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REMINDER FROM THE SPECIAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

If you have a PPT scheduled on a morning or afternoon affected by a delay or early dismissal, the PPT will be canceled and rescheduled for a later date. This applies to delays and early dismissals that are weather-related or otherwise. For example, if there is a 2-hour delay on a day where you have a 9:00 a.m. PPT at GMS, the PPT would be canceled because school would now start at 9:20 a.m. If this occurs, the special education office will contact you to reschedule.

FUTURE-FOCUSED TALK

On January 12, Griswold Public Schools hosted a Future-Focused Talk for faculty and staff on Zoom to discuss Artificial Intelligence (AI), ChatGTP, game design, and other future-focused subjects. The goal of the session was to consider ways to expose our students to a future that is already upon us. The group will meet again soon.

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CASE STUDY AT NATIONAL CONFERENCE

Generation Esports, the leader in Gaming Concepts education and esports competition at schools across the United States, has included Griswold Public Schools as a case study in their presentation at the 2023 Future of Education Technology Conference (FETC) in New Orleans from Jan. 23-26.

Generation Esports Vice President of Educational Innovation Kristy Custer presented, "Put the WOW factor into your scholastic esports program," which mentioned Griswold High School's innovative new programs.

In 2021, Griswold High School opened The Nexus Lab, an advancedtechnology lab, where classes and afterschool programs could take place. The Lab has become home to new courses in animation, esports, design, coding, and drafting. The school also launched an esports team in 2021. Since then, the Lab was named one of the Top 10 Gaming and Esports Labs in the country by Generation Esports in 2022, and one of the school's Valorant teams was ranked 7th in the High School Esports League's eastern US division, and 1st in the state of Connecticut in the fall.

Students in Mr. Scholl's 8th grade English/LA class are reading and studying <u>Ender's Game</u>. To develop a deeper understanding of the novel, students worked in groups to create a talk-show script based on the characters and story, and performed them in the GMS auditorium.



In 5th grade science, Mr. Knolhoff and Mrs. LaBossiere helped the students design "biomes" in the GMS Launch Pad. Our student scientists had to identify 20 organisms to place in their individual digital domes.

Overall, he found the lessons to be highly engaging. Griswold teachers are guiding our students in critical thinking, creative approaches and effective communication so that they can thrive.

ALUMNI NEWS: THE SIMS BROTHERS

Since the early days of Griswold High School, we have had standout athletes who have gone on to do amazing things to represent our town, region, and state. Cal Coffey '69 even represented the United States at the 1976 Summer Olympics in rowing and took home a silver medal! Others have played sports in college, played professional sports in the MLB (Bill Dawley '76, Roger LaFrancois '74, Jayson Drobiak '97), AFL and IFL (QB Sean Brackett '09), gone on to be successful coaches and athletic trainers, and even had days named in their honor (Gavin Coombs '04 Day is March 22, per former CT Governor Rowland after winning New England and National Championships in the 1- and 2-mile). More recently, we have seen students excel in each of our athletic programs. In 2022, 9 seniors made commitments to play sports in college. The two years prior, 11 students total. So far this year, we have six seniors who committed early to continue their athletic careers in college, and more will do so in the coming weeks. One of those early commitment students is Daniel Sims.

You may remember seeing Danny Sims on the football field, playing Defensive or Offensive Line. You can hardly miss him— Danny stands at 6' 3" and is 300lbs. He has received All-ECC and All-Bulletin teams his Junior and Senior years, and was one of the team captains in the 2022 season. Although his senior season ended early due to a knee injury, he impressed college recruiters both on and off the field to be scouted for a slot on a team next year.

