Dear Committee,

Thank for your all your hard work and careful consideration for our children and communities. I am very excited about the new school and happy to be a part of the future of BSD as my children approach school-age. I am writing to express my support for the "submitted scenario 3." I believe this scenario is the most forward-thinking, which will keep communities together and allow the best continuity for our kids. I would like to address three main points that were the focus of the 11/17 meeting:

- 1) Overcrowding: It appears that with all scenarios some overcrowding is inevitable. This is the direct consequence of a growing community, and unfortunately the discussion relies heavily on data projections. A big fear for the neighborhoods south of Springville is another large redistricting effort in 2019, which they have seen many times over short lifetime of those homes. Continued reassurances to this community that they will not to be moved in the future, have historically proved false. Keeping that in mind, the overcrowding that is projected to occur at Kaiser in 2019 with "submitted scenario 3," if not addressed through portables, could be addressed through much smaller readjustments to Springville, Jacob Wismer, and Rock Creek. These schools are at or overcapacity now, but fortunately, are expected to decrease in the next 5 years. At that time, "submitted scenario 3" could see very minor adjustments without disrupting multiple communities. Adjusting eith er "modified scenario 3" or "map submittal #2" will be large undertakings, similar to what we are currently doing. "Submitted scenario 2" is very similar to the modified island approach which was rapidly rejected for its discontinuity. While "submitted #2" eliminates the island, the peninsula approaches of #2 and scenario #3 are not ideal in the long term.
- 2) Transportation: "Submitted scenario 3" currently has a slightly higher transportation cost than some of the other proposals; however, this scenario will see the most cost decrease over time as the N. Bethany neighborhood develops. I understand that the Arbor Creek neighborhood (North of Springville K8) is very upset that their currently walkable school will be bussed to Kaiser in "submitted scenario 3." This is an unfortunate change in the short term and a consequence of Kaiser's current remote location. However, as the area west of Kaiser continues to develop, sidewalks, trails, and safe pathways will provide a walkable route for that entire neighborhood to get to Kaiser, since the two are separated by less than 1 mile. The area south of Springville will never be walkable to Kaiser. However, the neighborhoods south of Springville have been working with Washington County and BSD to get a light and crossing guard at Joss and Springville, which will provide w alkability to the majority of the Springville boundary laid out in "submitted scenario 3." This small and in-process change would substantially decrease the \$ 41,332 estimated for the Springville bussing of "submitted scenario 3."
- 3) Neighborhood Unity: Lastly, I am very grateful that the committee previously reopened this discussion to allow for our strong, established neighborhood to remain together once we realized the division that was proposed in "modified scenario 3." This is something our area and the Jacob Wismer parents felt very strongly about. "Submitted scenario 3" strongly supports this value. I believe this is also true for the new Arbor Creek neighborhood, which has shown their unity in this process. As that community develops, they will be strongly unified in North Bethany. While that area is still being developed, the future of North Bethany appears to be (like the areas south of it) oriented in east-west. That community will develop strongly around the Kaiser school and I believe "submitted scenario 3" best supports that.

I believe that "submitted scenario 3" most readily addresses the overcrowding, cost and safety of transportation, and neighborhood unity of our elementary students in the long-term. Please consider these points and thank you again for your consideration and concern for our kids

I understand the difficulty task ahead of yeah, but want to share my thoughts as these concerns are shared by many. To illustrate the importance of the boundary changes, I am writing this personal comment rather than copying and pasting a message that requires no thought or effort.

Map #1 makes the least sense to me. It doesn't make much sense to overcrowd JW unnecessarily. JW is near capacity and is expected to remain near capacity but is not expected to go over capacity as the neighborhood around it is pretty much built out. One of the most important goals of any boundary adjustment is to minimize the number of students impacted. It would appear to be least disruptive for BSD to leave the JW boundary as is and focus efforts in the Springville and Kaiser boundaries. These are the areas that need attentions.

Safety must also be given significant consideration. If the Arbor View neighborhood is moved to the new Kaiser school, it would require crossing 2 busy streets. Springville and Kaiser roads create a natural boundary for JW. There are paths from the Arbor View neighborhood that allow safe travel via walking or biking to JW. Keeping the JW boundary will allow students to continue getting the desired physical activity while doing so safely.

Map #3 ensures that these concerns are addressed. It also keeps the majority of original Springville boundary as it originally was, keeping neighborhoods together rather that needlessly tearing them apart. It focuses on the new development (as it should) for the new school.

As a resident of the Arbor View Neighborhood, I would like to request in the strongest possible terms that Map Submittal #1 specifically, and more generally any proposal that alters the Jacob Wismer boundary, be eliminated from consideration.

Map Submittal #1 contains numerous serious flaws, any one of which should be enough to remove it as an option but taken together make it a non-starter.

