I am pleased and excited to begin another year of exceptional teaching and learning in the Mercer Island schools. From our youngest kindergartners (and their parents) who are anxious to enter school for the first time – to our seniors looking forward to their last year, I say welcome to some of the most exciting learning opportunities that public schools have to offer.

An unprecedented outpouring of support

This past year has been challenging for our education community. In the spring we faced a \$2 million deficit due to cuts in state funding. We were forced to eliminate 11 teaching positions from our staffing model. However, our community "stepped up to the plate." During the June

Unfortunately we are facing the same deficit scenario in the spring of 2010 and are already taking steps to mitigate reductions by working closely with the MISF and our hard-working PTAs.

Levies up for renewal

Finally, our Maintenance & Operations Levy and the Transportation Vehicle Fund Levy (replacement levies) are up for renewal on February 9, 2010. Our School Board is also exploring the possibility of a new Tech Levy. Stay tuned for more information.

Thank you all for your continued support for our schools and most of all, for your commitment to the value of education both at home, in the community and at school. I hope to see you soon.

UPDATE on Math Expressions –

Mercer Island's new K-5 Math curriculum

The district's Learning Improvement Day in August, as well as an additional half-day supported by the Mercer Island Schools Foundation was dedicated to math for 87 elementary teachers, including Special Education and Learning Support Professionals. Last year a committee of parents and teachers reviewed 9 curricula before settling on *Math Expressions*, a combination of reform and traditional teaching which is now used in several other districts in the state including Bellevue,

Northshore, Edmonds and Kent. Math coaches Kirsten Pickering (K-2) and Amy McDonald (3-5) from Bellevue led the training for MISD teachers. "We heard about Kirsten and Amy while we were doing the review," said Kathy Morrison, Director of Elementary Learning Support. "The experience of teachers who are actually in their second year of using the curriculum has been absolutely invaluable." Morrison and Rich Mellish, Principal of West Mercer, along with several other district teachers are part of a Math Expressions Users Group

organized by the Puget Sound Educational Services District. They have been sharing work around curriculum alignment, pacing guides and teaching strategies. Grade level leads serving all 3 elementary schools meet once a month to get feedback from teachers and problem solve issues. In addition, each grade level has been assigned to an email "buddy" from Bellevue. "The whole process of adopting *Math Expressions*, from the work the committee did last year, to the training this summer has been wonderfully collaborative," said Morrison.

MISF PHONE-A-THON is October 26 & 27

On the evenings of October 26 and 27 Mercer Island Schools Association volunteers will be calling every household on Mercer Island requesting support to help the district prepare our students for the "highly competitive and evolving world ahead." This year's goal is \$537,000, including nearly \$200,000 for the new K-5 Math Curriculum and \$90,000 for Enrichment grants and the 2020 Vision Investment fund. The money is intended to support programs in Fine Arts, K-8 Science, School Improvement Plans, Student Support programs and Professional Development for teachers. The Foundation is suggesting a donation of \$500 per student.

Progress on PEAK

The Boys & Girls' Club has commenced construction on the PEAK facility, located adjacent to the Maintenance and Operations (MOT) building and Crest Learning Center. The timeline for completion is projected to be June of 2010 depending on weather and other factors. During the month of September, the school board deliberated on a request from the Boys and Girls Club in order for them to obtain a construction loan from U.S. Bank. The \$8.2 million "bridge loan" over 5 years is intended to cover costs until all of the club's pledges have been received. The board has outlined the key terms of the

The District is interested in preserving the original terms and conditions of the Ground Lease, particularly the agreement that the PEAK facility will continue to operate as a "local youth development center." Resolution on this First Amendment to the Ground Lease is projected to come before the board in October 2009.

MIHS receives state grant for International Entrepreneurship Study Program

Mercer Island High School has recently been awarded a \$20,000 state grant to develop an International Entrepreneurship Study Program. The grant was awarded under OSPI's "high demand" category described to "expand access to and awareness of the opportunities offered by high quality career and technical education." MIHS intends to use the funds to develop an International Entrepreneurship course to potentially be offered through the Washington Network for innovative Careers (WA-NIC). The course would be taught at MIHS, but through WA-NIC would welcome advanced business students from the region to participate in the course. The program is based on the high school's Marketing/ DECA classes taught by Carol Wiseley, in particular The Mercer Trading Company, featured in last spring's MISF Breakfast of Champions and on King5 News. This

year, 22 students enrolled in this Advanced Marketing class (up from 11 last year) and another trading country (Malaysia) has been added in addition to Ghana. State funds will be used to purchase additional technology for the program, as well as time to further develop the course frameworks and market the program to students from other districts.

According to Mark Roschy, Director of Career and Technical Education for MISD, "Mercer Island is fortunate to have ready access to many successful entrepreneurs and international diplomats right here in our community. Because we cannot easily export our community out to other interested students and classes regionally, we want to develop a program through the WA-NIC Skills Center to bring students to our community." The high school hopes to have the Skills Center course up and running by the fall of 2010.
