1. Introduction

As required by the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), the Consolidated Plan is a planning document that must be prepared by cities every five years and contain a needs assessment and strategic plan to pursue the HUD goals of developing viable communities, providing decent housing and suitable living environments, and to expand economic opportunities principally for low-and moderate-income persons. The Consolidated Plan requires cities to assess their affordable housing and community development needs in consideration of market conditions and propose strategies to meet those needs.

The Consolidated Plan is intended to help cities make data-driven, place-based investment decisions for use of HUD grant funds. In order to receive grant funds from HUD -- under the Community Development Block Grant and HOME Program -- the City is required to prepare an Annual Action Plan that is aligned with the housing and community development priorities set forth in the Five-Year Consolidated Plan.

In its Five-Year 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan the City established the following goals:

1. Provide affordable and appropriate rental housing opportunities by increasing the supply and availability of affordable rental housing in the city and affordable market housing in strategic locations.
2. Support affordable homeownership opportunities through the rehabilitation of existing ownership housing, provision of down payment assistance and improving the availability of supportive social services to homeowners.
3. Increase the level and delivery of support and mental health services to the homeless and those at-risk of becoming homeless.
4. Improve existing, and encourage development of, public facilities serving lower income populations.
5. Encourage the continued improvement of the City's infrastructure, particularly with regard to street and sidewalk improvements and removal of architectural barriers activities.

6. Continue to support public service programs that address community needs.
7. Continue to support job training and employment programs that support community and business needs.
8. Support new and expanded businesses to create job opportunities.

Many of these goals will be addressed by activities funded by the 2020 CDBG and HOME program and by other anticipated resources. It is important to note that declining financial resources inevitably impact outcomes.

3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

Year Two of the City's Five-Year Plan was completed on June 30, 2021 and results are being evaluated. The Public Service programs are on track to achieve anticipated program and spending outcomes. Public Facilities and HOME Program projects have been severely delayed due to COVID-related supply chain impacts and price surges. The City was not able to meet its CDBG Timeliness Test in May 2021 but overcame challenges to meet the 2022 Test.

DPD will monitor the progress of all programs as well as projects and recommend changes in approach in order to meet benchmarks. Any changes will follow HUD requirements and notifications required by the approved Citizen Participation Plan.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Summary from citizen participation section of plan.

The lead entity responsible for administering the programs covered by the Consolidated Plan for the City of New Britain is the Department of Planning & Development (DPD). In January 2022, Mayor Stewart issued informational materials prepared by the DPD and requested proposals for funding consideration for the 2022 Program Year. This information was directly sent to all City departments and non-profit agencies operating in New Britain. The Commission on Community and Neighborhood Development (CCND) and the staff of the Department of Planning & Development prepared the Proposed Consolidated Plan with input from government agencies, the New Britain Housing Authority, non-profit organizations, businesses, elected officials, neighborhood groups and housing agencies. A public hearing was held on Thursday, February 24, 2022 in Council Chambers. Attendees were given the opportunity to speak for or against applications. The CCND voted on recommendations to the Council at its meeting of April 7, 2022.

5. Summary of public comments

The City of New Britain's citizen participation process followed the approved Citizen Participation Plan and included outreach hearings available to the public. These organizations have specific expertise in the areas of housing, non-housing, community development, homelessness and the near homeless. 1. Introduction

The City of New Britain realizes the importance of collaboration and coordination between public and private housing as well as health and social service agencies. During the planning process, the City Department of Planning & Development (DPD) directly engaged housing and social service agencies and organizations that work with special needs and at-risk populations.

The DPD has also collaborated with the State Department of Economic and Community Development and Department of Housing on several projects. These projects support housing initiatives centered around Transit Oriented Development, residential and commercial development near TOD sites increase connectivity to job opportunities for all income levels, with a heightened focus on those with barriers to transportation; traditionally low-to-moderate income residents. These projects will enhance the State's CTfastrak busway usage as well as the City's economic recovery and growth by making additional properties available for private investment.

The City has adopted a Citizen Participation Plan for its Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan that identifies when public hearings and other consultations are to take place. This Plan was used in preparing this 2022 Annual Action Plan. The City of New Britain's Consolidated Plan and Action Plan were also prepared to comply with the consultation requirements of ESG, including consultation with the local Continuum of Care agencies.

Consultation on the development of this year's plan began in January 2022 and was accomplished through a variety of strategies, including public notices, public and community meetings, and direct correspondence. Efforts were made to contact appropriate parties and obtain their input for the content of the plan. These consultations, coupled with citizen participation opportunities, provided the direction for the plan development.

Coordination will continue to be strengthened through regular interaction and meetings. Local networks address several priorities outlined in the CDBG plan. The DPD staff and key municipal leaders participate on boards and commissions that represent these agencies. Connectivity to the subject matter provides for access to data and organizational trends. The City participates in a Coordinated Access Network (CAN) plan to increase preventative measures around homelessness, mental health and human service needs. The CAN is a wing of the Balance of State Continuum of Care. This provides for a streamlined process that reduces incidents of people "slipping through the cracks." A higher level of attention ensures greater outcome.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

The City participates with the Balance of State Continuum of Care and the regional Coordinated Access Network (CAN) and continues to involve members of these groups in the Mayor’s Building Hope Together work plan to end homelessness which also involves other key service providers, funders and the business community. CAN provides people facing housing crises a single access point to community resources. All Continuums of Care (CoC) must establish a comprehensive and standardized coordinated access system for shelter, prevention, rapid rehousing, transitional housing, and permanent supportive housing.

The City continues to receive support from the Connecticut Coalition to End Homelessness and the State Department of Housing. Recently, the City has centralized its homelessness prevention, addiction services, youth prevention, and emergency shelter support programs under the umbrella of New Britain Recovers. New Britain Recovers is operated in close coordination of the CAN and allows for a comprehensive approach to mitigating homelessness and addressing risk factors in the City’s youth.

The City is supporting various projects to develop additional transitional and permanent supportive housing developments, including Gilead Community Service’s GVS Farrell Treatment Center, Prudence Crandall, and the Friendship Service Center.

