Message

Such offensive language has in the past been used in school incidents and was not and shall not be considered acceptable by anyone in our schools. We are committed to the work in this area to ensure all within the Milford School District are treated with respect.

Inclement Weather Remote Learning Plan

A schedule of learning has been implemented to support students in the event of extended closures due to inclement weather. Schools will close on the first day of inclement weather. As elements and factors change, our plan for continuous learning is a combination of synchronous and asynchronous learning. The district has worked internally to ensure that we have the appropriate technology tools in place.

National Honor Society

National Elementary Honor Society groups have started to become active across the elementary schools. Benjamin Banneker's induction was held on November 30, 2022, Lulu Ross' induction is scheduled for January 5, 2023, Mispillion's induction is scheduled for February 15, 2023, and MCA and MHS inductions are anticipated for winter or early spring.

Strategic Planning Update

The Strategic Planning Steering Committee continues to meet to work through the district's vision, mission, goals and identified priorities.

Spelling Bee

Mr. Bryce Baylis is helping to coordinate the elementary schools' elementary spelling bees this year. School winners will have the opportunity to represent regionally with the opportunity to proceed to nationals. Mispillion winners include 1^{st} place -5^{th} grader Marylei Fernandez and 2^{nd} place -4^{th} grader Armani Feliciano. Benjamin Banneker's Spelling Bee is scheduled for December 16^{th} and Lulu Ross' Spelling Bee is scheduled for January 13^{th} .

Drinking water sampling for lead in Delaware schools

Delaware is working with federal and local partners to ensure all children and school staff have safe and clean drinking water. This document provides an overview of next steps for the State of Delaware water sampling initiative to identify and respond to lead levels in school drinking water.

Overview

With the support of a grant from the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the Delaware Department of Education (DOE) with support from the Delaware Division of Public Health (DPH) began a sampling initiative in Delaware schools in October 2020 to identify the levels of lead within the drinking water system. This is the first time all school facilities had their drinking water sampled for the presence of lead, outside routine monitoring by the individual water systems serving schools.

As of early 2022, every school in Delaware had been sampled and the initial results were analyzed by the Delaware Public Health Laboratory (DPHL).

Initial sample results indicate lead may only be an issue at a limited number of fixtures in a small number of schools, but further steps are being taken to reduce risk. Delaware is contracting with a local environmental firm to collect samples that will be analyzed by an independent lab. This sampling effort will help identify the source of lead, better gauge risk, and guide next steps. DPH is working directly with schools and districts to provide short- and long- term recommendations based on initial sampling and resampling results. EPA is supporting Delaware by providing training and serving as a technical resource as we move forward.

Proposed Plan

Over the next six months, every public-school consumption point will be tested for lead.

- State-funded sampling: Delaware is moving forward with state-funded sampling using an independent contractor and analytical laboratory. To ensure proper sampling conditions, no sampling will be conducted during extended breaks.
 - Sampling will be conducted at every consumption point in all public schools in the state. Additionally, all non-consumption points that originally tested at or above 7.5 ppb will be retested.
 - Schools with elevated levels at or above 7.5 ppb will be prioritized for December 2022; all sampling is expected to be completed by end of February 2023.
 - Results, which will be returned no more than 14 days after sampling, will be provided to DOE, DPH and districts/charters as they are received.
 - Results summary will include immediate steps and recommendations based on sampling (fixture replacement, signage, further sampling, etc.).

- All consumption points that test at or above 7.5 ppb will be turned off or posted as "do not consume" pending remediation.
- o DOE and DPH will provide districts/charters with remediation support.
- Planning for long-term monitoring will begin as the SB 270 assessment tool development commences.
- Current cost estimate is \$5,500 per school, not to exceed \$1.5M, which the state is funding. Schools wishing to have non-consumption points and non-student buildings tested may do so at an extra cost paid for by the district/charter.
- Sampling will be conducted in compliance with EPA's 3Ts (Training, Testing, and Taking Action) and the Quality Assurance Project Plan (QAPP).
- Enhanced communications: Regular, consistent communications will be provided to the general public, districts and charter schools, and stakeholders. A communications plan is attached.
 - Prior to resampling:
 - DOE will provide updates to superintendents and charter leaders.
 - Sampling requirements and logistics will be communicated by DOE to district and charter school building managers.
 - Districts and charters will receive communications support from DOE to further engage school boards and communities.
 - During sampling:
 - All results will be shared as received with districts and charters; immediate steps will be facilitated if elevated samples are found through sampling.
 DOE will coordinate this messaging with DPH.
 - Districts and charters will share results and any next steps with their school boards, staffs, families, and communities.
 - Updates will be regularly posted on de.gov/schoolwater.
 - Post sampling
 - Any remediation and resampling updates will be communicated following the project communication plan so all stakeholders receive timely information.
 - Districts and charters will be engaged in **Senate Bill 270** transition discussions as the assessment tool is developed. (Process slated to begin Feb/March 2023.)
- EPA WIIN Grant: DOE and DPH are working with EPA to successfully complete Delaware's grant.
 - DOE is amending grant documents to allow use of funds for contract lab and remediation.
 - DOE's Quality Assurance Project Plan has been approved by the EPA.
 - EPA is providing subject matter expertise to DPH on lead sampling, source ID and remediation to best support districts and charters.
- Early child care facilities: The planning to determine best approach and funding for early child care center drinking water sampling for lead levels will begin in early 2023. This initiative is logistically more challenging than school sampling because early child care centers include more locations, private property matters and, currently, less remediation funding.

