
Alumni Profiles and Class Notes round out the issue and remind us of the talents and interesting lives of many GSA alumni.

# GSA Matters

## A World Away - A World at Home

In February, I made a nine-day trip to China and Korea. I had the chance to meet with the parents of ten of our international boarding students. As a parent, I cannot imagine the challenges of sending my young child halfway around the world. The constant, low level worry and anxiety that must come from being so far away, unable to help, must be deep. The fact that parents of our international students are willing to have their children go to school seven thousand miles from home is a testament to the value they place on their child's education and their confidence in the living and learning experiences their children are getting at GSA. Their knowledge that the community here has embraced their sons and daughters, and that we care for their children as we do our own, is a tremendous comfort to them.

While, as a rule, the parents I met value the quality of their children's classroom experiences, it is just as important to them that their children are experiencing an American education, profoundly different from educational opportunities in their own countries. They want for their children an education that opens doors, that encourages making choices, that doesn't force or track students onto career paths that exclude all others. They want a school that values and encourages creativity. They want a school that invites their children into a wider intellectual arena, and a wider cultural world, than is possible in their own

countries today.

They are parents, and they want what all parents want: their child's happiness, safety, and success. GSA can help young people discover and grow into the adults they will become, no matter their hometown. We have been doing this for children across the peninsula, and, for ten years, for children from around the world, which makes every GSA student's experience larger, better, and more connected to the world we are helping prepare them to live in.

It is also the fourteenth year in a row for a GSA combo to place 1st, 2nd, or 3rd in their respective division. Benny & the Jets placed 3rd in the Multiple Division A. In Multiple Division B, Tess & the Mess placed 3rd and Cymbal Pleasures placed 2nd. In Combo Division III, High Five placed 1st!

GSA musicians earned nine out of a possible twenty Most Valuable Player Awards! Congratulations to senior Raine Smith'16, vocals of Tess & the Mess, and Cymbal Pleasures' Jackson Billings'17, trumpet. Benny & the Jets MVP was senior Schuyler Williamson'16, vocals, as well as High Five's Mira Schubeck '17, vibes & trumpet, Joseph Boulet'17, drums, and Yvonne Rogers'17, piano, who also received an MVP award for Jazz Band. Seniors Abigail Jakub'16, alto sax, and Matthew Stephens'16, bass, were also awarded MVPs for Jazz Band.

The weekend concluded the magnificent State Jazz Festival careers of nine GSA senior musicians: Abigail Jakub, Grace Hylan, Erin Niehoff, Maya Sealander, Schuyler Williamson, Matthew Stephens, Raine Smith, Aidan Byrne and Aylen Wolf.

# Cross Country Kudos

In the fall season, the Cross Country teams had their share of glory, with the boys winning their first state championship since 1993, and the girls team finishing as Class C state runners up!

According to coach Erich Reed, both teams ran their best races of the season at States at the Twin Brook course in Cumberland on October 31.

In the girls race, the trio of GSA sophomore girls — Eliza Broughton (5th), Zeya Lorio (7th) and Mary Richardson (10th) — all placed among the top 10 Class C finishers.

For the boys, junior John Hassett was the individual state champion, with Ollie Dillon '17 and Will Entwisle '16 finishing as state medalists in 7th and 9th places.

The boys placed first with 60 points, to Orono's 71 and Lisbon's 120.

Coach Erich Reed was voted Boys Coach of the Year by the US Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association.

Notably, this was the first time a Northern Maine boys team has won States in Class C since 1998. With their victory, the boys team qualified for the New England championships for the first time, and they competed well at Thetford Academy, in Vermont.

STATE CRAMPING
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### What a season for Boys Basketball!

Not only did they win the Class C State Championship, they set a new school record along the way, ending the season with 21 wins and only 1 loss. Entering the tournament as the top seed, they defeated Fort Kent handily (73-28) in the quarterfinals, with four starters (Max Mattson '18, Taylor Schildroth '18, Nick Szwez '16, Jarrod Chase '17) scoring in double digits.

In the semifinals they beat Schenck by a score of 68-39, with the same four again scoring in the double digits. On to the Northern Maine final where they faced Bucksport in what turned out to be a tough game. The Eagles again prevailed, winning 55-43. According to Coach



Dwayne Carter '80, Taylor Schildroth "had an amazing game, scoring a career-high 32 points", and was key in turning the game around during the second half.

All of this led up to the state championship game against Southern Maine champions Waynflete on February 27. The game was close through three quarters until, according to Coach Carter, some stellar play from Jarrod Chase and Beckett Slayton '17 turned the momentum in GSA's favor. The defense took over and kept Waynflete from catching up, resulting in GSA's first gold ball since 2003, with a final score of 59-46.

An interesting side note: This is Coach Carter's third state championship with GSA – once as a player on the team in 1979, once as an assistant coach in 2003 and, now, as head coach.



