

#### INFORMAL MEETING

- 1. **Convene School Board Workshop:** The School Board convened in the einstein.lab at 4:02 p.m. In addition to Superintendent Spence, all School Board members were present with the exception of Ms. McLeod who Chairwoman Anderson reported was out of the country.
  - A. <u>School Board Administrative Matters and Reports</u>: Administrative matters encompassed the distribution of revisions to the agenda packet related to the Approval of Minutes and An Achievable Dream Academy Future Ad Hoc Committee Action item; circulation of the final grid for School Board member attendance at 2018 graduation commencement exercises; dispersal of a worksheet for School Board members to advise the School Board Chair of preferences for consideration in finalizing FY19 School Board Committee Assignments for the term commencing July 1, 2018; and notice of closed sessions to be held at the conclusion of the afternoon workshop if time permits, otherwise, after the formal meeting. Chairwoman Anderson explained the revision to the Achievable Dream Academy Future Ad Hoc Committee item was to clarify the formation of the committee and establish the membership to include four School Board members along with the School Board Chair serving in an ex-officio capacity, the Superintendent and Chief of Staff as well as other community members.

School Board members then reported on events they attended to include the Special Olympics' Opening Ceremony, Thoroughgood House and Education Center Grand Opening Ceremony, and lacrosse all-star team status. The May 23 Adult Learning Center graduation ceremony was also announced.

- Β. One Lunch Program: Daniel F. Keever, Senior Executive Director of High Schools, presented an overview of the One Lunch program that was field tested in high schools during the 2017-18 school year. He reviewed the timeline and process associated with the division considering ways to redesign the high school experience to meet the needs of students the current model does not provide. He reported high schools experimenting with the One Lunch schedule that provides an extended lunch period for all students during which they can take advantage of numerous resources within the building. Successes and challenges were reported along with specific school examples and reflections presented by representatives from Landstown, Kellam, and Salem high schools. Lengthy School Board discussion ensued regarding operations, safety and security, and student accountability. School Board members were encouraged to make arrangements to observe the program at schools continuing to utilize the One Lunch model through the Standards of Learning (SOL) testing window. Superintendent Spence cautioned the School Board that change brings about inquiries and asked that they filter through opposition to figure out what is right for students. He commended principals for undertaking the initiative to try to do what is right for children and enhance their high school experience by providing opportunities for remediation, enhancement and socialization. This portion of the workshop concluded at 5:30 p.m.
- C. Operation Update for Transportation: David L. Pace, Director of Transportation, presented an update on the operation of Transportation Services focusing on the technologies being used, programs being explored, and those being considered for the future. He explained the routing and planning system, automatic vehicle location system (GPS), bus driver mobile data terminals, and parent notification application currently being used. A parent notification application known as "Here Comes the Bus (HCTB)" being explored to provide actual arrival times at home and school via text messages and e-mail alerts when the bus is near or when the bus has been substituted was presented along with an overview of implementation in the first quarter of the 2018-19 school year. Also explained was the American Traffic Solutions (ATS) stop arm camera program being implemented and maintained by the Virginia Beach Police Department at no cost to the division for equipment because the camera vendor recovers costs from fines collected. Future options include a student ridership tracking and verification application that allows the district to track when and where each student boards and exits the bus. This portion of the workshop concluded at 5:44 p.m.

ATC students earned an individual first place in the Electronic Career Portfolio event, and also won a team award for Web Design and Development.
  - D. <u>Class of Brickell Scholars</u>: Twenty-three students from the Class of 2019 were recognized for being selected Brickell Scholars in the E.E. Brickell Scholarship Program sponsored by the Virginia Beach Rotary Club which honors students whose academic performance is exceptional.
  - E. <u>Brickell Scholarship Recipient</u>: Green Run High School senior, Curtis Brown, Jr., was recognized for being selected as the recipient of the 2018 Brickell Scholarship awarded annually by the Virginia Beach Rotary Club. In addition to being an active volunteer in his community and receiving numerous academic awards and several leadership distinctions, he is also a member of Green Run's NJROTC unit which won the national championship in 2017 and 2018.
- 7. Superintendent's Report: In his tradition of recognizing the newest member(s) of the Compass Keepers Club<sup>1</sup>, Superintendent Spence's report featured Salem Middle School's student activities coordinator, Randy Sparling, who is not only known for his deeds and actions at the school, but for the heroic lifesaving measures he took while heading up a class field trip to Busch Gardens when two motorcycle passengers were seriously injured in an accident that took place directly in front of the school bus.

B. <u>Interim Financial Statements – April 2018</u>: Crystal M. Pate, Director of Business Services, presented highlights of the interim financial statements as of April 30, 2018. In reporting the overall revenue trend as acceptable, she advised the March 31 Average Daily Membership (ADM) had been confirmed at slightly higher than budgeted reducing the projected shortfall in state revenue to approximately \$68,000 from \$345,000 previously reported. She advised federal revenues continue to remain acceptable with no additional Impact Act payments expected by June 30 which may result in an unfavorable trend in this area at year end. Sales tax receipts were reported on an acceptable trend at \$620,000 higher than the prior year-to-date through April, and an increase of \$238,000 is expected in May when compared to the prior year. Finally, expenditures and encumbrances were reported as acceptable at this point in the fiscal year.

# Title I, Part A – Improving the Academic Achievement of the Disadvantaged: Improving Basic Programs Operated by Local Educational Agencies (LEA)

Title I, Part A, provides supplemental educational services for eligible public and private school students to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging State academic achievement standards and State academic assessments. Title I of ESEA provides financial assistance to support instructional programs in school divisions and schools with high numbers or percentages of low-income students to ensure that all children meet challenging content and achievement standards. Title I also authorizes federal grant programs that provide funds for services to migrant children and services to neglected and delinquent children.

# <u>Title I, Part D – Improving the Academic Achievement of the Disadvantaged: Prevention and Intervention</u> <u>Programs for Children and Youth Who are Neglected, Delinquent, or At-Risk</u>

Title I, Part D, Subpart 2, provides financial assistance to locally-operated correctional facilities for educational services to neglected and delinquent children and youth in locally operated correctional facilities and to other at-risk populations to prepare them for secondary school completion, training, employment, and further education.

# <u>Title II, Part A – Preparing, Training, and Recruiting High Quality Teachers and Principals: Supporting Effective</u> <u>Instruction for Both Public and Private Schools</u>

The purpose of Title II, Part A, is to: (1) increase student academic achievement through strategies such as improving teacher and principal quality, increasing the number of highly qualified teachers in the classroom and highly qualified principals and assistant principals in schools; and (2) hold local educational agencies and schools accountable for improvements in student academic achievement.

THIS AGREEMENT, made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2018, between THE SCHOOL BOARD OF THE CITY OF VIRGINIA BEACH, a Virginia municipal corporation, hereinafter called "Owner", GRANTOR, and VIRGINIA ELECTRIC AND POWER COMPANY, doing business in Virginia as DOMINION ENERGY VIRGINA, a Virginia Corporation, hereinafter called "Company", GRANTEE.