- Most disruptive option: Map Submittal #1 is by far the most disruptive of all the maps under consideration. Since the target opening enrollment for Kaiser Rd K-5 is approximately 500, it is unavoidable that around 500 students will be required to change schools to relieve the overcrowding at Springville. Under this scenario however, a whopping 798 kids will be forced to change schools to achieve the same result. Forcing an additional 300 or so kids to change schools is unnecessary and unacceptable.
- Overcrowds Jacob Wismer: Jacob Wismer is currently at 94% of capacity, which according to BSD, is exactly within the desired range. Map Submittal #1 would add 89 students to Jacob Wismer, pushing them to 111% of capacity in the first year, with no significant reduction in subsequent years. This even pushes Jacob Wismer enrollment far beyond the capacity of the current portables. Alleviating overcrowding at Springville by overcrowding Jacob Wismer is nonsensical.
- No safe routes to school: An elementary school is much more than the place children go to attend classes. it is the center of their school community and the place kids go to play, socialize, and meet friends. If the Arbor View community were to be reassigned to Kaiser Rd K-5, kids would be forced to cross both Springville Rd. and Kaiser Rd. to get to the school, an unacceptably dangerous situation. Currently, Jacob Wismer is easily accessible from Arbor View using safe walking paths, and Jacob Wismer is closer in proximity than Kaiser Rd. K-5.
- Fails to keep neighborhood unity: Parents in the Pirate Park neighborhoods have been vocal in their desire to keep their neighborhood unity intact, but Map Submittal #1 actually divides the Pirate Park neighborhoods into three areas attending three different schools. Map Submittal #1 also fails to maintain unity for Arbor View, neighborhood, an original founding neighborhood for Jacob Wismer whose neighborhood identity is woven into the fabric of the Jacob Wismer community.
- No benefit for Arbor View Community: Families that currently attend Springville and stay at Springville after the boundary adjustment benefit from no longer attending an overcrowded school. Families that currently attend Springville, but move to Kaiser Rd. K-5 after the boundary adjustment also benefit from no longer attending an overcrowded school. Families that currently attend Jacob Wismer but move to Kaiser Rd. K-5 after the boundary adjustment do not derive any benefit because Jacob Wismer is not overcrowded, but will experience the negative disruption. It is unfair to include any families in this disruptive process who won't receive any benefit from the process.

In summary, this boundary adjustment process was initiated to relieve overcrowding at Springville Elementary through the opening of the new Kaiser Rd. K-5, and to open Kaiser Rd. with approximately 500 students. These goals can be accomplished with the smallest amount of disruption to the children by limiting the changes to the current Springville boundaries and leaving current Jacob Wismer boundaries as they are today.

Continuity of schools is a critical cornerstone to the academic success for all students. The Beaverton School District has a track record of grandfathering in students when a new school is opened to allow for minimal disruption for those students in their last year at their existing school. This standard practice has supported the district's commitment to student success.

It is imperative for 5th grade students to be grandfathered in at Springville K-8 for the fall of 2017 when the new Kaiser K-5 opens. Many of these students have been at Springville for 5 years since Kindergarten in the Expeditionary Learning (EL) environment. To not allow them the choice to stay at Springville will be a huge disruption for these students if they are forced to move schools in their last year of elementary school. Not only does it require a move in 5th grade but again in 6th grade when they enter middle school. It also takes away their priority status to opt into the Springville Middle School as they would have if they stay at Springville. This specific K-8 program is why many parents have bought homes in the Springville district. Middle school is a challenging transition and students need to be set up for success by entering middle school with stability and confidence.

The Springville Middle School also depends on having a high percentage of EL students opt into the program. This year's 7th grade class is the first class that went K-5 and opted into the middle school. They were the first group of kindergarteners to attend in 2009 when Springville opened. The Middle School has worked hard to become a credible and established program and by removing such a high percentage of 5th graders that have been invested in EL, not only is detrimental to the students but arguably also to the Springville Middle School itself.

There are unique characteristics about the EL style teaching including crew meetings, all school gatherings, character traits, leadership skills, field studies, hands on learning, and high quality expedition final projects. These students have been entrenched in this style of learning and to take them out of this in their last year of elementary school to transition to a STEAM school is not in the best interest of the students. Many of these students will likely be forced to apply through the general lottery system for the Middle School option programs. These students should not have the opportunity to stay in the EL environment stripped from them when they have been committed and invested in EL since they began their education.

The Beaverton School District is taking a conservative approach with the opening of the new high school by only opening with 9th and 10th graders as not to disrupt the education of 11th and 12th graders. We implore you to be consistent and reconsider the decision not to grandfather 5th graders into Springville during this boundary adjustment. It is in the best interest of our students and of great importance to their social, emotional and academic success.

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- 3. Does not split up the Pirate Park neighborhood. Power lines are NOT dividing lines, they are arteries that bind our community together.
- 4. Established neighborhoods, if changing schools, are moved as a whole.

Transportation Costs

- 1. Majority of current Springville routes will continue.
- 2. Transportation costs are similar to proposed Modified Scenario 3, and have the same number of bus routes. When walking paths in North Bethany are built out it is likely that bus routes and expenditures for Kaiser would decrease.

Student Body Composition

- 1. Maintains the Expeditionary Learning culture for communities who have been invested in Springville school the longest and those most likely to continue into the middle school program. Grandfathering of current 4th graders into the 5th grade at Springville should be considered a high priority so as to avoid the interruption of the EL program if they are moved to Kaiser.
- 2. The Pirate Park neighborhood and surrounding communities made up approximately 70% of the "heart of Springville" the original neighborhoods that Springville was built to house.

