#### 13.1 Administrative & Business Services:

13.1.1 Certify the 2010-11 Second Interim Report (Separate Cover Item)

Dr. Franco commented that at last week's board meeting there was a presentation for the 2011-12 budget. He thanked staff, parents and community members who worked together to help make necessary decisions. The Governor proposed a 2 part plan on January 10<sup>th</sup>. The voters of California will be asked to extend the tax measures. If they do not pass, the District is facing a \$4.4 million dollar reduction. Tonight, we are presenting a 2 part budget reduction plan; one if they do not pass and one if they do. Hopefully will only have to implement \$63,000 in reductions. The tax extensions that will be voted on in June will be vital to our schools and community. Since 2003, we have reduced \$30.6 million dollars from our budget due to continued budget cuts from the state. Hopefully the propositions will get on the ballot and we will work together to make sure they pass.

Associate Superintendent of Business Services, Dr. Casey Goodall, presented a power point which clarified the 2<sup>nd</sup> interim report, the spending rules associated with the federal jobs bill and the particular kinds of service resolution. He reviewed the 5 steps of understanding a budget. He also clarified that the 2<sup>nd</sup> interim report has a certification page that must be signed by the president of the board. The budget that we will present in June requires that criteria and standards be applied and requires a 3% reserve. If you do not have that, the county will not approve the budget.

He also reviewed and clarified that the District does not have a "surplus". A surplus is defined as that which is above what is used or needed. The District's "ending fund balance" is not a "surplus". We do not have enough revenues to last us through the next 3 years.

The Federal Jobs Bill funds can only be spent on compensation, benefits, other expenses necessary to retain existing employees, to recall or rehire former employees, and to hire new employees, in order to provide early childhood, elementary, or secondary educational and related services. It may not be used for general administrative expenses or for other support services. The District cannot supplant state funds. We have not decided where the federal jobs funds will be spent, but they will be allocated proportionately to retain existing certificated, classified and management who work at school sites in accordance with Resolution No. 10-04 which was adopted by the Board in June, 2010.

We took the \$3.1 million from the federal jobs bills and counted it as revenue to get the budget reduction amount lower. If we were to spend that to enhance staffing standards our target would go up and would not help us achieve goal of keeping low.

President Gouveia reminded all speakers that presentations shall be

held to 5 minutes and to please refer all questions to the president. Board and staff will respond to questions and answers where appropriate. Detailed questions about budget and staffing plans are (see written) if you wish to discuss

TEA President, Steve Sievers, stated that his time will be longer than 5 minutes. He has questions on the Federal Jobs Bill. He wanted to know how much money it was and how the District was using it.

Dr. Goodall replied that the Federal Jobs Bill will amount to approximately \$3.1 million. As shown on the power point he presented earlier tonight, the money will be spent proportionately. This will come out of the general fund. It will be spent to retain teachers. All teachers except adult school teachers will be paid from the general fund. Mr. Sievers commented that TEA is asking that the status be changed for all 19.5 temporary teachers.

Ian Stewart had a question on the deficit factor. Dr. Goodall clarified that Proposition 98 determines how school districts are funded and that the deficit factor was generated after Prop 98 while Governor Wilson was in office.

13.1.2 Approve the Tracy Unified School District Modified Budget Reduction Plan

Associate Superintendent of Business Services, Dr. Casey Goodall, reviewed the modified plan. The District shortfall would be \$3,209.828 which the District hopes to work with constituent groups and which will be restored if the measures pass.

Dr. Goodall explained that CSR cannot be saved for \$300,000. That amount would be about half of what it would take and we would be precluded from using the categorical dollars as we did in the past.

The federal jobs funding could be used to fund programs, however that would increase the budget reduction amount by about \$1,000,000.

#### Speaker Cards:

Renee Riddle is here on behalf of the librarians. They would like to do anything they can to help the tax measures pass. Libraries are important and affect every student and staff.

Ann Ostepiej commented that she has questions on the cuts from last year compared to this year. Dr. Goodall explained that the five day furlough was for 1 year only. She would also like everyone to see what they do at her site and how much money they bring in.

Trustee Crandall commented that he respects the opinions heard tonight. This is not the District's fault. This is coming from

Sacramento. It is not Tracy mishandling funds.

#### 13.2 Human Resources:

13.2.1 Adopt Resolution No. 10-23 Authorizing the Removal of Identified Particular Kinds of Service (PKS) from the Layoff Resolution

Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services and Human Resources, Dr. Sheila Harrison, reviewed the PKS resolution which is needed to balance budget. This was developed using staffing standards and individualized staffing plans for each school site. There are 76.9 certificated positions on list which include teachers and administration. Many are there as a result of consistently applying existing staff standards and categorical positions not being funded in the future.

PKS is a mandated step in the budget and layoff timelines. The PKS will be amended by the board to remove positions to make the adopted reduction plan that you just passed.

March 11<sup>th</sup> is the deadline that the state has to put the proposition on the ballot. Our website will have further information. June 7<sup>th</sup> is the election if it gets placed on the ballot and we will adopt our budget at a board meeting in June.

TEA President, Steve Sievers commented that he believes that the most important groups are the students and the teachers and that other staff contact with students pales in comparison to teachers. The rest are support staff. TEA believes that the District does not have to cut all the teaching positions that are listed. He feels that it will cause substantial harm to students. He believes that the District refused to answer how they would staff with that many teacher layoffs. He does not want to see non teaching positions saved tonight at the expense of teaching positions. He is concerned how the federal stimulus money is used and thinks that none of it was spent on teachers\*.

\*Administration has not yet allocated the Federal Jobs Bill funds, however they will be used proportionately to retain existing certificated, classified and management who work at school sites in accordance with Resolution No. 10-04 which was adopted by the Board in June, 2010.

Mr. Sievers believes that TEA has already made concessions and that the District does not need to cut the first year and should wait and see if the economy may turn around. He stated that TEA will never agree to \$3.1million in salary cuts. He is asking the District to put the cuts at the end of the three year period. He believes that TEA will work with the District if the economy doesn't turn around. He further commented that the District is asking for concession that are severe and that this Board and administration should never ask more from TEA than what

the county is asking from their people.

Mr. Sievers stated that TEA is willing to work with District to get the message out. He feels that cutting teachers may temporarily help our District but will hurt the economy more. He noted that 41 teachers will be cut at the elementary level. He would like an explanation of how we are going to do that.

Trustee Costa commented that it would be better to educate yourself first before getting everyone riled up without knowing the facts.

Dr. Franco commented that as was mentioned earlier, there are staffing plans for each of the schools. The District has met with principals and other staff to determine the staffing plan. Be assured that all staffing guidelines are met regarding contractual obligations regarding state requirements. If anyone would like to look at that or if teachers would like to talk to their principals, they can do that. These are very difficult times. We met with the principals and came up with the best plan possible.

Trustee Swenson commented that we are not here to negotiate but we are here to listen and thank you for your comments.

