



Student Ethnicity







2021 Graduation Rates









Personalized Learning

Personalized Learning in Clear Creek ISD artfully combines targeted instruction, collaboration and creativity, reflection and goal setting, and flexible learning paths and pace so that each student is empowered and inspired to achieve at high levels.

CCISD has created a learning eco-system based on four key principles which allows instruction to be targeted based on what a student needs, when they need it.

Measuring the success of personalized learning in CCISD is achieved through learning

walks utilizing a standard rubric. On a scale of 1-4, the overall average for all components, at 10 pilot campuses, was 1.96.

The averages are listed below:

Collaboration & Creativity: 1.79
Reflection & Goal Setting: 1.97
Targeted Instruction: 2.07
Flexible Path and Pace: 2.00

Collectively all ten elementary campuses focused on reflection and goal setting as a target area for students. From the first learning walk to the last, evidence of student reflection and goal setting went from 40% emerging and 52% developing, advancing, and sustaining to 15% emerging and 83% developing, advancing, and sustaining.

The Key 4 to Personalized Learning are embedded in the curriculum and intentional work in this area will continue in the 2022-2023 to include additional elementary schools.


Elementary Education

Reading and Mathematics are foundational subjects for students in elementary schools. Clear Creek ISD utilizes an array of assessments, both formal and informal, to monitor student progression towards mastery of the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills.



Mathematics

The data below show grade-level growth of elementary students in math based on their use of the DreamBox program. 49% of elementary students met the recommended use standards of at least five DreamBox lessons each week. Those students who met the recommended usage grew, on average, one grade level in math proficiency. Students who did not meet the recommended usage exhibited less than one year's growth in math proficiency.

Reading

During the 2021-2022 school year, K-2 teachers administered the Benchmark Assessment System (BAS) in the fall and spring. In all three grade levels more students were reading on or above grade level by the end of the year than at the start of the year, even though the assessment in the Spring is more rigorous than the assessment in the Fall.

Secondary Education

Post-Secondary Plans, Class of 2022

Two thirds of Clear Creek ISD's Class of 2022 graduated with the intent to pursue postsecondary education, working toward at least a bachelor's degree. CCISD offers the PSAT to all ninth and tenth graders, as well as a school-day SAT at least once to each eleventh or twelfth grader. Additionally, the District offers a robust selection of both Advanced Placement (AP) and dual credit courses to prepare all learners for postsecondary education.

College Readiness Exams

SAT

The SAT is a college readiness exam offered through The CollegeBoard® that measures students' abilities in Evidenced-based Reading and Writing (EBRW) and mathematics. The highest score possible on the SAT is an 800 in EBRW and an 800 in Math for a total score of 1600. The district experienced a decrease in average SAT total, with a more substantial decline in math scores than reading and writing scores.

ACT

The ACT is another college readiness exam that measures students' performance in four subject areas: English, math, reading, and science. The highest possible score on each of the four subjects is a 36. District scores declined for the ACT at about one point lower for each subject area and the overall composite.

THE PSAT/NMSQT is designed for use by tenth and eleventh graders and includes the content and skills they have most likely have had the opportunity to learn by those grade levels. Additionally, the PSAT/NMSQT is used as a qualifying assessment for National Merit honors and recognitions when taken by students in the fall of their second to last year of high school.




College Readiness Coursework

Advanced Placement (AP)

Advanced Placement courses engage students in a rigorous curriculum across a variety of self-selected subjects and courses. At the end of the school year, students have the opportunity to take an AP exam that may result in the student earning college credit for that subject if their exam score meets preset criteria. CollegeBoard® considers a score of 3, 4, or 5 to be passing.

CCISD students experienced an increase in the percentage of exams scored at 3 or higher with most of that growth at the highest possible score of 5.





2021-2022 Superintendent Scholars

Every year, CCISD recognizes meritorious academic achievement of high school students through the Superintendent Scholars program. Superintendent Scholars have earned grades of at least 95 in all courses (85 in advanced academics/honors) each semester. Dual Credit Earned





Science Fair

Annually, more than 500 CCISD students in grades 4-12 compete in the Science and Engineering Fair. In 2021-2022, 329 elementary and 250 secondary students created unique projects to be judged. Of those, 25 students qualified to advance to the Texas Science and Engineering Fair. The competition drew more than 1,200 projects from across the state. Four CCISD students placed at or near the top of their respective categories and two advanced to the Regeneron International Science Fair.



National Technical Honor Society

A total of 390 Clear Creek ISD high school students were inducted into the 2021 National Technical Honor Society (NTHS). This is the 16th year the District has recognized top juniors and seniors for their success within the Career and Technical Education (CTE) program. Established in 1984, NTHS rewards student excellence in technical education, develops self-esteem, encourages students to reach for higher levels of achievement and promotes career-based values.

FFA

Clear Creek ISD is home to five active FFA chapters, represented by over 365 students and 16 agriculture science instructors.

Student participation opportunities include Leadership Development Events (LDE), Career Development Events (CDE), Livestock Shows, Leadership Teams, Speaking Development Events (SDE), as well as other community service events.

In the 2021-2022 academic year, CCISD was represented in LDE competitions, taking 36 different teams to compete at the Gulf Coast District competition. Of the 36 teams competing from CCISD, 6 teams advanced to the Area III contest.


2021-2022 Highlights






Energage Workplace Survey

Annually, Clear Creek ISD conducts, via a third-party, a workplace climate survey. In the 2021-2022 school year, Clear Creek ISD employees indicated a higher level of disengagement than in prior years, some of which can be attributed to the national downward trend of educators' satisfaction in the industry.

According to a national Hanover Research Study titled "2022 Trends in K-12 Education," 33% of the nation's teachers report they are very likely to leave the profession in the next two years, up from 13% before the pandemic.


