

Andover Organization Focus creates alignment in curriculum, teaching



This year, Andover Public Schools has focused on aligning our curriculum and teaching practices with student success in mind. Our goal is to prepare students for success and through organizational focus, we are creating an aligned system to ensure we reach our goals. In order to accomplish this task, we have organized and aligned our school district focus. The Andover Organizational Focus breaks down our different areas of focus to specifically target student success. Divided into three parts, we are asking ourselves the questions "Why are we doing this?", "How are we going to do this?" and "How are we doing?" in order to measure our teaching practices compared to student performance. Through these three questions, we are centering ourselves on the areas below to achieve best practices to gain the maximum levels of student success:

Kansas College and Career Ready Standards - Why are we doing this?

Today's students are preparing to enter a world in which colleges and businesses are seeking highly-skilled, critical thinkers. To ensure all students are ready for success, the new standards establish clear, consistent guidelines for what every student should know and be able to do. The standards are rigorous and will help our students be competitive in a global marketplace.

Aligned Curriculum and Instructional Resources - How are we going to do this?

Our school district is committed to ensuring students are on the pathway to success in their academic careers. Educators across the district collaborate to align their curriculum and what is taught to students by selecting the materials, resources, textbooks and technology tools students will use to learn.

Andover Instructional Framework - How are we going to do this?

One of our district goals is the implementation of the Andover Instructional Framework. Educators are responsible for preparing students for success and we feel it is important to transform how we teach and facilitate learning in the classroom. Students who are highly engaged, experience cognitive rigor and who are invested in learning through relevant classroom experiences will receive an excellent education in our district. The Andover Instructional Framework is designed to create these learning opportunities for students.



Teachers come together on Professional Learning Days to learn about the Andover Instructional Framework, helpful tools and best practices for implementing the Framework into their classrooms.

Andover Data Dashboard - How are we doing?

As a successful school district, we engage in a system of continuous improvement. We monitor our progress by setting goals, analyzing data and making decisions based on the results. The Andover Data Dashboard shows us results as a visual "dashboard," much like a vehicle. We monitor our academic progress through the STAR assessment given in the Fall, Winter and Spring to all students in Kindergarten through 10th grade. We also look at data from classroom instruction in areas of student engagement and cognitive rigor. The data dashboard also monitors the effective educator is the most important factor in student achievement. We believe professional learning increases educator effectiveness and results for all students.

Flying Classroom pilot visits Martin Elementary

In September, Martin 3rd, 4th, & 5th grade students had a once in a lifetime opportunity to meet Captain Barrington Irving. His stop in Wichita was the first leg of his travels that will take him across North America, Asia, Indonesia and Australia on his three-year Flying Classroom journey.

Captain Irving became the youngest person and only African American ever to fly solo around the world. He is a National Geographic Emerging Explorer and Guinness World Record Holder. Captain Irving talked about having goals and overcoming



obstacles in order to reach those goals. Students will participate in Captain Irving's Flying Classroom program, following his expeditions over the remainder of the year. Students using the Flying Classroom curriculum, including Martin Elementary, will study subjects relevant to each expedition as they track Irving's team. In addition to Science, Technology, Engineering and Math topics, they will also learn about geography, history and the humanities.

District facilities requests have gone electronic

In an effort to maintain efficiency at our district facilities, Support Services has rolled out a new online program to reserve facilities for outside users called FS Direct. This program is part of a suite that we currently use for transportation, technology and maintenance requests. This online option for the district came with the ability to give schools more efficient planning for outside organizations reserving the facilities, allowing schools to adequately clean and set up the space requested. This update also allows the district to better track its facilities, heating, air, and lighting usages throughout the year. Another benefit of this change for public requests is the ability to give quicker responses for those requests as well as the added bonus of electronic billing.

Some important things you need to know as a public user:

- To be able to use the online program, an email address is required. Once you set up your account, your email address will serve as your username as well as give the district the ability to communicate with you quickly.
- All requests must be entered into the system at least 5 days prior to the date being requested. The 5 day period will start after you have submitted an online Facility Request.
- In the event that school is canceled for ANY REASON, all practices, events and activities are canceled. The Requester will be responsible for notifying their participants.
- Step-by-step instructions for completing your initial setup and future reservations can be found on our website <u>www.</u> <u>usd385.org</u>.