President Gouveia reminded Mr. Sievers that we have been respectful to him numerous times and to please follow the rules.

Mr. Sievers requested that for every non teaching position saved on the PKS list, they would like 2-3 teaching positions saved.

Teacher, Wes Walker, understands that this is not the Board's fault. He believes we are cutting 50 classrooms. At his site there are many overages. He asked if the cuts have to be split over the 3 year period. He also reviewed a budget adjustment agenda item which contained numbers that he didn't understand.

Dr. Franco commented that we have to meet audit standards and reassure you that if you look that there is not any misspending over budget. Maybe we can do a better job of educating you and had offered at the last meeting to set up some budget workshops.

Student, Hector Sanchez represents the Academic Decathlon and Mock Trial. He believes that extra-curricular activities have served a valuable purpose. This year alone these organizations have been able to put at least 10 students through college in this state. He also commented that he has benefited from libraries and they provide a valuable service provided by libraries cannot be put in a dollar amount. He believes more information on the election should be put on our website.

Dr. Goodall clarified as far as advocating measures on our website, that because we are paid from state dollars we are not allowed to use school

District property or funds.

The President then called for a recess at 8:40 p.m. The meeting was then reconvened at 8:57 p.m.

Mrs. Williamson thanked everyone for the beautiful library. Mr. Swenson came and toured the building. They were only closed for 4 days while they stocked the shelves. The students are very excited. Please feel free to visit anytime.

#### **Board Reports:**

Trustee Silva commented that there are a lot of great things going on in this District. He has had the opportunity to listen to various groups who are all consistent on how much we are expected to lose if the measures don't pass. He can't overemphasize that we have got to work together to get the voting public to understand that it is extremely important to get the word out to our friends and neighbors and hopefully it passes and we can get by with as little pain as possible. Trustee Swenson passed. Trustee Guzman this was a hard decision that we have been thinking about for a long time. He personally knows people on the layoff list and it is a very difficult thing. As a board, we need to pass the budget and the state does not allow us to know what is available to us. The system is broken. We are not getting \$18 million a year of what we deserve. We need to let our legislatures know that it needs to be fixed. We cannot wait for the vote. We need to start working on it now and talking to the legislatures that are not agreeing to put it on the ballot. They need to be contacted by people in the state and students. It is not fiscally responsible to not cut one year and then cut \$12 million all in the next year. Our District is responsible and we are doing a lot better than other districts. Trustee Vaughn appreciates all of the employees of the District across the board. Everyone is equally contributing to the success of our students. The administration, teachers, classified, board members all play a role. Sometimes it yard duty or campus supervisor that could inspire a student. He wants to see everyone stick together, no one is more important than someone else. To see the kids that we are producing is what we need to stay focused on. He thanked everyone and commented that all employees of the District are valued. Trustee Costa passed. Trustee Crandall commented that he attended Smokey Blues and loved it. Last week, he set up an appointment in Sacramento and had a discussion with Senator Liu who is involved with CTE, urban school government and education. We have a lot of talent and have to work together.

## Superintendent Report:

Dr. Franco reiterated that he admires and appreciates all of the work the employees do for our school District. The board is comprised of elected citizens. They know it's hard and affects peoples' lives. It is not easy and we do care. When he sees students doing well, we take great pride in everything going on in our District. We have to get together. We need the community to invest in us. We want to make sure that they realize that our district is a good investment. Make sure that the 3 measures get on the ballot and come up with working groups that are legal. As parents we can really make a great effort to pass the propositions and save that \$4 million dollars that we would otherwise have to reduce. 11.1.1 Receive Presentation Regarding the Financing Plan for the Issuance of an Additional Series of Measure S General Obligation Bonds which Incorporates the Issuance of a Qualified School Construction Bond

Ruth Alahydoian with KNN Public Finance presented a power point which reviewed the process of the bonds. We have received an allocation to issue qualified school construction bonds from the state. The Federal Government will pay a percentage of the bond. These bonds are taxable, most are tax exempt. She reviewed how a QSCB bond works and what the benefit is. The District will issue approximately \$16 million in measure S bonds. The JPA will purchase the \$16 million and hold \$3.77 million to be used for measure S projects. The taxpayers pay it back and the IRS pays the subsidy back to the JPA. The JPA then repays the investors. A JPA is a statewide agency who partners with cities, schools and other agencies. The District will need to issue an additional \$6 million of regular tax exempt bonds, for a total of \$25 million for bond projects.

The next steps will be to establish a JPA at the March 22nd board meeting. In April we will authorize the issues of SFID bonds and authorize issuance of JPA bonds.

This PUBLIC AGENCY OFFSITE IMPROVEMENT AGREEMENT (Agreement) is made and entered into by and between the CITY OF TRACY, a municipal corporation (City), and TRACY JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, a public school District operating under the laws of the State of California (District), as of July 16, 2002; and (District Contractor)

(District and the District Contractor are collectively referred to as Developer):

#### RECITALS

- A. District is the owner of certain real property located within the boundaries of the City of Tracy, more particularly described in the attached legal description and map marked as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by this reference (Property).
- B. District intends to develop the Property as a school site. In undertaking such improvements to the Property, District will be required to provide certain offsite improvements, the approval of which will be under the City's jurisdiction (Offsite Improvements). The Offsite Improvements required under this Agreement are described in the Offsite Improvement Plans and Specifications (Plans) attached hereto as Exhibit "B" and incorporated herein by this reference. The Plans have been approved by the City Engineer.
- C. Because the Offsite Improvements required under the Plans and Specifications have not been completed and the District needs to proceed with development of the Property prior to completion of the Offsite Improvements, the City has requested that the Developer execute this Agreement, and the Developer has agreed to do so.
- D. District and City recognize that, under Government Code Sections 53090 through 53097.5, the District is exempt from a number of requirements which the City would normally impose upon developers; and, in particular, under Section 53097, the District must only give consideration to the City's requirements for Offsite Improvements. Nevertheless, in the spirit of cooperation and in a mutual effort to have school facilities available in a timely manner while insuring that Offsite Improvements, which are the District's responsibility, are compatible with existing City infrastructure, the parties wish to enter into this Agreement.

