At this year's White Plains High School graduation ceremony at the Westchester County Center on June 23rd, there was a common message among the addresses delivered to the 500+ graduates: embrace diversity. Principal Ellen Doherty said: "You've learned so many things from physics to lacrosse, from world history to culinary arts, from math to Mozart. But most impressive of all is that you've learned how to be a part of a community and still be yourselves... how to make sense of people who think differently than you do... how to accept that your neighbor is worthy of the same kindness and respect that you are... how to make room at the table for those who are hungry."

Valedictorian, Jacob Brady reminded his fellow graduates to listen and learn from others: "The world is full of a diverse array of voices and narratives, and a huge part of learning is hearing from

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others who don't look like us, don't talk like us, don't even agree with us."

In her salutatory address, Sarah Samaranayake said that the WPHS student body represents more than 50 countries and all walks of life – some new to America and White Plains, others lifelong residents – and school brings them together.

"Education is the most powerful tool for obtaining equity because it fosters tolerance, constructive conversation, and respect for one another. Regardless of race, religious preference, or sexual orientation, White Plains High School has always been a safe environment for us to learn, explore, and discover ourselves."




BOE ELECTION

School Budget & Proposition Pass!

The 2016-2017 school budget of \$208,750,000 and a proposition authorizing the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund were passed by the voters on May 17th with more than 80% in favor of each. We are grateful to everyone who participated in this process, including parents and staff members, who provided valuable input in the budget development. Thanks to

the voters, we are able to enhance our technology curriculum at the elementary and middle school levels; add additional elementary school teachers, a new HS art teacher, and additional assistant coaches; and offer more in-district special education. Thanks also to Fred Seiler, who recently retired as Assistant Superintendent, for his hard work on this budget.

Rochambeau Students Clean Up National Landmark

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Thirty students from Rochambeau School recently spent several hours at Stoney Hill Cemetery in Harrison, a National Historic Landmark, in an effort to clean up and help create a walking path where visitors can pay their respects. Science Research Accomplishments

WESTLAKE SCIENCE FAIR

Four WPHS sophomore research students won awards at the Westlake Science Fair in June, the only competition in Westchester for first year (usually sophomore) science research students. This year, 469 students from 28 Westchester high schools competed.

The Science Research Program is a threeyear commitment – students apply as freshman, typically present proposals as sophomores and then collect data through lab or field work. About 100 students are expected to participate during the upcoming school year. "This program is what education should be about: studentdirected, hands-on, with teachers acting as more of a coach. We are not giving students content, but rather empowering them to find it themselves. They're in charge of determining what they want to learn and how deep they go," said Science Research Teacher Kimberly Fleming. "They also learn lifelong communication skills that will serve them in college and career, like interacting with professionals and present publicly to an audience."

REGENERON INTERNSHIPS

Caitlin Sergi and her teacher, Kimberly Fleming, were both selected by Regeneron to participate in internships. Caitlin will take part in the Regeneron Science Research Mentorship Program this summer and next. Ms. Fleming will complete the research mentorship part of her year-long Regeneron STEM Teaching Fellowship through the STEM Leadership Center, in collaboration

WPHS Senior Earns Scholarships

Graduating WPHS senior Rose Reiken, who will attend Barnard College in the fall, has been recognized with two prestigious scholarships. 
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
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Critical Literacy Museum of Human Rights

Highlands Middle School 7th grade Critical Literacy II students were given the task of promoting awareness and celebration of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, proclaimed by the United Nations in 1948. They worked in small groups to choose one of the 30 human rights described in the Declaration to research and showcase in a museum exhibit, displayed to the school community on June 15th.

"This project provided learning opportunities in the areas of architectural engineering, layout, teamwork and critical thinking," said teacher Caryn Friedman. "It also required students to master the aspects of a museum exhibit that include designing artifacts and labels and engineering

a layout to support the theme of their exhibit."

Students began exploring this theme by reading *A Long Walk to Water* and watching *Rabbit Proof Fence* and discussing that certain rights which are supposed to be guaranteed are often violated.

"Creating this type of problembased learning where students can advocate for issues they care about, not only promotes ownership, but also encourages students to become compassionate global citizens," said Jessica O'Donovan, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction.

Students Visit Chinese Consulate

Thirteen students in the WPHS Chinese Language Program enjoyed a visit to the Chinese Consulate-General in New York in May, as part of an event designed to increase interest in learning about Chinese language and culture by students of all ages. The group sang a famous Chinese song, "The Moon Represents My Heart," and participated in various activities including Chinese calligraphy writing, dumpling-making, a vocabulary game, and Chinese paper cutting.
