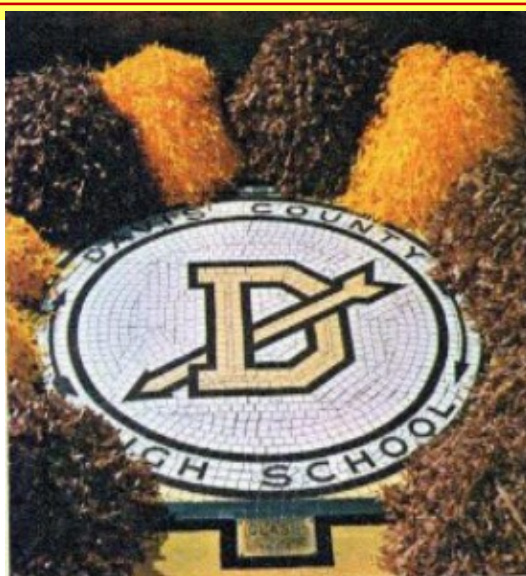
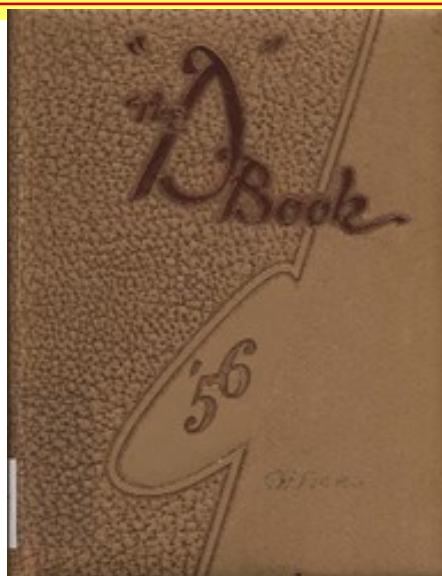

Norman Wilhelm Faldmo, Jr.

Norman passed away peacefully on August 17, 2021, in his son Chris's home in Saratoga Springs, UT, just two days after his 84th birthday. He quietly fought a 15 year battle with Parkinson's Disease and most recently myeloma cancer. Norm was born on August 15, 1937, in Salt Lake City, UT. His parents were Norman Wilhelm Faldmo Sr. and Erma Brunt Faldmo. He was the oldest of 4 children.

Norm had a happy childhood and enjoyed learning the meaning of hard work as he worked alongside his dad, who worked as a metal lather. As a teen he enjoyed working on projects and tinkering with things. In high school he purchased a rundown boat and fixed it up for himself and his friends. He graduated from Davis High School in 1956 where he played football for a year. After High School Norm had the unique opportunity to live in Hawaii with his family after High School while his father served a church labor mission to build the Church College of Hawaii (later named BYU Hawaii). He finished two years at the CCH and enlisted in the Army National Guard before being called to serve a church mission to Australia. After his mission, he enrolled at the University of Utah and graduated with a masters from their architecture program. Norm married his sweetheart, Carolyn Shurtliff on December 20, 1961 in the Salt Lake Temple. They had dated in high school and sparked up their relationship after he returned from his mission. Together they raised seven children. After graduating from the U of U and working in the private architectural sector for a few years, Norm received a job opportunity from Brigham Young University. He was in charge of the church school programs in Mexico, South America, New Zealand, and the South Pacific. He enjoyed his years traveling to these different countries and improving the buildings at the different campuses. Shortly after moving the family to an apartment in Orem, Norm designed and built his family's home on Carterville Road in Orem. Some of the buildings he was primarily responsible for planning and coordinating the build of at BYU were: the Tanner Building, the Cougar Stadium expansion, many of the student housing developments, the MTC expansion, the Wilkinson Student Center expansion, the Eyring and Benson Science buildings, the BYU Museum of Art, the new Athletic Complex, the underground library along with many other projects. As his years continued with BYU, his promotions took him to the position of Director of Architecture and Planning. Norm enjoyed the 32 years of working for Brigham Young University before retiring. While Norm's parents and brother owned Faldmo Tours and Travels, he would get to act as the host or tour guide for some of the tours. He and Carolyn would bring one or two of their children along on the tours, being able to visit many states including Hawaii, and other countries like Canada, and in Europe. Norm's children and grandchildren appreciate the years of fun they have enjoyed together on their houseboat at Lake Powell and appreciate dad's hard work to keep everything shipshape and running! The family is also grateful for the emphasis Norm and Carolyn had on the family, as they arranged for Family reunions every 2 years for all the family to gather in fun places to strengthen their family bonds. After retirement, Norm and Carolyn did not slow down. They spent a year teaching English to University Students in Nanjing, China. They loved their time there connecting with the students and exploring that part of the world. Norm utilized his talents to help renovate the Luau area of the PCC and other projects at the PCC during his two church missions to the Polynesian Cultural Center and BYU Hawaii.

