#### KIRKERSVILLE MOVE

All Kirk students will return to school on January 6th and will report to the old middle school. This building will house our Kirk students and staff until the renovated building is complete. Current completion date will be summer of 2024. Plans are currently underwav for playground equipment at the middle school for our students to enjoy during their time at the building. We are excited for this transition in January.

### WINTER ACTIVITIES

Over the last few weeks, our students were busy spreading holiday cheer throughout the school community. Students in our high school choir program caroled throughout the district and participated in the Pataskala Cookie Walk. 


## AGRICULTURE PROGRAMMING

Many of you may remember our community helping the District to win a State Farm Grant for \$25,000 to purchase a new green house for our renovated middle school. Our Agriculture Program in grades 6-12 have been working hard on plans for the green house. It is currently in our courtyard at the middle school and we are finalizing plumbing and electric. The Agriculture Program is currently growing and harvesting crops. Plans are underway for a food forest adjacent to the old baseball field, and an additional growing area will be located at the high school. Students will have a variety of hands-on opportunities as this program continues to grow. We thank everyone again for your help in winning the State Farm Grant.

## BUILDING UPDATES

As you drive by the new high school on route 40, you may have noticed the new athletic facilities under construction. This site will hold new tennis courts, two softball diamonds and one baseball diamond. Our previous tennis courts were unplayable and the need for new courts was imperative. Watkins Road Elementary will break ground this spring and a portion of the building will be located where current softball fields are on Watkins Rd. This created the need for new fields on the high school campus. As our district grows and we continue to have more students, we have outgrown the use of one baseball field. With almost 4800 students, we have a need for two baseball diamonds to support our high school and junior high athletic teams. The entire project will be complete by the fall with portions completed this current year.







### CALAMITY DAYS





## EARLY LEARNING CENTER

The ELC participated in the Giving Program sponsored through LEADS of Pataskala. Each day our students participated in a themed dress up day and graciously donated supplies.

West Licking County Family YMCA and Licking County Board of Developmental Disabilities invited the Southwest Licking Early Learning Center to participate in the Inclusive Fall Family Night.

The ELC is partnering with CTEC's Individualized Transition Education to Careers (ITEC) program as an eight week job placement location. This placement is a first of its kind for ITEC. The high school students participating are acquiring knowledge and skills in the early childhood field.

Ohio State University has student teachers placed at the ELC learning valuable tools of the trade at special needs preschool.

## Preschool Skills

Preschool age students acquire independence quite quickly. Fostering that development is really important for growth in the area of self help. Self help skills are behaviors or activities performed by your child which lead to them developing more independence and autonomy. Such skills include personal hygiene, dressing, cleaning up, and helping with chores.

Personal hygiene: -Wash and dry hands -Blowing their nose -Sneezing with proper technique (with a tissue or in their elbow) -Wiping face

> Dressing: -Picking out clothes -Independent Dressing -Putting clothes away

Chores: -Problem solving -Road safety -Cleaning up their dishes -Sorting laundry -Setting the table

A child's ability to complete tasks such as those listed above depends on their own individual age and development. All children develop differently so it's important to not judge one against the other.

Daily students at the ELC are given many opportunities to practice self-help skills. They unpack and pack their own book bags. Manage their snack bag, opening containers, and cleaning up after oneself. Students wash and dry their hands multiple times a day as well as assist with nose blowing followed by proper disposal of a tissue and hand washing. Students assist in cleaning up the classroom and the gymnasium. The students also participate in facilitated problem solving based on their developmental level.

## **CONFLICT** RESOLUTION

Conflict resolution is a big part of the preschool day. Preschoolers at times have big emotions that are tough to navigate outside of the home and with others not their parents or siblings. That is what preschool is for, learning how to be part of a group. Our curriculum includes a six step process to conflict resolution for parents and caregivers.

