ELECTION RESULTS

The results are in! The 2022 election results have been counted, and the results for Pennsylvania shows clear winners.

For Pennsylvania, Governor Josh Shapiro won with 3,000,989 votes, beating Douglas Mastriano by 770,633 votes.

For US Senate, John Fetterman won with 2,720,316 votes, beating Mehmet Oz by 242,511 votes.

For our 9th district Representative in Congress, Dan Meuser won with 206,346 votes, beating Amanda Waldman by 116,331 votes.

For our 20th district general assembly, Senator Lisa Baker won with 74,177 votes beating Jackie Baker by 38,587 votes. For our general assembly representative in the 111th district, Jonathan Fritz won in an uncontested race.

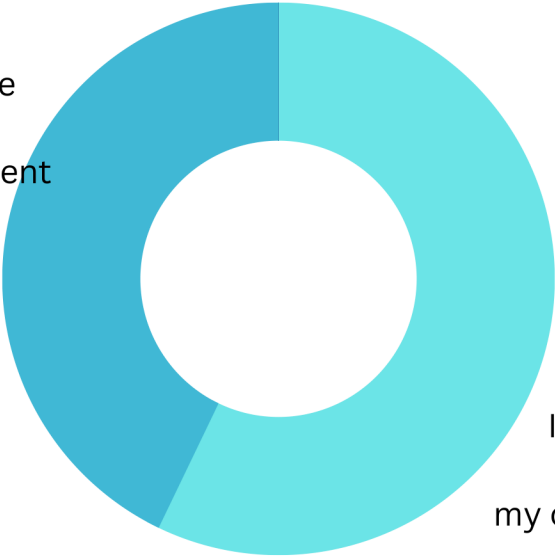

Did you vote for your candidate because they align with your beliefs or because you disagree with the opposing candidate?

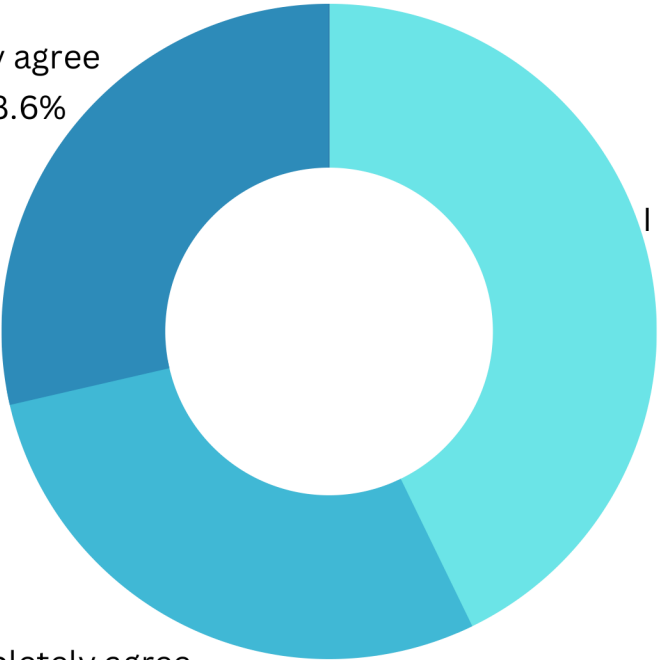
I disagree with the opponent