Staffing Patterns

- 1. Relieves significant burden on teaching and support staff at Springville
- 2. Boundary proposal allows Kaiser to open with projected enrollment that will support a full K-5 program.

Feeder Schools

- 1. Per district standard.
- 2. Sets up area for needing minor boundary changes if /when Kaiser overcrowds.

LONG TERM

- 1. We feel this scenario sets up North Bethany and ALL communities in the best possible situation for any future boundary changes.
- 2. Map submittal #3 would limit neighborhood adjustments in the future. Families with younger children are looking for a long-term solution and would like boundaries drawn so they are not once again asked to change schools as the North Bethany area grows. This is most concerning to the Pirate Park community which has been moved in every past boundary adjustments.
- 3. By stabilizing Jacob Wismer and Springville enrollment with established (non-expanding) neighborhoods, it allows BSD to make future enrollment adjustments with only one or two schools, instead of more. (For example, moving the "island" of approximately 100 students in the 185th neighborhood back to Rock Creek).
- 4. The Pirate Park neighborhood made up approximately 70% of the "heart of Springville" the original neighborhoods that Springville was built to house. Please don't displace them for vacant lots and neighborhoods that have only developed in the last year. These North Bethany neighborhoods should go to Kaiser, the school that is being built for them.

To whom it may concern,

I am writing to you in regards to the Beaverton Elementary School District Boundary Adjustment. My husband and I live in the Kaiser Woods area and have a 1st grader currently attending Jacob Wismer. We want to voice our opinions because we are greatly concerned by what we have seen while viewing the proposed boundary maps.

Map Submittal #1 is the most concerning to us. The proposal removes our neighborhood from Jacob Wismer, sending us to Kaiser Rd. Elementary, and brings in neighborhoods further to the west (S. Pirate Park). This will immediately put Jacob Wismer over capacity, which we believe goes against the general goal of keeping all schools involved from overcrowding. Jacob Wismer already has 2 portables on their grounds and does not appear to have any more portable room at this time. Also, common sense dictates that just by looking at the map, it does not seem logical to move a neighborhood so far away (Pirate Park) into the Jacob Wismer boundary lines. We understand there is need to relieve the numbers Kaiser Elementary has taken on, but we do not believe breaking up Jacob Wismer neighborhoods that are so close to the school is the solution (It is no more than an 8 min walk from our location). If our students south of Springville Rd. are sent to Kaiser Rd. Elementary and decide to walk, they would need to cross a very busy street without the aid of crossing guards. This does not sound like a safe option.

In addition, Map Submittal #1 was rejected by 5 out of 6 committee members at the meeting. People would have spoken out against this map option if it hadn't already been rejected...only to then have it brought back after the public comment was over at the meeting. This raises concerns that Map Submittal #1 has not been vetted through the outlined process and remains highly suspicious.

Finally, if Map Submittal #1 is chosen, Jacob Wismer will lose one of its oldest communities in its attendance boundary. The change will break up the community and the school will lose some of its strongest supporters.

The reason Kaiser Rd. Elementary was built was because of the growing need for another school and the boundary adjustment is meant to help with that, not burden other schools involved with overcrowding. Map Subbittal #1 is not a viable option and those of us in the Kaiser Woods area urge those involved to reconsider and remove it as an option.

My daughter is a 1st grader at Jacob Wismer. I have been attending boundary adjustment process meetings which have been very informative. It is a good learning experience for lot of parents like me who participated for the first time. We came to know more about warm bonds among students and parents of both springvile and Jacob wismer along the parents.

Overcrowding at springvile has been a long festering issue and something needs to be done about it. superintendent Rose and Beaverton school District met with Springville parents in 2014 and have gathered feedback from them. Based on brainstorming and further research superintendent Rose submitted a proposal to build a new elementary school in north Bethany area to relieve over crowding at Springvile K-8. Proposal was accepted and incorporated into a bond which was approved voters as well.

In the current boundary process meetings we have seen all permutations and combinations of proposals/maps from springville parents. These are the same parents and neighborhoods that (in 2014) wanted a new school built to relieve overcrowding in their beloved school but come 2016 they do not want to move? Was everybody thinking that somebody else will move?

I was living in Jacob wismer boundary in 2014 and we did not receive any intimation about the meeting held at springville in 2014 despite being in Jacob wismer boundaries. How come no one is outraged that a solution approved based on springville parents feedback is affecting Jacob wismer families?

Interestingly a few neighborhoods did want somebody else to move to new school so that they can replace the "others" in Jacob wismer. If a neighborhood can claim that they have attended Jacob wismer 5 years ago but were moved, would other neighborhoods that have been attending for the last 15 years have any lesser claim?

There were comments about how Jacob wismer committee members are 50% of the committee and offering suggestions. It is unfortunate that Jacob Wismer boundaries are being considered at this time, since there is not a pressing need to remove students. With all elementary school boundaries slated for reconsideration in several years, it makes much more sense to leave Jacob Wismer as is, until that time, otherwise an increased number of families and communities are facing repeated upheaval. Specifically proposed Map #1 would place a large group of Jacob Wismer families in the Kaiser Rd school that may end up moving to yet another school a few years later. In their place, the portion of the families that would be moved in that proposal from Springville to Jacob Wismer would increase the student population. Dear Elementary School Boundary Committee Members,

I have attended and spoken at the elementary school boundary adjustment meetings. I am deeply concerned about how things were handled at the last meeting.