#### NOW THEREFORE, THE PARTIES MUTUALLY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. SCOPE OF WORK. The Developer shall perform, or cause to be performed, the work described in the Plans, to the reasonable satisfaction of the City Engineer. The Offsite Improvements shall be performed, and all materials and labor shall be provided, at the Developer's expense, in the manner described in the Plans. The Developer may submit a written request to the City Engineer for a change in the Plans, as required by Tracy Municipal Code Section 12.36.060(f). The City acknowledges the Developer is not the Subdivider under the Subdivision Map Act, and that unless otherwise indicated on Exhibit B, Developer will contract with other professionals to do the actual construction of the Offsite Improvements. The City acknowledges and agrees that District has delegated responsibility for the District's performance under this Agreement to the District Contractor in a separate agreement, which is attached as Exhibit "C". The City also acknowledges that requirements normally placed upon developers who construct offsite improvements are not applicable except as set forth herein.
- 2. PROJECT SUPERVISION. At all times during the progress of the Offsite Improvements, District shall require its contractor(s) to have a competent foreman or superintendent onsite with authority to act on behalf of the District's Contractor. The District's Contractor shall, at all times, keep the City Engineer informed in writing of the name and telephone number of the foreman or superintendent. Upon request, the District shall keep the City Engineer informed in writing of the names and telephone numbers of all contractors and subcontractors performing the Offsite Improvements.
- 3. <u>LOCATION OF PERFORMANCE</u>. The Developer shall perform all Offsite Improvements at the locations and grades shown on the Plans. Any easement or right-of-way necessary for the performance of the Offsite Improvements shall be acquired by the District at the District's sole cost and expense.
- 4. <u>IMPROVEMENT SECURITY</u>. Prior to the commencement of any Offsite Improvements, the District Contractor performing the Offsite Improvements shall be required to furnish security on behalf of the District, in a form acceptable to the City and naming the City as a covered entity in the following amounts:
  - 4.1. Faithful Performance security in the amount of 100% of the contracted amount, \$\frac{1}{2}\$ to secure faithful performance of this Agreement until the date when the City Council accepts the Offsite Improvements as complete.
  - **4.2.** Labor and Material security in the amount of 100% of the contracted amount, \$ \_\_\_\_\_ to secure payment by the District's contractor to

laborers and for materialmen until the date when claims are to be made by laborers and materialmen.

- 5. <u>INSURANCE</u>. Concurrently with the execution of this Agreement by the Developer and City, and prior to the commencement of any Offsite Improvements, the Developer shall furnish evidence to the City that the District Contractor has satisfied all of the following insurance requirements.
  - **5.1.** General. The District Contractor shall, throughout the duration of this Agreement, maintain insurance to cover the District, its agents, representatives, contractors, subcontractors, and employees in connection with the performance of services under this Agreement at the minimum levels set forth herein.
  - 5.2. Commercial General Liability (with coverage at least as broad as ISO form CG 00 01 01 96) coverage shall be maintained in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 general aggregate and \$1,000,000 per occurrence for general liability, bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage.
  - **5.3.** <u>Automobile Liability</u> (with coverage at least as broad as ISO form CA 00 01 07 97, for "any auto") coverage shall be maintained in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
  - **5.4.** Workers' Compensation coverage shall be maintained as required by the State of California.
  - **5.5.** Endorsements. The District Contractor shall obtain endorsements to the automobile and commercial general liability coverage with the following provisions:
    - **5.5.1.** The City (including its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents, and volunteers) shall be named as an additional "insured."
    - 5.5.2. For any claims related to this Agreement, the coverage of District's Contractor shall be primary insurance with respect to the City. Any insurance maintained by the City shall be excess of such coverage, and shall not contribute with it.
  - 5.6. <u>Notice of Cancellation</u>. District Contractor shall obtain endorsements to all insurance policies by which each insurer is required to provide thirty (30) days prior written notice to the City should the policy be canceled before the

- expiration date. For the purpose of this notice requirement, any material change in the policy prior to the expiration shall be considered a cancellation.
- 5.7. <u>Authorized Insurers</u>. All insurance companies providing coverage shall be insurance organizations authorized by the Insurance Commissioner of the State of California to transact the business of insurance in the State of California.
- **5.8.** <u>Insurance Certificate</u>. District Contractor shall provide evidence of compliance with the insurance requirements listed above by providing a certificate of insurance.
- **5.9.** Substitute Certificates. No later than thirty (30) days prior to the policy expiration date of any insurance policy required by this Agreement, District Contractor shall provide a substitute certificate of insurance.
- 5.10. Obligation of District's Contractor. Maintenance of insurance by the District's Contractor as specified in this Agreement shall in no way be interpreted as relieving the District Contractor of any responsibility whatsoever (including indemnity obligations under this Agreement), and the District Contractor may carry, at its own expense, such additional insurance as it deems necessary.
- 6. <u>PERMITS, LICENSES, AND COMPLIANCE WITH LAW.</u> Developer shall bear all expenses for, obtain and maintain all necessary permits and licenses for performance of the Offsite Improvements. The Developer shall comply with all local, state, and federal laws, whether or not said laws are expressly stated in this Agreement.
- 7. <u>TIME OF PERFORMANCE</u>. Time is of the essence in the performance of the Offsite Improvements and the timing requirements set forth herein shall be strictly adhered to unless otherwise modified in writing in accordance with this Agreement. The Developer shall submit all requests for extensions of time to the City, in writing, no later than ten (10) days after the start of the condition, which purportedly caused the delay, and not later than the date on which performance is due.
  - 7.1. Commencement of Work. No later than forty-eight (48) hours prior to the commencement of the Offsite Improvements, the Developer shall provide written notice to the City Engineer of the date on which the District's Contractor shall commence work. The Developer shall not commence work on the Offsite Improvements until after the notice required by this section is properly provided, and the District's Contractor shall not commence such work prior to the date specified in the written notice.

- 7.2. Schedule of Work. Concurrently with the written notice of commencement of work on the Offsite Improvements, the Developer shall provide the City with a written schedule of work, which shall be updated in writing as necessary to accurately reflect progress of the work.
- 7.3. Completion of Work. The Developer shall complete the Offsite Improvements including the fire services to the Property, prior to occupancy of the first building constructed within the Property.
- 8. <u>INSPECTION BY THE CITY</u>. In order to permit the City to inspect the Offsite Improvements the Developer shall at all times provide the City with proper and safe access to the project site, to all portions of the Offsite Improvements, and to all shops wherein portions of the work are in preparation.
- 9. INSPECTION FEES. Concurrently with the execution of this Agreement by the District, and prior to the commencement of any work on the Offsite Improvements, the District shall pay the City inspection fees in the amount of three and one-half percent (3-1/2 %) of the estimated cost of the Offsite Improvements (as approved by the City Engineer). In the event that the City determines that its actual costs of inspecting the Offsite Improvements (including all costs and expenses of inspection, reviewing maps and plans, field checking, testing, and administrative and overhead costs of fifteen percent (15 %) exceeds the amount of inspection fees paid by the District, the District shall pay the City the actual costs of inspecting the Offsite Improvements less any inspection fees already paid.

#### 10. DEFAULT.

- **10.1.** In the event that the Developer is in default of this Agreement, as defined in this section, the City shall provide written notice to the Developer and the surety in which the default is described.
- **10.2.** The Developer shall be in default of this Agreement if the City determines that any one of the following conditions exist:
  - **10.2.1.** The Developer is insolvent, bankrupt, or makes a general assignment for the benefit of its creditors.
  - 10.2.2. The Developer abandons the Offsite Improvements site.
  - **10.2.3.** The Developer fails to perform one or more requirements of this Agreement.

