#### 2021-22 School Overview

Helen Estock Elementary is located on 12.4 acres near Old Town Tustin and was opened in 1964. Estock Elementary was named to honor an eighth-grade history teacher in Tustin Unified School District (1940-1961). In June 2016, nearby Lambert Elementary School was closed and 300 students, as well as nine teachers, became part of the Estock campus and community. Helen Estock Elementary educates approx. 400 students in kindergarten through fifth grades, 92% who are Hispanic/Latino, 54% English Learners, and 74% Economically Disadvantaged.

The Estock Elementary community is dedicated to mindfully and compassionately engaging, elevating, and supporting each learner. Our mission statement at Helen Estock Elementary School is to create a rich and rigorous learning environment that reaches all learners. We foster a safe and positive community where scholars take ownership of their learning, take risks, persevere, reflect, and collaborate. We, the parents, students, and staff commit to empowering each other on our journey to success.

Strong achievement for all students is the highest priority for Tustin Unified School District, therefore the 2021-22 focus goal, based on the results of our Comprehensive Needs Assessment, is to ensure Multi-tiered systems of support are developed and implemented to address academic, behavioral, attendance, and social-emotional needs of all students as they engage in a standards-based, rigorous academic program. Estock Elementary is committed to maintaining and developing strong/strategic Tier 1 instruction and Tier 2 systems of support for continuous improvement and achievement in all academic areas, for all students with a specific lens on at-risk subgroups, including English Language Learners, Students With Disabilities, and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged. Based on the focused goal, there are twelve actions in place to increase/improve services for Estock Elementary. These actions, in the areas of staff, technology, parent education, resources, and professional development, are focused on increasing and improving core instruction, interventions, parent involvement, and student well-being.

All TUSD students, including all English learners, have textbooks\* and instructional materials, including science laboratory equipment at the 9-12 level, that are current and in good condition in accordance with Education Code requirements. All textbooks\* and instructional materials are provided in sufficient quantities for each student for use in class and to access from home.

Parents are kept informed with bilingual school messages through SMORE and classroom newsletters and communications through ParentSquare.

Estock Elementary uses categorical funds to support families by hiring a community liaison to provide outreach to our most underrepresented subgroups. The school principal and community liaison collaborate to create and maintain a strong link between the school and home for our most at-risk students by working closely with the teaching staff and supportive adults in the lives of our students.

Our main focus is to increase participation in community services, non-profit organizations, and our own Parent Teacher Association. Currently, the Tustin Assistance League provides uniforms, Padres en Accion provides parent training in health and nutrition, Families Forward provides backpacks, as well as Christmas and Thanksgiving baskets, for our families, and the Community Action Partnership helps families receive food stamps. In addition, for this school year, we have partnered with Shoes that Fit, providing free pairs of shoes, and Second Harvest Food Bank, to provide a monthly free farmers market to our community. These outreach efforts encourage parent involvement on our campus.

#### 2020-21 Types of Services Funded

Estock Elementary School receives funding for categorical programs focused on ELL and At-risk students that are available at our school site in addition to base funding to support all students. These program funds include LCFF-EL and Schoolwide Title I Program funds. The Tustin Public Schools Foundation and site PTO/PTA also supports the school with donations and financial support throughout the year to support school-wide programs and events for students. The school's Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) identifies student needs and addresses specifically how these categorical funds will support student learning and achievement through a Multi-Tiered System of Supports. The categorical funds are used to provide tiered and targeted supports or interventions for at-risk students in the areas of academics, behavior and social emotional learning, and absenteeism, professional development, instructional materials, additional personnel to support all students in accessing academic standards, and technology resources.

Staff development is focused on targeting skill instruction and providing in-services on research based best practices in the core instructional areas related to writing, Professional Learning Communities (PLCs), supporting students at-risk for retention, supporting students who are English learners, building relationships with students and connectedness to school, and varied parent education. Personnel costs include Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) staff to support student success, and a portion of the community liaison's salary to support connections with our parent community. Supplemental materials to address needs were also purchased to support English/Language Arts, Mathematics, English Language Development, Student Wellness and School/Community Partnerships.

### **Professional Development**

Tustin Unified School District provides dedicated time for professional development for all staff. Schools often provide additional professional development time based on specific school-site scheduling and budgetary decisions. The District provides intensive workshops in August during the week before school starts to provide teachers with new knowledge and enhanced skills for the upcoming year. Staff development opportunities are also offered after school and by release time throughout the school year. New teachers are provided an extensive new teacher training program throughout the year to support their implementation of effective instruction.

Estock staff development is designed to meet the Common Core State Standards with an emphasis on personalization and the use of classroom technology to support 21st-century teaching and learning. Teachers work in Professional Learning Communities (PLC) to analyze student data and develop strategic instructional support plans for students. In addition to professional learning, teachers continue to work on incorporating 21st-century teaching strategies into their daily instruction by utilizing resources found on the TUSD Curriculum Google sites provided by the Tustin Unified School District. Teachers access valuable resources on these sites, and through collaboration with colleagues, develop rich lessons that transform their classroom learning environments to meet individual student needs. For the 21-22 school year, a professional development emphasis is placed in the area of science as teachers engage in utilizing a new curriculum and teaching platform.

Each grade level utilizes District created phase and standards guides for the pacing of units of study in English language arts and Mathematics. These guides align with District assessments and allow for continuity of instruction. At the beginning of the school year, grade level teams create a yearlong projected path for reading and writing, which outlines specific units of study and tentative dates. This projection remains flexible and fluid, in order to meet specific student needs. Data is reviewed with each common assessment to adjust/provide targeted and individualized instructional support for students and adjust curricular projections.
