### from the Head of School

## Living Fully Our Mission



ne year ago George Stevens Academy was preparing for its decennial evaluation by an NEAS&C visiting team for purposes of reaccreditation. Working in committees that represented all our constituencies, we undertook an extensive and thorough self-study, and produced a detailed report that included more than seventy recommendations across every aspect of the institution, from academic programs and student experience to infrastructure, facilities, communication, and governance. We made these recommendations, not because we found our

programs and practices ineffective, but in the belief that we can improve the ways we live our mission to educate the students on our peninsula and beyond. When the NEAS&C team made their visit in April, they concurred with our self study, and in their report wrote that "George Stevens Academy has accomplished what many schools dream of—authentic community that unites all members sincerely in a single purpose: student success."

The recommendations we arrived at, and that NEAS&C endorsed, fall into six broad areas: (1) school mission, (2) strategic planning, (3) public relations and aesthetics, (4) administrative responsibility, (5) financial sustainability, and (6) health and safety protocols. We began to address many of our recommendations as soon as they surfaced, continued to do so over the summer, and I guarantee that in the coming months we will address all of them in such a way as to improve the learning experience of all our students.

The chief purpose of an annual report is to recognize, and thank collectively, all of you who have contributed so generously to support GSA. I am deeply grateful for the many gifts that allow us to live fully our mission and to find even better ways to deliver the best possible education to our students in the 21st century.

Thanks to your gifts to our capital initiatives, we completed the renovation of our gym floor late last fall, allowing our teams the very best performance space in the area. In September we opened the doors of a new Science Projects Room, the first phase of science facilities renovations. We established the Jerold M. '33 and Diana Hinckley Professional Development Fund, substantially increasing the professional development opportunities we are able to offer our faculty, believing that the best way to serve students is to attract and retain the best faculty. On the capital front we still have much to do; facilities that served us well fifty years ago no longer support the most relevant programs we must offer students today. But the pattern of your giving gives us hope that we will be able to meet our capital goals.

The Annual Fund provides "mission critical" support year after year. As our mission states, George Stevens Academy is committed above all to serving the children in our community. This commitment is reflected in the fact that we accept from our "sending towns" whatever annual tuition rate the state sets, despite the fact that the real cost of educating a GSA student is always significantly more. We depend on annual giving to close this "gap," the difference between tuition revenue and annual operating costs. Bridging that difference through annual giving directly supports the "GSA difference"—all those distinctive and extraordinary learning experiences we offer our students.

It is an honor to be serving as the Head of GSA, and my experience in these first months since I arrived has deepened my appreciation for this wonderful school and for all the ways I have been welcomed, and above all made me profoundly grateful to the many people who have and will continue to give generously to support GSA and its mission.

## Graduation 2011



For the second year in a row, he also qualified for the New England Championships in the 800-meter, where he was the top Maine finisher and set a new GSA record (1:58:78), just one week after the State Championships. Nick Doolittle '11, placed fourth in the high jump at the state meet, with a personal best height of 5'8". He placed seventh in the long jump. Vika Grindle '11, enjoyed a very successful season, placing first in the PVCs in the long jump.

#### Jazz Championship Reclaimed!

On Saturday, March 18 & 19 at Mount Desert Island High School the GSA Jazz Band, under the direction of GSA music teacher Steve Orlofksy, reclaimed the #1 spot to be crowned the 2011 Maine State Champion. It was GSA's 8th State Jazz Band Championship since 2003 and 14th since 1989. For the first time since 2006, a combo won the State Championship in Combo, Division III (Sam's Soul Children). For the second year in a row, a combo won the State Championship in Multiple Combo Division B (Delicious), and for the ninth year in a row a multiple combo placed either 2nd or 3rd (Caramello, 3rd place).

#### Independent Study and Internship Projects (ISIP)

Last spring 60 juniors and 65 seniors developed and carried out independent study and internship projects. ISIP is an integral part of the GSA experience and provides every junior and senior the opportunity to explore an academic or vocational interest through a self-designed, two week course of study. ISIP encourages interdisciplinary skills and connected knowledge as students investigate a specialized area of interest with the assistance of an ISIP advisor and an off-campus advisor.

