The Vikings varsity boys basketball team has started the season with a strong 6-1 record, 4-0 in LCL play. Most recently they competed in the Holiday Hoops fest at Harvest Prep High School where they defeated Chillicothe 54-47. The team kicks off 2023 with Rivalry Week hosting Licking Heights on the 4th and traveling to cross-town rival Johnstown on Jan. 7th.

Girls basketball is having a very competitive season with the varsity currently at 4-5 while the JV has improved to 4-4. Much of the improvement from last season rests with the leadership and play of captains Reese Callan, Hannah Aamodt, Darla Dorman, and Kenzie Hannahs. The team travels to Licking Heights on Jan. 3rd and will host Johnstown on Friday, Jan. 6th.

The High School team has competed in 7 meets so far. including venues such as Ohio State University and Kenyon College. They are getting ready to host the Northridge Viking Classic at Kenyon College on January 7th, where over 400 swimmers will be in attendance. The middle school team is training hard and will complete their season on January 14th in the Central Ohio Middle School Championships.

Northridge wrestling has been wrestling well so far with Michael Fister leading the team in wins. The team will compete at a huge two-day tournament in Maumee Bay coming up in January.

Viking boys bowling is currently 2nd in the LCL with a 6-1 record (8-4 overall). Logan Hupp tied the school record for high game with a 258. The JV boys are in 2nd in the LCL with a 5-2 record (6-3 overall). Varsity girls are improving their averages and putting up higher team scores than last year.

DREAMS BECOME A REALITY FOR **NORTHRIDGE STADIUM PROJECT**

What started out as a dream three years ago took a major step toward being realized this week when the Northridge School Board passed a resolution supporting financing the construction of the stadium facility using Permanent Improvement funds. The project has been a vision of the Northridge Athletic Boosters and school district since 2019 when discussions about the need for an upgrade first began.

The School Board initially passed a resolution in August of 2019 supporting a fundraising campaign led by the Booster organization. Aggressive work began on the project until the global pandemic created unforeseen challenges, pushing the launch of the fundraising campaign back to spring of 2021. To-date \$1.68 has been pledged to the project with \$1.4 million in cash collected toward the \$2 million Booster campaign goal.

"We have received great support from the Northridge community to help us get this far in the fundraising efforts, but with the incredible commitment from the district this week we are kicking it into full gear to reach our \$2 million goal," commented Curt Booher, Booster president. "The Booster officers would like to thank the School Board and district leadership for the support during this campaign to build a facility our student-athletes can be proud of."

The resolution passed this week by the School Board pledges the district will use permanent improvement funds to enter into a lease purchase option up to \$6 million to support the project which will include a track, field (lights and scoreboard), bleachers, press box, restrooms and concession stand. The action was the result of a recommendation originating from the Athletic Facility Master Plan Committee, established in July to determine the scope and direction of the project. Upon receiving the initial budget cost information from Robertson Construction which was just over \$7 million, the committee recommended the project be a priority for our student-athletes. The Finance Committee then made a recommendation that the district move forward with the project with the commitment of \$2 million from the Boosters and financing up to \$6 million from the district.

Superintendent Scott Schmidt is appreciative of the combined efforts that will ultimately provide a much needed facility that will benefit not only our student-athletes but the community as a whole. "The generosity of this community has helped this dream come alive," stated Schmidt.

As a result of this week's school board resolution, Robertson Construction will complete the design phase of the project while the Boosters work diligently to reach the fundraising goal so we can break ground this spring.
