEAR, ENDED JUNE 30, 2022

UBLIC school districts are required to have an independent audit of their annual financial statements each year. This involves an outside firm, hired by and reporting to the Board of Education, conducting a thorough study of the District's financial statements.

While the school district's business office prepares the financial statements, the outside firm comments on their validity and accuracy.

This process provides an annual "check and balance" mechanism to ensure that school district resources have been properly classified and accounted for according to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), and that taxpayer funding is being utilized within the parameters allowed by law.


For the school fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2022, the school district retained Plante and Moran, which is one of the leading school audit firms in the state of Michigan. We are pleased to report that Plante and Moran has issued an "unmodified" audit opinion, which means that the audit was "clean", and that no material discrepancies were found in the dollar amounts or District budgeting, accounting, and reporting procedures that the school district presented.

An unmodified audit is the best report that can be achieved in the audit process.

The school district's General Fund is the primary fund that encompasses daily instruction and operations. Here are a few highlights from the audit report for the district's General Fund:


REVENUES - \$75.3 million

The primary revenue source for the school district is the State-established Foundation Grant. This is an annual dollar amount per student that the State sets for each school district. Last year, the Foundation Grant for WBSD was \$9,269 per pupil, which ranks seventh of 28 public school districts in Oakland County. Therefore, the number of pupils the District attracts and retains is critical to our annual funding. No other revenue component comes close compared to the importance of the Foundation Grant each year.



EXPENDITURES - \$74.1 million

Over 82 percent of school district expenditures go toward personnel costs, with 14 percent classified as purchased services and the remaining four percent for supplies and materials. To provide another layer of detail, this chart shows that 75 percent of the \$74.1 million in expenditures goes directly toward instruction and instructional support. This chart illustrates that various resources are needed to operate the school district but the vast majority of resources are allocated where they should be – for teaching and learning.

An adequate fund balance promotes financial stability and helps preserve continuity in educational programming and outstanding opportunities for students. Some additional benefits of maintaining an adequate fund balance are:

- Minimizes the need to borrow on a short-term basis to meet cash flow
- Prevents operating with a structural deficit
- Flexibility in adjusting spending during the school year
- Helps with maintaining bond credit ratings

ALIE Fishman always thought she knew what she wanted to do with her life. As she started her freshman year in 2018 at a college in Detroit, she was convinced she'd get a degree in journalism and become a news anchor.

"I always saw myself being on TV," remembers Kalie. "But I guess I just lost interest."

Like most 18-year-olds just beginning their college path, Kalie struggled with determining not only her major, but what her ultimate career would be. It was the sort of uncertainty that brought with it mounting anxiety–so much that Kalie decided to leave college after just one semester.

"It was a really tough time for me," says Kalie. "I just didn't know what I wanted. So, I decided to get some counseling."

Her proactive approach to her mental health helped Kalie in both big and small ways. Not only did the therapy help her to manage stress more effectively, but she also struck up a friendship with a woman who was a social worker.

"She really showed me the value of social work and how I could help people," says Kalie. "I've always enjoyed making a difference in people's lives, so becoming a social worker definitely piqued my interest."

As Kalie imagined herself as a social worker, she began to research educational options. Because her grandmother, mom and sister had all attended OCC, following in their footsteps seemed like a perfect fit.

"The more I looked at my options, the more appealing

OCC became for so many reasons. The credits were super affordable, the campus was close to my home and I really liked the small class sizes," says Kalie.

And that wasn't all. By working closely with a counselor at OCC, Kalie learned about OCC's many articulation agreements. This meant her credits would easily transfer to many 4-year colleges in Michigan. Kalie crunched the numbers and realized she could save thousands of dollars by getting a two-year degree at OCC before transferring to another school to get the required master's degree she would need in social work.

In 2019, Kalie started at OCC and graduated in May of 2021 with an associate's degree in social work. And she couldn't be happier with her experience.

"I give so much credit to OCC," says Kalie. "The advisors and instructors went above and beyond to help me both in and out of the classroom. The free tutoring was great as well as so many resources. I'm just so grateful."

Now getting her master's degree in social work at Wayne State University, Kalie also works part-time as a senior youth specialist at Common Ground Sanctuary. This youth shelter in Royal Oak helps runaway and homeless teens in Oakland County to get the mental and emotional support they need to overcome life's toughest challenges.

"I run drug and alcohol awareness groups where I get to help kids as a mentor," says Kalie. "It's so heartwarming to see them thrive."
