BACKGROUND: Pursuant to the Williams Settlement, the Valenzuela Settlement, and California Education Code Section 35186, every school must provide 1) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials, 2) school facilities that are clean, safe, and maintained in good repair, 3) a properly credentialed teacher for every classroom and 4) intensive remediation for up to two years for students who have completed grade 12 but not passed the California High School Exit Exam. Education Code, EC 35186(d), requires that school districts shall report summarized data on the nature and resolution of all Williams/Valenzuela uniform complaints on a quarterly basis to the county superintendent of schools and the governing board of the school district. The summaries shall be publicly reported on a quarterly basis at a regularly scheduled meeting of the governing board of the school district. The report shall include the number of complaints by general subject area with the number of resolved and unresolved complaints. The complaints and written responses shall be available as public records. There were no complaints filed under the Williams/Valenzuela settlements during the July 15, 2010 – October 15, 2010 reporting period.

**RATIONALE:** The quarterly report for the period of July 15, 2010 through October 15, 2010 has been submitted to the San Joaquin County Office of Education and must be reported to the local school board. The report summarizes the complaints received through the Williams Uniform Complaint Process as well as the resolution of each of those complaints. **BACKGROUND:** Special Education students may require consultation services from an Autism Specialist as part of their Individual Education Plan (IEP). The Board has approved consultation services from Therapeutic Pathways, Inc. in previous school years. The IEP team agreed that the same level of services is necessary for the 2010-2011 school year. Ratification is necessary because services are currently being provided per the students' IEP.

RATIONALE: The District does not have an Autism Specialist employed, therefore it is necessary to provide services through a contract arrangement. Therapeutic Pathways, Inc. is a non-public agency that serves many children throughout Central California. Nonpublic agency contracted services are part of the continuum of services districts must provide to students with exceptional needs. This request supports District Goal 1: Provide a variety of learning opportunities through standards based curriculum and assessment and research based instruction that ensures that all students meet or exceed grade level standards and results in closing the achievement gap and supports District Goal 7: Develop and utilize partnerships that contribute to the achievement of District Goals.

**FUNDING:** Total contract expenses are equally shared between the District and Valley Mountain Regional Center (VMRC). The District's 50% share of the total contracted expense will not exceed \$114,595.00 through June 30, 2011. Funding for Nonpublic School tuition is built into our 602 funding base for Special Education. Expenditures that exceed the base funding are reimbursed at 70% from San Joaquin SELPA funds. ### AGREEMENT FOR SPECIAL CONTRACT SERVICES

This agreement, by and between Tracy Unified School District, hereinafter referred to as "District," and <u>Therapeutic Pathways, Inc.</u> hereinafter referred to as "Contractor," is for consultant or special services to be performed by a non-employee of the District. District and Contractor, herein named, do mutually agree to the following terms and conditions:

- 1. Contractor shall perform the following duties: Provide consultation for students diagnosed with autism. Consultation will include recommendations for placement, teaching strategies and social skills training, picture exchange, communication system training, behavior management communication strategies, assessments including behavioral and environmental, material preparation participations at IEP's and other meetings.
- 2. Contractor will provide the above services(s), as outlined in Paragraph 1, for a period of up to a total of up to 9 months per year, under the terms of this agreement at the following location any and all school sites in TUSD, and at sites operated by Therapeutic Pathways, Inc.
- 3. In consideration of the services performed by Contractor, District shall pay Contractor according to the following fee schedule:
  - a. District shall pay \$ various sums per HOUR, not to exceed a total of \$114,595.00. Contractor shall only be paid for work completed to the satisfaction of District through, the termination date of this agreement.
  - b. District [ ] SHALL; [X] SHALL NOT reimburse Contractor for out-of-pocket expenses incurred during Contractor's performance of the services, including: mileage, meals and lodging in the district rates not to exceed those currently in effect for employees of the District. Reimbursement of expenses shall not exceed those currently in effect for employees of the District. Reimbursement of expenses shall not exceed \$\_\_\_\_\_\_ for the term of this agreement.
  - c. District shall make payment on a [X] MONTHLY PROGRESS BASIS, [] SINGLE PAYMENT UPON COMPLETION OF THE DUTIES and within thirty (30) working days from Contractor's presentation of a detailed invoice or on a claim form provided by District. Original paid receipts are required for lodging, air fare (passenger coupon or ticket stub), automobile rental, and parking. Claims for unusual expenses, such as teaching materials, photocopying, etc., must be accompanied by original paid invoices.
- 4. The terms of the agreement shall commence on July 1, 2010, and shall terminate on June 30, 2011.
- 5. This agreement may be terminated at any time during the term by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice.
- 6. Contractor shall contact the District's designee, <u>Dr. Janet Skulina</u> (209) 830-3270 with any questions regarding performance of the services outlined above. District's designee shall determine if and when Contractor has completed the services described.
- 7. The parties intend that an independent contractor relationship be created by this contract and District assumes no responsibility for workers' compensation liability. District likewise assumes no responsibility for loss, damage, or injury to person(s) or property resulting from, or caused by, the contractor's activities during or relating to the performance of service under this Agreement.