The Balance of State Continuum of Care works in close coordination with the Coordinated Access Network for Central Connecticut (CAN). The City of New Britain, as part of its annual allocation process, invites representatives of the CAN to public hearings of the Application Review and Planning Committee, the Commission on Community and Neighborhood Development, and the Common Council. In reviewing ESG applications, Commissioners are instructed to utilize CAN and CoC policy as well as procedural and guidance documents in determining the best use of funds. A formal consultation took place between the City, CAN, and CoC on January 17, 2022. During the consultation, representatives expressed a need for additional homeless prevention case management services and support to emergency shelters.

1. Summary of citizen participation process/Efforts made to broaden citizen participation Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting

The lead entity responsible for administering the programs covered by the Consolidated Plan for the City of New Britain is the Department of Planning & Development (DPD). In January of 2022, Mayor Stewart issued informational materials prepared by the DPD and requested proposals for funding consideration for the 2022 Program Year. This information was sent to City departments and non-profit agencies. The Commission on Community and Neighborhood Development (CCND) and the staff of the Department of Planning & Development prepared the Action Plan based on submitted proposals and resident needs described by organizations at the CCND Public Hearing in February. The Common Council held a Public Hearing on April 19, 2021, and approved the Plan on May 11, 2021.

During the planning process, DPDDPD and Mayor’s staff directly engaged housing and social service agencies, neighborhood groups, City departments, and organizations that work with special needs as well as at-risk populations. DPD

In keeping with the aforementioned participation plan from pages 2 and 3, the City of New Britain CCND held in-person public hearings on the following dates:

- February 24th at 7:00 p.m., Council Chambers, City Hall
- April 19th at 7:00 p.m., Room 504, City Hall

A notice was posted in the New Britain Herald (regional newspaper) to request citizens’ comments during a 30-day comment period.

The City of New Britain provided two opportunities for the public to comment at Council meetings prior to the Council’s final vote on the recommended allocation.

- April 13th, 2021 7:00 Council Chambers, City Hall
- May 11, 2021 7:00 Council Chambers, City Hall followed by a vote of the Council.

Public notices of the hearings, deliberations and the vote were published in advance in the New Britain Herald (regional newspaper), the New Britain City Clerk's Office. To date, no public comments were received from public hearings or the notices. A notice regarding the final Council decision will be posted online at www.newbritainct.gov. An email informing applicants as to the results will be sent. Information will be sent to the New Britain Herald through a notice.

From application creation, to monitoring, to close-out of programs, the DPD office continues to engage community-members at all levels of the HUD process. Public service groups remain heavily engaged in discussions. The development of the FY 2022 application and the focus on outcomes was a result of these conversations.

Introduction

The City of New Britain is a CDBG, HOME, and ESG entitlement jurisdiction received \$1,742,648 in CDBG funds, \$612,934 in HOME funds, and \$146,468 for FY 2022. New Britain does not receive funding under the Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) program.

Any program income that might be received from the repayment of any future (CDBG) grants/loans will automatically be re-programmed for grant activities in those same or similar programs from which the funds were originally provided to the extent possible. If additional program income funds are received that are not automatically reprogrammed, specific projects will be identified during the Action Plan process.

In addition, the city intends to apply for Section 108 funding to capitalize programming that benefits the LMI community.

Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically

Public Services activities funded by the Community Development Block Grant Program in New Britain are operated out of centrally located facilities available for all income-eligible residents. The CDBG and HOME funds allocated for housing activities are qualified on a resident-income basis; the activities are available on a citywide basis.

There are approximately 28,000 occupied housing units in New Britain. Fifty-nine percent of all housing units are occupied by resident making less than \$50,000 per year, almost \$40,000 less than the Area Median Income. Sixty percent of housing units are rental occupied with seventy-three percent of those occupying rental properties making less than \$50,000 per year. Issues relating to decent affordable housing, creating suitable living environment and promoting economic opportunity are city-wide.

Discussion

New Britain will continue to focus on projects that work to reduce the housing cost burden of low-to-moderate income individuals. This will be done through a combination of residential rehab, down payment assistance, new construction of affordable units, homeless prevention efforts and through public service agencies aiming to improve wages through workforce development.

AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h)

Introduction

The New Britain Housing Authority (NBHA) owns/manages more than 800 units of public housing. NBHA also administers approximately 800 Section 8 Vouchers that are combination of tenant based, elderly/disabled, or are family unification vouchers. The mission of the NBHA is to develop and operate each development solely for the purpose of providing decent, safe and sanitary housing for eligible individuals and families in a manner that promotes the serviceability, economy, efficiency and stability of the developments, and the economic and social well-being of the residents.

To effectuate the above, the Authority strives to balance the needs of residents versus the economic realities facing all public housing authorities. The goal is to retain the existing affordable housing stock.

The Authority focuses on reducing the cost burden for extremely low income and very low income renter households. Through the efforts of the property managers and resident services coordinators, the Authority tries to be more than just a landlord by meeting the overall requirements of its residents.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

To provide a safe and secure environment in the public housing developments, both in the senior housing and family housing. The NBHA is continuing to invest in security cameras and other essential security infrastructure for NBHA properties. Tenant security and safety remains a critical element of project design and planning. *2. To offer education and job opportunities to public housing tenants and voucher holders.* The training facility adjacent to Mt. Pleasant offers comprehensive education and training programs for residents lacking adequate job placement skills. The NBHA works with local agencies, schools, colleges and technical schools to improve job potential of the residents and is seeking commitment from one or more educational/training organizations to locate in the new training facility. *3. To promote self-sufficiency and asset development for residents.* The NBHA will continue to use HUD Family Self Sufficiency funding to employ Service Coordinators. These individuals assist public housing residents in obtaining jobs and education; improve their personal finances; and plan for homeownership. Programming increases access to computers so residents can be trained on the use of computers for job hunting or furthering their education. *4. To address the continued need for quality housing.* The NBHA will seek funding for the redevelopment of housing units will continue to take administrative measures that improve coordination between foremen, property manager, housing asset manager, director of operations, and modernization clerk. This will guide progress of the sites in reaching their goals.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

Housing Authorities that engage residents show greater improvements over periods of time. To

accomplish this, NBHA has been actively pursuing HUD resources that will allow the administration to focus on the economic advancement of its residents. The NBHA secured Family Self-Sufficiency funds for both the Section 8 renters and public housing residents. The FSS program provides individual case management, helps participants further their education and find jobs, provides support services such as child care and transportation, and offers monetary incentives that promote financial independence. The Housing Authority coordinates, promotes and provides other programs to enhance the economic and social self-sufficiency of residents. These include after school homework program, scholarships and elderly services; and in September the Adult Ed will continue classes at Oval Grove.