#### WITNESSETH:

That for the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00), and other valuable considerations, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, Owner grants unto Company and its successors, the perpetual right, privilege and non-exclusive easement of right of way in widths as shown on recorded plat to lay, construct, operate and maintain one or more lines of underground conduits and cables, as Company may from time to time deem expedient or advisable, located on the right of way hereinafter described, for the purpose of transmitting and distributing electric power by one or more circuits; together with all wires, conduits, cables, transformers, transformer enclosures, concrete pads, manholes handholes, connection boxes, ground connections meters, attachments, equipment, accessories and appurtenances desirable in connection therewith (hereinafter referred to as "facilities"), over, under, across and through certain lands of Owner situated in The City of Virginia Beach, Virginia and known as Old Donation School shown as "20 & VARIABLE WIDTH PRIVATE UTILITY EASEMENT TO BE CONVEYED" and further described on the Easement Area Table as "20 & VARIABLE WIDTH PRIVATE UTILITY EASEMENT 30,617 SQ. FT. 0.703 AC.", on that plat entitled "PLAT SHOWING PRIVATE UTILITY EASEMENTS TO BE CONVEYED TO DOMINION ENERGY FROM THE SCHOOL BOARD OF THE CITY OF VIRGINIA BEACH, VIRGINIA BEACH, VIRGINIA", prepared by wpl Landscape Architecture Land Surveying Civil Engineering, Scale 1" = 100', dated 01 October 2015 and revised March 30, 2018, recorded in the Clerk's Office of the Circuit Court of the City of Virginia Beach, Virginia as Instrument No.

The facilities erected hereunder shall remain the property of Company. Company shall have the right to inspect, rebuild, remove, repair, improve, relocate on the right of way described above, and make such changes, alterations, substitutions, additions to or extensions of its facilities as Company may from time to time deem advisable.

Company shall at all times have the right to keep the easement clear of all buildings, structures and other obstructions (except fences), trees, roots and undergrowth. Company shall promptly remove from the right of way any trash or debris resulting from the exercise of the rights hereby granted. All trees and limbs cut by Company at any time shall remain the property of Owner.

For the purpose of constructing, inspecting, maintaining or operating its facilities, Company shall have the right of ingress to and egress from the easement over the lands of Owner. Company shall exercise such right in such manner as shall occasion the least practicable damage and inconvenience to Owner. Company shall repair damage to roads, fences or other improvements and shall pay for all other damage when such damage results from the construction, inspection or maintenance of Company's facilities, provided Owner gives written notice thereof to Company within sixty (60) days after such damage occurs.

Owner, its successors and assigns, may use the easement for any purpose not inconsistent with rights hereby granted, provided such use does not interfere with or endanger the construction, operation and maintenance of Company's facilities and provided that not buildings, structures, or other obstructions (except fences) may be constructed on the easement.

It is further understood and agreed between the parties that:

The rights granted herein to Company are non-exclusive and Owner shall at all times have the right to make or grant such other use of the easement area as shall not be inconsistent with the exercise by Company of the rights and privileges granted to it hereunder.

The easement hereby granted is subject to existing rights, if any, of third persons to the extent that such rights are of record so as to constitute constructive notice to Company.

If Company shall discontinue the use of the easement area all rights granted hereby shall cease and terminate, and upon demand of Owner, Company will at its cost and expense remove its facilities from the easement area and restore the land to substantially the condition in which it was at the time when the easement was granted.

Upon demand by Owner, and upon the granting to Company of an equivalent easement in a reasonably practicable location, and payment to Company of the actual cost of relocating its facilities to such new easement, exclusive of any additions and betterments, Company will relocate its facilities upon such easement, whereupon all rights hereby granted in respect of the vacated portion of the easement herein described shall cease and terminate.

NOTICE TO LANDOWNER: You are conveying rights to a public service corporation. A public service corporation may have the right to obtain some or all of these rights through exercise of eminent domain. To the extent that any of the rights being conveyed are not subject to eminent domain, you have the right to choose not to convey those rights and you could not be compelled to do so. You have the right to negotiate compensation for any rights that you are voluntarily conveying. 

#### SCHOOL BOARD BYLAWS

#### Committees, Organizations and Boards – School Board Member assignments

The School Board utilizes committees, boards, and other organizations (hereinafter "Committee") to accomplish both internal and external goals. School Board Members may be assigned to represent the School Board's interest on any such Committee. School Board Members have no individual authority when serving in these assignments and may only exercise the authority specifically authorized by the School Board. The School Board recognizes the following types of Committees: <u>a</u>4) Standing School Board Committees; <u>b</u>2) Joint School Board/City Council Committees; <u>c</u>3) Ad Hoc School Board Committees; <u>d</u>4) School Division Standing Committees with School Board Liaisons; and <u>e</u>5) Outside Committees.

#### A. General matters

1. Creation

The School Board may determine that certain School Division objectives require longer term study and analysis, and/or ongoing oversight. In such cases where When, in the opinion of the School Board, educational concerns need to be addressed which require longer term study, analysis and/or oversight and which concerns lend themselves to a committee approach, committees comprised of School Board Members either alone or in conjunction with members of the School Administration, other public bodies or public organizations, and/or the public-at-large may be created by the School Board. The School Board shall describe the objectives of any such Committee in its minutes or other writing and provide it to the Committee. The School Board, in consultation with the City Council, may create Joint School Board and City Council Committees.

2. Authority

Any such Committee shall have only such authority to bind the School Board as is expressly granted and shall have only such powers as the School Board has expressly granted or which, by implication, are reasonably necessary to accomplish the stated purpose(s).

3. Assignments

Unless otherwise specified, School Board Members will be assigned/appointed to Committees or Boards by the School Board Chair in consultation with the Vice Chair and with the approval of the School Board. School Board Members will be assigned to Committees or Boards no later than July 1st of each year. Assignments may be reviewed in January of each year or when otherwise necessary. Each School Board Member should be assigned to at least one (1) Committee. Appointment to a Committee should take into consideration, but not be limited to, the following: <u>a</u>4) equitable distribution of Committee assignments among School Board Members; <u>b</u>2) expressed interests of School Board Members; <u>3c</u>)) experience as a School Board Member; <u>d</u>4) a School Board Member's training, education and/or experience with the purpose of the Committee; <u>e</u>5) continuity of service and historical knowledge; <u>f</u>6) availability for meetings; <u>g</u>7) the need for diversity; <u>h</u>8) the needs of the School Board; and <u>i</u>9) other good and just reason for assignment. Should one or more representatives of the School Board be needed to attend a Committee meeting prior to the School Board's adoption of Committee assignments, the <u>ChairmanChair</u> is authorized to temporarily appoint School Board Members to that Committee. Assignments to a Committee are effective until June 30th of each year.

The School Board is authorized to appoint alternates to Committees, should the School Board Member assigned require another School Board Member to substitute. In the absence of an alternate or when an alternate is unavailable, the <u>ChairmanChair</u> may assign another School Board Member to represent the School Board at a Committee meeting.

4. Individual Authority

Individual School Board Members appointed to any Committee shall have no authority to bind the School Board on any matter unless such authority is expressly granted by the School Board.

5. Reports

Assigned School Board Members shall report to the School Board on Committee activities when and in the format designated by the School Board.

#### 6. Committee Chairmen

The Committee ChairmanChair will be chosen by the Members of the Committee unless otherwise specified. For the purposes of electing a Committee ChairmanChair, the most senior School Board Member attending the first meeting of the year (or the most senior assigned staff member attending the meeting if a School Board Member is not present at the first meeting) shall conduct the election of the Committee ChairmanChair. All School Board created Committees, shall be chaired by an assigned School Board Member unless the Committee ChairmanChair. When choosing a Committee ChairmanChair, the following shall be considered: a1) continuity of membership; b2) expressed interest of assigned School Board Members; c3) diversity of membership; and d4) needs of the School Board Committee.

