President Biden Signs Respect for Marriage Act into Law

Historic legislation ensures all couples are treated equally under the law

WHITE PLAINS--On the morning of December 13th, President Joe Biden, in front of 5,300 people who had gathered to watch, signed the Respect for Marriage Act into law. This Act was passed with bipartisan support in both the House and the Senate finally erasing the Defense of Marriage Act. The Defense of Marriage Act was passed in 1996. This act defined marriage as a union between a man and a woman exclusively and allowed states to ban samesex marriage under state law. This new law rules in the complete opposite direction, protecting the right to marry across the country regardless of sex, race, or ethnicity. Additionally, this recent law was also amended from its previous draft to include interracial marriage.

Marriage Equality wasn't always a main goal of LGBTQ+ activists. They instead focused on legalizing homosexuality and outlawing discrimination. The real push for same-sex marriage began in the late 1980s, following the HIV/AIDS crisis. The Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) is a disease that attacks a person's immune system, making it harder to fight off infections. At the beginning of the outbreak and for many years thereafter, HIV would subsequently turn into Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) which was considered a death sentence, especially for the gay community. Due to the stigma surrounding homosexuality, and the lack of sex education and health care for queer

people, HIV disproportionately affected the gay community, particularly gay men. By 1980, over 120 thousand deaths due to AIDS had been reported. This tragedy highlighted the lack of protections for same-sex couples. Many people were unable to visit their partner in the hospital because they weren't related or married. Unaccepting families wouldn't share information about the infected person with their partner and would prevent them from seeing each other at all. The partner would also have no say in funeral preparations, no claim to personal affects and, no claim to any assets left in their deceased partner's will. After their partner's death, many people were evicted from homes they previously shared because either their late partner owned it, or renters didn't want someone who had close contact to someone with HIV living in their building. The lack of these basic legal protections and rights is why marriage equality is so important. Marriage is more than a ceremony of commitment; it's an important legal right that protects the union between two people.

The legalization of same-sex and interracial marriage as a law, instead of a court case is a very significant part of the new act. Previously, interracial, and same-sex marriage had only been protected by the Supreme Court cases *Loving V. Virginia* (1967) and *Obergefell V. Hodges* (2015) respectfully. The protections afforded by these cases were not substantial enough to adequately protect the rights of marriage for every American citizen, because cases are always



open to be reinterpreted and overturned. A recent example of this is the overturning of Roe V. Wade, a Supreme Court case which protects a person's right to an abortion under the 14th amendment's "right to privacy." This past June, the Supreme court ruled to overturn Roe, setting off the enactment of anti-abortion laws in over 30 states. Unlike laws, court rulings are only under the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, so court decisions are not reviewed by other government branches, and only five out of nine votes are needed to overturn a case. Because federal laws supercede supreme case laws, the new Respect for Marriage Act will protect equal marriage across all 50 states, and in order to amend or over-turn the law, it would have to go through

> The Institution of Marriage is more than just a public declaration of love; it is also a legal contract that binds two people together and gives them protections under the law. Marriage is tied into health insurance, buying a home, adoption, taxes, and inheritance. Past attempts to protect marriage for every American citizen, such as *Loving* and *Obergefell*, were not concrete or extensive enough to be effective. The latest law will ensure anyone of any race, sex, or ethnicity can marry whomever they want, and make it very difficult for this right to be revoked.

After the completion of the outline in early April, the school ordered 2 4'x8' planks of plywood and an assortment of acrylic paints to start sketching the piece. Georgia Runoff Election Provides Further Disappointment for Republicans

WHITE PLAINS--Last month, following the midterm elections, the state of Georgia called a runoff for their Senate election between Democrat and incumbent, Raphael Warnock, and Republican, Herschel Walker. This is because the state of Georgia requires that the winner of the Senate race achieve a majority, and while Warnock was able to gain a plurality of the votes, the overall percentage of those who voted for him was just shy of 50%. With this runoff election, void of any third-party votes, Warnock was able to keep his Senate seat with 51.4% of the vote, about 3% more than Walker. With this win, the Democrats now have a 51-49 majority in the Senate, no longer requiring Vice President Harris' tie-breaking votes, with the Republicans holding a 222-213 majority in the House of Representatives, proving this predicted "red wave" to be more of a "purple splash." So, how was Warnock able to win?

Both candidates ran very different campaigns. Walker, the incumbent and someone with actual political experience, homed in on his experience as a pastor, while Walker, a former NFL player, had a campaign plagued with controversy. Throughout his campaign, Walker was hit with claims of domestic violence and paying for his former girlfriends' abortions, despite holding a strong pro-life stance on the issue. In addition, Warnock attempted to connect with not just the Democrats, but also independent/third-party and Republican voters in Georgia. This is one of the factors that helped him secure the third-party and independent vote in the runoff. On the other hand, Warnock was very heavily endorsed by Trump and, as seen by the rest of the candidates that were endorsed by him this election cycle,

the post-Trump administration influence has not resulted in many victories.

