Grand Valley State Tutoring

We have been given a wonderful opportunity to partner with Grand Valley State University and the Skillman Foundation of Detroit.

The goal is to then match them with 1st and 2nd grade students who may need additional reading or math support. This is an opportunity for your students to spend 1:1 time with a trained literacy tutor focusing on phonics, fluency, comprehension and vocabulary.

Chronic Absenteeism

Attendance Matters All Day Every Day!

Chronic absenteeism can cause poor grades and is defined as missing at least 10 percent (18 days) of days in a school year for any reason, including excused and unexcused absences. <u>Currently 40% of students have been identified as chronically absent per the state of Michigan.</u>

Every day counts as each days missed equals 7 hours of instructional time missed. We look forward to seeing ALL of our scholars on the first day back from the break (Jan. 2). Remember that 2 absences per month will cause a student to be Chronically Absent by the end of the school year. Please reach out to us with any questions, comments or concerns. The number that we want to do our best to avoid is 15 (by the end of the year). If your child is currently below this number of absences, he or she can finish the year strong and not become Chronically Absent! If your child has exceeded this number for the year, it is critical that he/she is in school daily, on time. Remain diligent, we are here to support! Read & Respond and C3 Homework


The expectation is for students to complete homework every night and to return every day for teacher feedback. Please make and take the time now to push students on

NPFE Annual Goals

- **NWEA-** 60% or more of our students will meet their NWEA GOALS fall to spring targets in both reading and math
- **M-Step/PSAT-** proficiency will increase in both ELA and Math by 20% for grades 3-10
- Attendance Goals- Average daily attendance will be at 95% by June 2023; Chronic absenteeism will decrease by 15% in comparison to the 2021-2022 school year
- Intervention- Student usage will average 80% or higher during scheduled intervention time
- **Coaching Cycle-** Leaders will complete a minimum of 8 complete coaching cycles per teacher during the 2022-2023 school year.