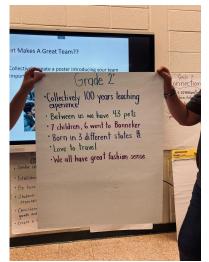


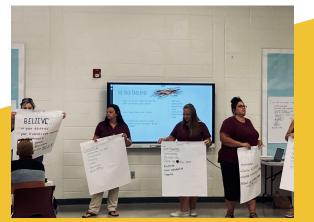

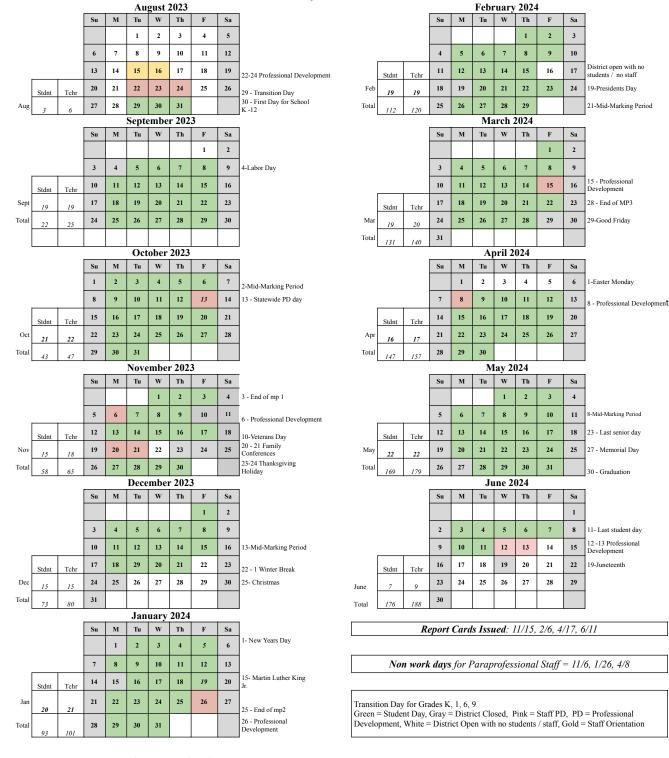

POLICY 1015

Hate Speech on School Property

The District finds that racial epithets and slurs as to national origin create a disturbance in, and interference to, the educational environment, which outweigh any legitimate educational purpose. The Milford School District denounces and prohibits the use of racial epithets and slurs as to national origin, regardless and irrespective of context, user, audience, target, intent, or lack thereof, purpose or lack thereof, bias or lack thereof, or means of communication. Any words or language that would have an offensive meaning if it was used by a member of a certain race or national origin is prohibited regardless of the race or national origin of the user. This policy shall apply to all administrators, staff, students, visitors, parents, and guardians:

- (1) in school, on District property, on school buses or other District provided transportation, and at designated locations where students to wait for buses;
- (2) during any District-sponsored or District-sanctioned program or activity;
- (3) when the transmission of racial epithets and slurs as to national origin is through electronic means from a District computer or computer network, or other electronic school equipment;
- (4) when logging offenses in e-School;
- (5) when completing reports; or
- (6) when racial epithets and slurs as to national origin occur off District property or through the transmission of information from a computer that is accessed from non-District property, if the words or language causes a substantial disruption to the educational process or the orderly operation of a school. This may include, but is not limited to, prohibited communication disseminated through social media, chat groups, and email, with a nexus to the school.

No curricular materials may be used that contain racial epithets and slurs as to national origin unless approved by both the Director of Student Learning and Supervisor of Equity and Support Services.

When context requires reference to racial epithets and slurs as to national origin, abbreviations or culturally aware substitutions shall be used.

Reporting:

An administrator, staff, student, visitor, parent, or guardian who believes they have been a victim of hate speech should report the situation to a school administrator or staff member.