1. Approach calmly, stopping any hurtful actions Place yourself between the children, on their level, use a calm voice and gentle touch, remain neutral rather than take sides

2. Acknowledge children's feelings Say something simple such as "you look really upset" (if there is a dispute over an object, let children know you need to hold the object) **3. Gather information** Ask "what's the problem?" Do not ask "why" questions 4. Restate the problem So the problem is... use and extend the children's vocabulary, substituting neutral words for hurtful or judgemental ones (such as "stupid) if needed 5. Ask for ideas for solutions and choose one together Encourage children to think of a solution, but offer options if children are unable to at first 6. Be prepared to give follow up support Acknowledge children's accomplishments, e.g., "you solved the problem!" Stay nearby in case anyone is not happy with the solution and the process needs repeating









I am sure I share the same sentiments as everyone else when I say how shocked I am that we are already halfway through the 2022-2023 school year. We are incredibly proud of how hard everyone has been working and all that has been accomplished. I cannot wait to see what we can achieve next semester as we SOAR into 2023.

Our district participated in Start With Hello Week, a social and emotional learning program that focuses on the power of connecting and uniting through simple acts of kindness. Mrs. Truman, our school counselor, has continued working with students on anti-bullying lessons that support our commitment to the social and emotional wellbeing of our students.

Students and staff participated in the 12 Days of Giving in December, which donated items collected to LEADS to support Licking County residents in need. This fantastic project allowed our students an opportunity to learn about generosity and helping others.





Our kindergarten and first-grade students had the opportunity to attend a PBIS performance in the high school auditorium again this year. The show was performed and written by Mrs. Hayes' middle school theater class. They delivered an excellent PBIS message that was enjoyed by all that attended. We want to thank Mrs. Ladowitz for allowing us to use the auditorium and Mrs. Hayes' class for their hard work. The students had a wonderful experience.

There have been great things in all the classrooms. Most recently we have had students traveling back in time to learn about Thanksgiving, our version of the Macy's Day Parade, gingerbread houses being decorated, and third-grade reading to our kindergarteners, to highlight a few.

It has been a fantastic first semester at WMHS. Community service has been a focus of many student groups, and we're so proud of how kids are serving others. (photos below)

- Student Council is partnering with E & I classes to hold a HUGE holiday toy and food drive. All donated items, in addition to proceeds from the Powderpuff Football Game, will go to individuals in need in our community.
- The girls soccer team volunteered with Homeless Outreach in downtown Columbus. In addition to donating various hygiene items, team members helped serve food, filled bags of hygiene products, and helped people select from clothing items, bedding, and other donated items. Several dozen people were able to benefit from the event, and the organizers were very appreciative of our girls' help.
- Chorale performed around the town as part of the Pataskala Cookie Walk.
- Future Warrior Mentors and Peer Collaborators go to other schools daily to work with our younger friends. Mentors worked with individuals and small groups on academics, hung out on the playground and in the lunch room, and served as buddies.
- Students in Advanced Graphics work with real clients in our community. They've been working on a t-shirt design for Elite Pest and Termite Control. The students came up with a variety of different design solutions to present to the clients.

Students in Life Skills class have been working all semester to prepare for a cookie and cinnamon roll sale. Students have tested recipes; planned, budgeted, and shopped for necessary supplies; taken orders and prepared invoices; and baked, decorated, and packaged a gazillion treats (photos below).

We've also spent time in classes and during E & I thinking about life after high school. Students have worked on life skills such as organizing their email and Google Drives, set goals and identified action steps, and had great conversations about the impact of phones and social media on their connections with friends, family, and the community. In World Studies class, students had the opportunity to experience a court case in front of a Licking County magistrate as they faced off versus their teacher to decide once and for all the issue of gum in the classroom (photo below).

During second semester, we'll be ramping up for the annual SWL Arts Show in the spring. Student-created pieces are on display throughout the building already, and it's amazing to see what kids can do! ## SWL DIGITAL ACADEMY

It has been an exciting first semester for our SWL Digital Academy. Currently, our Digital Academy has 80 students. The digital academy has provided an opportunity for all of these students to learn state-aligned curriculum at their pace. Students have had to increase the amount of time they are spending online as they strive to meet the state's mandate of 455 hours per semester. To help with this, students log time in Edmentum for their core and elective courses and complete and submit guided notes. They also spend time reviewing core material on IXL, an online personalized learning platform.