The New Britain Housing Authority enforces a Community Service Policy that requires residents to perform eight hours of community service a month. Through community service, the Authority hopes that its residents will be able to improve not only their lives, but also improve the surrounding community in the process. Resident Councils are organized at each of the New Britain housing projects, including now at Mt. Pleasant. A Resident Advisory Board, comprised of tenants from each housing site, is actively involved with developing and approving the Housing Authority's Annual and Five-Year Plan required by HUD. According to the Housing Authority, representation from Public Housing residents will be assured during the planning for revitalization activities.

The City continues to operate a homeownership program which is available to public housing renters. FSS Service Coordinators are able to help residents improve their credit rating to better qualify for homebuyer opportunities. In order to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in homeownership opportunities, it is necessary to increase individuals earning potential. In order to purchase a home, residents must improve credit, decrease debt and save. This can only be accomplished through increasing income. This requires greater employability. To promote employment opportunities for very-low to moderate income residents, when appropriate, all subrecipients will be required to sign the Section 3 Certification which states the purpose of Section 3 and that work performed under this contract is subject to the requirements of Section 3.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i)

Introduction

CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds are used by the City of New Britain to support services and facilities for the homeless.

There is a vast array of services offered through the Coordinated Access Network (CAN) partnership. Assistance may be in the form of transitional housing, family homeless shelters, supportive housing for single adults, security deposit, rental assistance, utility assistance and food assistance for populations at risk of homelessness, landlord-tenant mediation, mobile and stationary medical care for homeless individuals and individuals with HIV, case management services, mental health services, life skills counseling and transportation for residents of supportive housing.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City participates with multiple non-profits and volunteers to find unsheltered homeless individuals as part of the Point in Time Count (PIC). In the 2021 PIT Count, 83 people were experiencing homelessness (Sheltered and Unsheltered). Many individuals housed that night were in emergency and transitional shelters that were filled to capacity, 24 were children.

Annual Homeless-Connect events provide employment workshops, housing information, healthcare, counseling, foot care, haircuts, and referrals to other support services.

The Friendship Service Center is a grantee in the PATH Program – Projects for Assistance to Transition from Homelessness. Staff are trained to provide outreach and engagement that addresses homeless people where they are—geographically, philosophically, and emotionally – in order to reduce barriers to care and link people with appropriate housing and services.

The City is a part of a Coordinated Access Network (CAN) that covers the region including Berlin, Bristol, Plainville, Southington, and New Britain. The CAN developed a plan to coordinate services and resources on a regional basis. According to the CAN Plan, any individuals or families with housing needs call the State's 211 help line. When deemed appropriate based on the initially assessed need of the caller, 211 will make a referral to a CAN agency, which will make an appointment for an in depth assessment and/or case management services. The City continues to work on merging the CAN with Building Hope Together, which was established as part of New Britain's 10-Year Plan to end homelessness. This will enhance the collaboration among the five municipalities in our CAN network and reduce administrative costs.

The City's objective is to advocate for funding that will continue the PATH Program and expand programs for homeless individuals, families, persons with special needs, and the unsheltered homeless

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City is receiving Emergency Solutions Grant funds from HUD for the first time since FY 2014. The City has allocated ESG funding to the New Britain Recovers program which oversees homeless prevention and street outreach efforts in the City of New Britain. Through collaboration with the CAN, New Britain Recovers will utilize a portion of their ESG funding to improve the emergency shelter at the Friendship Service Center on Arch Street. The remaining portion of New Britain Recovers' ESG funds will be used for street outreach and homeless prevention. All beneficiary metrics will be reported on in HMIS.

HUD Continuum of Care Homeless Assistance funds are used for Transitional and Permanent Supportive Housing. The majority of the funded projects are ongoing, and the funding is being used annually as renewal funding to continue the projects administered by the Friendship Service Center and Prudence Crandall Center. These organizations are providing a mix of programming that includes targeting homeless youth, ages 18-24.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

Under the HOME Program, funds are allocated for the Supportive Housing for Persons with HIV/AIDS program which prevents homelessness for this very vulnerable population. HUD Continuum of Care Homeless Assistance funds are used for Permanent Supportive Housing.

The majority of the funded projects are ongoing, and the funding is being used annually as renewal funding to continue the projects administered by the Friendship Service Center, Prudence Crandall Center and Community Mental Health Affiliates.

Additionally, the City received ESG funding in 2021 for the first time in seven years. New Britain Recovers has been funded to continue homeless prevention and street outreach. As part of prevention efforts, New Britain Recovers will provide rental assistance to individuals and families at risk of homelessness. In 2022, funding will be going used to support Friendship Service Center's Daytime Triage Center, Prudence Crandall Center, Community Health Resources, Inc. Rapid Rehousing Program, and the Salvation Army.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

The State of Connecticut mandates that discharges from foster care, health care, mental health facilities and the Department of Corrections be done in such a way as to minimize risk of homelessness. The Continuum of Care partners ensure that the proper steps are taken with regard to discharge planning.

Foster Care

Connecticut has built in an Independent Living Program that offers young people a continuum of independent living services along with specialized case management to ensure a successful transition to productive community life. The Community Housing Assistance Program provides youth aging out of Foster Care with a subsidy to cover living expenses.

Health Care

The Hospital of Central Connection verbally confirmed that current discharge practice includes providing case management services. With the exception of extreme situations, local hospitals do not discharge into emergency shelters, the street or HUD McKinney–Vento funded beds.