- 10.2.4. The Developer fails to replace or repair any damage caused by Developer or its agents, representatives, contractors, subcontractors, or employees in connection with performance of the work on the Offsite Improvements.
- **10.2.5.** The Developer knowingly violates any legal requirement related to the Offsite Improvements.
- 10.3. In the event that the Developer fails to cure or fails to cause the District Contractor to cure the default within twenty (20) days, or provide adequate written assurance to the satisfaction of the City Engineer that the cure will be promptly commenced and diligently prosecuted to its completion, the City may, in the discretion of the City Engineer, take any or all of the following actions:
  - 10.3.1. Cure the default and charge the Developer for the costs therefore, including administrative costs and interest in an amount equal to seven percent (7 %) per annum from the date of default.
  - **10.3.2.** Demand the Developer to complete performance of the work on the Offsite Improvements.
- 11. ACCEPTANCE OF WORK. Prior to acceptance of the Offsite Improvements by the City, the Developer shall be solely responsible for maintaining the quality of the Offsite Improvements, and maintaining safety at the Project site. The Developer's obligation to perform the work on the Offsite Improvements shall not be satisfied until after the City has made a written determination that all obligations of the Agreement have been satisfied and all outstanding fees and charges have been paid.
- 12. WARRANTY PERIOD. The Developer shall warrant the quality of the work on the Offsite Improvements, in accordance with the terms of the Plans and Specifications, for a period of one year after acceptance of the Offsite Improvements. In the event that (during the one year warranty period) any portion of the work on the Offsite Improvements is determined by the City to be defective as a result of an obligation of the Developer under this Agreement, the Developer shall be in default.
- 13. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR STATUS. Neither party to this Agreement is the employee of the other party, and each party shall be solely responsible for all acts of its officers, employee's agents, contractors, subcontractors, including any negligent acts or omissions. Neither party shall have any authority, express or implied, to act on behalf of the other party as an agent, or to bind the other party without the express prior written permission of the other party.

- 14. <u>OWNERSHIP OF WORK</u>. All original documents prepared by or for the Developer in connection with this Agreement are the property of the Developer, which shall give a copy to the City at the completion of the Offsite Improvements.
- 15. <u>ATTORNEY'S FEES</u>. In the event any legal action is commenced to enforce this Agreement, the prevailing party is entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, costs, and expenses incurred.
- 16. <u>INDEMNIFICATION</u>. Developer shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City (including its elected officials, officers, agents, and employees) from and against any and all claims, demands, damages, liabilities, costs, and expenses (including court costs and attorney's fees) resulting from or arising out of the performance of the work on the Offsite Improvements by Developer or Developer's agents, representatives, contractors, subcontractors, or employees.
- 17. ASSIGNMENT AND DELEGATION. This Agreement and any portion thereof shall not be assigned or transferred, nor shall any of the Developer's duties be delegated, without the written consent of the City. Any attempt to assign or delegate this Agreement without the written consent of the City shall be void and of no force and effect. Consent by the City to one assignment shall not be deemed to be consent to any subsequent assignment.

#### 18. NOTICES.

**18.1.** All notices, demands, or other communications which this Agreement contemplates or authorizes shall be in writing and shall be personally delivered or mailed to the respective party as follows:

- 19. MODIFICATIONS. This Agreement may not be modified orally or in any manner other than by an agreement in writing signed by both parties.

- 20. <u>WAIVERS</u>. Waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement shall not constitute a continuing waiver or a waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 21. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>. In the event a court of competent jurisdiction holds any term of this Agreement invalid, the Agreement shall be construed as not containing that term, and the remainder of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
- 22. JURISDICTION AND VENUE. The interpretation, validity, and enforcement of the Agreement shall be governed by and construed under the laws of the State of California. Any suit, claim, or legal proceeding of any kind related to this Agreement shall be filed and heard in a court of competent jurisdiction in the County of San Joaquin.
- 23. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement, including all documents incorporated by reference, comprises the entire integrated understanding between the parties concerning the improvements to be constructed for this Project. This Agreement supersedes all prior negotiations, representations, or agreements.
- 24. FORM OF AGREEMENT APPROVED. This Agreement is a form agreement to be used on all construction projects involving the Developer's completion of Offsite Improvements. The form of this Agreement has been approved by the City Council of the City and the District Board of Education, and each has authorized the individuals whose signatures appear on this document to execute it without further approval by either agency.

BACKGROUND: On October 12, 2010, the Board of Trustees authorized district staff to complete and submit an application for a Qualified School Construction Bond (QSCB) Allocation authorized under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. On January 14, 2011, the California Department of Education notified TUSD that it had been awarded an allocation of \$19,771,700 in QSCB bonding authority. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 provides significant new financing methods for state and local governments. One option available to school districts is a new debt instrument know as Qualified School Construction Bonds (QSCB) in which the federal government subsidizes the interest cost (up to a set rate) through the allowance of tax credits to investors or direct subsidy payments to school districts, significantly reducing the interest cost associated with financing public school facilities.

On January 11, 2011, the Board of Education approved the recommendation of the Facilities Utilization Committee to sell up to \$26 million of bonds in order to move ahead with Measure S projects. A financing plan has been developed for the issuance of an additional series of general obligation bonds authorized by the voters of the SFID #3, which plan will incorporate the issuance of Qualified School Construction Bonds.

RATIONALE: On March 8, 2011, the Board of Education heard a presentation regarding the financing plan for the issuance of an additional series of bonds to finance Measure S projects. The financing plan calls for the formation of an agency under the Joint Powers Act by and between the California Municipal Finance Authority ("CMFA") and Tracy Joint Unified School District to be known as the Tracy School Facilities Financing Authority (the "Authority"). Attached is a proposed form of the Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement (the "Agreement") which creates and establishes the Authority. The purpose of the Agreement is to establish a public entity for the exercise of additional powers given to a joint powers entity

under the Joint Powers Act; including, but not limited to, the issuance of Bonds for the purpose of aiding in the financing and refinancing of public capital improvements for the benefit of the District. Under California law and the Agreement, the Authority will be a public entity separate and apart from the parties to the Agreement and the debts, liabilities and obligations of the Authority will not be the debts, liabilities or obligations of the District or any representative of the District.

**FUNDING**: A financing plan has been developed for the issuance of an additional series of general obligation bonds authorized by the voters of the SFID, which plan will incorporate the issuance of Qualified School Construction Bonds and the formation of a Joint Powers Agency.

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this meeting a proposed form of Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement (the "Agreement"), by and between CMFA and the District, which Agreement creates and establishes the Authority; and

WHEREAS, under California law and the Agreement, the Authority will be a public entity separate and apart from the parties to the Agreement and the debts, liabilities and obligations of the Authority will not be the debts, liabilities or obligations of the District or any representative of District;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Board of Trustees of the Tracy Joint Unified School District as follows:

**Section 1.** All of the recitals herein contained are true and correct, and the Board of Trustees of the District so finds and determines.

