Wisconsin School Board Appreciation Week

The Wisconsin Association of School Boards has set Oct. 2-8 as Wisconsin School Board Appreciation Week as a time to build awareness and understanding of the vital function an elected board of education plays in our communities. The Superintendents from Albany, Black Hawk, Brodhead, Juda, Monroe, Monticello, New Glarus, and Parkview are joining together to celebrate Wisconsin School Board Appreciation Week to honor local board members for their commitment to our area school districts and the children and families they serve.

The eight area superintendents share the sentiment that it takes strong schools to build strong communities, and the men and women of our school boards devote countless hours making sure our schools are helping every child learn at a higher level. Our school boards make tough decisions every month and spend many hours studying education issues and regulations in order to provide the kind of accountability our communities expect.

The key work of school boards is to raise student achievement by:

- Creating a vision for what the community wants the school district to be and for making student achievement the top priority;
- Establishing standards for what students will be expected to learn and be able to do;
- Ensuring progress is measured to be sure the district's goals are achieved and students are learning at expected levels;
- Being accountable for their decisions and actions by continually tracking and reporting results;
- Creating a safe, orderly climate where students can learn and teachers can teach;
- Forming partnerships with others in the community to solve common problems; and
- Focusing attention on the need for continuous improvement by questioning, refining and revising issues related to student achievement.

Supporting Your Student's Emotional Well Being

Normalize the big emotions. Many kids experience a mix of emotions at the beginning of the school year – happy, excited, confident, worried, nervous, overwhelmed, and more. Kids are adjusting to new school routines and expectations, while also trying to navigate friendships and the "social rules" at school. This can be stressful for a variety of reasons.

Some kids may be eager for in-person interactions but can still experience difficulties, especially if they're going to a different school than before the pandemic or they've had minimal contact with peers. Other kids may have experienced less social anxiety or appreciated having more flexibility during remote learning, and they can find it difficult to be around many people again in busy, over-stimulating environments. And some kids might not have any concerns about in-person school, but the sudden increase in social interactions can still leave them emotionally drained.

Go back to the basics. Sometimes, kids just need time and space to feel their emotions and settle into their routines and relationships. Adults can help by going back to the basics of positive parenting: spend quality time together, talk with each other, and give affection and attention. Give each child your full, focused attention for brief but frequent amounts of quality time. Talk with them before and after school, during meals, and at bedtime. These could be casual conversations about things they're interested in, check-ins about their feelings and experiences, or something in between. Listen to any concerns or feelings they share, and acknowledge what they're experiencing — "That sounds really hard," or, "It's ok to feel that way." Give affection and attention to reassure them you care for and support them. During calm moments, teach them techniques like deep breathing, yoga, or coping statements (affirmations) so they can use these tools whenever they feel strong emotions.

Help kids problem-solve. If your kids share a concern, resist the urge to solve it for them. Instead, ask what they think could help and if they have ideas about what to do. If they want your assistance, help them define "the problem" – e.g., they don't understand what their teacher is covering, or they're having difficulty making friends. Have them brainstorm several ideas of what they could do and help them think through the pros and cons of each option. Encourage them to pick one idea to try, then ask questions, like "What could you do first?", "What would you say?", or "When could you try that?" to help them develop a concrete plan. Have them try their plan, then check in periodically to see what worked well, what could have gone better, and if they want to try another idea. This process helps kids develop problem-solving skills they can use in any situation throughout life.

FINAL THOUGHTS: As you support your children's emotional health, remember to take care of your own physical, mental, and emotional well-being. Do something that helps you rest, recharge, and be a calm, patient, and positive parent. (Source: California Parenting Institute)

Flu Information



Flu:

A Guide for Parents



Influenza (flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat and lungs. Flu is different from a cold, and usually comes on suddenly. Each year flu causes millions of illnesses, hundreds of thousands of hospitalizations, and tens of thousands of deaths in the United States.

Flu can be very dangerous for children. CDC estimates that since 2010, between 6,000 and 26,000 children younger than 5 years old have been hospitalized from flu each year in the U.S. Flu vaccine is safe and helps protect children from flu.