Mental Health

The State of Connecticut Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services have policies in place that dictate that every attempt shall be made to verify discharge housing arrangements. Clients are not discharged into emergency shelters, the street or HUD McKinney–Vento funded beds. Organizations, such as Community Mental Health Affiliations (CMHA) are there to assist as needed.

Corrections

The State of Connecticut Department of Corrections continues to complete an Offender Accountability Plan for each inmate, program outline and expectations during the entire time of incarceration. A standardized discharge plan is completed with inmates at the end of sentence, addressing issues including housing, identification and community resource needs. The Department has significantly increased staffing and the number of halfway house beds for parole and community services and contracts for a wide range of residential services in the community.

The New Britain Consolidated School District assists with emergency needs to help stabilize families with

children who are facing homelessness. The many non-profit agencies that are members of the Continuum of Care bring various Federal, State and private sources of support for homeless services and homeless prevention.

Many of the public service programs that will be funded by the CDBG Program will aid in the prevention of homelessness by providing essential services to persons and families who are marginally subsisting.

Discussion

One of the key strategies for homeless prevention is employment development. The goal is to enhance a person's ability to obtain and keep a job, and to make an adequate income to be self-sufficient. These resources are described under job training initiatives in Section MA-45 Non-Housing Community Development Assets of this Consolidated Plan. The City also works diligently to expand and conserve its affordable housing inventory, especially affordable rental housing that benefits the extremely low and low income households who are most at risk of becoming homeless. The Continuum of Care agencies work closely with hospital in the region to address their discharge policies to avoid discharging patients into homelessness and the school system families that are not falling through the cracks.

The City will continue to address needs of the non-homeless special needs to ensure the most vulnerable of populations are protected. This includes working with the Continuum of Care, Southeastern Mental Health Affiliates and the partner agencies affiliated with these programs and the activities mentioned previously.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

Introduction:

In developing the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan, the City was required by the National Affordable Housing Act to address how the cost of housing and the incentives to develop affordable housing are affected by public policies. The Consolidated Plan identified barriers to affordable housing as being the cost and availability of land, costs of meeting current standards and codes at all governmental levels, and the lack of community banks. Also, the age of New Britain's housing stock complicates code compliance and inflates rehabilitation costs. Codes, fees, charges and other policies affect the return on residential investment, which in turn is passed on in the form of rent increases to tenants.

The City will work to advocate for Housing Choice Vouchers program and to restore cuts proposed to the HOME 202 and 811 programs. DPD will work to educate elected officials and residents on the real impact of supportive housing and affordable housing programs. We will work with organizations such as Corporation for Supportive Housing, Connecticut Housing Coalition, Connecticut Fair Housing, Connecticut Coalition to End Homelessness to help advocate for policies that not only remove barriers directly but also provide adequate resources to meet the HUD housing objectives.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

To address these barriers, the Consolidated Plan's strategy is to: resume and continue operating the HUD-funded housing rehabilitation programs, since all housing produced or renovated under these programs must be affordable; investigate new strategies of financing and assistance to current owners and developers; advocate now through the Capital Region Council of Governments to emphasize the need for surrounding towns to develop affordable housing; develop affordable housing through the State of Connecticut's Incentive Housing Zones program which will encourage mixed-use development to capitalize on the transit oriented design concepts that will be conducive to the new busway and related infrastructure improvements; and continue to provide housing counseling, especially to minorities and social service recipients, to insure equal access to housing.

During this coming year, the City anticipates using HUD CDBG and HOME funds for rehabilitation of housing units to provide affordable rental and owner housing. This creates a comprehensive program that has greater impact in protecting residents and stabilizing the housing stock. New Britain will also look to find innovative ways to collaborate with the HOME Program's CHDO funding.

The City has in the past supported housing development with modified tax structure arrangements and fee waivers. The City is working with developers at Columbus Commons (160 units), Cortland Arms (24

units), the Berkowitz Building (27 units), and 180 North Street (11 units) for new housing development. The City has also committed HOME funding to 321 Ellis Street which will see the adaptive-reuse of an industrial complex into 150+ units (including 11 HOME units).

As part of the City's aggressive Brownfields Remediation activities, and with support from the State Department of Economic and Community Development, reclaimed land in the Downtown is being made available for development; and with the State and City's commitment to Transit Oriented Development principles and Incentive Housing Zones, there is likelihood that significant housing development in the downtown will occur. The preference for mixed use, higher density development will complement the State's CTfastrak bus transit ridership and build around the three CTfastrak stations in New Britain.

Lastly, the City continues to assess its abandoned coal and oil facility at 24 Dwight Court. The site is in the middle of a residential neighborhood and was acquired when its previous owner forfeited possession to the City. . This parcel is located adjacent to the busway and has been included in a master planning effort for the neighborhood. The current vision is to assemble this parcel with two additional abutters in order to create an additional 30-40 units of mixed-use and mixed-income property. In 2018, the City was awarded state brownfield funding to address environmental barriers on-site. As of 2022, the demolition and remediation plan is under review by the State of Connecticut.. This is a critical step in redeveloping the parcel and abutters.

Discussion:

The City recently completed its housing needs assessment, and Transit Oriented Development Plan which identifies an inventory of sites with residential development, including sites that would be rezoned/up-zoned to higher density development or redevelopment. This expanded inventory of mixed use and multi-family sites could facilitate the development of affordable housing.

A number of recommendations have also been discussed, including:

1. Work with CT Fair Housing to conduct testing of sale and rental properties to identify violations of the Fair Housing Act at an early stage.
2. Work with Mid Connecticut Association of Realtors (Mid-CAR) to provide training of real estate professionals to discourage steering based on race, ethnicity, familial status, or disability, the four primary bases of fair housing complaints.
3. Require "affirmative marketing" of all new residential developments and buildings in order to receive a building permit, zoning, or subdivision approval. The underlying concept is to make home seekers aware of the full array of housing choices available to them. For the developer, affirmative marketing means taking special steps to promote traffic from particular racial or ethnic groups that are otherwise unlikely to compete for their housing.
4. Train key staff (including everybody who might answer the phone at the police department) to refer callers about fair housing to the designated staff person in City Hall. The designated

individual should be well-versed in fair housing law and practices. At least one backup individual should be assigned to field calls for when the designated individual is not available.