Section 2. The Agreement, in substantially the form submitted to this meeting and made a part hereof as though set forth herein, is hereby approved. The President of the Board of Trustees, or such other member of the Board of Trustees as the President may designate, the Superintendent of the District and the Associate Superintendent of Business Services of the

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District, or such other officer or employee of the District as the Superintendent may designate (each an "Authorized Officer") are, and each of them is, hereby authorized and directed, for and in the name of the District, to execute and deliver the Agreement in substantially said form, with such changes, insertions and omissions as the Authorized Officer executing the same may require or approve, such requirement or approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery of the Agreement by such Authorized Officer.

Section 3. The Superintendent and the other officers and employees of the District, are hereby authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to do any and all things which they may deem necessary or advisable in order to consummate the transactions herein authorized, and otherwise to carry out, give effect to, and comply with the terms and intent of this Resolution. Any such actions heretofore taken are hereby approved, confirmed and ratified.

**Section 4.** This Resolution shall take effect from and after its date of adoption.

THIS JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS AGREEMENT, dated \_\_\_\_\_\_\_\_1, 2011, by and between the TRACY JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, a school district duly organized and existing under the Constitution and the general laws of the State of California (the "District"), and CALIFORNIA MUNICIPAL FINANCE AUTHORITY, a public body, corporate and politic, duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of California ("CMFA"),

### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Articles 1, 2 and 4 of Chapter 5 of Division 7 of Title 1 of the Government Code of the State of California (the "Act") authorize the District and CMFA to create a joint exercise of powers entity (the "Tracy School Facilities Financing Authority" or the "Authority") which has the power to exercise any powers common to the District and CMFA and to exercise additional powers granted to it under the Act;

WHEREAS, the District and CMFA are each empowered by law to undertake certain projects and programs;

WHEREAS, the District is authorized to buy, sell and lease property and to issue bonds, expend bond proceeds, and borrow money for certain public purposes pursuant to the Education Code of the State of California;

WHEREAS, CMFA is authorized to buy, sell and lease property and to issue bonds, expend bond proceeds, and borrow money for any of its corporate purposes pursuant to the Act and a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement, dated as of January 1, 2004, by and among the County of San Diego, the City of Santa Clarita, the City of Oakland and other political subdivisions;

WHEREAS, Article 4 of Chapter 5 of Division 7 of Title 1 of the Government Code of the State of California (the "Marks-Roos Local Bond Pooling Act of 1985") authorizes and empowers the Authority to issue bonds and to purchase bonds issued by, or to make loans to, the District or

CMFA for financing public capital improvements, working capital, liability and other insurance needs, or projects whenever there are significant public benefits, as determined by the District or CMFA;

WHEREAS, the Marks-Roos Local Bond Pooling Act of 1985 further authorizes and empowers local agencies to sell their bonds to a joint powers authority on a negotiated basis without compliance with any public sale requirement included in the statutes under which the bonds are issued;

WHEREAS, the Marks-Roos Local Bond Pooling Act of 1985 further authorizes and empowers the Authority to sell bonds so issued or purchased to public or private purchasers at public or negotiated sale; and

WHEREAS, by this Agreement, the District and CMFA desire to create and establish the Tracy School Facilities Financing Authority for the purposes set forth herein and to exercise the powers described herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, the District and CMFA, for and in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements herein contained, do agree as follows:

### SECTION 1. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>

Unless the context otherwise requires, the terms defined in this Section 1 shall for all purposes of this Agreement have the meanings herein specified.

### Act

The term "Act" shall mean Articles 1, 2 and 4 of Chapter 5 of Division 7 of Title 1 of the Government Code of the State of California, including the Marks-Roos Local Bond Pooling Act of 1985, as amended.

### **Agreement**

The term "Agreement" shall mean this Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement, as it may be amended from time to time, creating the Authority.

### **Authority**

The term "Authority" shall mean the Tracy School Facilities Financing Authority created by this Agreement.

### **Board**, Board of Directors

The term "Board" or "Board of Directors" shall mean the governing board of the Authority.

### **Bond Purchase Agreement**

The term "Bond Purchase Agreement" shall mean an agreement of the Authority to purchase bonds of the District or CMFA on the terms and conditions set forth therein.

### **Bonds**

The term "Bonds" shall mean bonds and any other evidence of indebtedness of the Authority authorized and issued pursuant to the Act.

### **CMFA**

The term "CMFA" shall mean the California Municipal Finance Authority, a public body, corporate and politic, duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of California.

### **District**

The term "District" shall mean the Tracy Joint Unified School District, a school district duly organized and existing under the Constitution and the general laws of the State of California.

### <u>Member</u>

The term "Member" or "Members" shall mean the District and/or CMFA, as appropriate.

### SECTION 2. PURPOSE

This Agreement is made pursuant to the provisions of the Act. The purpose of this Agreement is to establish a public entity for the joint exercise of powers common to the Members and for the exercise of additional powers given to a joint powers entity under the Act or any other applicable law, including, but not limited to, the issuance of Bonds for any purpose or activity permitted under the Act or any other applicable law for the benefit of the District, including for the purpose of aiding in the financing and refinancing of public capital improvements, as defined in the Act, for the benefit of the District by exercising the powers referred to in the recitals hereof and described in Section 5 herein. Such purpose will be accomplished and said power exercised in the manner hereinafter set forth.

### SECTION 3. TERM

This Agreement shall become effective as of the date hereof and shall continue in full force and effect until terminated by a supplemental agreement of CMFA and the District; provided, however, that in no event shall this Agreement terminate while any Bonds or other obligations of the Authority remain outstanding under the terms of any indenture, trust agreement, contract, agreement, lease, sublease or other instrument pursuant to which such Bonds are issued or other obligations are incurred. In any event, the Authority shall cause all records regarding its formation, existence, any Bonds issued by it, obligations incurred by it and proceedings pertaining to its termination to be retained for at least six (6) years following termination of the Authority or final payment of any Bonds issued by the Authority, whichever is later.

### SECTION 4. AUTHORITY

### A. <u>Creation of Authority</u>

There is hereby created pursuant to the Act an agency and public entity to be known as the "Tracy School Facilities Financing Authority." As provided in the Act, the Authority shall be a

public entity separate from the District and CMFA. The debts, liabilities and obligations of the Authority shall not constitute debts, liabilities or obligations of the District or CMFA.

Within 30 days after the effective date of this Agreement or any amendment hereto, the Authority will cause a notice of this Agreement or amendment to be prepared and filed with the office of the Secretary of State of the State of California in the manner set forth in Section 6503.5 of the Act.

