Girls Lacrosse Excels On-Field and Off

The White Plains High School Girls Lacrosse team won the League 2A Championship for the first time in school history, finishing the spring season with a 13-2-3 record. Led by Senior Captain Mary Lynch, they advanced to the Section semi-finals for the second straight year and finished the season ranked 4th in Section 1, the highest end-of-season ranking in school history. Nine players were recognized with All League honors and 5 were honored with All Section. The team's excellence on the field was further matched by their excellence in the classroom; ALL 17 members of the team were named New York State Scholar Athletes! In addition, Mike Leone was named the Conference 2 Coach of the Year for the second year in a row.

First Year of AVID in 9th Grade

dvancement Via Individual Determination - known as AVID - is a two-part program in the White Plains School District that focuses on writing, inquiry, collaboration, organization and reading (WICOR) skills as a means to foster student success among middle and high schoolers. A lot of time is spent on goal-setting and on preparing all students for college readiness and success.

AVID works in two ways: as an elective class and as a school-wide strategy. The AVID elective targets students in the academic middle who have the desire to go to college and the willingness to work hard. These students are capable of completing a rigorous curriculum but are falling short of their potential. Oftentimes, they will be the first in their families to attend college.

The first group of students to experience the AVID elective in White Plains began in 6th grade at Eastview and the program came with them to the high school for the first time in the 2013-14 school year. During the year the students made trips to two colleges and to a career-in-sports seminar and a college fair.

All of the students who entered the 9th grade AVID program will continue into 10th grade, where most will be placed in one or more honors/AP classes. The students hosted an orientation for the 8th graders, to help the incoming cohort get acclimated to the high school.

Students who don't take the elective also benefit from AVID, as the principles of this national program are shared with all teachers and administrative staff, so that every class and activity are infused with WICOR skills. Staff members have attended educational conferences and the schools have hosted trainings by AVID staff. The more experienced teachers help mentor colleagues to incorporate AVID strategies.

66 We want our students to be able to meet the challenge of a rigorous curriculum, including the requirements set forth by Common Core, 99 said Doug Cronk, English Coordinator/AVID District Director. "This program is the 'how' behind those goals - it gives us the tools and strategies we need to make it all happen."

Walk/Bike to School Day



The White Plains PTA Council's Walk/Bike to School Day in May, part of the "Safe Routes to School" initiative, had the highest involvement ever this year. WPHS Academic Team Places 3rd in **National Competition**

The WPHS Academic Team traveled to New Orleans over Memorial Day weekend to compete in the National Championship Tournament. The A-Team went 4-2 in the preliminaries and was seeded 6th. They defeated North Forsyth (#11) from Indiana,

then turned the tables on Jesuit B (#3) after a preliminary loss to that team. Jesuit went on to win the National Academic Championship, with White Plains placing #7 in the nation.

A-Team Captain Arielle Hazi was selected as a moderator for next year's National competitions, the third WPHS student to win this honor. Teacher Lester Roby was advisor to the group.