7. Roles and Responsibilities of the Committee ChairmanChair

The Committee <u>ChairmanChair</u> shall have the responsibility for: <u>a</u>1) presiding over the meetings or designating another Committee Member to preside in the <u>ChairmanChair</u>'s absence: <u>b</u>2) setting the direction for and establishing norms and protocols that allow for appropriate function and in an efficient manner; <u>c</u>3) provide guidance and communicate expectations to other Committee Members; <u>d</u>4) ensure that relevant, timely and effective decisions are executed and that all Committee Members are provided the opportunity to participate in the decision making process; <u>e</u>5) ensure that appropriate notices are made, agendas and supporting materials are provided and that minutes of the meetings are kept if so required by law.

#### **B.** Committee Meetings

1. Location of Committee Meetings

The Committee Chairman<u>Chair</u> or the staff member assigned to the Committee will provide the School Board Clerk with notice of the location of all Committee Meetings. Committee Meetings will be held in locations accessible to the public.

1. Notices of Meetings by Committee Chair

The Committee Chair or the assigned staff member shall provide the School Board Clerk notice of the date, time, and location of Committee meetings so that the School Board Clerk can give the public notice of meetings consistent with applicable law. The Committee Chair or the assigned staff member shall make available to the public, upon request, nonexempt agenda materials furnished to Members for the meeting as required by the Virginia Freedom of Information Act and other applicable law. Committee Meetings will be held in locations accessible to the public.

2. Public Access

Committee Meetings shall be open to the public but may be closed for all or a portion of the Meeting as permitted by the Virginia Freedom of Information Act and other applicable law or regulation. The Committee ChairmanChair or assigned staff member will make arrangements for any persons needing accommodations or other services to access the Committee Meetings.

3. Notices of Meetings by Committee ChairmanChair

The Committee Chairman<u>Chair</u> or the assigned staff member shall provide the School Board Clerk notice of the date, time, and location of Committee meetings so that the School Board Clerk can give the public notice of meetings consistent with applicable law. The Committee Chairman<u>Chair</u> or the assigned staff member shall make available to the public, upon request, nonexempt agenda materials furnished to Members for the meeting as required by the Virginia Freedom of Information Act and other applicable law.

#### 4.3. Rules of Order

Committee Meetings shall be run in accordance with the Special Rules of Order found in School Board Bylaws <u>Appendix A</u> and the current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised.* 

#### C. School Board Standing Committees

The Committees listed below shall be considered Standing Committees of the School Board:

#### 1. Internal Audit Committee

The Internal Audit Committee consists of a minimum of three Members, including at least two Members of the School Board and a third Member from the business community. The Internal Audit Committee assists the full School Board in considering internal and external audit matters, including the timely reporting to the School Board of material actions or inactions of school employees that could lead to charges of malfeasance in office by School Board Members or School Division employees or agents. The Internal Audit Committee has established the Office of Internal Audit, which reports directly to the Internal Audit Committee, and through the Internal Audit Committee, to the full School Board, as more particularly set forth in <u>Policy 3-9646</u> and the Internal Audit Charter.

#### 2. Legislative Committee

The Legislative Committee <u>will</u> consists of <u>a minimum of threetwo</u> School Board Members, School Board Legal Counsel, the School Board's Legislative Consultant and those staff members appointed by the Superintendent. The Legislative Committee is responsible for the development of the School Board's proposed annual legislative package. The legislative package, priorities and positions shall be based upon input from the School Board and the Superintendent. The Legislative Committee is also responsible for developing the School Board's regional legislative position and for acting as the School Board's liaison to the Virginia General Assembly as well as other publicly elected bodies.

#### 3. Student Discipline Committees

The Chairman shall appoint three Committees of the School Board to hear student discipline cases as needed. Each Committee shall consist of three (3) voting School Board Members and one (1) nonvoting guidance counselor. Each Member of a Committee, excluding the guidance counselor, has authority to make motions and vote on that Committee. Each Committee shall meet to determine cases dealing with expulsions and long term suspensions as set forth in School Board policy or regulation. A unanimous decision of a Committee consisting of three School Board Members regarding long-term suspensions and expulsions is final. If a Committee's decision is not unanimous, or if the decision is made by

#### 4.3. Policy Review Committee

The School Board Policy Review Committee will consist of three School Board Members. The School Board, at its discretion, may appoint a citizen to serve as a voting member.\_School Board Legal Counsel and the Chief of Staff or designee will serve as liaisons to the Committee but will not be voting members.

The Chief of Staff may assign other staff members to serve on the Policy Review Committee for designated periods of time for the purpose of assisting the Policy Review Committee. The Policy Review Committee will be responsible for advising the School Board and the Superintendent concerning the need to amend, adopt, repeal, and/or merge by-laws, policies and applicable regulations.

#### 5.4. Building Utilization Committee

The Building Utilization Committee (BUC) annually reviews enrollment projections and impact on optimal building utilization. The Building Utilization Committee shall be chaired by the School Division Demographer. No more than <u>T</u>three School Board Members shall be assigned to the BUC. The Superintendent may assign appropriate staff members to assist the BUC in its review. At its discretion, the BUC may invite input from PTAs or other community groups directly impacted by any recommendation from the BUC.

#### 5. Student Discipline Committees

The ChairmanChair shall appoin Threet three Committees of the School Board shall be appointed to hear student discipline cases as needed. Each Committee shall consist of three (3) voting School Board Members and one (1) nonvoting Schoolguidance counselor. Each Member of a Committee, excluding the Schoolguidance counselor, has authority to make motions and vote on that Committee. Each Committee shall meet to determine cases dealing with expulsions and long-term suspensions as set forth in School Board policy or regulation. A unanimous decision of a Committee consisting of three School Board Members regarding long-term suspensions and expulsions is final. If a Committee's decision is not unanimous, or if the decision is made by a Committee of less than three (3) School Board Members, the decision of the Committee may be appealed to the full School Board.

#### 6. D. Joint Standing School Board and City Council Committees/Boards

The Committees listed below shall be considered Joint Standing Committees of the School Board and the City Council. The Chairman<u>Chair</u> shall seek approval from the School Board for all Member appointments to such Committees. The Chairman<u>Chair</u> shall take into consideration the experience of the School Board Members, their interest in membership, diversity of membership and continuity of membership on a Committee. The Chairman<u>Chair</u> of each Joint Standing School Board/City Council Committee shall be selected by the Committee Members unless otherwise specified.

a. <u>1. CIP/Modernization Review Committee – the School</u> <u>Board Chair will appoint and the School Board will approve two</u> <u>School Board Members and one alternate to serve on the</u> <u>Committee. The School Board Chair will appoint the Committee</u> <u>Chair.</u>

b. Deferred Compensation BoardChair

c. Oceanfront Enhancement Committee

#### D. E. School Board Ad Hoc Committees

Upon an majority vote of the School Board, <u>Aa</u> School Board Ad Hoc Committee and Ad Hoc Committee Chair shall be proposed by the School Board Chair and appointed by the School Board, as the need arises, to carry out a specified task, at the completion of which - that is, on presentation of its final report to the School Board<sub>-7</sub> such Ad Hoc Committee will automatically cease to exist. <u>An Ad Hoc</u> <u>Committee shall have those powers designated by the School Board</u>. The following Committee(s) <u>areis</u> designated School Board Ad Hoc Committee(s):

#### 1. Ad Hoc School Site Selection Committee

The School Site Selection Committee is an Ad Hoc School Board Committee that is appointed as needed to assist the School Board in considering proposals for new school sites<u>and construction or</u> renovation of existing schools at those sites. Once the School Board has accepted the final recommendations of the Ad Hoc School Site Selection Committee, the Ad Hoc School Site Selection Committee will be disbanded.

