# from the HEAD OF SCHOOL



ne of the greatest ironies about high schools is that while we are in the business of change, we do not change very quickly. Let me explain. Schools exist to aid, inform, and further each student's academic, ethical, aesthetic, and personal growth. Schools embrace a fundamental mission to assist in a process of informed and directed change that occurs sometimes rather quickly and sometimes frustratingly slowly. Thus, change is not just a sought-after norm but also a hard and fast reality in the lives of students and their teachers.

Yet schools are notoriously slow to change. The organization of a 9th or 10th grade classroom today looks roughly the same as it did thirty and sixty and even ninety years ago. There are —and there were— desks in rows with a teacher in front of the desks. The teacher does most of the talking. That has not changed much at all.

Schools struggle with change for lots of reasons, among them, lack of resources, fear of the resulting adjustments or chaos, failure in leadership, lack of inspiration, or a fierce holding on to traditions and to what is safely known.

Perhaps the single greatest change in the life of a typical high schooler in

the last thirty years is the integration of technology into his or her academic life. Indeed, George Stevens Academy is poised to make a significant change this September when we join the Maine Learning Technology Initiative (MLTI) program. As school starts, every GSA student will be issued a very powerful tool—a MacBook Air laptop to keep and use for the entire year.

We are committed to each student's success in every area of endeavor, and that includes preparing students for college or for a work force that increasingly expects sophisticated computer skills. Having a technology-rich learning environment will further support our commitment to individualized student learning. Laptops for every student will enable them to conduct research, download readings, creatively work in groups, write papers, and produce multimedia projects-not just during school hours, but anytime and anywhere. Moreover, we are looking to expand our repertoire of teaching and learning strategies in every classroom as we challenge our students to create, think, design, and author academic and artistic works. We will be partnering with our 1:1 sending schools so that each incoming student will make a smooth transition from 8th to 9th grade.

Everyone here at George Stevens is excited about this innovation in how we teach and learn. There are many challenges ahead of us related to technology. Please stay tuned throughout the school year to see the results.

Sunday, June 8th was a beautiful, cloudless, sun-drenched day. Sixty-three seniors processed along Union Street to the bleachers arrayed in front of the Academy Building. The jazz band, led by this year's commencement speaker, Steve Orlofsky, played the familiar strains of Elgar's Pomp and Circumstance. Following a warm welcome by Head of School Paul Perkinson, Board president Marion Dillon Morris recognized members of the Reunion Class of 1964 who were in attendance. First Honor Essayist Bigo Shen amused the gathered crowds by comparing the innumerable choices graduates now face to the difficulty of selecting just one bottle of ketchup from the linear feet of shelves in a typical supermarket. Salutatorian Joan Liu spoke movingly of how her father has always been near at hand for her at moments of great risk. Valedictorian Loriman Looke meditated on the unexpected ways that preparing for a competitive senior debate became an experience in collaboration and friendship.

# Lilla Bowden '04 Memorial Speaker

Maine writer Elizabeth Peavey spoke at a special assembly in May. "The Unlikely Making of a Maine Writer" was part of the Lilla Bowden '04 Memorial Speaker Series. Over the years Ms. Peavey has made numerous guest appearances in GSA's Maine Writers course. "Growing up in Maine, being so anxious to get away, finally achieving that dream—and then, after 10 years of travel, I realized I wanted to come home. And, in coming home, I found my voice as a writer."

The speaker series is named for Lilla Bowden, who graduated from George Stevens in 1904 and died in Blue Hill at age 99 in 1986. Her daughter, Dr. Rebecca Bowden Wanbaugh, graduated from George Stevens Academy in 1941. She is Professor Emerita of History at the University of Presque Isle, where she was also Dean of Women. Along with her late husband, Robert, Rebecca established the Lilla Bowden '04 Speaker Series in memory of her mother.

After finishing the regular season as the second seed with a record of 10-2, the boys went on to sweep fourth-seeded Madawaska in straight sets, winning the Class C regional championship for the 10<sup>th</sup> time in 12 years. For the fifth consecutive year, they faced Waynflete in the state final match, and for the fifth consecutive year Waynflete won 5-0. ## Track

The relay team of Cimeno, Dillon, Madison Cole '15, and Hanna Jordan '17 finished second in the 4x800 relay. The team did well at the state finals, with Bella Cimeno placing sixth in the hurdles, and Alice Dillon doing the same in the 800-meter.

Second place finishers were: Finn Davis-Batt '15 in the 400-meter dash, John Hassett '17 – 1600-meter run, Devlin Valle '16 – 3200-meter run, and Alex Taylor-Lash '17 – pole vault. At the state finals, the team finished solidly in the middle – 15<sup>th</sup> out of 30 schools. Finn Davis-Batt finished fourth in the 400-meter dash, and John Hassett came in sixth in the 1600-meter run.

# Sailing

GSA also hosts the Downeast Regatta in Castine, competing against teams from New England as well as Maine.

This year's Welles Cup Regatta started well for GSA, as they held the lead 2-1 after the first round of three races. MDI rallied on the second day, however winning all three races and thus keeping the Welles Cup trophy for another year.

The Downeast Regatta saw two days of very differing conditions. Saturday the heavy wind was enough to postpone racing after several boats capsized during the second race of the day. Sunday's wind was very light, which did not favor GSA. Yarmouth was the eventual Downeast Champion, winning the Modisette trophy as the top Maine finisher.

## From Buildings & Grounds: Summer Projects

Last summer, at the direction of the Board of Trustees, the Buildings & Grounds Committee developed a three-year plan to improve the GSA campus, with the goals of making the campus more attractive, safer, "greener" and more cost efficient. Last summer's projects included the removal of the blacktop parking lot between the Butler Building and the McIntyre/Hinckley Buildings and the creation of a landscaped courtyard. This year's projects include painting and refurnishing the cafeteria, installing all-new high-efficiency LED lighting in the gymnasium, and removing and replacing all 71 windows in the Academy Building. These windows are insulated and tightly fitting, replacing old windows that were drafty and noisy, rattling and shaking in even mild breezes. The Academy Building's front door and porch are also being replaced. Additionally, thanks to a generous gift from a loyal supporter, the Faculty Room has been repainted, newly-carpeted, and refurnished.

# Head Search Update

A Head Search Committee has been formed to appoint Paul Perkinson's successor (as of July 1, 2015).