Information about fair housing violations and remedies should be easy to find on the city's website. The proper number to call for assistance with fair housing should be listed on the "Who Do I Call?" web page under a clear heading like "Fair Housing Complaints." However, the city should not rely heavily on the Internet because many of those who face housing discrimination may not have ready access to the Internet, be very skilled on the Internet, or read English well enough to use the city's website effectively.

AP-85 Other Actions – 91.220(k)

Introduction:

The City of New Britain's 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan identified many needs of the City, its residents and its neighborhoods, which were based on reviews and analyses of statistical data, community input and needs assessments, and evaluation of existing programs. It detailed the prevalence of cost burden and substandard housing that erodes the quality of life of New Britain residents. It identified the need to continue support of homelessness prevention and assisted housing.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

Obstacles to meeting the underserved needs comes in many forms. The City of New Britain will address a number of these obstacles through monitoring and performance evaluations of grantees. Specifically, we will focus on ensuring outcomes are being met within each program and that the recipients of funds adhere to CDBG related criteria.

The annual planning process concluded that meeting all the needs of New Britain's residents is beyond the limited financial means of the City and its partner organizations. Revenue shortages of the City and the escalating needs of the residents present constant challenges. The City will continue to support the important public service programs through the allocation and utilization of 2022 HUD funds.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The City will utilize CDBG and HOME funds to continue to address the substandard housing and cost burden problems through collaborations with private developers, Friendship Center, and Neighborhood Housing Services. New Britain will continue the Home Ownership Program which provides down payment assistance to LMI, first-time homebuyers. The Clean and Lien Program funded by CDBG will continue to be a key tool for enforcing anti-blight ordinances

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

New Britain's Health Department and Department of Planning & Development is identifying properties and property owners that are potentially eligible for CCHHP program. These programs will provide incentives to property owners to remove lead hazards, improve weatherization, and address health, fire, safety, and building code issues at the property. The City has been awarded \$5,000,000 in Lead Hazard Reduction Grant and \$600,000 in Healthy Homes Supplemental funding. The City will be rebooting its Healthy Homes New Britain Program to address lead-based paint hazards.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

Many of the activities to be funded by the 2022 HUD grants will address crucial needs of low-income or

poverty-level families. The activities provide an array of services for persons struggling with the threat or reality of homelessness and aim to remedy the problems that affect employability -- such problems as generational poverty and teenage pregnancy, family and health issues, language barriers and disenfranchisement.

Among other things, programs that help lead to increased education and employability, provide transportation to and from necessary activities, and provide permanent housing instead of sheltered housing will be funded this year.

The anti-poverty strategy utilizes existing job training and social service programs to increase employment marketability, household income, and housing options. The City's anti-poverty strategy also includes direct activities that focus on job creation. In New Britain, there are a number of barriers to employment, including transportation, affordable child care, health/medical care, and even language skills.

As a means of reducing the number of persons with incomes below the poverty line and reducing employment barriers, the City will continue to coordinate its efforts with those of other public and private organizations providing economic development and job training programs.

To stimulate business growth, New Britain has been using CDBG funds to encourage businesses to hire New Britain residents that are LMI. The strategy not only focuses on individual businesses, but works to tie in job training programs available through other organizations. Programs such as Property Rehabilitation aid in reducing housing cost burden and improving health as well as safety of residents. These activities helps increase residents financial self-sufficiency, while providing safe, clean, and affordable places to live.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The institutional structure through which New Britain carries out its housing and community development plan is made up of organizations from the public, non-profit and private sectors, and involves public/private partnerships among many housing and social service organizations. The City provides support, not only through CDBG funds for operational costs, but also through the commitment of city staff who meet with the Neighborhood Revitalization Zones, provide them with information as required, respond to their concerns, follow-up on requests and advocate for their plans.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City will use 2022 HUD grants to support programs operated by private, nonprofit agencies. The City will continue its participation with New Britain's Continuum of Care which is comprised of many of the agencies that serve or impact the homeless and poorest residents of the City, and will continue to convene meetings of the Mayor's Building Hope Together initiative to end homelessness which greatly

benefit from the contributions of key members of the business community.

New Britain participates in a collaborative system called the Coordinated Access Network (CAN) allowing for a holistic approach to reducing homelessness of at-risk populations. The City will continue to do the following to enhance coordination of housing and community development: Consult with housing and social service providers; Encourage collaboration of service providers as opposed to competing as separate entities; Participate in regional discussions to address housing; Participate with CRCOG; Ensure strong communication with neighborhood investment groups such as NRZs/block watches. Last year, the City created the New Britain Recovers Program which serves as the lead agency of three existing, City-operated, service initiatives: Building Hope Together, the Mayor's Opioid Taskforce, and the Youth Prevention Council.

Reference 24 CFR 91.220(l)(2)

1. A description of other forms of investment being used beyond those identified in Section 92.205 is as follows:

The City of New Britain will not be using other forms of investment than described in 24 CFR 92.205(b).

2. A description of the guidelines that will be used for resale or recapture of HOME funds when used for homebuyer activities as required in 92.254, is as follows:

The City of New Britain's Home Ownership Program (HOP) provides funds for down-payment Assistance and closing costs.

HOME Funds must be used to assist income-eligible homebuyers, gross income must not exceed 80% of the area median income, as adjusted by household size.

Homebuyer is required to receive and complete homebuyer counseling from a HUD approved agency prior to purchase.