#### Anna Peters


#### Girls' Dorm Parent

## GSA Currents

### From the Board President

Rob Clapp '73 has served as a GSA trustee since 2005, and since 2008 as Board president. Rob's tenure as president concluded this fall, but he will continue to serve as vice-president for the next two years. Trustee Melissa Mattes, who served as president once before, will step back into the role this year. Below, Rob reflects on highlights of the past year, and Melissa looks forward to a year of planning.



The academic year 2010-2011 saw impressive progress and growth on several fronts: facilities, development, personnel, and Board self-evaluation and future planning.

Our biggest capital effort in a generation started with a bang last fall when we completed the first phase of the renovation of our multipurpose facility. We committed just over \$770,000 to replace the composite floor

of a badly sagging gymnasium with a beautiful new wood floor, and we renovated two offices and storage areas. We then repainted and recarpeted the Esther Wood Room, and initiated a major "upcycling" effort, turning one of our classrooms into an all-sciences project room, complete with new storage space, a presentation room, and space in which students can carry out long-range experiments in physics, biology, and chemistry. It is gratifying to see how appreciative our students are. They really do notice, and it does make a difference in the quality of their educational experience at GSA.

Despite an economic climate that continues to be challenging, the number of people who made gifts to the Annual Fund increased this past year, and the number of donations to capital initiatives also increased. We are also in the third year of our Alumni Challenge, which will kick in a matching donation if we

reach and maintain higher percentage targets within the next few years. Increasing the number of GSA's alumni donors and alumni volunteers continues to be a key focus of our Development Office and the Development Committee.

Last spring the Board voted to earmark \$500,000 of the Jerold M. Hinckley '33 bequest to provide annual support for professional development for our faculty and staff. The Jerold and Diana Hinckley Professional Development Fund will generate income every year—about \$20,000 this year—to enable our teachers and staff to attend professional workshops, engage in continuing education, and in other ways improve their ability to deliver the very best education to each and every GSA student.

Our most important decision this past year was to hire Head of School Paul Perkinson. Trustee Marion Morris chaired the Search Committee. Working with a consultant, and making the process unusually transparent and inclusive, the committee developed a pool of exceptionally strong candidates. Their recommendation of Paul Perkinson was approved unanimously by the trustees in December, and Paul began his headship at GSA on July 1, 2011.

I want to acknowledge here the remarkable leadership last year of Bags Brokaw. Bags agreed to become Interim Head at a difficult juncture in our history. He was the fourth head in just five years at GSA. He was the right person for the position, with the right combination of interpersonal skills, tact, respect, and institutional understanding to move GSA in a positive direction last year, and we are deeply grateful to him for his service to our school.

Last spring we completed our reaccreditation process for the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEAS&C) with a visit from the accreditation committee made up of teachers and administrators. After reviewing our self-study report, written with the participation of faculty, staff, administrators, parents, trustees, and community members, the team visited our campus for three days to see the school in action, and recommended reaccreditation.

Now the hard work begins. We are now embarking on a strategic planning process that will update our previous Strategic Plan completed five years ago. A Strategic Planning Committee, led by trustees, began the planning process last spring, and will continue into the more active phase of strategic planning during the fall. We will use the recommendations from the NEAS&C report along with information gathered from all constituents in our community. There will be opportunities for participation and input throughout the fall and winter for those who wish to contribute.

On behalf of all of the trustees, I would like to thank Rob Clapp for his leadership during the last fours years as president of the Board. His wise leadership and commitment to GSA provided a steady hand as we negotiated changes in economy, leadership, and an ever-changing educational climate.

I am looking forward to the next year at GSA as I once again take on the position of President of the Board of Trustees. I feel very fortunate to work with the enthusiastic, committed, and diverse group of trustees. I am excited to see where Strategic Planning will take us as we renew



our vision and mission for all students in our community, with the goal of providing an educational environment where all students find a place to learn, grow, and be challenged to identify and reach his or her personal best.

Thanks to the generosity of alumni, parents, grandparents, friends, faculty, staff, and trustees, we received \$408,000 in gifts last year, including \$175,000 in support of the Annual Fund and \$233,000 to our endowment and capital initiatives.

