Requirements: SYLC members must be residents of the Town of Superior in grades 8-12. SYLC members must submit an application and participate in an interview. Upon appointment, members are to serve a two year term showing commitment and consistency in the council. Responsibilities: Attend and actively participate in a monthly meeting. Participate and provide leadership in SYLC programming and events through their term. Monthly meetings will occur at Town Hall on the first Wednesday of every month from 6:30-8:00 pm.