The meeting began by reviewing all the maps. The merits of each map was discussed. Public comments began after few maps were taken out of further consideration.

I did not address my concerns about Submittal Map #1 because at the beginning of the meeting it was crossed off due to the greater burden on all communities, causing overcrowding at Jacob Wismer and does not maintain the highly desired neighborhood unity of the Pirate Park area.

After public comment was over, a Springville committee member- Sarah Beachy, requested that the map be returned to consideration, as she was the owner of drawing the map. After her request to turn the microphones off was denied, there was a discussion among the committee members on mic about the map. Again, committee members 5-6 voted not to move forward with the map and focus on the remaining maps. She then asked if she could still push the map forward and was told yes.

My concerns about Submittal Map #1:

- -It unnecessarily disrupts many neighborhoods. Pirate Park loses neighbor unity-they are divided into 3 different school boundaries. Over 480 students will have to transition under this plan. No other plan comes close to that number.
- -It causes immediate overcrowding at Jacob Wismer for the 2017 school year. The campus is not large enough to put anymore portables, which means library, technology and other spaces will have to be converted into classroom space. We are in the process of adjusting the boundary to alleviate overcrowding at Springville, not make it at another school.
- -The main argument in favor of the map is if and when the new Kaiser RD school becomes overcrowded the Pirate Park communities will be moved again, and this map is looking to the future to prevent the neighborhood from being moved- in fact that is not the case.

Future Planning:

This map does not look to the future. In the near future, all elementary school boundaries will be readjusted. This boundary adjustment was pushed up because of the crisis level of overcrowding at Springville and the new Kaiser school opening a year early. Findley is overcrowded. What makes logical sense is that the neighborhood next to Arbor Heights be moved to Jacob Wismer to give some relief to Findley and that children are not bused up a dangerous portion of Salzman Road. Future planning is the entire community of Pirate Park staying at the new Kaiser school and having the communities to the East of Kaiser Road move to the school to be built after 2022. If the uppermost portion of Jacob Wismer is moved to the new Kaiser school, when it overcrowds it will be moved again to the school to be built in 2022. It is an unnecessary relocation and is shortsighted.

The map called Modified Scenario 3 is the collaborative effort of many stakeholders over many meetings. Modified Scenario #3 opens the new school with a target enrollment, but also leaves room for future growth of walkable communities. It is not a perfect solution as the communities surrounding Pirate Park are separated by power lines and sent to different schools. It maybe the solution for the least disruption immediately and in the future, as it has a sustainable boundary that will not force communities up be uprooted again when the



Comment:

I would like to remind the committee that the reason for building Kaiser is to fix the overcrowding at Springville and to accommodate the students in the recent and projected development. From 2017-2019, it is projected that there will be an additional 670 students added to the elementary schools in this area. Springville was not over its permanent capacity until 2014. If you refer to the 2013-2014 school boundary map, you will see the streets and neighborhoods Springville was intended to serve.

I attended the meeting that held on November on November 17. Based on the information provided at the meeting, I recommend map submittal #3 for the following reasons:

- Map submittal #3 is the only map that keeps Springville and Wismer within their capacity for future years. Projections for Springville and Wismer are fairly accurate in this scenario as they are based on current established neighborhoods.
- Provides the best solution to fix the overcrowding at Springville. Springville will be closest to its permanent capacity causing it to rely less on portables in the future.
- Makes the most geographic sense and does not divide any neighborhoods.
- Returns Springville to the neighborhoods it was intended to serve based on the 2013-2014 elementary boundaries.
- Although Kaiser is projected to be overcapacity, these projections are less reliable as they are largely based on new development. Overcrowding may not be an issue for Kaiser.
- If Kaiser's projections become a reality, a new school would rectify the situation and would not require Springville or Kaiser to undergo another boundary change. The 1,010 students projected as Kaiser would be sufficient to support two schools.
- Although some of the students in the new development will lose the convenience of walking to school, the increased transportation costs are negligible.

In regards to other scenarios and maps, I have the following comments and concerns that advise against them as options.

Modified Scenario 3 - against

- Does not fix overcrowding at Springville. Springville continues to rely on portables indefinitely and they may not provide sufficient space. Portables are temporary solution to overcrowding in schools, but should not be part of the long-term plan.
- Divides the Pirate Park, part of the original Springville community.
- Displaced Pirate Park students and families are likely to be subject to a future boundary change if another elementary school is opened.

Modified Scenario 3 with an Island – strongly against

Same concerns as previously noted in Modified Scenario with the following observation:

- Springville will be overcapacity as this scenario has Springville's highest enrollment numbers.
- Portables will not provide sufficient space to handle the overcrowding.
- o How will the Beaverton School District accommodate the overflow? Will they displace the Springville 6-8 grade population again? Where will they go?