The buyer must agree to the following provisions related to the purchase of the property, all of which will be enforced through loan documents secured by the assisted property and publicly recorded:

- Affordability period in accordance with HUD's affordability period based on investment amount of HOME funds per unit.
- Property Value, the purchase price must not exceed the HUD HOME Homeownership Sales Price Limits. These limits are determined by HUD and published annually.
- Purchase Price will be limited to no more than the appraised value of the home.
- Resale Provision (for outside agency development): Required when HOME assistance is provided in the form of a developer subsidy. Resale Provisions will be enforced through a Restrictive Covenant which is to be signed by the homebuyer at closing. The Restrictive Covenant will specify minimum affordability period, residency requirements, conditions and obligations of the homebuyer should they wish to sell prior to the end of the affordability period, income/residency requirements for the subsequent purchaser, and sales price requirements for the subsequent purchaser. The City will ensure continued affordability to qualified homebuyers that are low-income and do not exceed 80% of the area's median income, as adjusted by household size. Sales prices shall be set such that the amount of Principal, Interest, Taxes, and Insurance does not exceed 30 percent of the subsequent

buyer's annual income. The City will administer its resale provisions by ensuring that the homeowner receives a fair return on his/her investment and that the home will continue to be affordable to a specific range of incomes. Fair Return on Investment means the total homeowner investment which includes the total cash contribution, plus the approved capital improvements credits, and home value as described in the City's Resale Restrictions Attachment C of its HOP Agreement for Homebuyer Assistance.

- Recapture Provision (for City's HOP Program administered by Department of Planning & Development): the borrower agrees to repay all or a portion of the HOME Assistance if the Borrower sells or otherwise transfers the Property within the Affordability Period. The City may recapture the entire amount of the HOME Assistance from the Borrower as set forth in the HOP Program Guidelines' Recapture Requirements if sufficient funds are available when the net proceeds are calculated. The method for calculating the Net Proceeds is set forth in the Recapture Requirements.

Principal Residency and occupancy requirement: the property must be the borrower's principal residence. The City may request verification of this residency requirement.

3. A description of the guidelines for resale or recapture that ensures the affordability of units acquired with HOME funds? See 24 CFR 92.254(a)(4) are as follows:

Resale Provision (for outside agency development): Required when HOME assistance is provided in the form of a developer subsidy. Resale Provisions will be enforced through a Restrictive Covenant which is to be signed by the homebuyer at closing. The Restrictive Covenant will specify minimum affordability period, residency requirements, conditions and obligations of the homebuyer should they wish to sell prior to the end of the affordability period, income/residency requirements for the subsequent purchaser, and sales price requirements for the subsequent purchaser. The City will ensure continued affordability to qualified homebuyers that are low-income and do not exceed 80% of the area's median income, as adjusted by household size.  - c. Accessibility improvements, any and all of which must have been paid for directly by the homeowner and which were not installed through a federal, state, or locally-funded grant program; and
 - d. Outdoor improvements such as a new driveway, walkway, retaining wall, or fence.
3. **Home Value:** The percentage of change of value of home as calculated by the Housing Price Index (HPI) Calculator of the Federal Housing Finance Agency. The calculation shall be performed for the Hartford-West Hartford-East Hartford, CT Statistical Area.

To ensure that all housing will be purchased by subsequent buyers who are low income, the City may provide down payment assistance or other mechanisms that enhance affordability, if needed.

Recapture Provision (for City's HOP Program administered by Department of Planning & Development): the borrower agrees to repay all or a portion of the HOME Assistance if the

Borrower sells or otherwise transfers the Property within the Affordability Period. The City may recapture the entire amount of the HOME Assistance from the Borrower as set forth in the HOP Program Guidelines' Recapture Requirements if sufficient funds are available when the net proceeds are calculated. The method for calculating the Net Proceeds is set forth in the Recapture Requirements.

1. The buyer must maintain, own and occupy the home as his or her principal place of residency for the length of the loan (the affordability period). Failure to occupy the property as the participant's principal residence for this period will constitute default.
 2. A minimum affordability period based on 923254(a)(4).
 3. Other causes of default include: sale or transfer of the property, default on the first mortgage loan, subleasing of the property, failure to maintain proper insurance coverage, or failure to pay property tax and water and/or sewer charges to the City.
 4. In the event of any default, the deferred principal and accrued interest will be immediately due and payable.
 5. A Recapture Provision will be included in all loan documents that will be signed by the homebuyer at closing.

4. Plans for using HOME funds to refinance existing debt secured by multifamily housing that is rehabilitated with HOME funds along with a description of the refinancing guidelines required that will be used under 24 CFR 92.206(b), are as follows:

At this time the City of New Britain will not be refinancing existing debt.

**Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG)

The Balance of State Continuum of Care developed the Coordinated Access Network to cover particular regions of the State of Connecticut. The focus of the CAN is to streamline services to improve access to resources for individuals and families with housing needs. The New Britain Recovers Program is jointly run by the City of New Britain and the CAN through their Co-Chair Mary Floyd. The New Britain Recovers Program serves as the lead agency of three existing, City-operated,

service initiatives focused on reducing homelessness via a holistic approach. These sub-programs include Building Hope Together, the Mayor's Opioid Taskforce, and the Youth Prevention Council.

3. Identify the process for making sub-awards and describe how the ESG allocation available to private nonprofit organizations (including community and faith-based organizations).

The City's allocation of Emergency Solutions Grant funds is \$146,468 for Fiscal Year 2022. Grant funds are allocated for administrative costs in accordance with HUD caps. Remaining funds are allocated on a competitive application process. A solicitation period is announced by the City's Commission on Community & Neighborhood Development (CCND). Following this solicitation period, applications are reviewed by Department of Planning & Development staff for eligibility before being relayed to CCND for review based on community need. CCND issues a recommended plan of funding to the City of New Britain Common Council who will either finalize or amend the plan based public comment.

4. If the jurisdiction is unable to meet the homeless participation requirement in 24 CFR 576.405(a), the jurisdiction must specify its plan for reaching out to and consulting with homeless or formerly homeless individuals in considering policies and funding decisions regarding facilities and services funded under ESG.

The New Britain common Council is comprised of democratically elected officials. The City is unable to meet the requirements of 576.405(a) to provide for the participation of not less than one homeless individual or formerly homeless individual on its policy-making entity. In order to meet the alternative requirements of 576.405(b), the City requires the New Britain Continuum of Care to maintain membership of a minimum of one homeless person and one formerly homeless person to obtain their input when considering making policies and decisions regarding any facilities, services, or to other assistance that receives funding under ESG.

