## Westlake High School offers 17 AP courses in the following subjects:

Each student enrolled in an AP class will take the corresponding AP exam as a part of the requirement of that course. The AP exams are at a cost to the student that is set by the College Board Corp each year.

# Westlake High School offers 10 college credit-bearing courses in the following subjects: 

## SUNY Oneonta - Oceanography

SUNY Albany - Science Research
Mercy College - Criminal Law, Psychology, Sociology, Spanish 4, Italian 4 \& Italian 5
Westchester Community College - Accounting, Marketing

Students enrolled in these classes do NOT automatically receive credit. They must register through the individual college and pay a fee for each class. The process for each class/college is clearly outlined in a classroom presentation to the students by the respective college and/or high school teacher assigned to that class.

Students must also attain a satisfactory grade in the college credit-bearing classes in order to earn the college credit. Details about this are also discussed by the college and high school teacher.

Guidance does NOT issue the credits and/or grades for these classes. Seniors who participate in the Senior Experience (internship program) and take these courses in their senior year MUST continue attending classes in the $4^{\text {th }}$ quarter in order to receive the college credit.