What parents should know

How serious is flu?

While flu illness can vary from mild to severe, children often need medical care because of flu. Children younger than 5 years old and children of any age with certain long-term health problems are at high risk of flu complications like pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus and ear infections. Some health problems that are known to make children more vulnerable to flu include asthma, diabetes and disorders

of the brain or nervous system.

How does flu spread?

Flu viruses are thought to spread mainly by droplets made when someone with flu coughs, sneezes or talks. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people nearby. A person also can get flu by touching something that has flu virus on it and then touching their mouth, eyes, or nose.

What are flu symptoms?

Flu symptoms can include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills, feeling tired and sometimes vomiting and diarrhea (more common in children than adults). Some people with the flu will not have a fever.

Protect your child

How can I protect my child from flu?

The first and best way to protect against flu is to get a yearly flu vaccine for yourself and your child.

- Flu vaccination is recommended for everyone 6 months and older every year. Flu shots and nasal spray flu vaccines are both options for vaccination.
- It's especially important that young children and children with certain long-term health problems get vaccinated.
- Caregivers of children at high risk of flu complications should get a flu vaccine. (Babies younger than 6 months are at high risk for serious flu complications, but too young to get a flu vaccine.)
- Pregnant women should get a flu vaccine to protect themselves and their baby from flu. Research shows that flu vaccination during pregnancy protects the baby from flu for several months after birth.
- Flu viruses are constantly changing and so flu vaccines are updated often to protect against the flu viruses that research indicates are most likely to cause illness during the upcoming flu season.

Are flu vaccines safe?

Flu vaccines are made using strict safety and production measures. Millions of people have safely received flu vaccines for decades. Flu shots and nasal spray flu vaccines are both options for vaccination. Different types of flu vaccines are licensed for different ages. Each person should get one that is appropriate for their age. CDC and the American Academy of Pediatrics recommend an annual flu vaccine for all children 6 months and older.

What are the benefits of getting a flu vaccine?

- A flu vaccine can keep you and your child from getting sick. When vaccine viruses and circulating viruses are matched, flu vaccination has been shown to reduce risk of getting sick with flu by about 40 to 60%.
- Flu vaccines can keep your child from being hospitalized from flu.
 One recent study showed that flu vaccine reduced children's risk of flu-related pediatric intensive care unit admission by 74%.
- Flu vaccine can be life saving in children.

A study using data from recent flu seasons found that flu vaccine reduced the risk of flu-associated death by half among children with high risk medical conditions and by nearly two-thirds among children without medical conditions.

- Flu vaccination also may make your illness milder if you do get sick.
- Getting yourself and your child vaccinated also can protect others who may be more vulnerable to serious flu illness, like babies and young children, older people, and people with certain long-term health problems.

What are some other ways I can protect my child against flu?

In addition to getting a flu vaccine, you and your child should take everyday actions to help prevent the spread of germs.

Stay away from people who are sick as much as possible to keep from getting sick yourself. If you or your child are sick, avoid others as much as possible to keep from infecting them. Also, remember to regularly cover your coughs and sneezes, wash your hands often, avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth, and clean surfaces that may be contaminated with flu viruses. These everyday actions can help reduce your chances of getting sick and prevent the spread of germs to others if you are sick. However, a yearly flu vaccine is the best way to prevent flu illness.

If your child is sick

What can I do if my child gets sick?

Talk to your doctor early if you are worried about your child's illness.

Make sure your child gets plenty of rest and drinks enough fluids.

If your child is 5 years or older and does not have a longterm health problems and gets flu symptoms, including a fever and/or cough, consult your doctor as needed.

Children younger than 5 years old – especially those younger than 2 years – and children with certain long-term health problems (including asthma, diabetes and disorders of the brain or nervous system), are at high risk of serious flu complications. Call your doctor or take your child to the doctor right away if they develop flu symptoms.

What if my child seems very sick?