ACHS Science Teacher Wins Horizon Award

Patrick Huddleston, chemistry teacher at Andover Central High School, was named a 2015 Kansas Horizon Award winner. This award recognizes exemplary first-year educators. Thirty-two firstyear educators from around the state received this distinction and will be honored at a special ceremony during the Kansas Exemplary Educators Network (KEEN) State Education Conference on Feb. 20, 2015 in Topeka.

The Kansas Horizon Award program, which is sponsored by the Kansas State Department of Education, allows all school districts in the state an opportunity to nominate one elementary and one secondary teacher for the award. To be eligible for the award, teachers must successfully complete their first year of teaching and perform in such a way as to distinguish themselves as outstanding. The program is a regional competition with four regions corresponding to the state's U.S. Congressional districts. Four elementary and four secondary classroom teachers may be selected



In addition to the team winning the championship, Do-Hee Lee won the State Singles title and Grace Ball was the runner up. This is the 2nd year in a row that the team has won the state title. They competed against 23 teams in the state competition and ended the season with a 27-0 record.



New program allows students to take PRIDE in their work

Andover Central Middle School has taken the opportunity to create a unique program to give students the ability to learn and collaborate on character education, community connections, team building and 21st century skills called PRIDE Time. PRIDE Time brings sixth, seventh and eighth grade students together each Friday for a session with a new teacher each week. The time together builds connections amongst students, allows teachers to meet new students or reconnect with past students and brings a fun close to an action packed week.

Andover Central middle school principal Tim Hayden decided to start this program last year after feedback from their Climate Advocacy Team. "For two years this team has wanted to find a time to interact and teach character education, build cross grade level relationships amongst students and find a way to reward students for doing the right things," says Hayden.

Students must be in good academic and behavioral standing to participate in PRIDE Time. Classes are shortened by seven minutes on Fridays to allow 45 minutes for PRIDE at the end of the day with students still having normal allotted time for passing periods and lunch. Students who are in need of some extra help are referred to the PASS (Prescribed Academic Student Support) Program in which six to eight adults are there to give the support they need.

There is an array of activities that students will discover during PRIDE Time. Some of those activities include creating birthday and get well cards for The Fountains Assisted Living & Retirement Facility, Human Knot and Cup Challenge, the creation of inspirational placemats for the cafeteria, the Dangers of Rumors and Misinformation, assisting custodial staff with Friday shutdown, iPad Animation, Healthy Snack Creation, Good Day cards for patients at St Joseph's Hospital, Using Google to solve every day problems, career exploration through the BLS.gov website and much more.

Two of the many classes that students enjoy are both humanitarian projects. Seventh-grade teacher Kacy Bookout has facilitated the packaging of one box of Numana meals for the Andover Food Bank each session. "The students are impressed that they can package 216 meals during their short time! It is important for them to be involved in activities that require teamwork and provide much needed service to others," says Bookout. Mrs. Bookout's students have packaged over 865 meals so far this year and have learned valuable lessons from doing a service for others.

Eighth-grade teacher Lori Gunzelman spends her PRIDE time helping students make origami cranes for Cranes for Cancer. Cranes for Cancer's mission is to provide baskets or vases of 1,000 cranes to cancer patients. "We discuss the legend and old Japanese tradition of how cranes are symbols of good luck and the story of a Japanese girl who was diagnosed with leukemia and tried to make 1,000 paper cranes before her death. We then make origami paper cranes to donate to Cranes for Cancer," says Gunzelman. Mrs. Gunzelman hopes to reach her 1,000 total soon so those good luck crane "wishes" can be shared.

With all the educational benefits students receive from PRIDE Time, they truly are excited about these opportunities and look forward to each Friday. Hayden says "They like ending their Friday with something new and are never sure what to expect with each week bringing a different activity. They are connected to a new group of people and are constantly commenting to teachers on how much they enjoy their PRIDE Time. This program not only enhances our students, but the school community as a whole."