Contractor agrees to hold harmless and to indemnify District for:

Any injury to person or property sustained by Contractor or by any person, firm, or corporation employed directly or indirectly by the Contractor or by any of the individuals participating in or associated with him or her, however caused; and any injury to person or property sustained by any person, firm or corporation, caused by act, neglect, default or omission, of Contractor, or any person, firm or corporation directly or indirectly employed by Contractor upon or in connection with this Agreement, or any of the participants arising out of or in the course of their term of this Agreement, and Contractor at his or her own cost, expense, and risk, shall defend any and all actions, suits or other legal proceedings that may be instituted against District for any such claim or demand, and pay or satisfy any judgment that may be rendered against District in any such action, suit or legal proceedings or the result thereof. Nothing herein provided shall be construed to require Contractor to hold harmless or indemnify District for liability or damages resulting from the negligence or willful act, or omission of District or its officers, agents, or employees.

- 8. This Agreement is for the personal services of the Contractor and Contractor may not assign the performance of the services to any person or persons who are not parties to this Agreement except for employees of Contractor.
- 9. Contractor certifies that his or her current employer, if any, is fully cognizant of this Agreement and that payments hereunder are not in conflict with any federal, state, or local statutes, rules or regulations or with any policies of Contractor's current employer.

District shall become the owner or, and entitled to, exclusive possession of all records, documents, graphs, photographic or other reproductions of any kind produced in the scope of services performed and no other uses thereof will be permitted except by permission of the District. Proprietary materials will be exempted from this clause.

All work provided by Jamila Nibbs will be limited to a signed agreement (attached) and no legally binding responsibilities shall hold the student apart from the expectation that college credit will be denied for work hours not completed.

It is expected that the participating student will comply with all policies of the Tracy Unified School District. It is also understood that students accepted to the District for clinical training shall be subject to all applicable policies and regulations of both the District and Humphreys College. It is also expected that the student intern will work under all Humphreys College codes of conduct, as outlined in the college catalog as well as the student handbook, and also be subject to all rules of conduct required by the Tracy Unified School District.

Neither Humphreys College nor the Tracy Unified School District will be held liable for any personal injury or property damage or other loss except that resulting from its own negligence or the negligence of its employees or others for whom the party is legally responsible. It is expected that the Tracy Unified School District will meet all state and district required rules for safe working conditions while also make available first aid for work related injuries or illness.

The provisions of this agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon the successors of the parties hereto. Neither this agreement nor any of the rights or obligations hereunder may be transferred or assigned without prior written consent of the other party.

This agreement may be modified only by written amendment executed by all parties.

Either party may terminate this agreement with received written notification to the other party.

Nothing herein shall in any way be construed or intended to create a partnership or joint venture between the parties or to create the relationship of principal and agent between or among any of the parties.

### Community Studies Internship

The Community Studies major at Humphreys College is required to take a variety of upper division social science courses, some specialized Community Studies courses, and a mix of some business and law classes. In addition, each student must apply him or herself to two (2) internships, each worth 4 quarter credits. The following information will outline the requirements of both student, advisor, and employer.

Why make students do an internship?

The internship has been made a required part of the student's course of study so that the student can apply college courses to the stresses of the real world. In this way the student gives to the community, earns college credit, and learns whether or not a life of working within the social service sector is as desired as previously thought.

What are the time requirements for the internship?
Two internships are required, preferably in the last year or two of the student's course of study. The internships may not be simultaneous, must approximate ten hours of work per week, and each internship must last for a full quarter or approximately three months. The intern must meet with his or her advisor at least every two weeks and, and the end of the quarter, turn in a report detailing the tasks performed during the internship as well as the lessons learned about community involvement.

Are students paid for this internship? Students are given college credit for their work and may not receive any kind of monetary remuneration.

