What is SCOIR?

- Online software for college search and application process
- Counselors use this tool to suggest colleges, and send transcripts/letters of recommendation
- Students will use this tool for self-discovery, to search and compare colleges, create a resume, access forms and surveys, submit requests for transcripts and letters of recommendation, and apply to some colleges
- Parents can use this tool to suggest colleges, compare costs, and <u>monitor</u> student progress

SCOIR

- All students were given a link to login to SCOIR. Please bookmark this and <u>download the app</u>
- At this point in the process, **all** students need to be actively using SCOIR

College Selection:

• Reach:

1-2 colleges which you do not necessarily have the ideal academic criteria for admissions, but are close enough to still merit consideration. (These tend to be popular schools with competitive acceptance rates)

• Match:

 3-4 colleges for which you fall comfortably within the stated range of admissions criteria. The majority of colleges you apply to should be Match schools.

• Safety:

• 1-2 colleges for which you exceed the upper range of the admissions criteria and are therefore fairly "certain" to be admitted.

Common App

- Commonapp.org
- Universal application
- Exceptions to Common App
 - College does not have it as an option (Direct to Institution only)
 - You are applying in-state
 - You were advised by a coach or admissions rep to apply Direct to Institution

SAT & ACT ***Subject to change***

- Two major college entrance exams
- Serves as a predictor of how students will perform academically during their freshman year in college
- Spring of junior year
- Take either one, at least twice, if applicable
- Scores can be used:
 - For admission decisions
 - Some colleges are test optional or test blind!
 - To award scholarships and merit awards
 - To determine placement in college courses

SAT & ACT ***Subject to change***

- SAT- <u>collegeboard.org</u>
 - March, May, June, August, October, November and December
 - **\$60**
- ACT-<u>act.org</u>
 - February, April, June, July, September, October and December
 - \circ \$63, \$88 with essay portion
 - Most colleges don't require the essay portion

Letters of Recommendation

• Whom should I ask?

- 1 junior year core teacher (Math, Science, Social Studies, English, or World Language)
- At least 1 other teacher (Any subject, any school year)

• How do I ask them?

- Speak to teacher **<u>in-person</u>** before the end of the school year.
- Complete student surveys in SCOIR
 - Teacher Letter of Recommendation Survey
 - Counselor Recommendation Survey
 - ✤ Parent Survey is available as a link on the NDP website
- Request teacher in SCOIR
- Send thank you note!



- A chance for colleges to get to know you better outside of your grades and accomplishments
 - Get to know your personality, goals, values, and/or worldview- what makes you, you!
 - **Prompt.com is an excellent resource (see your counselor)**
- Personal Statement
 - Voice!
- Supplements
 - Specific to that college, make it personal
 - Answer all supplemental questions, even if listed as "optional"

- Early Decision (ED)
- Restrictive Early Action (REA)
- Early Action (EA)
- Regular Decision
- Rolling
- Priority Deadlines

In-State Admissions

Requirements for Guaranteed Acceptance:

- 16 core classes:
 - 4 English 2 Social Science
 - 4 Math 2 World Language (same language)
 - 3 Lab Science 1 Fine Art/CTE
- No more than 2 deficiencies (D or F in core classes) cannot be in both math and science
- Must also meet 1 of the following:
 - Graduate in the top 25% of your class
 - 3.0 GPA in competency courses
 - ACT-22/SAT-1120 (GCU: 19 ACT or 1000 SAT) *See test optional policies*

Applying to the Honors Colleges

ASU Barrett Honors College:

*Must apply to ASU first *Additional Application – Opens Sept. *One Essay

*Two Letters of Recommendation *Application Due – November

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<u>UofA Franke Honors College</u>:

*Must apply to U of A first *Additional Application *One Essay

*One Letter of Recommendation *Resume

*Application Due – November

NAU Honors College:

*Must be admitted to NAU before applying

*Additional Application - Opens Sept.

*Two Essays

*Resume

*Submit by Nov to be considered (scholarships)

GCU Honors College:

*Must be admitted to GCU

*Community service and leadership

*Automatic acceptance: 3.9 GPA or 31 ACT or 1410 SAT

*Additional application: 3.7 GPA or 27 ACT or 1295 SAT

**One Essay, Two Letters of Recommendation, Resume

Six Factors in Selective Admission

- Grades
- Strength of Curriculum
- Test Scores (ACT or SAT)**
- Recommendations
- Essay
- Extracurricular involvement

**Check school website, many schools are test optional

Institutional Need

- The magical "7th" factor in selective admissions
- "College admissions is not about the prospective student or parent of a student, it's about the college." - Jeffrey Selingo, *"Who Gets In And Why - A Year Inside College Admissions"*

Institutional Need

- College admissions is a business that we (students, parents, counselors) have no control over
- The college agenda goals set by university leaders drives admissions

College Visits

- College Rep Visits at NDP (sign up in SCOIR)
 Just for NDP students meet with reps on NDP campus
- College Campus Visits
 - If possible, visit when college is in session
 - Check college website for information about campus tours, dates, times, and registration
- Be prepared to ask a lot of questions
 - See Campus Visit Checklist in "College Planning 101"

Types of Aid

- Grants
- Loans
- Work Study
- Scholarships

Scholarships

- Merit Scholarships
 - Based on academic achievement
- Need Based Aid
 - Based on financial need
- Athletic Scholarships
 - Offered to student athletes based on athletic talents

Individual Scholarships

- Given by educational institutions or private donors
- Based on academic achievement, leadership qualities, community service work, special talents, acceptance to a specific program, or combination of all (Check <u>NDP Scholarship Database</u> on website and other websites listed in College Planning 101 book)

Need-Based Aid

- FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)
 - FAFSA forms can be completed starting Oct 1, 2023
 https://fafsa.ed.gov
- CSS (College Scholarship Service) Profile
 - An online application through College Board to determine eligibility for non-federal financial aid
 - Some colleges require for this to be completed alongside the FAFSA

Affording College

- Every family will pay something for college, and understanding what you're expected to pay is vital to a successful college plan.
- NDP has partnered with Monica Felton, college planning expert and NDP parent, to help families understand the true cost of college.

WUE

- Western Undergraduate Exchange
- Member states: Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington and Wyoming
- <u>https://wuesavingsfinder.wiche.edu/search-results.php</u>
- Reduced level of tuition 150% of the host institution's resident tuition
- Average student savings amounted to \$8,000
- Contact the institution of choice and indicate that they would like to apply as a Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) applicant. There is not a separate WUE application.