An Ad Hoc School Site Selection Committee will consist of a minimum of two School Board Members, two City Council Members, the Superintendent, the City Manager, at least one citizen member, the Director of Facilities Planning and Construction and such other Members as the Superintendent or the City Manager appoint. An Ad Hoc School Site Selection Committee Chairman<u>Chair</u> will be a School Board Member chosen by the Ad Hoc School Site Selection Committee Members. An Ad Hoc School Site Selection Committee may consider more than one school site selection if the School Board so authorizes the Ad Hoc School Site Selection Committee to do so.

2. Other Ad Hoc Committees as needed.

# E. <u>F.</u> School Division Standing Committees <u>and Citizens Advisory Committees</u> with School Board Member Liaisons

If requested by the Superintendent or as set forth by Policy, the School Board may assign School Board Members to serve as Members of School Division Standing Committees or Citizens Advisory Committees. In those instances, the appointed

School Board Members serve only as liaisons and have no authority to bind the School Board on any matter. The Superintendent shall provide a list of all <u>such</u> <u>Liaison positions</u>School Division Committees to the School Board by June 1st of each year.

 The following Committees are designated as School Division Standing Committees with School Board Members assigned as Lliaisons:

#### 1. <u>a. Equity Council</u>

The Equity Council addresses issues related to diverse populations and how the organizational climate contributes to fostering: greater student achievement; effective communication across all levels and with the greater community; honoring and listening to all voices; providing focused opportunities discussion, feedback, input and support to the implementation of Compass to 2020 and future School Board goals; reporting on all aspects of diversity and equity with a special focus on students of color; resources and support to further the work educational equity within the School Division. The Superintendent will designate a staff member to serve as the ChairmanChair of the Equity Council. No more than two (2) School Board Members will be assigned as liaisons to the Equity Council.

- 2. The following Citizens Advisory Committees will have one School Board Liaison and one School Board alternate Liaison assigned:
  - a. Special Education Advisory Committee;
  - b. General Advisory Council for Technical and Career Education;
  - c. Community Advisory Committee for Gifted Education;
    - d. Interagency Adult Basic Education Advisory Committee;
    - e. School Health Advisory Committee;
    - f. Ad Hoc Strategic Plan Committee, as needed;
      - g. Such other Citizens Advisory Committees as the School Board determines are needed.

#### F. <u>G.</u> Outside Committees

The School Board <u>Chair will appoint and the School Board will approvemay assign</u> School Board Members to represent the School Board on Outside Committees. In those instances, School Board Members have authority to bind the School Board for the limited purpose for which the Outside Committee exists. The Superintendent shall provide a list of all Outside Committees to the School Board by June 1st of each year. The School Board <u>Chair will appoint</u>, <u>subject to approval by the School</u> <u>Board</u>, <u>may appoint</u> School Board Members to such Committees by majority vote. Outside Committees include, but are not limited to:

## RESOLUTION REGARDING THE SALE OF SCHOOL BOARD PROPERTY FOR THE CITY'S PRINCESS ANNE ROAD PHASE VII PROJECT

WHEREAS, the City of Virginia Beach ("City") has identified the need to purchase certain School Board property located on the Three Oaks Elementary School site and identified as a portion of parcel GPIN 2414-13-3361 ("School Board Property"), for the City's Princess Anne Road Phase VII Project, CIP 2-195 (the "Project");

WHEREAS, the Project will provide a four-lane divided roadway within a 143-foot right-of-way with a bike path, from General Booth Boulevard to Fisher Arch, a distance of approximately 1.25 miles;

WHEREAS, the City has proposed purchasing the School Board Property in order to complete the Project, which will further include improvements at the intersections of General Booth Boulevard, Elson Green Avenue, and Upton Drive/Sandbridge Road, as well as aesthetic upgrades;

WHEREAS, the City's acquisition of the School Board property will enable the City to enhance this roadway corridor, increase property values, and provide an overall benefit to the citizens of Virginia Beach;

WHEREAS, Virginia Code §22.1-129 allows the School Board to sell real property that it determines it has no future use for and the School Board has held a public hearing on June 26, 2018 to take public comment on the proposed sale of property to the City and retention of the proceeds therefrom; and

WHEREAS, due to the de minimus impact the conveyance of the School Board property will have on the Three Oaks Elementary School site, and the expected benefits that will be derived from this Project for the citizens of Virginia Beach, the School Board is of the opinion that sale of the School Board property would be a benefit to all parties.

## NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that:

- 1. In accordance with Virginia Code §22.1-129, the School Board finds that, due to the strategic location of the parcel identified as GPIN 2414-13-3361, and the fact that the benefits of this conveyance are greater than the detriment to the remainder of the School Board property, the School Board finds that it does not have further use for such real property and determines that it may be sold.
- The School Board agrees to a) sell a 6,225 sq. ft. (0.1429 acre) portion of GPIN 2414-13-3361, located at 2201 Elson Green Avenue; b) grant a temporary construction easement of 1,276 sq. ft. (0.0293 acre) thereon; and c) grant a permanent utility easement of 1,687 sq. ft. (0.0387 acre) for the total appraised value of \$33,153.00. The permanent utility easement is intended for use by Verizon South, Inc., Dominion Energy, Cox Communications and Virginia Natural Gas.
- 3. Additionally, the School Board authorizes the Chair or her designee to execute any and all documents desired and necessary to complete the above-referenced transaction.

**THIS AGREEMENT OF SALE**, Made as of this \_\_\_\_\_\_day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2018, by the <u>SCHOOL BOARD OF THE CITY OF VIRGINIA BEACH</u>, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia, hereinafter referred to as "Landowner", and the City of Virginia Beach, a municipal corporation of the Commonwealth of Virginia, hereinafter referred to as "City".

**WITNESSETH:** That for and in consideration of one dollar (\$1.00) and other valuable consideration, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the City agrees to buy and the Landowner agrees to sell all its rights and interests in the following described land together with all improvements to the City by deed of General Warranty, properly executed, acknowledged, and delivered with usual English Covenants of title, free from all encumbrances.

The land and improvements subject to this Agreement of Sale (hereinafter referred to as the "Land") are described as follows:

All that certain lot, tract or parcel of land together with improvements thereon belonging, lying, situated and being in the City of Virginia Beach, Virginia and designated and described as: "PROPERTY TO BE ACQUIRED FOR RIGHT-OF-WAY PURPOSES AREA = 6,225 S.F. (0.1429 ACRE)" and being further designated and described as "PROPERTY TO BE ACQUIRED FOR RIGHT-OF-WAY PURPOSES 6,225 SQUARE FEET 0.1429 ACRES" as shown on that certain plat entitled: "PLAT SHOWING PROPERTY AND EASEMENTS TO BE ACQUIRED FROM THE SCHOOL BOARD OF THE CITY OF VIRGINIA BEACH BY THE CITY OF VIRGINIA BEACH BY THE CITY OF VIRGINIA BEACH FOR PRINCESS ANNE ROAD IMPROVEMENTS PARCEL 014 PROJECT CIP 2-195 VIRGINIA BEACH, VIRGINIA" prepared by VHB, having a scale of 1" = 25', dated March 2, 2016 and revised through August 15, 2016.

Together with the temporary right and easement to use the additional areas shown on the aforesaid plat for construction cut and/or fill slopes as being required for the proper execution and maintenance of work, containing 1,276 square feet/0.0293 acre. Said easement will terminate when all construction has been completed and the City accepts the work.

The total consideration is as follows: <u>THIRTY-THREE THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED</u> <u>FIFTY-THREE DOLLARS (\$33,153.00) in full for the Land, temporary construction</u> <u>easement, permanent utility easement (Virginia Electric and Power Company and Verizon</u> <u>South, Inc.), all appurtenances and improvements thereon and any and all damages.</u>

## CLAUSE NO. 1 (This Section Not Applicable)

<u>ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000.00)</u> of the above consideration will be withheld until the Land has been vacated in accordance with the terms of this Agreement of Sale. The owner will timely notify the city real estate agent for the building to be inspected and accepted. The City Attorney will be notified by the real estate agent whether to deliver the remaining part of the consideration.