What do students do in their internship?
Students are to apply skills and training while learning new skills and the ways of working within an organization or business that serves the community. Sometimes it is best for the student to design a work-plan and list of skills that can be offered first, and then to determine what the student would like to learn or gain experience from. Then the student and advisor can look through prospective placements and determine the best match. The most important part of the internship is that the student be interested in and excited by the position. Under no circumstance should the student expect to be trained without first having something to give

an organization. Nether should the student be used as a gopher or looked upon an a free menial laborer. There must be a give and take within the relationship that makes up the internship.

What do organizations and program directors have to do in overseeing the intern?

Humphreys College understands that sometimes volunteers and interns can be more trouble than they are worth. For this reason we search out a placement that will provide both organization and student with a chance to learn and gain from a mutual effort. Someone within the organization must keep track of the intern's hours and make sure that assigned work is both relevant to the position and is being properly carried out. Should problems arise or if the student's actions ever call the goals of the internship into question, the student's college advisor should be contacted immediately.

### Internship Information for Community Studies Majors

### Overview:

All Community Studies majors are required to complete two separate internships with organizations dedicated to providing services to the people of Northern California. Each internship should last one quarter in length, approximately ten hours of work for a period of ten weeks. Academic credit will be provided for the internship and no additional pay is expected. This requirement is designed to give qualified applicants practical work experience in the area of community service. This experience enables a student to assess the correctness of a career choice, to apply in practice concepts and ideas which until now have only been studied in the classroom, and to better choose remaining electives.

### Requirements:

The internship requirement is operated on an honor basis. The following internship requirements and considerations serve as criteria for admissions:

- 1) An overall 3.0 grade point average for courses taken at Humphreys College
- 2) A minimum of 24 units taken in Community Studies
- 3) A formal application to the coordinator of the Community Studies Program

The student must make sure the following paperwork and supporting documents are taken care of:

- 1) Internship Application
- 2) Mid-Quarter review by the person overseeing the work of the intern
- 3) Final review by the person overseeing the work of the intern
- 4) A student's written summary and evaluation of the work accomplished in the internship
- 5) A weekly journal by the student on activities, duties, etc.

In addition, the student must meet with the Community Studies Program Coordinator every two to three weeks during the internship to discuss progress and problems. A final oral review will take place when the student hands in the written summary and evaluation of the internship.

## INTERNSHIP CONTRACT AGREEMENT by and between BRANDMAN UNIVERSITY and

Tracy Unified SCHOOL DISTRICT

- Multiple Subject Internship Credential
- Single Subject Internship Credential
- Education Specialist Internship Credential

An Internship Credential authorizes the same service at the same level as the Preliminary Credential with some exceptions. The Internship Credential is only valid in one school district or consortium under the preconditions established by State law (see Appendix A).

For this reason, interns must have a contract before a credential can be issued. Each intern candidate is to work under the direct and continuing supervision of a Brandman University Supervisor, from the Modesto Campus, and District Support Provider (if appropriate) who provides general support at the classroom level of the cooperating school. Also, the Internship Credential shall be issued initially for a two-year period and may be renewed by the Commission. (Education Code Section 44455). For renewals, please see Education Code Section 44456.

- 1. The intern assumes full teaching and legal responsibility for their classroom from the first day of the teaching assignment as a paid employee of the District for at least <u>one academic year</u>, subject to the District's personnel policies and State law(s).
- 2. The intern receives salary and benefits based on the District's current policies. The intern may be assigned to extracurricular activities, department and/or faculty meetings proportionate to the teaching load of a regular contractual teacher. The intern will attend department and faculty meetings and parent-teacher conferences when appropriate. No intern may coach extracurricular activities nor be required to attend meetings that present a conflict with his/her internship responsibilities at Brandman University.
- 3. The intern is expected to attend all school and district in-service training sessions whenever possible. The intern will also attend assigned District and School orientations that occur prior to the start of the school. If there is a conflict between University and District training, University meetings shall take priority during the Internship period.

- 4. The intern is responsible for maintaining up-to-date records of course plans, lesson plans, and unit plans. The intern is expected to:
  - Make preparations to accomplish his/her teaching responsibilities outside the classroom;
  - Abide by the policies of the school and district;
  - Meet administrative due dates;
  - Communicate with parents by letter, phone, and/or conference when necessary;
  - Maintain prompt and regular attendance;
  - Maintain a grade book;
  - Initiate conferences with the University supervisor and district support provider to discuss progress and receive feedback about his/her teaching.
- 5. The District will assign a District Support Provider (if appropriate) to the intern to provide support throughout the year. The Support Provider will serve as an on-site guide, who observes the intern, and provides substantive feedback.
- 6. The District acknowledges that each intern under this Internship Contract Agreement shall be a paid employee of the District and thus covered under the District's insurance policies, including Workers' Compensation, to the extent available to other teachers. No intern shall be considered an employee or agent of Brandman University while performing services for the District.

