
# Board Approves Emergency Levy - May 2 Election

At the regular meeting of the Northmont Board of Education on December 12, the Board began discussions regarding placing a levy on the May ballot that will bring the district \$5.8 million per year. The five-year forecast has the district deficit spending in part because HB 920 prevents increased revenues on property values, causing local funding for the district to be flat funded outside of new construction. The state funding formula is projected to flat fund Northmont in the next state budget. The result is revenue not increasing while expenses are on the rise. The amount of money previous levies generate is the same amount as when they were originally approved by the voters. Therefore, revenues stay the same while expenditures continue to increase.

An emergency levy, while similar to a property tax, would bring in the same dollar amount each year with an adjustment to the millage amount.

# Student Enrollment Facts


The graph to the left shows Northmont enrollment trends over the last several years beginning with the 2015-16 school year.

According to several sources, changes in public elementary and secondary enrollment have varied by state. In 24 states, decline has been noted with 5 states (Illinois, Mississippi, West Virginia, Michigan, and New Hampshire) dropping by 10 percent or more. Focusing on the first year of the pandemic, all 50 states recorded lower enrollments in the fall of 2020 than in the fall of 2019.

Districts around Northmont are also experiencing the declining trend.

Beavercreek, Brookville, Centerville, Mad River, Miamisburg, and Vandalia have all seen lower enrollment over the last few years.

While new homes are being built in the Northmont community, fewer families with children or families with fewer children are moving to the area.



# District Profile



Northmont City Schools continues the tradition and heritage of academic, athletic and fine arts excellence that began over 50 years ago. Northmont City Schools is the essential element that blends the municipalities of Clayton, Englewood, Phillipsburg, Union, and a portion of Clay Township together into a community that supports quality education. The district encompasses 44 square miles, includes one early learning center, five elementary schools, one middle school and one high school and serves around 4700 students. Both the Kleptz Early Learning Center (KELC) and the high school are new, state-of-the-art facilities. The KELC opened in 2014 and the high school moved into its new building in January of 2016. Many Northmont students attend the Miami Valley Career Technology Center to enter career paths and further their education.