## CLAUSE NO. 2 (This Section Not Applicable)

The Landowner agrees that buildings within or encroaching upon the proposed right of way shall be removed by the Landowner within \_\_\_\_\_days from date of the Agreement and that the consideration for removal in the amount of \$\_\_\_\_\_\_will be withheld by the City until said buildings have been removed. If buildings are not timely removed as required, the Landowner will forfeit both the said \$\_\_\_\_\_\_and all rights in the buildings, which may then be removed or demolished at the City's discretion.

## CLAUSE NO. 3 (This Section Not Applicable)

The Landowner will vacate and remove all personal property from the buildings within or encroaching upon the proposed right of way within <u>NINETY (90) days</u> from date of the Agreement.

## CLAUSE NO. 4

The Landowner agrees that buildings within or encroaching upon the proposed right of way may be removed by the City, or its agents.

## CLAUSE NO. 5 (This Section Not Applicable)

It is understood by the Landowner that Building(s) (description of buildings) is/are located partially on the right of way and partially on the remaining property of the Landowner. The Landowner will allow the City, its agents or contractors, to remove the entire building and grants permission for such temporary encroachments as may be necessary in the construction of the above-referenced project.

## CLAUSE NO. 6

The Landowner will grant unto <u>Virginia Electric and Power Company</u>, a <u>Virginia public</u> service corporation (doing business in Virginia as Dominion Energy Virginia) and Verizon

<u>South, Inc. (F/K/A Bell Atlantic</u> deeds of easement for their facilities totaling 1,687 square feet/0.0387 acre (overlapping easements), across Landowner's remaining lands and adjacent to the new right of way. Upon the acceptance of this Agreement of Sale by the City, the utility companies, their employees, agents, or contractors have the right to enter upon the lands of the Landowner in order to proceed with the relocation of their facilities.

## CLAUSE NO. 7 (This Section Not Applicable)

When buildings are vacated, Landowner will not remove any fixtures from the property unless authorized in writing by the City.

## CLAUSE NO. 8

The Landowner will compensate the tenant of said Land, if applicable, for any damages said tenant may suffer and sustain by reason of the conveyance agreed to hereunder and by reason of the said proposed construction, and will save the City harmless from any and all claims that may be made by said tenant by reason of such conveyance and/or construction.

## CLAUSE NO. 9

The City, or its agents, may exercise the right to enter upon the Land for such purposes as may be necessary for the construction of this project without further notice to the Landowner.

## CLAUSE NO. 10

The consideration herein above mentioned represents the value of all estates or interests in such Land, and the damages to remaining lands of the Landowner which may result by reason of the City's use of the Land. The Landowner agrees to accept the Landowner's legally proportionate share of such total consideration for the Landowner's interest and rights in the Land.

## CLAUSE NO. 11

If the Landowner is unable to convey marketable title to the City as herein provided, and the City should elect to institute condemnation proceedings to acquire title to the Land, the Landowner agrees that this agreement may be introduced in such proceedings as evidence of the value of the Land and damages, if any, to the remaining property of the Landowner. Landowner shall supply affidavits and other documents required by the City's title insurance company for the issuance of policy of insurance.

## CLAUSE NO. 12

Landowner hereby waives all rights to repurchase all or any part of the Property pursuant to Virginia Code § 25.1-108, if applicable.

## CLAUSE NO. 13

The Landowner hereby covenants and agrees for himself/herself, itself, heirs and assigns

and successors, that the consideration is in lieu of any and all claims to compensation and damages by reason of the location, construction and maintenance of the project by the City, and the City will have the right to enter upon and take possession of the Land prior to the execution and delivery of the deed.

## CLAUSE NO. 14

The Landowner acknowledges that the plans for the aforesaid project as it affect the Land have been fully explained to the Landowner.

## CLAUSE NO. 15

(A) For purposes of this clause the following definitions shall apply:

(1) "Hazardous Substances" means asbestos and any and all pollutants, dangerous substances, toxic substances, hazardous wastes, hazardous materials and hazardous substances as referenced or defined in, or pursuant to, any federal, state, local or other applicable environmental law, statute, ordinance, rule, order, regulation or standard in effect on the date hereof including, without limitation, the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (42 U.S.C 6901, et seq.), as amended, the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act (7 U.S.C. 135, et seq.), as amended, the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (42 U.S.C. 9601, et seq.), as amended, and the Toxic Substance Control Act (15 U.S.C. 2601, et seq.), as amended.

(2) "Release" means placing, releasing, depositing, spilling, leaking, pumping, emitting, emptying, discharging, injecting, escaping, leaching, disposing or dumping.

(3) "Environmental Condition" means any condition, including, without limitation, the Release of Hazardous Substances, located on or affecting the Land that could require remedial action and/or may result in claims, demands, liabilities, costs and/or expenses to the City.

(4) "Notice" means any written, civil, administrative or criminal summons, citation, directive, order, claim, litigation, investigation, proceeding, judgment, letter or other communication from the United States Environmental Protection Agency ("USEPA"), the Virginia Department Environmental Quality, or other federal, state or local agency or authority, or any other entity or any individual, concerning any intentional or unintentional act or omission which has resulted or which may result in the Release of Hazardous Substances on or into the Land or otherwise relates to an Environmental Condition.

(B) Landowner covenants, represents and warrants to City that, 1) Landowner has received no Notice, 2) to the best of his/her/its knowledge and belief, Landowner has not caused or permitted any Environmental Condition on or affecting the Land, and knows of no such Environmental Condition caused or permitted by any other person or entity, and 3) to the best of his/her/its knowledge and belief, Landowner has not caused or permitted, and to the knowledge of Landowner, no prior or current other owner, tenant, user, operator or other person or entity has caused or permitted, the Land to Release or contain, or to be used to generate, manufacture, refine, transport, treat, store, handle, dispose, transfer, produce or process, Hazardous Substances or other dangerous or toxic substances or solid wastes. The Landowner further covenants, represents and warrants that there is no action, suit, proceeding, claim, investigation, citizen suit or review pending

or threatened against or affecting the title to the Land. Should any notice of such an action, suit, proceeding, claim, investigation or citizen suit be received, it will be immediately forwarded to the Office of the City Attorney of the City of Virginia Beach, Virginia.

## CLAUSE NO. 16

The Landowner covenants, represents and warrants that, to its knowledge, there are no wetlands, hazardous wastes, or endangered species which would prevent the City's allowed use of the Land. It shall, however, be the responsibility of the City of Virginia Beach, Virginia, to determine whether or not there are any adverse conditions, including, but not limited to, environmental conditions, hazardous waste conditions, status as protected wetlands or endangered species which would prevent the City's proposed use of the Land. If any such conditions are determined to exist, the City may declare this Agreement of Sale null, void and of no further legal effect.

## CLAUSE NO. 17

Settlement will be on or about <u>90 days</u> from the date this Agreement is fully executed by all parties, or soon thereafter, allowing a reasonable time to correct any title defects reported by the title examiner and the preparation and signing of the necessary documents to enable the City of Virginia Beach to take proper title.

## CLAUSE NO. 18

There have been no other promises, considerations or representations made which are not set forth in this agreement.

## CLAUSE NO. 19

THE COVENANTS, AGREEMENTS, REPRESENTATIONS, WARRANTIES AND INDEMNITIES OF LANDOWNER CONTAINED IN THESE PARAGRAPHS WILL SURVIVE FINAL CLOSING AND DELIVERY OF THE DEED.