5. Describe performance standards for evaluating ESG.

For the Emergency Shelter, homelessness prevention, and street outreach services funded by ESG, performance will be measured in terms of the number of persons provided with shelter, food, safety, health services, and case management.

For the provision of ESG assistance for rapid re-housing, measures are:

- The number of households placed or retained in permanent housing
- The percentage of assisted households retaining permanent housing at 3, 6, and 12 months post-subsidy

The number of persons reported as served will be verified in the Homeless Management and

Information System.

Written Standards for Providing Emergency Solutions Grant Assistance

City of New Britain, CT

As required by 24 CFR Part 576.400(e), the City of New Britain has developed the following written standards to ensure programmatic compliance, standardized support structures, and community benefit during the operation of all ESG-funded programs and projects.

Eligibility Evaluation Policy

Standard policies and procedures for evaluating individuals' and families' eligibility for assistance under ESG.

Each individual program is allowed to have general criteria by which they evaluate a potential participant's eligibility in an ESG-funded program. All such criteria must be reviewed and approved by the City of New Britain Department of Planning and Development (DPD), and must contain the following:

- All program participants must have an initial consultation with a case manager or other authorized representative who can determine eligibility and the appropriate type of assistance needed.
- All program participants must have income at or below 30% of the Area Median Income (AMI). Income shall be determined on a prospective basis (not retrospective), and shall be certified by the case manager or program authorized representative.
- All ESG-funded programs must provide DPD a copy of the certification for each eligibility evaluation which results in an eligible program participant.

For persons who are considered "literally homeless," no additional eligibility criteria are necessary. The documentation requirements for such persons are as follows:

- Written observation by the outreach worker; or
- Written referral by another housing or service provider (including HMIS recorded referral); or
- Certification by the individual or head of household seeking assistance stating that they were living on the streets or in a shelter.
- For individuals exiting an institution – one of the above forms of evidence and:
 - Discharge paperwork or written/oral referral, or
 - Written record of intake worker's due diligence to obtain above evidence and certification by individual that they exited institution

For persons who are considered at "imminent risk of homelessness," the following documentation is required:

- A court order resulting from an eviction action notifying the individual or family that they must leave; or
- For individual and families leaving a hotel or motel – evidence that they lack the financial resources to stay; or
- A documented and verified oral statement; and
 - Certification that no subsequent residence has been identified; and
 - Self-certification or other written documentation that the individual lacks the financial resources or support necessary to obtain permanent housing.

Finally, persons that are fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence must have the following documentation:

- *For victim service providers:*
 - An oral statement by the individual or head of household seeking assistance which states: they are fleeing; they have no subsequent residence; and they lack resources. Statement must be documented by a self-certification or a certification by an intake worker.

- For non-victim service providers (i.e., agencies who do not exclusively serve DV victims):
 - Oral statement by the individual or head of household seeking assistance that they are fleeing. This statement is documented by a self-certification or by the caseworker. Where the safety of the individual or family is not jeopardized, the oral statement must be verified; and
 - Certification by the individual or head of household that no subsequent residence has been identified; and
 - Self-certification or other written documentation, that the individual or family lacks the financial resources and support networks to obtain other permanent housing.

For persons who are considered “at risk of homelessness,” the following criteria apply:

- Program participants must not have sufficient resources or support networks, e.g., family, friends, faith-based or other social networks, immediately available to prevent them from moving to an emergency shelter or another place described in the definition of homeless; and
 - Meets ONE of the following conditions:
 - Has moved because of economic reasons two or more times during the 60 days immediately preceding the application for homelessness prevention assistance;
 - Is living in the home of another because of economic hardship;
 - Has been notified in writing that their right to occupy their current housing or living situation will be terminated within 21 days after the date of application for assistance;
 - Lives in a hotel or motel and the cost of the hotel or motel stay is not paid by charitable organizations or by federal, State, or local government programs for low-income individuals;
 - Lives in a single-room occupancy or efficiency apartment unit in which there reside more than two persons or lives in a larger housing unit in which there reside more than 1.5 people per room, as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau;
 - Is exiting a publicly funded institution, or system of care (such as a health-care facility, a mental health facility, foster care or other youth facility, or correction program or institution).

For persons who are considered “at risk of homelessness,” the following documentation is required:

- A documented and verified oral statement from the program participant; and
- Certification that no subsequent residence has been identified; and
- Self-certification or other written documentation that the individual lacks the financial resources or support necessary to obtain permanent housing; and
- Self-certification or other written documentation that the individual meets one of the conditions listed.

Homeless Services Coordination Policy

Policies and procedures for coordination among emergency shelter providers, essential service providers, homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing assistance providers, other homeless assistance providers, and mainstream service and housing providers.

All ESG-funded programs must participate in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). Only programs that are specifically forbidden by other statutes or regulations (e.g., domestic violence victim service providers) may not participate.

All HMIS-participating agencies must collect and maintain common data fields as determined by the HMIS Administrator and HMIS Committee, considering all relevant regulations. These common practices will be to ensure services are coordinated among organizations – one client, one record.

Finally, all ESG-funded programs document participation from at least one homeless resident on a board or committee responsible for program oversight. Failure to attend may result in a determination of ineligibility.

Prioritization Policies

Policies and procedures for determining and prioritizing which eligible families and individuals will receive homelessness prevention assistance and which eligible families and individuals will receive rapid re-housing assistance.

Street Outreach

Unsheltered persons are engaged for the purpose of providing immediate support, intervention, and connections with homeless assistance programs and/or mainstream social services and housing programs.

Engagement includes locating, identifying, and building relationships with unsheltered homeless people and engage them for the purpose of providing immediate support, intervention, and connections with homeless assistance programs and/or mainstream social services and housing programs. These activities consist of making an initial assessment of needs and eligibility; providing crisis counseling; addressing urgent physical needs, such as providing meals, blankets, clothes, or toiletries; and actively connecting and providing information and referrals to programs targeted to homeless people and mainstream social services and housing programs, including emergency shelter, transitional housing, community-based services, permanent supportive housing, and rapid re-housing programs.