Skype Around the World

Andover Public Schools has gone global! For the past 18 months, many of our teachers have embraced the latest video conferencing tools such as Skype and Google Hangouts to speak with students in far off places like Australia, Kenya, Costa Rica, Turkey, Ireland, and even in remote areas such as the Arctic Circle. Additionally, teachers are providing opportunities for students to connect with content area experts, professionals working in industry, National Park Rangers, National Geographic Explorers, NASA Educators and even professional authors at absolutely no cost. These experiences are building student excitement and passion for the curriculum while directly linking the real world connections to classroom learning. Students are sharing perspectives, conducting research, listening to experts, and



exploring the earth like no previous generation has had the opportunity to do before. As a result, Andover students are becoming more curious, inspiring new passions, asking more challenging questions and showing a love for learning that is contagious beyond the walls of our schools.

Teachers all across the district are discovering the power of video conferencing and are actively designing and seeking out more opportunities for their classrooms. Because of this passion, Skype has identified five of our Andover teachers as Skype Master Teachers: Todd Flory of Wheatland Elementary, Andrea Friend and Stacey Ryan of Andover Middle School and Micah Brown and Dyane Smokorowski, Technology Integration Coaches for the district. These five educators are now showcasing the Andover global learning success story with teachers across the globe.

Some fantastic global travel highlights from Andover Public Schools include: Skype around the world day (seven continents in one day); virtual field trips with animal experts at the Colorado Snake Conservatory and Minnesota Zoo; historic research investigations with National Historic Civil War Battlefields; Biome research with classrooms around the globe; art literacy training with the Nelson-Atkins; and many more!

Pre-Kindergarten @ Andover Public Schools

Did you know we offer Pre-Kindergarten opportunities for students in our district? In order to qualify for these programs, your child must be 4 years old by Aug. 31 and reside in the Andover School District.

Fee-Based Pre-K

For preschool aged children who are not eligible for the State Pre-Kindergarten program or Early Childhood Special Education, we offer a fee-based program at a rate of \$250 per month with 16 spots available.

State Pre-K

This program is Kansas grant funded and has 45 spots available and children must meet at least ONE of the following qualifications:

- Single Parent Family
- Limited English speaking
- Teen Parent Family · Low Income
- · Parent with no high school diploma/GED
- Delayed in development

Each month, the BOE recognizes students and staff for awards and achievements they have received.



Mark Cross was named the 2014 5A Tennis Coach of the year. He is the head tennis coach for Andover High School and teaches Woods & Metals. For the past two years, all six members of Mark's tennis team have qualified for state.



Deanna Deutscher of Sunflower Elementary and Shay Whetstone of Andover Middle School were nominated for the 2015 Kansas Teacher of the Year. Both nominees were honored at a reception held by the Kansas Department of Education in early September. At this reception, Shay was also recognized as a semi-finalist for Kansas Teacher of the Year.



Andover High School baseball coach Christ Weidert was named the 2014 AVCTL Div. II Baseball Coach of the Year. Chris is the head baseball coach at Andover High School and teaches biology and anatomy. Chris' Trojan baseball team made it to state for the first time since 1989. Chris played baseball professionally before beginning his career as a teacher.



DeeAnn Freeman, music teacher at Cottonwood Elementary was named the South Central Kansas Music Educators Association District Outstanding Elementary Music Educator. She has taught music at Cottonwood for 10 years.



Kenon Brinkley of Andover High School placed 10th in Original Oratory at the National Forensics Tournament held in Overland Park in June. He is the only person from Kansas to make the semi-finals (Top 14) in any event. With this placement, Kenon is automatically qualified for the National Forensics Tournament in 2015.



Andover Middle School teacher Jessica Dibble was nominated for the 2015 Horizon Award which honors exemplary first-year teachers. Dibble was also named the 2014 5A girls' Tennis Coach of the Year. She is the head coach of the Andover High 2-time State Champion Girls Tennis team.