## CLAUSE NO. 20

In accordance with instructions by the Department of the Treasury, Internal Revenue Service, for Form 1099-S, you are required by Law to provide the City Attorney's Office, Municipal Center, Virginia Beach, VA 23456 with your correct taxpayer identification number. If you do not provide the City Attorney's Office with your correct taxpayer identification number, you may be subject to civil or criminal penalties imposed by law. Landowner will also provide the City Attorney's Office with other documents necessary for City to comply with State reporting requirements

#### PERSONNEL

#### Suspension From Work or Administrative Leave of Teachers or Classified Employees

#### A. <u>Disciplinary</u> Suspensions Without Pay

An employee may receive a suspension without pay as discipline as a result of founded misconduct or unsatisfactory work performance. A suspension without pay means that the employee shall not be allowed to work for a specified period of time, nor be paid for his or her absence from work during the period of suspension.

An employee who is classified as a "non-exempt" employee in accordance with the Fair Labor Standards Act may be suspended without pay for a number of hours or up to five (5) days to be determined by the Chief Human Resources Officer. An employee who is classified as an "exempt " employee in accordance with the Fair Labor Standards Act may only be suspended without pay for an entire workweek or in multiples of a workweek, i.e., one week, two weeks, three weeks, etc. However, if the "exempt" employee is being disciplined for violating a major safety rule, he or she may be suspended without pay for a number of hours or days.

#### B. Investigatory Suspensions Without Pay and Administrative Leave With Pay

The Superintendent or his/her designee is authorized to temporarily relieve an employee of his or her duties pending an investigation into an allegation of employee misconduct or unsatisfactory work performance. Under such circumstances, the Superintendent or designee may choose to suspend the employee without pay, in accordance with subsection C or to place the employee on administrative leave with pay, pending the completion of the investigation and any subsequent corrective action. An employee's placement on <u>unpaid investigatory</u> suspension or <u>paid</u> administrative leave pending the outcome of an investigation shall not be considered disciplinary in nature. No determination regarding the alleged misconduct or unsatisfactory performance shall be made until the administrative investigation is concluded and sufficient facts have been gathered.

#### C. Grounds and Procedure for <u>Investigatory</u> Suspension<u>s</u> <u>Without Pay</u> for Criminal Charges

A teacher or other employee, whether full-time, part-time, permanent or temporary, may be suspended <u>without pay</u> for good and just cause when the safety or welfare of the School Division or the students therein is threatened, or when the teacher or employee has been charged by summons, warrant, indictment or information with the commission of a felony or a misdemeanor involving: i) sexual assault as set forth in Virginia Code Title 18.2; ii) obscenity and related offenses as established in Virginia Code Title 18.2; iii) drugs as established in Virginia Code Title 18.2; iv) moral turpitude; or v) the physical or sexual abuse, or neglect of a child; or an equivalent offense in another state.

1. Suspension with or without pay for criminal charges

Teachers or employees suspended because of being charged by summons, warrant, information or indictment with one of the offenses in subsection C may be suspended with or without pay. If a teacher or employee is suspended without pay, an amount equal to his or her salary while on suspended status shall be placed in an interest-bearing demand escrow account. Upon being found not guilty of one of the offenses, or upon dismissal or nolle prosequi of the charge, the teacher or employee will be reimbursed all unpaid salary and accrued interest from the escrow account, less any earnings received by the teacher or employee during the period of suspension. In no event will payment exceed one year's salary.

In the event a teacher or employee is found guilty by an appropriate court of one of the offenses, and after all available appeals have been exhausted and the conviction is upheld, all funds in the escrow account shall be repaid to the School Board.

The placing of a teacher or an employee on probation by a court pursuant to the terms of Virginia Code § 18.2-251 will be deemed a finding of guilt for the purposes of salary reimbursement.

#### 2. Hearing before School Board for classified employees

Prior to placing a classified employee on <u>an investigatory</u> suspension without pay for a period of five to sixty days for a matter not listed in subsection C, the classified employee must be advised in writing of the reason for the suspension and afforded the opportunity for a hearing before the School Board. The classified employee will continue to receive his or her then applicable salary unless and until the School Board, after a hearing, determines otherwise.

#### 3. Hearing before the School Board for teachers

Prior to placing a teacher on <u>an investigatory</u> suspension without pay for any period of time for a matter not listed in subsection C, the teacher must be advised in writing of the reason for the suspension and afforded the opportunity for a hearing before the School Board. The teacher will continue to receive his or her then applicable salary unless and until the School Board, after a hearing, determines otherwise.

#### D. Insurance benefits

No teacher or employee shall have his or her <u>health</u> insurance benefits suspended or terminated because of such suspension in accordance with this policy. <u>However</u>, the employee will be responsible for making the employee portion of premium payments for health benefits coverage.

# Age of Compulsory Attendance/Exemptions

Every parent, guardian, or other person having control of a child who will have reached <u>his/hertheir</u> fifth birthday on or before September 30 of any school year and who has not passed <u>his/hertheir</u> eighteenth birthday shall, during the period of each year the public schools are in session and for the same number of days and hours per day as the public schools, send such child to a public school or to a private, denominational or parochial school or have such child taught by a tutor or teacher of qualifications prescribed by the Board of Education and approved by the Superintendent or provide home instruction for the child pursuant to Virginia Code § 22.1-254.1.

As prescribed in the regulations of the Board of Education, the compulsory education requirement may also be met by: (i) attending an alternative program of study or work/study offered by a public, private, denominational or parochial school or by a public or private degree-granting institution of higher education; (ii) in the case of any five-year-old child, by sending the child to any public educational prekindergarten program, including a Head Start program, or in a private, denominational or parochial educational prekindergarten program; (iii) for a student who is at least sixteen years of age through an individual student alternative education plan developed in accordance with the guidelines set forth by the Superintendent in Division Regulation 6-76.1; or (iv) obtaining a high school diploma, its equivalent, or a certificate of completion.

The requirements of this policy apply to children in the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice or the Department of Correction who have not passed their eighteenth birthday and children required by the Superintendent to take a special program of prevention, intervention or remediation pursuant to Virginia Code §§ 22.1-253.13:1 and 22.1-254.01.

The requirements of this section shall apply to: i) any child in the custody of the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice or the Virginia Department of Corrections who has not passed the eighteenth birthday; and ii) any child whom the Superintendent has required to take a special program of prevention, intervention, or remediation as provided in subsection C of the Code of Virginia § **22.1-253.13:1** and in § **22.1-254.01**.

-The requirements of this section shall not apply to: a) any person 16 through 18 years of age who is housed in an adult correctional facility when such person is actively pursuing the achievement of a passing score on a high school equivalency examination approved by the Virginia Board of Education but is not enrolled in an individual student alternative education plan; and b) any child who has obtained a high school diploma or its equivalency examination approved by the of completion, or has achieved a passing score on a high school equivalency examination approved by the Virginia Board of Education, or who has otherwise complied with compulsory school attendance requirements.

Within one calendar month of the opening of school, <u>the each\_Ss</u>chool <u>Bb</u>oard shall send to the parents or guardian of each <u>minor</u> student enrolled in the <u>School Dd</u>ivision a copy of the compulsory school attendance law and the enforcement procedures and policies established by the <u>Se</u>chool <u>Bb</u>oard.

The Superintendent shall be responsible for ensuring that all school-age children residing in the <u>School D</u>division, not otherwise excused pursuant to the guidelines set forth in <u>Division</u> Regulation 5-11.1, meet the compulsory education requirements contained in this-<u>P</u>policy and Virginia Code § 22.1-254.