### New & Newsworthy

Lots to report since January! The Curriculum Committee approved seven new courses, all set to begin next fall: AP Biology, AP Physics 1, Robotics, 3D Computer Modeling, 2D Computer Illustration/Animation, Pre-Engineering, and Juegos y Fiestas, an entry-level Spanish culture and language class.

The Athletics Department has added Girls Volleyball and Indoor Track to our standing roster of teams.

We are grateful to long-time GSA supporter Bob Marville for a gift that is bringing more technology into our classrooms:

Several significant pieces of industrial tech equipment are now in place: a new tablesaw with state-of-the-art safety features, a new planer, and welding machinery are already being used by students in Eric Gallant's and Jason Billings's classes.

Ben Politte '17 helped research and choose our new 3D printer and then spent his Independent Study in March designing and "printing" a dualenvironment, submersible drone on it. Ben expects to help people learn how to use the printer in classes next year.

Coach Dan Kane now has an iPad that he uses in his Outdoor Leadership classes to take videos of students to provide immediate feedback on their performance.



Thanks to a grant from the Carter Foundation supporting the Culinary Arts program, and to the generous support of an anonymous donor, a new, energy-efficient walk-in cooler and freezer now replaces the older units that took up more space and used twice the electricity. The smaller footprint allows Culinary Arts teacher Frank Bianco to increase surface area for food prep, and thus enroll 50% more students in the program.



Since February, work has been underway to make the Tenney Hill property ready to serve as a new dormitory. GSA purchased the property last spring on the recommendation of the Board's Buildings & Grounds Committee. Since the building had been a private residence, significant remodeling was needed to make it code-compliant and suitable for twenty-four students and two faculty apartments. (For example, code requires a sprinkler system, and enclosed interior stairs).

The Facilities Committee, a sub-committee of B&G, sought bids by architects and builders before choosing local architect Bruce Stahnke and E. L. Shea Builders and Engineers of Ellsworth. The Facilities Committee spent the fall vetting designs and plans, which the full Board approved at its January meeting. (See ba<mark>ck cover for the</mark> architect's drawing.) Both design and construction aim to achieve three goals: a safe, comfortable, student residence; durable, cost-effective, energy efficient materials; and an exterior whose appearance is congruent with the best architectural traditions of downtown Blue Hill.

The new dormitory will be ready in early August.

### Young Alumni Spotlight: Sister Steel

### Pan Players Reunite in Portland

Several young alumni musicians in Portland are coming together to share a tradition they love. The band Sister Steel formed to take part in the 25th Annual New England Pan Festival last May. Spanning a decade of alumni class years, from director Duncan Hardy '04 to recent graduate Savannah Leaf '14, the initial members rehearsed every day for a month to prepare for the festival.

"We knew all these people were moving to Portland," said Duncan in a recent phone interview. "We decided, 'Let's just figure out who's here and how we can do this.' People showed up because they love it and it's important to keep it alive."

Like Flash in the Pans in Blue Hill, Sister Steel offers family-friendly outdoor street dances that bring people together and benefit local organizations. This January, the group performed in support of the Maine Animal Coalition. Sister Steel also serves as a professional band available for private events, such as weddings. Performance fees go into an account that covers basic band expenses.

Duncan emphasizes the solidarity of the group, noting that each member brings unique strengths. For example, Rachel Freedman '07 has tackled grant-writing efforts to expand the band's resources, and Martin Conte '11 "is particularly good at rounding everyone up for practice."

The name "Sister Steel" pays homage to the kinship band members feel toward the Blue Hill area bands they grew up with and learned from. "We're the sister band to Planet Pan and Flash in the Pans," says Duncan. "We're part of that community, and it's important to be vocal about that connection." Sister Steel's pride in its lineage includes a commitment to high quality musical arrangements that pay tribute to the seriousness of the steel band tradition. A sponsored trip to Trinidad last summer affirmed for Duncan the importance of "going to the source" and appreciating all the work that goes into traditional performances.

"It all started with Carl Chase—and with Nigel," Duncan says of his introduction to pan music.

Carl Chase grew up playing several instruments and majored in music at Harvard. He is credited with bringing the cultural phenomenon of steel drum music to the Blue Hill area following a Caribbean sailing trip in the early 1970s, when he heard an indigenous steelband. He soon began making the drums himself, thanks to a book by Pete Seeger and subsequent travel to Trinidad. By 1975, Carl had founded the Atlantic Clarion Steel Band in Brooksville.

In the following decades, Carl began teaching classes and started Flash in the Pans. Nigel, his son, played from an early age and is now GSA's steel band teacher and a community-wide instructor, as well as the director of Atlantic Clarion, Pan Coalition, Flash in Pans, and other local groups.

Duncan was fifteen when a friend showed up at his house and said, "I'm taking you to a practice." In his first encounter with Planet Pan, Duncan loved the energy of the group and was hooked. He was seriously involved in the jazz program at GSA but also kept up his steel band participation.