Cheryl Hochhalter from Andover Central High School was named the 2014 Kansas Association of Secondary School Principals (KASSP) Area 4 High School Principal Honoree. This year, Andover Central was also named a Bronze Award winner in the US News and World Report Best High Schools report. Cheryl has been the principal for 4 years at Andover Central High.



Director of Communication Nicole Gibbs was named Kansas School Public Relations Association's (KanSPRA) 2014 Newcomer of the Year. The KanSPRA Newcomer of the Year Award is given to a member who advocates for public education; is committed to a creative, dedicated and professional approach to school communications; and is actively involved in KanSPRA.

Board of Education Meeting Recap

July 14, 2014

• Scott Wilson was re-elected as President and Melinda Fritze was elected Vice President. Jamie Bohannon was reappointed as Clerk and Nicole Gibbs was appointed Assistant Clerk of the Board. Sherame Kneisel was reappointed as Treasurer.

August 11, 2014

 Business Manager Sherame Kneisel presented a proposed budget for the 2014-15 school year. The BOE voted to increase the LOB (Local Option Budget) from 31% to 33% for the 2014-15 school year to help offset reductions in state funding the district was facing. Even



with this increase, the total mils for the district went down 2.076 from the previous year with a total mil levy of 63.917. This decrease will save an owner of a \$100,000 home approximately \$24 on their property taxes. District bonds & interest will be paid in full by end of year 2019.

September 8, 2014

Asst. Superintendent Jill Lachenmayr reported on both Advanced Placement (AP) assessments and ACT scores for the district during the 2013-14 school year. The district had 317 students take the ACT and all performed above the state average in all areas. Our district's overall composite score is 23.3, which is above the state average of 22.0. There were 193 students that took AP assessments during the 2013-14 school year and our overall proficiency rate as a district was 76%, which is higher than the state (62.2%) and global (61.3%).

October 13, 2014

- Superintendent Greg Rasmussen gave an update on this year's enrollment and how it compared to years previous. Andover has had its highest enrollment ever in our history with an increase of 134 students putting enrollment over 5,100 students. The majority of growth came out of the middle and high schools.
- Assistant Superintendent Jill Lachenmayr and eCademy Principal Mark Templin presented on summer programs that
 were offered to students over the summer. At eCademy, there was a 6-week Elementary Program that allowed students
 to use computers at home and also receive small group instruction two days a week at the building. For middle and
 high school students, the eCademy offered an 8-week program that allowed students to take credit recovery and
 advancement classes. At Sunflower Elementary, the summer reading program encouraged children to read 540 minutes
 over the summer, equaling 60 minutes a week. The Andover Public Library also partners with school media specialists
 to promote reading over the summer.

November 10, 2014

 Administration proposed moving the land which will be the Portofino Apartment Complex from the North (Wheatland Elementary) to the South side feeder schools (Meadowlark Elementary). The area is 15.16 acres on the North side of Central, West side of 127th Street E. When construction is complete, the development will be a 278 unit apartment complex with units ranging from 789 to 1200 square feet and prices range from \$799- \$1,200 per month. We are projecting 15-20 students will be added to the district as a result of this development. The proposal was approved.

December 8, 2014

- Assistant Superintendent Jill Lachenmayr shared updated High School and Middle School Enrollment guides. A main focus for this update was to expand the Career and Technical Education (CTE) classes and create understanding of the pathways. The overview pages of the CTE clusters and pathways included an outline of specific courses in the pathway as well as real world examples of careers to help students and parents make informed decisions on choosing their class focus. There was also more information included on off-campus opportunities with Butler Community College on Health Services and Informational Technology Academies.
- The district is piloting Chromebooks and have placed a cart of 30 in 18 classrooms across the district. There is one cart
 in each elementary and middle school and five carts in each high school. Some of the great things about Chromebooks
 are they cost less than \$300, are quick to log on and off, are very easy to manage and maintain, their small size makes
 them very mobile and they easily integrate into Google Apps for Education, which we already use. Chromebooks are a
 viable option as a student device and will be a part of the computer refresh process throughout the district.
