Where the most viable option, LEAs were required to administer the statewide summative assessment in ELA and mathematics. Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021. The assessments were required to be:

- Aligned with CA CCSS for ELA and mathematics;
- Available to students in grades 3 through 8, and grade 11; and
- Uniformly administered across a grade, grade span, school, or district to all eligible students.

Options

Note that the CAAs could only be administered in-person following health and safety requirements. 2022-23 Opportunities for Parental Involvement

Prior to enrollment, parents and students meet individually with the coordinator to review the expectations of the school and current credit status. Parents are encouraged to attend weekly academic meetings with their child and the teacher. Parents are also encouraged to visit school during instructional hours but will be asked to follow visitor guidelines by signing in at the front office. The staff and the principal maintain an open door policy. A "Remind App" is used to communicate with parents by text. A parent representative sits on the School Site Council.