Please Note: As required by Education Code 44466: Interns shall not acquire tenure while serving on an Internship Credential.

Brandman University and the Tracy Unified School District, agree to all the conditions of this Internship Contract Agreement as outlined above, to be effective on November 10, 2010, and continuing until November 10, 2012 (2-year maximum). This agreement may be terminated and the provisions of this agreement may be altered, changed or amended by mutual consent of both parties upon sixty (60) days written notice.

**BACKGROUND:** On May 12, 2009, the Board of Trustees adopted Resolution No. 08-36 approving a Facilities Lease, a Site Lease and a Guaranteed Maximum Price relating to the Renovation and New Construction at Tracy High School. On June 1, 2009, Roebbelen Contracting, Inc. began construction of the project.


The lease-leaseback contract for the Tracy High School Renovation and New Construction – Library/Classrooms Building project included a project contingency of \$901,092 and the Cafeteria Classrooms Building project included a project contingency of \$942,022. To date the district has incurred change orders #1-5 totaling \$117,062 on the Library Building project and change orders #1-6 totaling \$469,410 on the Cafeteria Building project.

RATIONALE: In order to complete the frontage of the school near the new Administration/Classroom Building: Change order #7; \$205,210 (Cafeteria Building project) and Change Order #6; \$16,710 (Library Building project) will demolish the five portable classroom buildings adjacent to the EB Theater, provide additional drop off to the front of the school, install concrete, site lighting and landscaping in that vicinity. These change orders allow for the completion of work not included in the original agreement with Roebbelen. There are sufficient funds budgeted for contingencies associated with construction of building C to complete this work earlier than previously planned.

**FUNDING**: The project is funded by a combination of Measure E and grants from the State School Facilities Building Program.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Approve Change Order # 7 for the Tracy High School – Modernization/Reconstruction – Cafeteria/Classrooms Building Project; and Change Order # 6 for the Tracy High School – Modernization/Reconstruction – Library/Classrooms Building Project


























EROSION CONTROL PLAN - PHASE 1

Approve High School IB Psychology Textbook Adoption

BACKGROUND: Students enrolled in International Baccalaureate (IB) Psychology are required to demonstrate proficiency in four perspectives of psychology. The IB Organization requires instruction in three core perspectives: biological perspective, cognitive perspective, and social/cultural perspective. The teacher must also choose one additional perspective. Tracy High School has chosen Abnormal Psychology as the fourth perspective. The current District-adopted textbook for the IB Psychology class at Tracy High School only addresses one requirement, the cognitive perspective, and, thus, does not adequately prepare students for the IB examination. A class set of a supplemental textbook that addresses the remaining three categories, William Glassman's Approaches to Psychology 4th Edition (2004), was purchased in 2007. The cost of the class set was shared between the District and the site. Since then, the course has expanded from one section to three sections. With the increase in the number of sections being offered, one class set of textbooks no longer satisfies student needs as there are not enough textbooks to check one out to each student for home use. As a result, valuable class time is devoted to reading the textbook in class rather than discussing the content in depth. Because Approaches to Psychology 4th Edition (2004) is no longer in print, it is the recommendation of the Tracy High IB Psychology Adoption Committee that the District adopt the new publication of William Glassman's Approaches to Psychology 5th Edition (2008), Open University Press/McGraw Hill, for IB Psychology. This textbook is also recommended by the IB Organization. Community members have been made aware of the adoption process through newspaper announcements and public review of the textbook at the IMC.

**RATIONALE:** William Glassman's Approaches to Psychology 5<sup>th</sup> Edition (2008) is being recommended for adoption as this textbook addresses all three of the International Baccalaureate Organization's required psychology perspectives. In addition, the recommended text addresses several optional perspectives from which the instructor may select for addressing the fourth optional perspective.

This agenda item meets Strategic Goal #1: Provide a variety of learning opportunities through standards based curriculum and assessment and research based instruction that ensures all students meet or exceed grade level standards and results in closing the achievement gap.

**FUNDING:** Funding for the purchase of recommended materials in the amount of \$14,000 will be provided by state instructional textbook funds.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Approve High School IB Psychology Textbook Adoption.