GSA's Annual Fund supports the operating budget and is critical in closing the gap between the school's operating costs and tuition revenue received from sending towns. Annual Fund participation continues to increase impressively: just this year, 150 new donors contributed to the fund! Thank you to all of the parent, alumni, and trustee volunteers who joined together in support of our goals. We'd also like to acknowledge the members of the Class of 2011 who continued the tradition initiated by the Class of 2009 by making a senior class gift to the Annual Fund (see p. 25), as well as the generous friends of GSA who established The Flood Family Challenge and The Alumni Challenge, both critical initiatives to support the Annual Fund (see p. 27).

This past year we fulfilled two key initiatives of GSA's Campaign for Our Future. In December, we celebrated the completion of phase I of the Multi-Purpose Facility Renovation, and during Homecoming Weekend, October 7-9, we officially opened our new Science Projects Room. These exciting strides forward would not have been possible without the generous support of many individuals and local businesses and the significant involvement of dedicated volunteers. We'd like to acknowledge the many alumni who came forward in support of the Multi-Purpose Facility Renovation, and members of the Class of 1961 who paid tribute to a beloved faculty member with a 50th reunion class gift to the Science Projects Room (see p. 26).

Generations of students and faculty—current and future—will benefit directly from two gifts to GSA's endowment: a memorial fund established by the children of Spencer W. Winsor, GSA's first guidance counselor, that enables Student Services to provide immediate, practical support to many of our students (see p. 28); and the Rusty Duym '65 Sailing Fund, conceived by Henry Becton, Jr. and the Becton family, to honor the memory of Rusty Duym '65 by supporting GSA's sailing program (see p.

We are deeply grateful to the many friends of GSA who give unstintingly of their time and resources. We invite you to visit campus to see the exciting changes taking place and get to know the students and faculty who are the beneficiaries of your support.

Thank you for your continued commitment to GSA.

#### The Spencer H. Winsor Student Enrichment Fund

#### Doing good, one student at a time

Spencer H. Winsor, born in New York City in 1918 and the youngest of three sons, was raised during the depression in Bangor, Maine. He died of cancer in Blue Hill in 1979 at age 62. He developed a strong sense of personal and community responsibility from his father, a Baptist Minister, and his mother, a teacher. He saw his parents share meals with parishioners, and offer them emotional support. Spencer graduated from Bangor High School in 1936 and from Colby College in 1940. He married Barbara Libbey of Bangor in 1943 before joining the Naval Air Force during WWII as a naval aviator. He was a reconnaissance photographer and pilot in the Pacific on the USS Guam. Once home, Spencer worked as a reporter for the Bangor Daily Commercial before moving his family to Waterville, Maine where he started a career with the Colby College Alumni Magazine as a freelance photographer and fundraiser.

Between 1951 and 1966 Spencer and Barbara raised three children, Tom, Tania, and Libbey, in Pittsfield, Maine while he worked as the personnel manager for the Baxter Canning Company. Spencer earned a Master's of Education from the University of Maine. He was always an active

Democrat in Maine politics, especially in areas of education, and supported the Gifted and Talented Legislation in Augusta. Spencer was a ghostwriter for several politically active labor leaders and a speechwriter for Edmund Muskie's campaign for Governor, but turned down Muskie's offer to manage his U.S. Presidential bid. He was active in the Kiwanis Club, sang in the choir of the First Universalist Church, played the violin, enjoyed woodworking—and even spent a winter building a sailboat in his living room.

Spencer, Barbara, and daughter Libbey moved to Blue Hill in 1966 when he became GSA's first guidance counselor. Moving to the coast was Spencer's dream come true. He loved the ocean, music, art, boatyards and maritime history. He spent summers fixing his old wooden Deer Isle Skeg for the "Round the Island Race," and enjoying his family and growing grandchildren. While at GSA, Spencer completed a Certificate of Advanced Study in counseling and guidance from the University of Maine and started the GSA golf team. Barbara taught ballroom dancing, started the GSA girls' basketball team, and worked at GSA as librarian and study hall monitor.

Libbey Winsor Gulliver, GSA Class of '71, remembers, "It was understood growing up that I would support those coping with personal struggles." Spencer worked with other Hancock County leaders who were concerned about the increase in homeless teens, and formed the committee that founded "The Homestead Project," which later evolved into Kids Peace, a residential treatment program in Ellsworth Falls.

