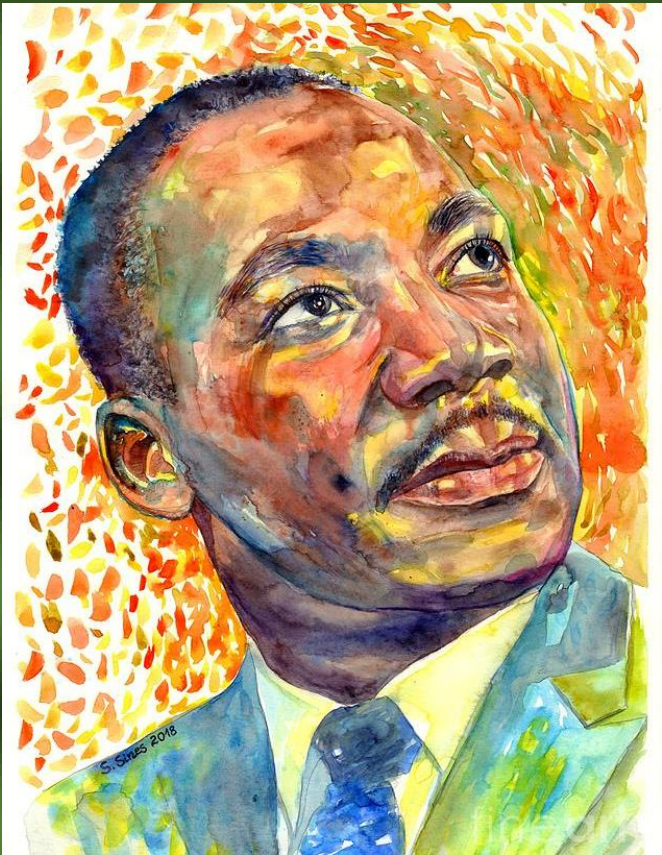

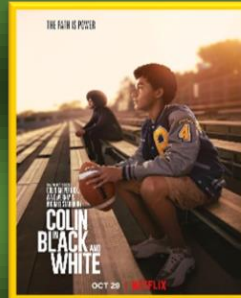
“Celebrating the Legacy of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.”

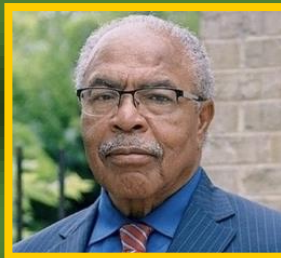

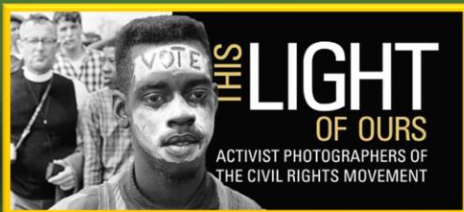


## TUESDAY, JANUARY 17