Not only is Danny an all-area athlete, but he is also a motivated academic and student leader. Danny likes to "lead by example," by putting his best effort forward in everything he does. He has also participated in Outdoor Track, leading the throwing team, and tried both Basketball and Wrestling. In his four years at Griswold, he took four Advanced Placement courses, and was one of a handful of seniors to have their Capstone Senior Showcase filmed. This year, Danny enrolled in the new Esports Management course in the Nexus Lab, and determined that sports management may be something he'd like to pursue in the future. He plans to study Business Administration and Management in college. Ultimately, Danny chose to sign with Curry College in Milton, MA, to follow in the footsteps of his older brother, Michael.

Michael Sims graduated from Griswold High School in 2020. The middle of three athletic boys, he was well positioned to follow in his eldest brother's footsteps to explore NCAA athletics, while forging his own path and being a role model to Danny. Despite COVID-19 interrupting his senior year of high school, Michael was able to tour many colleges to decide where he wanted to study and play football. Forward-thinking, he determined he'd rather attend a smaller school where he could build relationships with professors, coaches and teammates, and have a bigger impact. After his third visit to Curry College, he decided it was the place for him. Less than a two hour drive from the family's home in Sprague, attending Curry would allow him to visit home and his parents to attend his games. Picking a smaller school has paid off. His first year, he was able to focus on academics, as the football season was suspended due to the pandemic. When he came back for his second academic year, Michael was named Defensive Rookie of the Year in his freshmen year on the field. This year, he made the 2nd Team All-Conference (Commonwealth Coast Conference), was named the Team Defensive Player of the Year, and is proud to be a member of a tight-knit team. His success so far at Curry doesn't come as a surprise to those who knew him at GHS. While at GHS, Michael received All-ECC Football recognitions three times (2017, 2018, and 2019), was a team captain his senior year, and was proud of his "Leather Helmet" Team Award for attending every practice and showing his work ethic by leadership. Coach Phil Anctil noted that this award shows that Michael's attitude towards football is strictly business, and that he was one of the finest players Griswold ever had. Michael also participated in Basketball (Varsity starter junior and senior years), and Coach Anctil recruited him to be on the Outdoor Track Team, where he was a thrower. Michael was consistently on the Honor Roll, and a member of the National Honor Society. Instructors in the high school's business department had a huge impact on him, and led him to study Business Administration, with minors in Marketing and Managing Information Systems, in college.

In our phone interview, Michael referenced the impact the COVID-19 pandemic had on his senior year of high school in various ways. Fortunately, his senior football season was unscathed. However, his winter and spring sports were not. He noted the 2019-2020 boys basketball team was a top-10 seed, but unfortunately, the state playoff tournament was canceled. For four years, he and his classmates had looked forward to all the senior activities that led up to graduation, but was disappointed that they were all modified or canceled while school was remote. For the oldest brother, Stephen, COVID-19 has impacted most of his college experience.

Stephen Sims graduated from GHS in 2019, and went on to study Applied Mathematics and play football (fullback) at University of New England (UNE). The football season was canceled his sophomore year, and for a while college life post-pandemic felt very uncertain. The UNE team spent a whole season in practice without games, and classes were half in person and half online. Things finally felt back to normal his senior year of school.

Funny enough, Stephen shared with me that UNE is in the same Conference as Curry College, so the brothers have played each other on multiple occasions. "The coaches acknowledge it and the whole team gets excited the week-of, because no one else has a brother playing in the conference," said Stephen during a phone call. "We play the game to win, but at the end of the day we're still family. Who would have thought when we were kids playing Griswold Youth Football that we would end up playing against each other in college?"

The Sims brothers all played Griswold Youth Football from a young age. Stephen noted he played his first ever football game and his last high school football game on the same field at Griswold High School, despite being from Sprague.

Being the oldest brother, Stephen led the way for the brothers to attend Griswold High School. However, I was surprised to learn that he didn't attend Griswold all four years. "I attended NFA my freshman year because Sprague students were not able to choose to attend Griswold yet. Once I was able to my sophomore year, I transfered. I wanted to attend Griswold High School because I would be a name, not a number, and I already had a lot of friends there from Youth Sports," he said.

Michael and Danny were happy to follow Stephen and their youth football friends to Griswold High School.