GSA board member and former Assistant Head of School, Emil Andy, reflects on Spencer's years at GSA. "Spencer always had the students' best interests in mind. In addition, he was instrumental in establishing GSA's Independent Study program, which continues to this day." The Independent Study and Internship Program (as it is now called) is a distinct part of the GSA experience and offers every eligible junior and senior the opportunity to explore an academic or vocational interest through a self-designed, two- or three-week course of study. ISIP encourages interdisciplinary skills and connected knowledge as students investigate specialized areas of interest. "The program has benefited generations of GSA students and will continue to do so for years to come," says Emil.

Spencer's son, Maine State Legislator Tom J. Winsor of Norway Maine, adds: "My father believed every child deserved respect as an individual capable of great achievement, and it was his job as an educator to help each child find direction, and then find his or her own tools and to develop the skills needed to excel and prosper."

In 2007 Spencer's daughter Tania Hannon of Brooklin proposed to rededicate the scholarship fund originally set up in her father's memory, in order to better reflect his interest in helping students develop their futures while they are still enrolled at GSA. The Spencer H. Winsor Student Enrichment Fund was thus established.

The Enrichment Fund reflects Spencer's habit of giving students small financial support as needed for a college application, for gas money to attend a school interview, to pay for a visit to a college campus or a meeting with a potential employer—even gifts for lunch vouchers or a dentist's appointment.

"We are grateful for this tremendous investment in the long-term support of our students' immediate needs," said Martha Garfield '82, Director of College and Vocational Counseling. "In past years the Winsor Fund has supported our 9th grade orientation program. This year, the Spencer H. Winsor Student Enrichment Fund will enable GSA to take a group of juniors and seniors to visit the University of Southern Maine and Southern Maine Community College, take campus tours, and meet with admission officers. In addition, the fund has helped support our annual college financial aid workshops for seniors and their parents."

"Spencer Winsor encouraged me to think beyond the immediate area, and opened my eyes to what was available for college opportunities outside of eastern Maine," says Rob Clapp '73, vice-president of GSA's Board of Trustees. Dean of Students Libby Austin Rosemeier '77 is sure that "Spence would appreciate the fact that these funds are earmarked to help students explore options for furthering their education beyond high school."

Tania adds, "Many people who were students during Dad's years at GSA comment on his influence in their lives: 'Your Dad was so supportive of me. He gave what I needed to move ahead in my life.' It is my hope that the spirit of Spencer Winsor is passed on by those he assisted. This fund invites you to contribute."

At the same event, GSA sailing coaches Tom Gutow and Patrick Haugen announced the establishment of the Becton Trophy Women's Double-Handed Maine State Championship, a new regatta named in honor of the Becton family and their long-standing support of GSA. The Becton Trophy Women's Double-Handed Maine State Championship is a combined event with the Maine Maritime Academy Women's Downeast Double-Handed Invite, co-hosted by GSA and MMA on October 2nd at Maine Maritime Academy. This inaugural year, Koos and Lameyer captured both championships.

Henry Becton, Jr. spoke on behalf of his family to express what motivated them to make the lead gift to establish the fund. Portions are quoted below:

"I wanted to say a few words about what motivated our family to make the lead gift to get this fund established.

"It really was the confluence of three things. First, our life-long friendship and love for Rusty and desire to find a way to pay tribute to his talents and spirit in a lasting fashion; second, our belief in the importance of education, and specifically our long-standing support of George Stevens Academy; and third, our conviction, passed down from our parents, of the importance of a flourishing sailing program for young people in this community.

"The Blue Hill area has a long and rich history of connections to the sea that we think is a wonderful heritage to nurture. Esther Wood's history tells us that one of the first subjects taught at George Stevens was Navigation.

"I remember seeing photographs from the 1800s of the inner harbor teeming with the masts of wooden ships, one of them probably belonging to George Stevens himself. ...This area has bred some outstanding sailboat racers. Most of you are aware that the crews of the classic America's Cup defenders in the early 1900s all came from Deer Isle. And we're proud that in recent years the George Stevens sailing team has distinguished itself in many regattas and championships, as we've just heard...

"Rusty Duym personified Blue Hill's connection to the sea and its championship sailors. The whole area celebrated as he won his class in the single-handed "Bermuda One-Two" race several years ago, on his beloved sloop, Williwaw, which he restored and equipped himself. Rusty won or helped several of us win more racing trophies than anyone I know. "Rusty had many other wonderful attributes and talents—teacher, musician, technician—but I want to say a few more things about Rusty as a sailing and racing companion for our family and for me. Rusty was a virtual member of our family since boyhood. My mother spotted him back then as a newcomer to the sailing program, saw his talent and passion, and took him under her wing—or should I say, her mainsail.

