Dear Parents, Grandparents and Guardians,

I expressed last week that I wanted to focus on standards of punctuality, appearance, general behaviour and manners, and the response from the pupils has been great. Thank you for your support on that front – it's really helpful.

This week has been busy for a number of reasons, the primary one being that our ISI inspection took place. The inspection provided us with a chance to show off what a fantastic school we are and we were pleased that the inspectors enjoyed their time with us and, remarkably, had a week without much rain! During the week, I was delighted to find out that Millfield was declared the best sporting school in the country, for the ninth time in 10 years. Although this title is a welcomed recognition of the great work our staff and pupils do, it is also a credit to the wider Millfield community and for the contribution parents have made in the past year, ferrying children to all sorts of additional training sessions, fixtures and tournaments so thank you for that. With the recent Prep School of the Year award, this is another fantastic accolade and I'm hugely proud of the whole MPS community.

The rehearsals for Matilda have picked up pace and it is exciting to hear that the performance is starting to take shape. I heard some beautiful singing on my walk past the Assembly Hall earlier this week, so I am very much looking forward to watching the show in February. On the topic of singing, I do hope the Young Voices group enjoy their evening in Birmingham. It is always a brilliant spectacle and a great thing to be part of.

It has again been a busy week for a number of pupils who are going through scholarship assessments at the Senior School. I would like to wish good luck to all those who have applied.




SCIENCE

The pupils have learnt about the life of a water vole, including how they make their homes in the mud along the river bank, the food that they eat and who their main predators are. We have learnt that water voles are a vital part of river ecosystems and they have even featured on the current 'Winterwatch' series on the BBC.