Except as otherwise provided in this article, every parent, guardian, or other person in the</u> Commonwealth having control or charge of any child who will have reached the fifth birthday on or before September 30 of any school year and who has not passed the eighteenth birthday shall, during the period of each year the public schools are in session and for the same number of days and hours per day as the public schools, send such child to a public school or to a private, denominational or parochial school or have such child taught by a tutor or teacher of qualifications prescribed by the Board of Education and approved by the division superintendent or provide for home instruction of such child as described in § 22.1-254.1.

As prescribed in the regulations of the Board of Education, the requirements of this section may also be satisfied by sending a child to an alternative program of study or work/study offered by a public, private, denominational or parochial school or by a public or private degree-granting institution of higher education. Further, in the case of any five-year-old child who is subject to the provisions of this subsection, the requirements of this section may be alternatively satisfied by sending the child to any public educational prekindergarten program, including a Head Start program, or in a private, denominational or parochial educational prekindergarten program.

Instruction in the home of a child or children by the parent, guardian or other person having control or charge of such child or children shall not be classified or defined as a private, denominational or parochial school.

The requirements of this section shall apply to (i) any child in the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice or the Department of Corrections who has not passed his eighteenth birthday and (ii) any child whom the division superintendent has required to take a special program of prevention, intervention, or remediation as provided in subsection C of § 22.1-253.13:1 and in § 22.1-254.01. However, the requirements of this section shall not apply to any child who has obtained a high school diploma, its equivalent, or a certificate of completion or who has otherwise complied with compulsory school attendance requirements as set forth in this article.

B. A. school board shall excuse from attendance at school:

1. Any pupil who, together with his parents, by reason of bona fide religious training or belief is conscientiously opposed to attendance at school. For purposes of this subdivision, "bona fide religious training or belief" does not include essentially political, sociological or philosophical views or a merely personal moral code; and

2. On the recommendation of the juvenile and domestic relations district court of the county or city in which the pupil resides and for such period of time as the court deems appropriate, any pupil who, together with his parents, is opposed to attendance at a school by reason of concern for such pupil's health, as verified by competent medical evidence, or by reason of such pupil's reasonable apprehension for personal safety when such concern or apprehension in that pupil's specific case is determined by the court, upon consideration of the recommendation of the principal and division superintendent, to be justified.

C. A School Board may excuse from attendance at school: Legal Reference, Continued

1. On recommendation of the principal and the division superintendent and with the written consent of the parent or guardian, any pupil who the school board determines, in accordance with regulations of the Board of Education, cannot benefit from education at such school; and

2. On recommendation of the juvenile and domestic relations district court of the county or city in which the pupil resides, any pupil who, in the judgment of such court, cannot benefit from education at such school.

D. Local school boards may allow the requirements of subsection A of this section to be met under the following conditions:

For a student who is at least sixteen years of age, there shall be a meeting of the student, the student's parents, and the principal or his designee of the school in which the student is enrolled in which an individual student alternative education plan shall be developed in conformity with guidelines prescribed by the Board, which plan must include:

a. Career guidance counseling;

b. Mandatory enrollment and attendance in a general educational development preparatory program or other alternative education program approved by the local school board with attendance requirements that provide for reporting of student attendance by the chief administrator of such GED preparatory program or approved alternative education program to such principal or his designee;

c. Counseling on the economic impact of failing to complete high school; and

d. Procedures for reenrollment to comply with the requirements of subsection A of this section.

A student for whom an individual student alternative education plan has been granted pursuant to this subsection and who fails to comply with the conditions of such plan shall be deemed to be in violation of subsection A of this section.

Students enrolled with an individual student alternative education plan shall be counted in the average daily membership of the school division.

E. A school board may, in accordance with the procedures set forth in § 22.1-277 and upon a finding that a school-age child has (i) committed an offense in violation of school board policies, (ii) been charged with an offense relating to the Commonwealth's laws, or with a violation of school board policies, on weapons, alcohol or drugs, or intentional injury to another person, or (iii) been expelled from school attendance pursuant to § 22.1-277.01, require the child to attend an alternative education program as provided in § 22.1-209.1:2 or § 22.1-277.1.

F. Whenever a court orders any pupil into an alternative education program offered in the public schools, the local school board of the school division in which the program is offered shall determine the appropriate alternative education placement of the pupil, regardless of whether the pupil attends the public schools it supervises or resides within its school division.

The juvenile and domestic relations district court of the county or city in which a pupil resides or in which charges are pending against a pupil, or any court in which charges are pending against a pupil, or any court in which charges are pending against a pupil, may require the pupil who has been charged with (i) a crime which resulted in or could have resulted in injury to others, (ii) a violation of Article 1 (§ 18.2-77 et seq.) of Chapter 5 of Title 18.2, or (iii) any offense related to possession or distribution of any Schedule I, II, or III controlled

substances to attend an alternative education program, including, but not limited to, night school, adult education, or any other education program designed to offer instruction to students for whom the regular program of instruction may be inappropriate.

This subsection shall not be construed to limit the authority of school boards to expel, suspend, or exclude students, as provided in §§ 22.1-277, 22.1-277.01, and 22.1-277.2. As used in this subsection, the term "charged" means that a petition or warrant has been filed or is pending against a pupil.

G. Within one calendar month of the opening of school, each school board shall send to the parents or guardian of each student enrolled in the division a copy of the compulsory school attendance law and the enforcement procedures and policies established by the school board.

H. The provisions of this article shall not apply to:

1. Children suffering from contagious or infectious diseases while suffering from such diseases;

2. Children whose immunizations against communicable diseases have not been completed as provided in § 22.1-271.2;

3. Children under ten years of age who live more than two miles from a public school unless public transportation is provided within one mile of the place where such children live;

4. Children between the ages of ten and seventeen, inclusive, who live more than 2.5 miles from a public school unless public transportation is provided within 1.5 miles of the place where such children live; and

5. Children excused pursuant to subsections B and C of this section.

Further, any child who will not have reached his sixth birthday on or before September 30 of each school year whose parent or guardian notifies the appropriate school board that he does not wish the child to attend school until the following year because the child, in the opinion of the parent or guardian, is not mentally, physically or emotionally prepared to attend school, may delay the child's attendance for one year.

The distances specified in subdivisions 3 and 4 of this subsection shall be measured or determined from the child's residence to the entrance to the school grounds or to the school bus stop nearest the entrance to the residence of such children by the nearest practical routes which are usable for walking or riding. Disease shall be established by the certificate of a reputable practicing physician in accordance with regulations adopted by the Board of Education.

# Legal Withdrawal

# A. Kindergarten

A parent or <u>legal</u> guardian may withdraw, from kindergarten, any child who will not have reached his/her sixth birthday on or before September 30 of that school year provided that the parent or <u>legal</u> guardian notifies the <u>Superintendents or designee</u> chool board that he/she does not wish the child to attend school until the following year because the child, in the opinion of the parent or <u>legal</u> guardian, is not mentally, physically or emotionally prepared to attend school.