### B. Governing Board

The Authority shall be administered by the Board whose members shall be, at all times, the members of the Board of Trustees of the District. The term of office as a member of the Board shall terminate when such member of the Board shall cease to be a member of the Board of Trustees of the District; and the successor to such member of the Board of Trustees of the District shall become a member of the Board, upon assuming such office.

Members of the Board shall not receive any compensation for serving as such, but shall be entitled to reimbursement for any expenses actually incurred in connection with serving as a member if the Board shall determine that such expenses shall be reimbursed and there are unencumbered funds available for such purpose.

### C. Meetings of Board

(1) Time and Place. The Board shall hold regular meetings on each date, and at the hour and place at which, the Board of Trustees of the District holds a regular meeting (or on such other dates, times or places as may be provided in the By-Laws of the Authority adopted by the Board (the "By-Laws")); provided that if an agenda (containing a brief general description of each item of business to be transacted or discussed) for any such regular meeting is not posted at least seventy-two (72) hours before any such regular meeting of the Board, such regular meeting of the Board shall be deemed cancelled. The Board shall hold at least one regular meeting each year. The

Board may hold special meetings at any time and from time to time in accordance with law. To the extent permitted by the Brown Act, meetings of the Board may be held by telephone conference.

- (2) <u>Legal Notice</u>. All meetings of the Board, including, without limitation, regular, adjourned regular, special, and adjourned special meetings, shall be called, noticed, held and conducted subject to the provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act (Chapter 9 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code of the State of California) (the "Brown Act"), or any successor legislation hereinafter enacted.
- (3) <u>Minutes</u>. The Board shall cause minutes of all meetings of the Board to be kept and shall, as soon as possible after each meeting, cause a copy of the minutes to be forwarded to each member of the Board and to the District and CMFA.
- (4) Quorum. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. No action may be taken by the Board except upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the Board constituting a quorum, except that less than a quorum may adjourn a meeting to another time and place.

### D. Officers; Duties; Bonds

- (1) The Officers of the Authority shall be the Chair, Vice-Chair, Executive Director, Secretary, Treasurer and Controller. The officers of the Authority shall be the persons specified in the By-Laws and shall have the powers vested in them pursuant to such By-Laws and such other powers as may be granted by the Board from time to time by resolution.
- (2) The Treasurer and Controller of the Authority is designated as the public officer or person who has charge of, handles, or has access to any property of the Authority, and such officer shall file an official bond in the amount specified by resolution of the Board but in no event less than \$1,000 as required by Section 6505.1 of the Act; provided, that such bond shall not be required if the Authority does not possess or own property or funds with an aggregate value of

greater than \$500.00 (excluding amounts held by a trustee or other fiduciary in connection with any Bonds).

- (3) So long as required by Section 6505 and Section 6505.5 of the Act, the Treasurer and Controller of the Authority shall prepare or cause to be prepared: (a) a special audit as required pursuant to Section 6505 of the Act every year during the term of this Agreement; and (b) a report in writing on the first day of July, October, January and April of each year to the Board, the District and CMFA which report shall describe the amount of money held by the Treasurer and Controller of the Authority for the Board, the amount of receipts since the last such report, and the amount paid out since the last such report (which may exclude amounts held by a trustee of other fiduciary in connection with any Bonds to the extent that such trustee or other fiduciary provides regular reports covering such amounts).
- (4) The District shall determine the charges, if any, to be made against the Authority for the services of the Treasurer and Controller.
- (5) The Board shall have the power to appoint such other officers and employees as it may deem necessary and to retain independent counsel, consultants and accountants.
- (6) All of the privileges and immunities from liability, exemptions from laws, ordinances and rules, all pension, relief, disability, worker's compensation and other benefits which apply to the activities of officers, agents or employees of the Members when performing their respective functions within the territorial limits of their respective Member, shall apply to them to the same degree and extent while engaged in the performance of any of their functions and duties extraterritorially under the provisions of this Agreement.
- (7) None of the officers, agents or employees, if any, directly employed by the Authority shall be deemed, by reason of their employment by the Authority, to be employed by any

Member or, by reason of their employment by the Authority, to be subject to any of the requirements of any Member.

Section 4(A) hereof and in the Act, the debts, liabilities and obligations of the Authority shall not constitute debts, liabilities or obligations of the District or CMFA, and they do not intend by the following sentence to impair this provision. To the extent that liability is imposed or a claim is made on CMFA, for any reason whatsoever notwithstanding Section 4(A) hereof and the Act, directly or indirectly arising out of a transaction or series of transactions undertaken in connection with the activities of the Authority, the Authority and the District shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless CMFA and each of CMFA's officers, directors, employees and agents from and against any and all costs, expenses, losses, claims, judgments, fines, settlements, damages, liabilities and other amounts arising out of or in connection with such activities of the Authority. CMFA may elect to defend itself in any such action with counsel of its choice, the reasonable fees of such counsel to be paid by the District. The Authority and the District shall be jointly and severally liable for any indemnity obligation owed to CMFA. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 895.6 of the Government Code of the State, the District shall not have any right to contribution from CMFA.

### SECTION 5. POWERS

The Authority shall have the power, in its own name, to exercise the common powers of the Members and to exercise all additional powers given to a joint powers entity under any of the laws of the State of California, including, but not limited to, the Act, for any purpose authorized under this Agreement. Such powers shall include the common powers specified in this Agreement and may be exercised in the manner and according to the method provided in this Agreement. The Authority is hereby authorized to do all acts necessary for the exercise of such power, including, but not limited to, any of all of the following: to make and enter into contracts; to employ agents and

employees; to acquire, construct, provide for maintenance and operation of, or maintain and operate, any buildings, works or improvements; to acquire, hold or dispose of property wherever located; to incur debts, liabilities or obligations; to receive gifts, contributions and donations of property, funds, services, and other forms of assistance from person, firms, corporations and any governmental entity; to sue and be sued in its own name; to make grants, loans or provide other financial assistance to governmental and nonprofit and for profit organizations to accomplish any of its purposes; and generally to do any and all things necessary or convenient to accomplish its purposes.

Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Authority may issue or cause to be issued Bonds, and pledge any property or revenues as security to the extent permitted under the Act, or any other applicable provision of law.

To the extent required by Section 6509 of the Act, the manner in which the Authority shall exercise its powers and perform its duties is and shall be subject to the restrictions upon the manner in which the District could exercise such powers and perform such duties. The manner in which the Authority shall exercise its powers and perform its duties shall not be subject to any restrictions applicable to the manner in which any other public agency could exercise such powers or perform such duties, whether such agency is a party to this Agreement or not.

### SECTION 6. TERMINATION OF POWERS

The Authority shall continue to exercise the powers herein conferred upon it until the termination of this Agreement in accordance with Section 3 hereof.

### SECTION 7. FISCAL YEAR

Unless and until changed by resolution of the Board, the fiscal year of the Authority shall be the period from July 1 of each year to and including the following June 30, except for the first fiscal year which shall be the period from the date of this Agreement to June 30, 2011.