Warnock also worked to make voting more accessible for Georgians. The Republican aversion to mail-in voting, gaining immense strength during the 2020 election, may have cost them a seat in the Senate. According to <u>Politico</u>, Warnock was able to gain about 320,000 votes through mail-in ballots, winning over 58% support from these ballots. Black voters in Georgia, who were more likely to vote for Warnock, accounted for 31.8% of mail-in ballots.

Warnock was also able to gain high turnout in Atlanta, an area that votes heavily for Democrats, in the runoff. This allowed him to improve his margins to account for the slightly lower turnout of the election as a whole. Walker was unable to do this in generally Republican areas. In fact, Warnock improved his numbers in the only Republican area that showed higher turnout when compared to the November election, Walker's home county of Johnson County.

The results of this runoff and the midterm election in general provided immense disappointment for the Republican party. This "red wave" they were expecting did not hold up and the influence that a Trump endorsement was expected to have severely underperformed. In addition, because the Democrats had performed much better than expected, President Biden has a better shot at reelection than anticipated. This runoff election, if anything, is a strong testament to the ever-increasing importance of voting and hope that democracy will succeed in providing power to those who will fight for the people.

Email Chain Forwarded to Over 500 Students

Chain email sent to all seniors in the class of 2022 and class of 2023

A recent breach in student emails shows the vulnerability of White Plains High School's technology. Though the event occurred a couple of weeks ago, it was the start of a wave of spam emails sent to students and staff at the school. The breach shows the ease of access to email for all students in the class of 2022 and the class of 2023. With the immense number of students that are accessible through just one email, it is easy for a scammer to phish account information. With the lack of closure about the issue, it is unclear even if many staff are aware of the issue. Teachers learned about the email from the students, but it seems that many higher-up staff members may have been left unaware of the issue.

Although from a cybersecurity standpoint the email was daunting, many students found it to be a form of entertainment. What was originally a phishing email between one student and a dating scam bot turned into an email chain with myriad people replying. The original email was sent during Tiger community time, so many students had a fair bit of time on their hands to keep the emails going sending many different things such as funny images and videos.

One student, Bria Cardarelli, stated "It was like a show to me. I would put my phone down and come back to a ton of new emails". Though it was entertaining for many, others were left confused with a student, Alicia Garcia saying, "I was very confused- I did not know what was happening. I thought it was something serious since it was sent to my school email."

With various phishing emails sent from different students' accounts in the past couple of weeks, with the most recent one being sent on Nov. 4th, it is unclear whether precautions are being taken to ensure the safety of student information. Hopefully, there will be some sort of clarity on the steps being taken to prevent any more spread of phishing scams within the school network to protect the safety of students through their information and accounts.

Taylor Swift Eras Tour Breaks Ticketmanster, the Internet, and Millions of Fans' Hearts

When Taylor Swift announced her Eras Tour, it broke the internet, and soon enough, broke Ticketmaster. Millions of people were applying for presale trying to find any way to secure tickets, comparing this process to undergoing several bear attacks. Whether you have an IEP or 504 and whether you go to public school or private school, the Education Plan exists to assist students. The IEP and 504 outline accommodations, help students achieve their goals, and provide services to level the playing field for all students.

However, using accommodations can sometimes cause difficult situations. Sometimes teachers are not aware of one's accommodations, sometimes it's difficult to know what works best, and sometimes it's hard to speak up. I empathize, as I have had an IEP since kindergarten, and I am now a junior in high school. So, I have come up with my top ten tips for someone with an education plan, from someone with an education plan. As you read, don't forget that no matter what happens, you're awesome!

1. **Learn to self-advocate**. Do it at your own pace but take some steps now. You can start slow.


2. It's very important to reflect on what you need and be able to effectively speak on it. It's important to ask yourself what the challenge is, so it will be easy for others to understand when you access your accommodations.

3. **Be aware of accommodations**: Try to get a copy of your plan or take notes on what accommodations you get. Try to get into your meeting or ask your parents about it. Keep the notes with you at school so you know exactly what to ask for. You can hold people accountable without seeming rude. The 504/IEP is required by law.

4. It's okay to make a change. After reflecting on a challenge, I recommend being extra attentive to the success of the solution. Sometimes, there will be things to tweak, and sometimes, the original plan will need to be scrapped. It will be a much faster process if you, as a student, are aware of the situation.