Map Submittal #1 – strongly against

- Exchanges overcrowding at Springville with overcrowding at Jacob Wismer.
- Jacob Wiser would immediately be overcapacity. How will BSD accommodate the overflow?
- Divides the Pirate Park neighborhood.
- Most disruptive to current students and families as all three schools would be impacted in 2017.

• Risk of all three schools being impacted by a future boundary change if a new school is built.

Map Submittal #2 -against

- Springville will continue to rely heavily on portables and they may not provide sufficient space in the future. Therefore it does not address one of the reasons for building the new school: fixing overcrowding at Springville.
- Displaces Pirate Park, the largest and longest standing community of Springville, in favor of newer developed areas.
- Risk of all three schools being impacted by a future boundary change if a new school is built.
- Shorted sighted as it does not easily lend itself to a future boundary change if another school is built.

Please note that the Abbey Creek neighborhood was very vocal in the last meeting. It's unclear as to how many students they have currently enrolled at Springville as the maps are all based on projected 2017 enrollments. Only their current students would be impacted by map submittal #3 which I suspect is less than 93. Although I heard a member of their neighborhood comment that they are part of the Arbor Oaks community, I have not heard anyone from Arbor Oaks make the same argument. The Abbey Creek neighborhood does not appear on the 2013-2014 school boundary maps. The development of their neighborhood has added to the recent overcrowding at Springville. They are a relatively young neighborhood and therefore it makes more sense for them to be a part of the new school. Kaiser is being built for them. This is an opportunity for them to develop their neighborhood and be a part of a new school with very little risk of being subject to a future boundary adjustment.

We should not displace the larger more established Pirate Park. Pirate Park is unified with mutual agreement as to our boundaries. Please do not value empty lots over older established communities. Pirate Park has been attending Springville since it opened. Springville was built for Pirate Park. Thank you.

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Proximity

- 1. Some walking areas remain at Springville.
- 2. Approximately half of Kaiser is projected to be walking zones when the neighborhoods are built out.

Safety

- 1. Trails and low traffic streets will eventually serve Kaiser.
- 2. Installation of a stoplight and crosswalk at the Springville Rd and Joss intersection would improve safety and enable safe routes to school for the Pirate Park neighborhood. Pirate Park students will never be able to have safe walking routes to Kaiser.

Neighborhood Unity

- 1. Least amount of disruption within ALL ESTABLISHED communities. Maintains unity of existing Jacob WIsmer neighborhoods and major neighborhoods that started Springville School in 2009.
- 2. This map will allow North Bethany homes, streets, sidewalks, trails, and parks time to develop into a community around Kaiser school, as our neighborhoods have developed communities around Jacob Wismer and Springville.
- 3. Does not split up the Pirate Park neighborhood. Power lines are NOT dividing lines, they are arteries that bind our community together.

Dear Superintendent Grotting, Beaverton School Board and Elementary Boundary Committee:

Continuity of schools is a critical cornerstone to the academic success for all students. The Beaverton School District has a track record of grandfathering in students when a new school is opened to allow for minimal disruption for those students in their last year at their existing school. This standard practice has supported the district's commitment to student success.

It is imperative for 5th grade students to be grandfathered in at Springville K-8 for the fall of 2017 when the new Kaiser K-5 opens. Many of these students have been at Springville for 5 years since Kindergarten in the Expeditionary Learning (EL) environment. To not allow them the choice to stay at Springville will be a huge disruption for these students if they are forced to move schools in their last year of elementary school. Not only does it require a move in 5th grade but again in 6th grade when they enter middle school. It also takes away their priority status to opt into the Springville Middle School as they would have if they stay at Springville. This specific K-8 program is why many parents have bought homes in the Springville district. Middle school is a challenging transition and students need to be set up for success by entering middle school with stability and confidence.

The Springville Middle School also depends on having a high percentage of EL students opt into the program. This year's 7th grade class is the first class that went K-5 and opted into the middle school. They were the first group of kindergarteners to attend in 2009 when Springville opened. The Middle School has worked hard to become a credible and established program and by removing such a high percentage of 5th graders that have been invested in EL, not only is detrimental to the students but arguably also to the Springville Middle School itself.

There are unique characteristics about the EL style teaching including crew meetings, all school gatherings, character traits, leadership skills, field studies, hands on learning, and high quality expedition final projects. These students have been entrenched in this style of learning and to take them out of this in their last year of elementary school to transition to a STEAM school is not in the best interest of the students. Many of these students will likely be forced to apply through the general lottery system for the Middle School option programs. These students should not have the opportunity to stay in the EL environment stripped from them when they have been committed and invested in EL since they began their education.

The Beaverton School District is taking a conservative approach with the opening of the new high school by only opening with 9th and 10th graders as not to disrupt the education of 11th and 12th graders. We implore you to be consistent and reconsider the decision not to grandfather 5th graders into Springville during this boundary adjustment. It is in the best interest of our students and of great importance to their social, emotional and academic success.