Street outreach efforts must follow the abovementioned Eligibility Evaluation Policy.

Emergency Shelter Programs

Emergency shelter program participants may receive essential services, but must be voluntary and based on assessment of program participant's interests and desires. Program participants must be notified of the availability of services at intake, and assessment for interest in engagement in services may be initiated by staff or by program participants. Emergency shelter program participants must prioritize housing and service plans based on ongoing risk assessment and safety planning for victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. Additionally, those experiencing the highest barriers to housing and who are likely to be homeless the longest should be given consideration when determining priority. Each emergency shelter program participant is allowed to have general criteria detailing these priority factors as well as limits on length of stay and facility safeguards to meet safety and shelter needs of individual participants. The general criteria must be written policy and submitted to the City Department of Planning and Development prior to award of funds.

Homelessness Prevention

Any household that may otherwise be eligible for prevention assistance under ESG must also meet the "but for" rule – that is, "Would this individual or family be homeless but for this assistance?"

The "but for" rule can be documented with the following:

- Certification by the individual or head of household that no subsequent residence has been identified; and
- Self-certification or other written documentation, that the individual or family lacks the financial resources and support networks to obtain other permanent housing.

Furthermore, any household that qualifies for prevention assistance and meets the “but for” rule must also have the following qualifications:

- Have no more than three months of arrears; and
- Demonstrate an ability to sustain housing; and
- Demonstrate an ability to earn income; and
- Would remain in housing that is decent, safe, sanitary, and affordable.

If the household cannot meet the above qualifications, it is reasonable to infer that the household is in greater need than prevention assistance can provide for, and the household will be referred to a more appropriate program.

Rapid Re-Housing

Programs funded to do rapid rehousing in the City of New Britain must use an assessment that identifies barriers to obtaining and maintaining housing. Programs will select participants based on this assessment by prioritizing the population where a rapid rehousing intervention will be most effective. This population will have barriers to housing but not significant barriers. Programs will continue to assess the match between intervention and target population as data is available.

Termination Policy

Programs funded by ESG are required to have a written policy outlining the process by which support to program participants may be terminated. This policy must affirm the rights of the individual(s) affected and document a formal process which demonstrates how the agency will exercise judgement and examine all extenuating circumstances in determining when violations warrant termination. Termination should only be considered in the most severe cases of violation.

Each ESG-funded program must also document a grievance policy which affords program participants the opportunity to file a grievance prior to termination of support. This policy must include a detailed process in which the grievance will be reviewed.

These policies must be reviewed and approved by the City Department of Planning and Development prior to award of funds.

Rent & Utility Cost Sharing Policy

Standards for determining the share of rent and utilities costs that each program participant must pay, if any, while receiving homelessness prevention or rapid re-housing assistance.

Each individual program is allowed to have general criteria by which they determine a program participant's share of rent and/or utilities in an ESG-funded program. All such criteria must be reviewed and approved by the City of New Britain Department of Planning and Development (DPD).

Rapid rehousing programs will focus subsidies on providing just enough assistance to allow participants to maintain housing. Programs will use a declining subsidy model to allow participants to adjust to subsidy reductions over time. Participants will be better prepared to assume full responsibility for rent as program termination approaches.

Length of Participation Policy –Financial Assistance

Standards for determining how long a particular program participant will be provided with rental assistance and whether and how the amount of that assistance will be adjusted over time.

Within homeless prevention programs, ESG funds will be limited to short-term rental assistance (up to three months) and payment of rental arrears (up to three months). Participants may only receive ESG prevention assistance once in a 24-month period.

Rapid rehousing programs will provide rental assistance for a maximum of nine months. Payment of up to three months of rental arrears will be allowed.

Performance Measures

Performance measures for ESG projects were developed to comply with the CT Balance of State Continuum of Care to align with the strategies to end homelessness in the State of Connecticut, the existing reporting requirements of the CoC and the data available in the homeless management information system.

The City of New Britain developed the following performance measures to help accomplish the following goals:

- Measure program performance
- Align program evaluation between ESG recipients
- Measure participants' progress toward homeless services goals as outlined in the Consolidated Plan, Annual Action plan and reported to HUD in the Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER)

Participation in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) is required by ESG regulation for all projects receiving ESG funding. Therefore, all performance measures must be tracked in and run out of HMIS.

The required ESG performance measures are as follows:

For all programs:

- Average length of stay
- Percentage of households with exits to permanent destinations
- Percentage of adult participants who maintain or increase their income

For Homeless Prevention Programs (except legal services) and Rapid Rehousing Programs:

- Percentage of households who remain in permanent housing six months after their exit from the program

WHEREAS, the City of New Britain will receive funds from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for Fiscal Year 2022 under the Community Development Block Grant Program, in an amount of \$1,742,648, the HOME Program, in an amount of \$612,934, and Emergency Solutions Grant, in an amount of \$146,168, and


WHEREAS, in order to receive these funds, the City is required to prepare an Annual Plan that is consistent with the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan for HUD Programs which was adopted by the Common Council of the City of New Britain, and

WHEREAS, a Public Hearing of the Common Council was held on April 19, 2022, to obtain the views of citizens on housing and community development needs and priorities, and to provide citizens an opportunity to comment on the Proposed 2022 Annual Consolidated Plan as prepared by the Commission on Community and Neighborhood Development, prior to its approval of the 2022 Annual Consolidated Plan, and

WHEREAS, also during Fiscal Year 2022 the City anticipates receiving Program Income from CDBG activities in the amount of \$135,000, and from HOME activities in the amount of \$310,000, which will be used to support new projects;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Common Council of the City of New Britain hereby adopts the 2022 Annual Consolidated Plan for HUD Programs, and hereby authorizes the Mayor to submit to the U. S. Department of Housing & Urban Development said plan, including certifications and descriptions as required by HUD and any agreements, revisions, rescissions or amendments as necessary for the City's receipt of CDBG and HOME funds.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mayor is hereby authorized to execute any and all subrecipient agreements with FY- 2022 CDBG, HOME, and ESG applicants in accordance with the final funding awards as approved by the Common Council of the City of New Britain, subject to HUD approval.