Offenses:

Administrators, staff, students, visitors, parents, or guardians who violate this policy shall be subject to sanctions commensurate with the offense as determined by the Superintendent or his/her designee.

USE OF FORCE

Purpose

The Milford School District has a paramount duty to take all reasonable steps to protect the safety of students. To this end, and in light of the tragic incidents involving active shooters at schools, the District will employ safety monitors who possess the training and experience to be commissioned as constables by the Delaware Board of Examiners of Constables.

Use of Deadly Force

- Constables may use deadly force in self-defense, or defense of others, from imminent death or serious bodily injury. Constables shall not use deadly force to protect property.
- Prior to discharging a firearm, constables shall, where safely possible, identify themselves and state their intent to shoot.
- Constables shall not draw or exhibit their firearms unless there is reasonable cause to believe it may be necessary to use the weapon consistent with this policy.
- 4. Constables shall not fire into crowds.

Use of Non-Deadly Force

Where deadly force is not appropriate, constables shall use that level of force reasonably necessary to de-escalate the situation, and bring it under control.

Custodial Detention

If a person engages in criminal activity, constables may exercise custodial detention over the person and notify the Delaware State Police or the Milford Police Department. It shall be responsibility of the Delaware State Police or the Milford Police Department to undertake any necessary investigation, and to comply with the reporting requirements of State Bureau of Identification.

USE OF FORCE

The Milford School District Board of Education and its school constables recognize the value of human life, specifically, the lives of students, staff, and visitors of the school district. The use of force, especially force likely to result in serious bodily injury or death by use of a firearm, is a serious action. When deciding to use force, the school constables shall act within the boundaries of the United States and Delaware constitutions and laws. It is the policy of the Milford School District Board of Education to provide its school constables with guidelines for the use of deadly force in accordance with Delaware Code Title 11, Section 464-465.

It is the policy of the Milford School District to afford school constables the authority to use deadly force to the extent permitted by Delaware law statute. A school constable is authorized to use deadly force only when he/she reasonably believes it necessary given the circumstances known to the constable at the time in order to protect students, school employees, or visitors of the Milford School District from apparent death, serious physical injury, kidnapping, or sexual intercourse compelled by force or threat.

The Superintendent and/or their designee is empowered to implement and monitor the provisions of this policy.

Restrictions on the Use of Force:

School constables shall not resort to the use of deadly force if the monitor reasonably believes that an alternative to the use of deadly force will avert or eliminate an imminent danger of death, serious physical injury, kidnapping, or sexual intercourse compelled by force or threat.

School constables will not use deadly force on persons whose actions are only destructive to property.

School constables shall not discharge a weapon as a signal for help or a warning shot. School constables shall not pursue an individual who has left the school grounds.

Exhibiting a Firearm:

A school constable shall not unholster or exhibit a firearm except under the following circumstances:

- a. For maintenance of the firearm.
- b. To secure the firearm in an appropriate secure area.

- c. During training, practice, or qualification with the firearm.
- d. When circumstances create a reasonable belief that it may be necessary to use the firearm for the protection of any students, staff, or visitors of the Milford School District.

Definitions:

"Dangerous instrument" means any instrument, article, or substance which, under the circumstances in which it is used, attempted to be used, or threatened to be used, is readily capable of causing death or serious physical injury; or any disabling chemical spray, or any electronic control devices, including but not limited to a neuromuscular incapacitation device, designed to incapacitate a person.

"Deadly force" means force which the defendant uses with the purpose of causing, or which the defendant knows creates a substantial risk of causing death or serious physical injury, including the use of a chokehold. Purposely firing a firearm in the direction of another person, or at a vehicle in which another person is believed to be, constitutes deadly force. A threat to cause death, serious bodily harm, kidnapping, or sexual intercourse compelled by force or threat, by the production of a weapon or otherwise, so long as the defendant's purpose is limited to creating an apprehension that deadly force will be used, if necessary, does not constitute deadly force.

"Deadly weapon" includes a firearm, bomb, knife of any sort (other than an ordinary pocketknife carried in a closed position), switchblade knife, billy, blackjack, bludgeon, metal knuckles, slingshot, razor, bicycle chain or ice pick or any dangerous instrument, which is used, or attempted to be used, to cause death or serious physical injury. For the purpose of this definition, an ordinary pocketknife shall be a folding knife having a blade not more than 3 inches in length.

"Serious physical injury" means physical injury which creates a substantial risk of death, or which causes serious and prolonged disfigurement, prolonged impairment of health, or prolonged loss or impairment of the function of any bodily organ, or which causes the unlawful termination of a pregnancy without the consent of the pregnant female.