Thank you for listening to each of our perspectives and concerns with regard to the boundary adjustment process. What follows is a summary of my assessment based on considerable attention to the ongoing process and each of the maps presented for discussion:

Committee Modified Scenario 3 is the best choice:

- 1. It alleviates overcrowding at Springville, which is the foremost stated purpose of this boundary adjustment process.
- 2. It leaves room for growth at Kaiser and aligns growth areas with this school.
- 3. It leaves Jacob Wismer (JW) with 94% enrollment. Thus, enrollment at all 3 area schools is stabilized.
- 4. Keeps the Arbor View neighborhood (my community) within the boundaries of Springville and Kaiser, thereby allowing safe transportation to school via walking and biking paths built by THPRD.
- 5. Leaves Arbor View in JW boundaries, which is important to our community as a founding neighborhood of JW.
- 6. It unfortunately splits the pirate park neighborhood, but provides more room for growth at Kaiser (note that neighborhood unity can still be addressed by the reasonable alternatives of Map Submittals #2 and #3 without altering JW boundaries).

Map Submittal #1 should be taken out of consideration:

- 1. Given that the stated goal of this boundary adjustment process is to alleviate the overcrowding at Springville (at 119%) it is patently unclear why the district would consider an option that alleviates this crowding by immediately overcrowding Jacob Wismer (JW), pushing their enrollment to 111%. This is a false choice as it merely moves the overcrowding without actually solving the problem. JW is currently at 94% (which is considered near ideal capacity). This proposed move stands in complete violation of the district's criteria. The matter will only worsen as the West Park apartment complex would be brought into JW, which will attract a significant number of new families to the school. It is not at all clear how these new students would be incorporated into the school.
- 2. Is maximally disruptive, requiring the highest number of students to move schools. Indeed, an additional 298 students would be unnecessarily moved by this plan, in addition to the necessary 500 to open Kaiser. The counterargument is that it offsets potential future adjustment-related moves with the anticipation of continued future growth in the north Bethany area. However, future growth percentages are speculative numbers, at best, and do not take into consideration potentially changing economic conditions. It is also an artificial recovery of space, given that JW will be impossibly overcrowded.
- 3. Forces the Arbor View neighborhood, where I live, to cross the boundaries of Springville and Kaiser roads, taking away the potential for safe and easy travel to school via walking or biking, which have been recently facilitated by new THPRD pathways.
- 4. Removes Arbor View neighborhood from JW; this neighborhood was a founding community at JW and has the longest history with JW of

any neighborhood currently in attendance.

- 5. Was voted against by 5/6 committee members.
- 6. It was not fully vetted through public discussion, being introduced very late in the process and only after being voted against by the committee. The other families attending JW have not had adequate opportunity to be alerted to this important development in the boundary adjustment process, which has critically important implications for them in the name of severe overcrowding.
- 7. Does not maintain neighborhood unity, as it splits up the pirate park neighborhood.

Map Submittals #2 and #3 are also acceptable choices:

- 1. They offer a trade-off between neighborhood unity in the pirate park area, and growth potential at Kaiser (in comparison to Committee Modified Scenario 3).
- 2. There is no change to JW in these scenarios, which is desirable for the reasons identified above. The district should strive for minimal disruption of it's student body.

I am a concerned Arbor View Community parent who has sat on the bench and stayed at home with our children while my significant other has been tirelessly attending these important meetings from the very beginning. Now, as this process comes to an end, I feel it important to share my views, and I am glad that this forum is open to me. There is a team of people from my community who have constructively argued and contributed, like many others, to developing what is the best scenario/map on the table (modified #3) for the most number of communities.

I appreciate that this is by no means an easy task, and I don't envy all those decision-makers for what lies ahead.

However, I want this to be a fair process and ask that the decision not be made on which neighborhood sends in the most emails, or even has the loudest voice. The decision needs to be logical and in the best interests of the students' educational continuity, safety, and peer unity. In my opinion, Map #1 is not the right solution for several reasons:

- 1) This map was already rejected by 5 out of 6 committee members at a meeting early in the process. What has changed since this time? Surely the concerns that got this option rejected haven't gone away!?
- 2) The reopening of Map #1 as an option does not seem to have followed the appropriate procedures that were adhered to previously because the proposal has not been fully vetted through the process that was defined by BSD. People would have spoken out against this map at the meeting if the committee hadn't already rejected it before public comment. Allowing it back on the table after public comment was over at the meeting doesn't seem right.
- 3) It forces the most of number of students to switch schools versus only one school being impacted. The estimates show to be in the region of 480 students.
- 4) It places Jacob Wismer into an over-capacity situation. What is the plan for accommodating these students? More portables? I hope not...
- 5) An initial goal of this Boundary Adjustment was to relieve the overcrowding at Springville, not to burden other schools with the same problem.
- 6) This option doesn't keep neighborhood unity. It seems to me that Pirate Park would get split up and that seems like a terrible solution for the children and families living there.
- 7) Jacob Wismer loses the oldest community in its attendance boundary. Arbor View was a founding community at Jacob Wismer. There is a historical bond to Jacob Wismer that should remain untouched.
- 8) Arbor View now has a walking trail to Jacob Wismer that is being completed by THRPD. Many Arbor View/Jacob Wismer children and families leverage this method of travel to school. Forcing a large student body to take a school bus to the Kaiser Road school when a healthy alternative like walking or biking to Jacob Wismer is a legitimate option doesn't seem socially or environmentally responsible.