# B. Other

1. The Superintendent shall approve the withdrawal of:

a. Any <u>studentpupil</u> who, together with his/<u>her</u> parents/<u>legal guardian</u>, by reason of bona fide religious training or belief is conscientiously opposed to attendance at school. For purposes of this subdivision, "bona fide religious training or belief" does not include essentially political, sociological or philosophical views or a merely personal moral code; and

b. On the recommendation of the juvenile and domestic relations district court of the county or city in which the pupil resides and for such period of time as the court deems appropriate, any <u>studentpupil</u> who, together with his/her parents/legal guardian, is opposed to attendance at a school by reason of concern for such <u>pupil's student's</u> health, as verified by competent medical evidence, or by reason of such <u>studentpupil</u>'s reasonable apprehension for personal safety when such concern or apprehension in that <u>pupil's student's</u> specific case is determined by the court, upon consideration of the recommendation of the principal and division superintendent, to be justified.

c. The School Board shall develop policies for excusing students who are absent by reason of observance of a religious holiday. Such policies shall onsure that a student shall not be deprived of any award or of eligibility or opportunity to compete for any award, or of the right to take an alternate test or examination, for any which the student missed by reason of such absence, if the absence is verified in a manner acceptable to the Superintendent.

2. The School Board may approve the withdrawal of a student:

a. On recommendation of the principal and the division superintendent and with the written consent of the parent or <u>legal</u> guardian, any <u>studentpupil</u> who the <u>Sechool</u> <u>Bb</u>oard determines, in accordance with regulations of the <u>Virginia</u> Board of Education, cannot benefit from education at such school; and

b. On recommendation of the juvenile and domestic relations district court of the county or city in which the <u>studentpupil</u> resides, any <u>studentpupil</u> who, in the judgment of such court, cannot benefit from education at such school.

Except as otherwise provided in this article, every parent, guardian, or other person in the Commonwealth having control or charge of any child who will have reached the fifth birthday on or before September 30 of any school year and who has not passed the eighteenth birthday shall, during the period of each year the public schools are in session and for the same number of days and hours per day as the public schools, send such child to a public school or to a private, denominational or parochial school or have such child taught by a tutor or teacher of qualifications prescribed by the Board of Education and approved by the division superintendent or provide for home instruction of such child as described in § 22.1-254.1.

As prescribed in the regulations of the Board of Education, the requirements of this section may also be satisfied by sending a child to an alternative program of study or work/study offered by a public, private, denominational or parochial school or by a public or private degree-granting institution of higher education. Further, in the case of any five-year-old child who is subject to the provisions of this subsection, the requirements of this section may be alternatively satisfied by sending the child to any public educational prekindergarten program, including a Head Start program, or in a private, denominational or parochial educational prekindergarten program.

Instruction in the home of a child or children by the parent, guardian or other person having control or charge of such child or children shall not be classified or defined as a private, denominational or parochial school.

The requirements of this section shall apply to (i) any child in the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice or the Department of Corrections who has not passed his eighteenth birthday and (ii) any child whom the division superintendent has required to take a special program of prevention, intervention, or remediation as provided in subsection C of § 22.1-253.13:1 and in § 22.1-254.01. However, the requirements of this section shall not apply to any child who has obtained a high school diploma, its equivalent, or a certificate of completion or who has otherwise complied with compulsory school attendance requirements as set forth in this article.

B. A. school board shall excuse from attendance at school:

1. Any pupil who, together with his parents, by reason of bona fide religious training or belief is conscientiously opposed to attendance at school. For purposes of this subdivision, "bona

fide religious training or belief" does not include essentially political, sociological or philosophical views or a merely personal moral code; and

2. On the recommendation of the juvenile and domestic relations district court of the county or city in which the pupil resides and for such period of time as the court deems appropriate, any pupil who, together with his parents, is opposed to attendance at a school by reason of concern for such pupil's health, as verified by competent medical evidence, or by reason of such pupil's reasonable apprehension for personal safety when such concern or apprehension in that pupil's specific case is determined by the court, upon consideration of the recommendation of the principal and division superintendent, to be justified.

C. A School Board may excuse from attendance at school:

1. On recommendation of the principal and the division superintendent and with the written consent of the parent or guardian, any pupil who the school board determines, in accordance with regulations of the Board of Education, cannot benefit from education at such school; and

2. On recommendation of the juvenile and domestic relations district court of the county or city in which the pupil resides, any pupil who, in the judgment of such court, cannot benefit from education at such school.

D. Local school boards may allow the requirements of subsection A of this section to be met under the following conditions:

For a student who is at least sixteen years of age, there shall be a meeting of the student, the student's parents, and the principal or his designee of the school in which the student is enrolled in which an individual student alternative education plan shall be developed in conformity with guidelines prescribed by the Board, which plan must include:

a. Career guidance counseling;

b. Mandatory enrollment and attendance in a general educational development preparatory program or other alternative education program approved by the local school board with attendance requirements that provide for reporting of student attendance by the chief administrator of such GED preparatory program or approved alternative education program to such principal or his designee;

c. Counseling on the economic impact of failing to complete high school; and

d. Procedures for reenrollment to comply with the requirements of subsection A of this section.

A student for whom an individual student alternative education plan has been granted pursuant to this subsection and who fails to comply with the conditions of such plan shall be deemed to be in violation of subsection A of this section.

Students enrolled with an individual student alternative education plan shall be counted in the average daily membership of the school division.

E. A school board may, in accordance with the procedures set forth in § 22.1-277 and upon a finding that a school-age child has (i) committed an offense in violation of school board policies, (ii) been charged with an offense relating to the Commonwealth's laws, or with a violation of school board policies, on weapons, alcohol or drugs, or intentional injury to another person, or (iii) been expelled from school attendance pursuant to § 22.1-277.01, require the child to attend an alternative education program as provided in § 22.1-209.1:2 or § 22.1-277.1.

F. Whenever a court orders any pupil into an alternative education program offered in the public schools, the local school board of the school division in which the program is offered shall determine the appropriate alternative education placement of the pupil, regardless of whether the pupil attends the public schools it supervises or resides within its school division.

The juvenile and domestic relations district court of the county or city in which a pupil resides or in which charges are pending against a pupil, or any court in which charges are pending against a pupil, may require the pupil who has been charged with (i) a crime which resulted in or could have resulted in injury to others, (ii) a violation of Article 1 (§ 18.2-77 et seq.) of Chapter 5 of Title 18.2, or (iii) any offense related to possession or distribution of any Schedule I, II, or III controlled substances to attend an alternative education program, including, but not limited to, night school, adult education, or any other education program designed to offer instruction to students for whom the regular program of instruction may be inappropriate.

This subsection shall not be construed to limit the authority of school boards to expel, suspend, or exclude students, as provided in §§ 22.1-277, 22.1-277.01, and 22.1-277.2. As used in this subsection, the term "charged" means that a petition or warrant has been filed or is pending against a pupil.

G. Within one calendar month of the opening of school, each school board shall send to the parents or guardian of each student enrolled in the division a copy of the compulsory school attendance law and the enforcement procedures and policies established by the school board.

H. The provisions of this article shall not apply to:

1. Children suffering from contagious or infectious diseases while suffering from such diseases;

2. Children whose immunizations against communicable diseases have not been completed as provided in § 22.1-271.2;

3. Children under ten years of age who live more than two miles from a public school unless public transportation is provided within one mile of the place where such children live;

4. Children between the ages of ten and seventeen, inclusive, who live more than 2.5 miles from a public school unless public transportation is provided within 1.5 miles of the place where such children live; and

5. Children excused pursuant to subsections B and C of this section.

Further, any child who will not have reached his sixth birthday on or before September 30 of each school year whose parent or guardian notifies the appropriate school board that he

does not wish the child to attend school until the following year because the child, in the opinion of the parent or guardian, is not mentally, physically or emotionally prepared to attend school, may delay the child's attendance for one year.

The distances specified in subdivisions 3 and 4 of this subsection shall be measured or determined from the child's residence to the entrance to the school grounds or to the school bus stop nearest the entrance to the residence of such children by the nearest practical routes which are usable for walking or riding. Disease shall be established by the certificate of a reputable practicing physician in accordance with regulations adopted by the Board of Education.