### SECTION 8. <u>DISPOSITION OF ASSETS</u>

Upon termination of this Agreement pursuant to Section 3 hereof, any surplus money in possession of the Authority or on deposit in any fund or account of the Authority shall be returned in proportion to any contributions made as required by Section 6512 of the Act. The Board is vested with all powers of the Authority for the purpose of concluding and dissolving the business affairs of the Authority. After rescission or termination of this Agreement pursuant to Section 3 hereof, all property of the Authority, both real and personal, shall be distributed to the District, subject to Section 9 hereof.

### SECTION 9. <u>CONTRIBUTIONS AND ADVANCES</u>

Contributions or advances of public funds and of personnel, equipment or property may be made to the Authority by the District and CMFA for any of the purposes of this Agreement. Payment of public funds may be made to defray the cost of any such contribution. It is mutually understood and agreed that neither the District nor CMFA has any obligation to make advances or contributions to the Authority to provide for the costs and expenses of administration of the Authority, even though either may do so. The District or CMFA may allow the use of personnel, equipment or property in lieu of other contributions or advances to the Authority.

### SECTION 10. AGREEMENT NOT EXCLUSIVE

This Agreement shall not be exclusive and shall not be deemed to amend or alter the terms of other agreements between the District and CMFA, except as the terms of this Agreement shall conflict therewith, in which case the terms of this Agreement shall prevail.

### SECTION 11. ACCOUNTS AND REPORTS

The Authority shall establish and maintain such funds and accounts as may be required by good accounting practice. The books and records of the Authority shall be open to inspection at all reasonable times by the District and CMFA and their representatives.

### SECTION 12. CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODE

The Authority shall, by resolution, adopt a Conflict of Interest Code to the extent required by law.

### SECTION 13. BREACH

If default shall be made by the District or CMFA in any covenant contained in this Agreement, such default shall not excuse either the District or CMFA from fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement and the District and CMFA shall continue to be liable for the payment of contributions and the performance of all conditions herein contained. The District and CMFA hereby declare that this Agreement is entered into for the benefit of the Authority created hereby and the District and CMFA hereby grant to the Authority the right to enforce by whatever lawful means the Authority deems appropriate all of the obligations of each of the parties hereunder. Each and all of the remedies given to the Authority hereunder or by any law now or hereafter enacted are cumulative and the exercise of one right or remedy shall not impair the right of the Authority to any or all other remedies.

### SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY

Should any part, term, or provision of this Agreement be decided by the courts to be illegal or in conflict with any law of the State of California, or otherwise be rendered unenforceable or ineffectual, the validity of the remaining parts, terms or provisions hereof shall not be affected thereby.

### SECTION 15. <u>SUCCESSORS; ASSIGNMENT</u>

This Agreement shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the successors of the Members. Except to the extent expressly provided herein, neither Member may assign any right or obligation hereunder without the consent of the other.

### SECTION 16. AMENDMENT OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement may be amended by supplemental agreement executed by the Members at any time; provided, however, that this Agreement may be terminated only in accordance with Section 3 hereof and, provided further, that such supplemental agreement shall be subject to any restrictions contained in any Bonds or documents related to any Bonds to which the Authority is a party.

### SECTION 17. FORM OF APPROVALS

Whenever an approval is required in this Agreement, unless the context specifies otherwise, it shall be given, in the case of CMFA, by resolution duly adopted by the board of directors of CMFA, and, in the case of the District, by resolution duly adopted by the Board of Trustees of the District, and, in the case of the Authority, by resolution duly adopted by the Board. Whenever in this Agreement any consent or approval is required, the same shall not be unreasonably withheld.

### SECTION 18. WAIVER OF PERSONAL LIABILITY

No member, officer or employee of the Authority, the District or CMFA shall be individually or personally liable for any claims, losses, damages, costs, injury and liability of any kind, nature or description arising from the actions of the Authority or the actions undertaken pursuant to this Agreement, and the District shall defend such members, officers or employees against any such claims, losses, damages, costs, injury and liability. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, no member, officer or employee of the Authority or of any Member shall be personally liable on any Bonds or be subject to any personal liability or accountability by reason of the issuance of Bonds pursuant to the Act and this Agreement. To the full extent permitted by law, the Board shall provide for indemnification by the Authority of any person who is or was a member of the Board, or an officer, employee or other agent of the Authority, and who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to a proceeding by reason of the fact that such person is or was such a member of

the Board, or an officer, employee or other agent of the Authority, against any and all costs, expenses, losses, claims, judgments, fines, settlements, damages, liabilities and other amounts actually and reasonably incurred in connection with such proceeding, if such person acted in good faith and in the course and scope of his or her office, employment or agency. In the case of a criminal proceeding, the Board may provide for indemnification and defense of a member of the Board, or an officer, employee or other agent of the Authority to the extent permitted by law.

### SECTION 19. NOTICES

Notices to the District hereunder shall be sufficient if delivered to the Superintendent of the District, and notices to CMFA hereunder shall be sufficient if delivered to the financial advisor of CMFA, 2111 Palomar Airport Rd, Suite 320, Carlsbad, CA 92011, tel. (760) 930-1221; Fax (760) 683-3390.

### SECTION 20. <u>SECTION HEADINGS</u>

All Section headings contained herein are for convenience of reference only and are not intended to define or limit the scope of any provision of this Agreement.

### SECTION 21. COUNTERPARTS

This Agreement may be signed in several counterparts, each of which will constitute an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same instrument.

**BACKGROUND:** On June 24, 2008, the Board of Trustees adopted a resolution ordering an election requesting voters authorize the issuance of school facilities improvement district bonds on the ballot held on Tuesday, November 4, 2008 election. The Proposition 39 measure was for the purpose of raising money for the specified school facilities benefiting School Facilities Improvement District No. 3 of the Tracy Joint Unified School District and required a 55% approval from voters. The bond measure received voter approval in excess of the 55% required and the District adopted a resolution certifying the results of the election to the County Board of Supervisors and that all election proceedings were accomplished according to law.

**RATIONALE:** To continue to fund the projects listed within the bond measure, the District must request authorization from the County Board of Supervisors to issue an additional portion of the bonds in one or more series or subseries. The first series of bonds in the amount of \$12,000,000 were issued in May 2009. The attached resolution allows for the District to issue and sell bonds of the SFID No. 3 on its own behalf at a private or negotiated sale without the further action of the Board of Supervisors of the County.