In closing, we all just want what's best for our own children. As I mentioned before, I get that this isn't easy, but we need to come together

I find it deeply disturbing that plans are being discussed to move our neighborhood from Jacob Wismer to the new school. Here are the reasons our neighborhood should stay with Jacob Wismer:

- >> Jacob Wismer is walking distance from our neighborhood through the Kaiser Woods trail. Or the kids can bike on the trail if they want. The walking distance is less than 1 mile on the trail.

The Beaverton School District has a track record of grandfathering in students when a new school is opened to allow for minimal disruption for those students in their last year at their existing school. This standard practice has supported the district's commitment to student success.

Hello, BSD Elementary Boundary Committee.

First and foremost, we want to thank you all so much for the work you have done so far on the committee. Your time and effort has been appreciated. However, we as a community do not feel that the current proposed scenario is satisfactory (Modified Scenario 3). This proposed scenario is short-sighted and does not take long-term issues or community unity into account. The BSD School Attendance Area policy itself states that "whenever possible, neighborhood areas, particularly at the elementary level, should be retained within a single attendance boundary." Even the Board Policy JC-Criteria provided on Nov 3, 2016 states that "established neighborhoods, if changing schools, are moved as a whole" is a priority. Modified Scenario 3 not only fails to do this, it fails to do this twice, by splitting two neighborhood communities - Pirate Park/Emerald Estates and Graf Street. In addition, we feel the constant shuffling of these neighborhoods needs to stop. We have been b ounced around from school to school every time a new one opens. Our children and our families need STABILITY and CONTINUITY.

Members of our community have come together to develop a solution that is long term for everyone, maintains continuity for established communities, and addresses future growth. We urge you to consider the plan we have outlined below. Where we are able, you will find maps attached to better illustrate our plan. Thank you.

- Members of the Pirate Park, Emerald Estates, Graf St, West Parc and Bethany Meadows Communities

Issues with Modified Scenario #3:

- (1) This scenario causes a major disruption to the Pirate Park neighborhood. It separates areas 91-18-41 that have strong ties to the Emerald Estates areas of 57-9. It also splits the Graf St. neighborhoods of 84-14 from 18-1. Communities in this area do not run north/south, but instead from east/west. From a transportation perspective, it also makes the Emerald Estates area (57-9) an "island" (separated from Springville) as there are no roads connecting this neighborhood to the northern Springville communities. The Pirate Park and Emerald Estates neighborhoods MUST be considered as a whole unit. Not only is moving one without the other illogical, but it also goes against the BSD School Attendance Area standards and the criteria set out by the Committee.
- (2) This is a not a feasible long-term solution for the Pirate Park (91-18-41) and surrounding neighborhoods. The neighborhoods proposed to move to Kaiser from this area are over 31% of Springville's current population. They have already been moved from Jacob Wismer when Springville was opened and are now being considered to move again to the new Kaiser school. What happens when Kaiser is overcrowded in 2-3 years as is predicted? When you consider the long-term effects of housing growth along with the location of BSD properties, these neighborhoods are destined to be moved again. Where will they be moved? The only logical options are either back to Springville or to Jacob Wismer - their only neighborhood school options. It does not make long-term sense to move this southern region north when long-term scenarios are considered. It would cause MAJOR disruption for the families in this area not once, but twice.
- (3) There are no safe walk routes from the Pirate Park area to the new Kaiser school, nor are there any planned. Granted there are no safe walk routes from the Pirate Park neighborhood to Springville right now, but the simple addition of a stoplight and crosswalk across Springville Rd. would create safe walk routes for nearly all of the current Springville neighborhoods via the Pirate Park THPRD trails.

Advantages to Modified Scenario #1:

(1) Projected numbers work out for all schools involved. Kaiser would open at 487 students - right on the 500 student target. Springville would be at 86% capacity with 682 students and Jacob Wismer would be unchanged with 708 students (95% capacity). Growth at Springville

would be stabilized to allow plenty of space for the special needs and middle school students to return. By absorbing a small region that is slated for MFA housing (area 0 near the proposed northern Springville boundary), Springville is also off-setting some to the growth that will occur within the new Kaiser school. Jacob Wismer's population is expected to decline over the next few years, thus allowing them to relieve Findley of overcrowding if necessary.

