One thing that Rumer wanted the whole school to hear was: "Be nice to everyone no matter who it is!"






Martin Luther King, Jr. Day Kindergarten Performance




Second Grade By: Rose Ott, 5th Grade

Pablo is about 20 years old according to Mr. Hanson, he's had him for about 15 years.






