
Orientation & Superintendent's Conference Day

About 60 new staff members joined the District this school year and 40 teachers attended an orientation session at WPHS on August 31st. Addressing them, Dr. Ricca stressed the importance of supporting students and helping them move forward and acknowledged the "awesome power of teachers."


"We will utilize and leverage every bit of technology to connect with kids every day," said Dr. Ricca. "We're going to show the world that public educators are superstars!"

Maggie Racioppo, R.N., School Nurse Coordinator, addressed the group, sharing information about new health procedures and stating that everyone must share responsibility and work together to keep the school community safe.

At the first Superintendent's Conference Day of the year, held via Zoom, Superintendent Ricca, Board of Education President Rosemarie Eller, White Plains Mayor Tom Roach, and District union officials welcomed staff to a new school year with words of wisdom and encouragement. Each speaker reiterated that everything we do is to teach, support and inspire students. President Eller commended District staff for the "masterful job" they do every day for students and families and reminded them that they make a difference. Dr. Ricca shared that in these challenging times, no one is expecting perfection. After all, education is a practice!

Facilities Upgrades to Improve Salety, Comfort and Recreation

Director of Facilities and Operations Frank Stefanelli oversaw many improvements to the District's buildings and grounds over the summer,

including air conditioning in 16 Church Street classrooms, a new public address system at GW, an upgraded sound system in the MAS auditorium, ball field

renovations at MAS, Post Road and Eastview, restroom renovations at Ridgway, new signage in front of Highlands, and the completion of security fencing around the WPHS fields. The Facilities team also made many Covid-19 preparations, including new procedures for cleaning and response, the installation of more than 700 hand sanitizer dispensers in classrooms and new signage throughout all buildings.

With safety in mind, many fall sports began in late September, including Boys and Girls Soccer, Girls Tennis, Boys and Girls Cross Country, and Field Hockey. Other Fall sports will begin March 1. As of right now, all Winter sports — Indoor Track, Basketball, Wrestling, Ice Hockey, Bowling, and Cheerleading — are scheduled to start November 30th.

"Athletics are an important part of the students' experience and their development, both mentally and physically," said Matt Cameron, Director of Athletics "I'm excited to have kids back on the fields."



Districtwide Hybrid Learning

This summer was devoted to developing a plan to safely reopen our schools. In terms of curriculum and instruction, our goal was to ensure we could continue to provide all children with an excellent education — challenging them with rigorous coursework, providing for social/emotional learning and offering extra support whenever needed.

As of September 21st, the District is operating under a hybrid learning plan with students in their buildings one or two days a week and learning remotely the rest of the time. In order to allow for social distancing (not just in classrooms but in hallways, cafeterias and on buses), students in kindergarten through 6th grade attend school in person two days a week and students in 7th through 12th grade are in their school buildings one day a week. Whether participating from school or home, students follow a full schedule that includes all regular classes, electives and specials (art. music. physical education, and library media). All art materials, math manipulatives, literacy supply kits, and more were sent home to families to ensure every child has what they need to get the most from every lesson.

As was the case pre-pandemic, most classes feature some combination of live teaching, group work and independent work/study. Many offer a synchronous, hybrid learning environment; that is, teaching students who are in the classroom and those who are participating via Zoom at the same time. It's a big challenge for teachers and teaching assistants and they are doing an amazing job!

To ensure that students and staff are still able to connect and build positive relationships, special time is set aside for community check-ins. The elementary schools have a morning meeting and closing circle, and the older students have advisory, where they gather in small groups (in person or online) with teachers.

"One benefit of this hybrid model is that it promotes continuity of learning," explains Dr. Debbie J. Hand, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum & Instruction. "If a building needs to close temporarily due to the virus, if it becomes

necessary to shift to all-remote learning, or when the time comes that we are able to return to regular in- person instruction, it will be a smooth transition."

This is only made possible through preparation, a lot of professional development and increased use of technology.

For instance, 60 of our teachers attended two four-day workshops hosted by Innovative Designs for Education (IDE) during the summer and during the Superintendent's Conference Days in early September, the District offered 100 hours of professional development options over two days. Teachers learned how to use new hardware and software and developed amazingly creative ideas to keep their students actively engaged in learning. These two examples are just a small sampling of the immense amount of time teachers have invested in professional growth and preparation!

Hardware and software also play an important role. Ron Velez, Director of Management and Information Systems and Rocco Varuolo, Coordinator of Instructional Technology, manage the Herculean task of ensuring we have the technological capacity to educate more than 7,000 students online. Every child in the District now has an iPad, classrooms are equipped with webcams and whiteboards, and the District worked with Altice One to provide WiFi to students who needed it. Two learning management systems are used as base platforms — Schoology and Seesaw. Teachers also use a variety of other tools that help them

make lessons more interactive or assist students with studying or staying organized, including Nearpod, Padlet, Quizlet, BrainPOP and more. Students have access to online books through sites like Sora and Tales2go.

Even with a great plan, a lot of training and all this technology, there will still be challenges and frustration. But if we communicate well and support one another, we can make it a great year for our students.