"In his early 20's Rusty became a regular member of the crew on our racing yawl, Ariana. As Dad began campaigning Lucero, his yellow Atlantic, Rusty signed on, first as crew and later when Dad retired, as his successor, skippering the "banana boat" as we sometimes called it, and proudly wearing those yellow and orange tee shirts around town that he had made for his crew. And he eventually became my partner in racing our sloop, Otter, and keeping her in racing trim. He was a continuing presence at Sculpin Point. from June to October, ready to help

with anything to do with boats, taking my parents for a sail when we weren't around, or fixing the odd troublesome fuel filter or sump pump.

"Racing Otter together, Rusty and I experienced an intuitive, non-verbal communication as

together we adjusted the trim to every small change in the breeze or in the look of the jib along the luff. No one could anticipate when a spinnaker was about to curl or fold like Rusty could. From his position near the mast he'd throw a glance back at me at the wheel. And sometimes I knew that it meant he was going to trim the sheet six or eight inches. It was sheer joy to be in touch with the elements together, reading and riding the literal and figurative waves.

"In the weeks following Rusty's death, several of us wanted to do something to insure that other young people from this community could learn the same sailing and racing skills, the same appreciation as stewards of this beautiful Bay, and the same joys of being out on the water.

"So we decided to work with his family and with George Stevens Academy to establish the Rusty Duym '65 Sailing Fund to endow support for the sailing program. Rusty loved to teach and mentor young people, and these funds will keep that part of his spirit alive. We hope you'll consider joining us in contributing to this Fund.

"It's hard for many of us to imagine our lives on the water without Rusty's physical presence. But we're happy that his sailing spirit, his broad waterman's skills, his dependable good humor, his modest, quiet strength, and his mentorship of young people will be kept alive through this fund."

Horace and Sylvia Wardwell's roots at GSA go deep, and for years they have loyally supported their school by giving to the Annual Fund.

If you live on the Blue Hill Peninsula and heat your home with oil, there's a good chance you've had oil delivered by Wardwell Oil. Horace '57 and Sylvia '59 Conner Wardwell have owned and operated Wardwell Oil in Sargentville for over 50 years. They took over the business from Sylvia's father, Myron Connor '33 shortly after marrying in 1959, following Sylvia's graduation from GSA. Y ou hear it all the time: George Stevens Academy is an independent school. But what does this really mean? New England academies represent a long and venerable tradition. The Academy is not a "public" school; we operate independent of public school requirements and constraints. On the other hand, GSA has a long-standing commitment to educating the students in this community: we are here to provide the best possible education to all students on this peninsula who choose to come to GSA.

For more than a century Maine legislation has required towns with no public school option to provide tuition dollars for their resident students. The tuition allowance is set annually in Augusta. This means, simply, that when students from Brooksville or Castine or Surry, for example, choose to attend GSA, the "sending" or "tuitioning" town pays those tuition dollars to GSA. In fact, sending towns pay tuition to any accredited school their resident student chooses to attend (with few restrictions), whether the school is GSA, an out-of-state private school, or another Town Academy in Maine.

Like every private school, college, and university in the country, GSA's tuition dollars never meet the true cost of educating a student. Last year it cost about \$11,500 to educate a student at GSA, but the state-set tuition was just \$9,300. How do we make up the difference? The Annual Fund plays a

large role, of course, and has grown impressively over the past eight years. But it is not sufficient to close the gap between tuition revenues and real costs.

Moreover, tuition dollars can't be used to fix leaking roofs or build new science labs. For that, the State provides GSA a small facilities stipend, the "insured value factor" or IVF. Until two years ago, the IVF was 10% of tuition, but Augusta cut that amount in half in 2008. Where a public school looks to the State when it needs new facilities, GSA must look to its community of supporters.

So behind the "GSA difference"—those distinctive opportunities our students have, whether Independent Study programs, the annual Arts Festival, mentorships with local artists and businesses, alternative course contracts, and dozens of elective courses—lies another difference: the difference between the tuition we receive and the dollars it costs to support our distinctive curriculum and programs.