Even healthy children can get very sick from flu. If your child is experiencing the following emergency warning signs, you should go to the emergency room:

- Fast breathing or trouble breathing
- Bluish lips or face
- Ribs pulling in with each breath
- Chest pain

- Severe muscle pain (child refuses to walk)
- Dehydration (no urine for 8 hours, dry mouth, no tears when crying)
- Not alert or interacting when awake
- Seizures
- Fever above 104°F
- In children less than 12 weeks, any fever
- Fever or cough that improve but then return or worsen
- Worsening of chronic medical conditions

This list is not all inclusive. Please consult your medical provider for any other symptom that is severe or concerning.

Is there a medicine to treat flu?

Yes. Antiviral drugs are prescription medicines that can be used to treat flu illness. They can shorten your illness and make it milder, and they can prevent serious complications that could result in a hospital stay. Antivirals work best when started during the first 2 days of illness. Antiviral drugs are recommended to treat flu in people who are very sick (for example, people who are in the hospital) or people who are at high risk of serious flu complications who get flu symptoms. Antivirals can be given to children and pregnant women.

How long can a sick person spread flu to others?

People with flu may be able to infect others from 1 day before getting sick to up to 5 to 7 days after. Severely ill people or young children may be able to spread the flu longer, especially if they still have symptoms.

Can my child go to school, day care, or camp if he or she is sick?

No. Your child should stay home to rest and to avoid spreading flu to other children or caregivers.

When can my child go back to school after having flu?

Keep your child home from school, day care, or camp for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone. (The fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine.) A fever is defined as 100°F (37.8°C)* or higher.

*Many authorities use either 100 (37.8 degrees Celsius) or 100.4 F (38.0 degrees Celsius) as a cut-off for fever, but this number can vary depending on factors such as the method of measurement and the age of the person.

Building Project Progress

As we move forward with plans for the building project I am sure there are more questions that you have about what is happening. We will work to update the district website with new information and keep you informed.

HSR has moved the timeline up slightly. The plan is to put the project out for bid in December. The intent is to break ground in March/April of 2023. The first phase to be completed in December of 2023. Destruction of the identified portions of the building to happen in January-February of 2024. The start of phase two to occur in March/April of 2024. Finally, the completion of the project by December of 2024.

HSR meets with district personnel twice a month during this time of the project development. Currently, the HSR team meets with us on the second Wednesday of the month. During the Wednesday meetings they meet with district personnel, followed by the board buildings and grounds committee, and culminating with the full board. Then they meet with district personnel on the last Thursday of the month. In many of these meetings key consultants are brought in at appropriate times to assist with the progress. Some of the key consultants include, Focus on Energy, Environmental Management Consulting, Inc., TC Networks (technology), Freezer/Refrigeration consultants and several others.

Individual components of the project have been considered separately due the nature of the project. The district has researched options for the "garage" (the Morton Building), which will be done independently of the main project. The board buildings and grounds committee has started to select finishes which include such things as the exterior finishes and the flooring. The Board also approved the purchase of the switchgear, which is the main electric system controls coming into the building. The early order of the switchgear was necessitated by the current delivery delays in the industry.

There is a lot of work going on to make this project go forward and serve the needs of the district. Currently, much of this work is not outwardly visible. Feel free to reach out with questions. You will need the following items in order to complete your 2023-24 FAFSA. If you are considered a dependent student for financial aid purposes, you will also need these items for your parent(s).

- 2021 Federal Tax Return and W2s
 - 2021 Untaxed Income Records, such as child support or veteran's non-education benefits
 - Information on savings, investments, business assets and farm assets (if applicable)
 - Driver's License (if you have one)
- Cell phone (if you have one)
- Social Security Number
- Alien Registration Card or Permanent Resident Card (if you are not a U.S. citizen)
- Date of birth for parents
- Month and year of parents' marriage, divorce, or separation
- FSA ID (if you have one). To create an FSA ID, please visit studentaid.gov. Every student and at least one parent if the student is considered a dependent student needs one

It is highly recommended that a dependent student attend the event with a parent so the FAFSA can be submitted that day.