I no longer live in Colorado so it is now **"Greetings** from Utah"

Yes, I'm now a resident of Utah, my new address is, 40 North 100 West, Fillmore, UT 84631. Fillmore is located on I-15, half way between Salt Lake and St George. Traveling this way, stop by to visit or spend the night. I'm happy to announce that one of our Classmates spent last night with me, Gary Eaton. We had a wonderful visit, dinner and breakfast. Its been awhile since our last Class Newsletter, the last nine months of my life have been busy and dizzy.

Because my birthday is May 22, I thought 2022 would be a wonderful fun year for me. Didn't happen---I was my wifes 7/24 caretaker for over eleven years. One of my goals was to keep her out of Emergency Rooms and Hospitals, they are not good for your health and well being. On April 20, 2022 I had to call for an ambulance to take my wife to ER at local hospital. They kept her for a few days then tranfered her to a rehab facility. On May 28th we decided that it was not doing her any good and I took her home. On June 18th I had to call for an ambulance again to take her to ER. They put her in intensive care, on June 26th at 8:20PM tjeý pronounced her dead. We held a graveside service for her at the Meadow, UT cemetery on July 1st (Meadow is in Millard County). I started packing and moving loads of my belongings and houshold goods to a storage facility in Fillmore, UT. On August 10th I put my moving aside and departed on a 4,170 mile road trip to Tennessee, Georgia and Virginia for my Grand Daughters wedding and to visit my two daughters and grandson. Now back to more packing and moving. Eventually, I purchased a house in Fillmore, UT and closed on it in October 2022. Now during all of this, I was trying to sell my house in Colorado Springs, CO, finally closing on it on December 1, 2022. I've got all of my stuff out of storage and in my Fillmore house, will be months before I get it all unpacked. I'm now busy making my new residence more liveable (I'll tell you more about it in next newsletter).

Now that I have more time to devote to the Class Newsletter and Class Reunions you will be hearing from me more often. The first thing I want to discuss with you and get some input from you is plans for a DHS Class of 1956 Luncheon in September 2023. My first choice would be to hold a Class Reunion in the Common Area in Dear Old Davis High School with lunch catered in to us. My next choice would be lunch at the Golden Corral in Layton. David grew up on the family farm in Syracuse, UT, where he developed a lifelong love of farming and a prodigious work ethic. He was educated at schools in Davis County and graduated from Davis High. David attended Utah State University, where he met his sweetheart, Delores Collett. They were married on August 28, 1963, in the Logan Temple. During college, David was selected to be an International Farm Youth Exchange student in Venezuela, where he lived, worked, and learned for six months.

After his graduation from Utah State, David attended Air Force pilot training in Del Rio, Texas. He was then stationed at Charleston Air Force Base, where he flew the C-141 Star Lifter on missions around the globe during the Vietnam War. After completing his active duty in the Air Force, David returned to Utah State University to earn his MBA. He then opened a business in Clearfield, UT, the HMC Rental Center. David joined the Air Force Reserves and flew the C-124 Globemaster and the T-33 Shooting Star at Hill Air Force Base, where he also became a contract administrator, retiring in 2004.

He loved his Savior, Jesus Christ, and faithfully served in many positions in The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, including full-time service as a missionary in the Western Canadian Mission from 1958 to 1960. Dave and his wife, Delores, served two missions together.

He generously shared his vegetables with others and gave freely of his time and talents to help with any project. A skilled mechanic, craftsman, and carpenter, Dave could repair or build anything.

David leaves behind a legacy of love and faith in the gospel of Jesus Christ. He is preceded in death by his parents.