Under the tutelage of Carl and Nigel, Duncan not only played but also learned to arrange music and teach. Following graduation, he spent several years with Atlantic Clarion, Nigel's professional and award-winning ensemble. After completing a major in Jazz Studies at SUNY Purchase, Duncan landed a job at Waynflete teaching middle school steel band. He also teaches private sax lessons and never

imagined that his steel band experience would lead to a career.

Duncan credits the GSA community with "helping me grow into feeling excited about music and creating my own identity." For Duncan, Sister Steel brings together some of the people who shared that experience. It also serves as a way to appreciate those who offered so many opportunities. "I feel like I'm carrying a torch," says Duncan. "I'm doing it for me and Portland but also for them."

SURFACE Magazine selected Lilian Day Thorpe'09 as one of 10 winners of its 2015 "Avant Guardian" photography competition. Recognized as "emerging talents who show great promise," the award winners were featured in the October 2015 issue of the magazine. Currently Lilian is pursuing a Masters in Art History at Pratt Institute. GSA's Jen Traub caught up with her recently—just before she made a return trip to Iceland—for an informal Q&A about her artwork and the award.



#### What was your reaction to receiving the Avant Guardian award, and how did your professors at Pratt respond?

I was completely shocked. I entered the competition because my thesis professor used to tell my class to enter any photography competition that seemed up our alley because there was nothing to lose—and maybe a lot to gain! I never thought I would actually be one of the ten winners, but I was of course thrilled. My professors were all extremely supportive and proud of me when I told them the news, especially my thesis professor and the chair of the photography department.

Has this award led to any new connections or opportunities? Receiving this award has indeed led to new opportunities, as well as better exposure of my own work. Coincidentally, I had a solo show in Manhattan at the restaurant Better Being in Hell's Kitchen at the time the October issue of Surface came out. I began to get emails from people who were interested in seeing my work in person, and I could easily direct them to my show. From there, I sold many pieces to people who had seen my work first in Surface. The New York show was so successful that it was extended by an entire month and then traveled to Chicago to hang in Cup and Spoon, another restaurant/gallery. I sold two pieces in the Chicago show.

According to the executive editor of Surface, "Images have the power to change how we think about everything from a building to a chair to a watch." In what ways does your work exhibit the power to change how we think (and about what)?

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My work has always played with the definition of photography, and because of that, I was both surprised and encouraged that it was chosen to be featured in Surface. What I mean is, I am mostly inspired by paintings by the Old Masters, and consequently, my photographs often appear more painterly than photographic. They are, after all, collages or montages rather than straight images. Each of my works is composed of up to ten different photographs that I stitch together in Photoshop. I love using a digital medium to create work that does not look obviously digitally made. When I was still in school, people often wondered if my work seemed too painterly. I never understood that critique, especially because photography is a continuously

expanding medium. I hope that my work allows people to consider photography the way I see it today: as a complicated, not always straightforward medium that is constantly evolving. I am excited to see how my work grows as the medium grows, too.

#### Before receiving the award, you spent a summer in Venice (2013) and a month in Iceland (2014). What was the impact of these experiences on your work?

Travel always gives me inspiration for my work. To create each of my digital montages, I rely on a huge library of images (that I've taken) to choose from. When I travel to visually appealing places like Iceland or Venice, I am able to shoot more, which broadens my selection of images with which to create montages. It's most exciting when I can create a piece like Soft Civilization that combines elements from two or more extremely different places. Soft Civilization (2013) has an Icelandic backdrop with Venetian houses lining the coast. I love creating fictional landscapes out of my favorite places. My artist residency in Iceland during September 2014 was the perfect opportunity to take tons of photographs that I continue to use in my montages today.

#### During your artist residency, you exhibited your work in Iceland. How was it received?

Yes, I had a selection of the work that I made during my artist residency exhibited at a museum in Laugarvatn, Iceland. My pieces were well received by the Icelanders, and I even sold one to the Reykjavik printer who printed my images for the exhibit (I usually print my own work, but it was too expensive to ship pieces there for the show). After the exhibit was over, I donated the series of twelve pictures to the directors of my artist residency, who have them on display in the studios there.

### Lilian Day Thorpe '09

#### Describe your connection with Courthouse Gallery in Ellsworth, Maine.

I started working at Courthouse Gallery in the summer of 2012. I needed a summer job while I was in Maine, and I was lucky enough to get one there. I loved being surrounded by art every day at work. I continued to work there the summers of 2014 and 2015 (in 2013, I was in Venice studying art history and oil painting). I was picked up by Courthouse Gallery as a permanent artist at the end of the summer in 2014.

I am in graduate school now, so it's difficult to find time to make new art, but I'm working on a few new pieces to show at the Gallery this spring and summer. I hope to devote a lot of time this summer to creating new pieces.

#### In what ways did GSA prepare you as an artist?

GSA and my early education were instrumental in my artistic success. I learned so much from Katie Greene's art classes. She was a terrific and encouraging teacher. Further, I fondly remember my early days at the Bay School, which I am convinced played a huge role in where I am today. I feel very lucky to have had such a great early and high school education that underscored the importance of art and creativity.