- (2) This Modified Scenario 1 keeps the majority of neighborhoods intact and promotes the neighborhood school concept significantly more than Modified Scenario #3. Jacob Wismer boundaries are left unchanged. The Pirate Park/Emerald Estates and the Graf St areas are kept together so that strong community neighborhoods are not split. In addition, Modified Scenario #3 seeks to move 45% of Springville's current population while our Modified Scenario #1 brings this number down to 31%, causing less disruption to the current communities while still reaching target numbers.
- (3) The Pirate Park community helped to open Springville. They have been a part of the EL learning community for the longest amount of time and have been the most invested in the process. Moving this area to a new learning environment only to move them back in a few years is majorly disruptive and should be avoided.
- (4) With this scenario, the stability of Springville and Jacob Wismer would be greatly improved as most of the areas contained within them are already built-out. This would be very beneficial in minimizing boundary adjustments in the future when Kaiser overcrowds. With the majority of housing growth to the north, it makes sense for the boundaries to be drawn to the north so that there is minimal disruption to students and schools when the boundaries need to be redrawn. In addition, if the housing growth of the North Bethany area slows, this scenario could make the addition of another new BSD school unnecessary as Kaiser should be able to house the predicted students within its determined capacity.
- (5) Although the northern Springville regions of 72-9-93 are currently able to walk to Springville and would have to be bussed to Kaiser, the proximity of this area rather than Pirate Park is more inline with the neighborhood school concept for Kaiser (a priority of the BSD). Admittedly, there may be an additional transportation cost, but with the area being developed and safe trails planned, the path from this area to Kaiser will be a safe walk route within a year or two. Bus transportation would be able to be dropped when the trails are completed. Additionally, with our proposed consolidation of the Springville area, bus service to outlying neighborhoods within the current boundary (the areas off 185th and to some extent the Bethany Meadows and West Parc neighborhoods 60-41-12) could be diminished. Therefore, adding temporary bus service to the northern Springville area may not represent a significantly increased cost.
- (6) In addition, in the long-term scenario of Kaiser overcrowding and the new BSD school being built, this Modified Scenario 1 makes boundary changes easy and minor -- by simply incorporating the northern Jacob Wismer areas (61-55-74-15) that are already slated to attend Westview high school into the new BSD school's boundary. Therefore, this long-term plan supports a continuous and stable elementary-to-high-school feeder system for all involved schools. The issue of Springville Rd. being a barrier should not be a factor since all students will be bused to Kaiser regardless, as there are no safe walk routes along Kaiser Rd. at this time.

Other concerns to consider:

- (A) A stoplight needs to be added to the Springville Rd and Joss Ave intersection. Not only does this area have high traffic, but it is also very dangerous. A crosswalk would allow students to walk safely from the 18 neighborhood across the street as well as all of the proposed Springville neighborhoods below Springville Rd. There is a great trail system surrounding Pirate Park that makes walking even from Bethany Blvd to Springville feasible if there is a stoplight and crosswalk across Springville Rd.
- (B) We ask that the Superintendent and Board members visit our neighborhoods to see how they are aligned before making any boundary decisions based on maps alone. We would love to have them join a small group of us to walk the trails and see the areas and communities that they are considering splitting up before final decisions are made.
- (C) Please take a long term and sustainable look at Bethany's long-term Community Plan. We looked at many documents from Washington County, including the North Bethany Subarea Plan and maps. We have also talked with Nicole Paulsen, the Design and Develop coordinator for THPRD, and considered BSD's commitment to the Safe Routes to School program. We came to know more about warm bonds among students and parents of both springvile and Jacob wismer along the parents. Overcrowding at springvile has been a long festering issue and something needs to be done about it. superintendent Rose and Beaverton school District met with Springville parents in 2014 and have gathered feedback from them. Based on brainstorming and further research superintendent Rose submitted a proposal to build a new elementary school in north Bethany area to relieve over crowding at Springville K-8. Proposal was accepted and incorporated into a bond which was approved by voters as well.

I was living in Jacob wismer boundary in 2014 and we did not receive any intimation about the meeting held at springville in 2014. How come no one is worrried that a solution approved based on springville parents feedback is affecting Jacob wismer families?

In the current boundary process meetings we have seen all permutations and combinations of proposals/maps from springville parents. These are the same parents and neighborhoods that (in 2014) wanted a new school built to relieve overcrowding in their beloved school but come 2016 they do not want to move? - 1) Why and in what way is it more logical to send elementary students from areas (60, 12, 91, 41 and 18) Which totals 222 students to Kaiser which is 1.5 miles away and not to the closest neighborhood school 0.5 miles away which is to Jacob wismer?
- 2) Area (61, 55 and 74) which totals 190 children in that particular order are closer to Kaiser than the above children but are very vocal about wanting to stay in Jacob wismer so the committee chooses to just never touch Jacob Wismers boundaries. Before you read on in my email, I would like to express that I do not have children that will be affected by this decision. However I am in the community where my neighbors will be affected.

I would like to urge you to reconsider moving the pirate park community to the Kaiser school. I was a part of the last boundary change from Jacob was moved to Springville K-8. Previously to that our neighborhood was moved from Bethany to Jacob Wismer. I am concerned with the lack of continuity that Beaverton places as priority for our neighborhood.

It seems counterintuitive that an established community at Springville would move to a brand-new school, when a new development and growth of the new communities north of the urban growth boundary are adding the population to require a new school. Furthermore a large premise of an EL school is community. This is a standard at Springville and the school songs, character traits, all school gatherings, and expeditions have been threaded through each and every year with our students. I do not understand why the communities north of Springville are slated to stay at Springville yet our community which is MUCH further away from Kaiser, is being moved to a new school.

Furthermore, I feel that a strong community at a school create stability and safety within that school. Having teachers who have seen students grow up and understand who they've been from kindergarten through fifth grade and on creates a stronger sense of community. I believe that cutting the school boundaries and schools apart actually is detrimental to our society. Why not leave an