**FUNDING**: No funding necessary.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TRACY JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT REQUESTING AUTHORIZATION FROM THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF SAN JOAQUIN FOR THE DISTRICT TO ISSUE AND SELL BONDS OF SCHOOL FACILITIES IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 3 OF THE TRACY JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ON ITS OWN BEHALF AT A PRIVATE OR NEGOTIATED SALE WITHOUT THE FURTHER ACTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees (the "Board of Trustees") of the Tracy Joint Unified School District, located in the counties of San Joaquin and Alameda, California (the "District"), has formed School Facilities Improvement District No. 3 of the Tracy Joint Unified School District (the "SFID"), located wholly within in the County of San Joaquin (the "County");

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees duly called an election, and such election was regularly held, on behalf of the SFID, on November 4, 2008, at which the following proposition (as abbreviated pursuant to Section 13247 of the California Elections Code) was submitted to the electors of the SFID:

"To renovate and modernize the community's oldest elementary and middle schools, upgrade classrooms, replace aging roofs, old heating, electrical, plumbing, cooling and ventilation systems with energy efficient systems, and improve security and technology systems at all schools, increasing student access to computers, shall School Facilities Improvement District No. 3 of the Tracy Joint Unified School District be authorized to issue \$43,100,000 in bonds, at legal interest rates, with all expenditures monitored by an Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee?"

WHEREAS, at least 55% of the votes cast on said proposition were in favor of issuing said bonds;

WHEREAS, on May 5, 2009, pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Supervisors (the "Board of Supervisors") of the County adopted on February 24, 2009, at the request of the District pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Trustees of the District adopted on February 10, 2009, a series of said bonds designated the "Bonds of the School Facilities Improvement District

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- No. 3 of the Tracy Joint Unified School District, Election of 2008, Series 2009" in an aggregate principal amount of \$12,000,000 was issued and sold;
- WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the District deems it necessary and desirable to consummate the sale of an additional portion of the bonds (the "Series 2011 Bonds"), in one or more series or subseries;
- WHEREAS, Sections 53506 and following of the California Government Code (the "Government Code"), including Section 53508.7 thereof, provide that a school district may issue and sell bonds on its own behalf at a private or negotiated sale pursuant to Sections 15140 and 15146 of the California Education Code (the "Education Code");
- WHEREAS, Section 15140(b) of the Education Code provides that the board of supervisors of a county may authorize a school district in the county to issue and sell its own bonds without the further action of the board of supervisors or officers of the county if said school district has not received a qualified or negative certification in its most recent interim report;
- WHEREAS, the District has not received a qualified or negative certification in its most current interim report; and
- WHEREAS, the District deems it necessary and desirable to issue and sell the Series 2011 Bonds on its own behalf at a private or negotiated sale;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Tracy Joint Unified School District as follows:
- **Section 1.** All of the recitals herein contained are true and correct, and the Board of Trustees of the District so finds and determines.
- Section 2. The Board of Supervisors of the County is hereby requested, pursuant to Sections 15140 and 15146 of the Education Code, as permitted by Section 53508.7 of the Government Code, to authorize the District to issue and sell the Series 2011 Bonds on its own behalf at a private or negotiated sale without further action of the Board of Supervisors.

SUBJECT: Approve Use of the Education Jobs and Medicaid Assistance Act (PL

111-226), the Federal Jobs Bill

BACKGROUND: On September 10, 2010, an appropriation of one-time funds was made to local education agencies from federal funds provided to the state of California under the Education Jobs Fund (Ed Jobs) program authorized in the Education Jobs and Medicaid Assistance Act of 2010 (Public Law 111-226), with an intended use at the school site level only for compensation and benefits and other expenses, such as support services, necessary to retain existing employees, to recall or rehire former employees, and to hire new employees, in order to provide early childhood, elementary, or secondary educational and related services. Public Law No. 111-226 prohibits the use of Federal Jobs Bill funds from supplanting, or taking the place of state funds in a manner that has the effect of establishing, restoring or supplementing a rainyday fund.

To date, Tracy Unified School District has received \$ 2,835,422 of these funds, and expects to receive \$ 315,047 more, for a total apportionment of \$ 3,150,469.

A school district may use categorical or restricted funds to supplement and, to the extent practical, increase the level of funds that would, in the absence of these funds, be made available from non-categorical or unrestricted funds for the education of students identified as the recipient of the categorical funds.

Determination of compliance with the supplement not supplant requirement shall be based on a determination of what services to students a district would have provided in the absence of categorical funds, and, said determination about supplanting is difficult and case specific. Indeed, no general guidelines exist outside a set of presumptions or predictions by the state of what the district would have provided in the absence of categorical funds. These presumptions are refutable if the district can demonstrate that it would not have been able to provide the services in question without categorical funds.

The Second Interim Report, submitted to the Governing Board on March 2, 2011 demonstrated that, given that state revenue limit funds are being deficited by approximately \$18,659,504 million for the 2011-12 school year. Therefore, without the use of Federal Jobs Bill funds, Tracy Unified School District would not have been able to retain existing employees in order to provide early childhood, elementary, or secondary educational and related services without the use of the Federal Jobs Bill money.

In differentiating supplemental services versus core services which may not be supplanted, it is important the district maintain good fiscal records and other documentation that will permit an auditor or program monitor to conclude that they have overcome a presumption that supplanting has occurred.

The School District must maintain records that separately track and account for Ed Jobs funds in a manner which will facilitate an effective audit and demonstrate that the funds were used in compliance with applicable requirements. In addition, quarterly and annual reporting is required which will include information on the number of education personnel affected by the Ed Jobs program.

**RATIONALE:** As stated above, the Ed Jobs funds must be used for personnel costs at the school site level for support services necessary to retain existing employees, to recall or rehire former employees, and to hire new employees, in order to provide early childhood, elementary, or secondary educational and related services.

These funds will be allocated proportionately to retain existing Certificated, Classified, and Management employees who work at school sites.

**FUNDING:** These one-time funds supplied from the Education Jobs Fund (Ed Jobs) program are identified by resource code 3205. To date, Tracy Unified School District has received \$2,835,422 of these funds, and expects to receive \$315,047 more, for a total apportionment of \$3,150,469. Use of these funds has the effect of limiting the budget reductions required for the 2011-12 school year.

BACKGROUND: District staff has determined the need to adopt sole source products for various technology systems and to purchase replacement items for old or non-functioning items. Much of the District's existing equipment has become obsolete and cannot be repaired. At some campuses, items are non-operational and have not been replaced as they became older or obsolete. As the District moves forward with a number of new technology projects, it is important to incorporate items that can uniformly be programmed, serviced, maintained and repaired.

RATIONALE: The Director of Technology has recommended that the District standardize items that are to be purchased or replaced to maintain uniformity. Standardizing systems will help the District better maintain the health and safety of our students by being able to service and maintain equipment in a more timely and cost effective manner. The ISET Staff recommends updating standards for network equipment, uninterrupted power supply (UPS) equipment, and computer, server and other electronic equipment. Staff has evaluated the items recommended for standardization indicated in this Resolution. This supports District Strategic Goal #2: Provide a safe environment for students and staff that is conducive to learning and Strategic Goal #3: Use technology as a tool to improve classroom instruction and school operations.

FUNDING: No funding implications from this Resolution. Projects using District standard items will be funded by a number of different funding sources.