5. Make sure you're getting the support you need. Reflect. If you need another accommodation, contact someone on your team (your parents or guidance counselor).

6. Follow up with teachers and make sure they have received a copy of the document. Communicate with them! Teachers are not always aware of unique accommo-



dations. It can be hard to navigate when teachers do not hear the facts and figures from the student. Being knowledgeable about your accommodations will ensure that you will always receive the accommodations to which you are entitled.

7. Your education plan is a legal document! It's mandated by law, and it's okay to not share everything with everyone. While team members should be informed, it's not up to you to answer your classmates' questions about what you need.


8. Always know what mandates your documents. (IDEA, ADA, Rehabilitation Act, or whatever it may be).

9. Don't feel guilty about asking for accommodations. You have an extra obstacle in your way. Part of being disabled is being aware of society's need to accommodate you.

10. Remember that your accommodations do not define you. The Education Plan is there to help you, but it does not define you. It is only one aspect of your education. It is a tool that helps you achieve what you want, and it lets you learn in a classroom that is appropriately challenging for you, without holding you back.

For me, it took a few years to find a happy balance between accommodation and academia. However, after this balance is reached, it will be a much smoother ride.

These tips are general guidelines. Everyone's education is unique to them, and some things that work for me may not work for everyone else. However, I do hope that I was able to give some inspiration to my fellow Education Plan users. I wish everyone luck and success this school year!



NASA Introduces New World-Saving Technology



If you are looking for a book that makes you think twice, "Lock the Doors" is the book for you.


Arizona Travel Review Explore the Beauty of Arizona



World Cup Fever Grips White Plains High School However, allegations of worker mistreatment cast a shadow over the event

For the past month, the World Cup has captivated the world and has certainly entranced the White Plains High School community. Every game day, students walk the halls listening to cheers and groans as games are broadcasted from the Ben Q boards in classrooms from Coach Galligani's Team Sports class to Ms. Simmons's room during lunch periods. Unfortunately, the way the extravagance was achieved was nowhere near humane. Instead of paying their blue-collar workers a reasonable minimum wage and providing safe working conditions, Qatar developed the entirety of their infrastructure using a modern-day slave system. make the working conditions better for the employees, however the Qatari government had no interest in enforcing the laws because the low cost of labor turns a profit.

A typical workday for these men was nothing like a day of a common blue-collar construction worker in the United States. These men were forced to work at least 12 hours a day in the blazing heat and direct sun, and many died from overwork and heat exhaustion. to answer any questions surrounding the living conditions or maltreatment of their workers. In addition, they tried to prevent any further exposure of their country's inequities by not actually granting foreign journalists the freedom to tell the truth. Journalists who have gone to Qatar and have been granted journalistic freedom have been imprisoned because they had physical evidence concerning the truth about the country. They are not only put in prison, but all their video and photographic evidence is taken from them before they leave the country, ensuring nothing else gets released.

Much like the Olympics, the World Cup brings countries from all over the world together to appreciate a common passion, allowing them to put aside grievances for the duration of the tournament. It makes people happy. Supporting the team from their home country gives people a sense of pride and national identity.

This year, the World Cup is taking place in Qatar, a small middle eastern country whose economy relies primarily on natural gas. With its fortune, Qatar built eight stadiums where the soccer matches were held. The Qatari elites wanted this World Cup to be the most extravagant World Cup ever in order to try and restore their country's reputation. The men in the labor system all came from other underdeveloped countries such as Bangladesh, Nepal, Pakistan, and many others in and around central Asia. They tried to escape the economic turmoil they faced at home, where some families make \$200 a year, for a place where they could make some sort of income to send back to their families.

Little did these men know they were entering a life where any basic human rights they had in their home country would be stripped away, and they would become stuck in a forced labor system that would only be escapable through death.

When these men arrived in Qatar, they were hired by whatever company was willing to take them and were essentially forced to start working immediately. There are certain laws that were passed to The men then returned home to labor camps, sharing a living space with hundreds of other men. Living in the camps was just as bad and possibly worse than the long shifts in the sun. The camps were cramped, dirty, and unsafe. The kitchens were filled with bugs. The beds were filled with bed bugs. The few bathrooms in the entire camp were filled with sewage from overflowing toilets, and the bathrooms had no showers. They had only buckets filled with water to use to clean off their bodies.

Although this information has been released by many news sources, the Qatari government still denies any wrongdoing. When speaking with journalists during interviews, Qatari elites refused So, even though many of us enjoyed the World Cup matches, it's disheartening to know that the ground

the players played on and the stands fans cheered from were built by innocent men who just wanted to make a life for themselves and their families but were stripped of that opportunity because of harsh monarchal rule.
