Riding at Stonar

Equestrianism has a long history at Stonar and it is believed to be the oldest equestrian school in the UK. The School acquired its first pony, Tufty, in 1923 for the recreational enjoyment of the pupils. Riding lessons began 10 years later when the School recruited its first riding instructor, Miss Hilda Wakeman. Since that time, the School has led the development of educational riding programmes to give it an unequalled position in the UK.

The equestrian facilities are at the heart of the School and include a 20m x 40m indoor arena, floodlit Olympic-sized outdoor arena, grass show jumping arena, stabling for 62 horses, a hacking track, turn out paddocks, horse walker and an Olympic designed cross country course with a variety of different fences.

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The Equestrian Centre's ethos is based around a holistic approach to equestrianism, where 'hands-on' experience is essential. Developing the skills required to care for horses to a higher standard not only helps to develop the horse and rider bond, but also provides pupils with a deeper understanding of the horse and its psyche. This produces riders who have a connection with their horse and can therefore train and develop the horse independently, and lead by example.



The School has a stable of 30 of its own ponies and horses, with a number available to loan for Senior pupils. Alternatively pupils may bring their own horse to school. Livery is available for pupils from Year 5 and day pupils may also arrange to use their own horse for lessons.

Riding Programmes

The riding programmes at Stonar have been developed and enhanced over the years to suit complete beginners through to advanced competition riders.

Expert Coaches Working with the Individual

A coaching system underpinned by strong fundamental techniques provides mentoring for young riders and individual development plans for more advanced riders, enhanced with regular clinics delivered by specialists.

Riding lessons will be arranged according to the School's fortnightly academic timetable and are typically held at lunchtimes, during PE lessons, in study periods (for Sixth Formers) and after school.

Prep School Riding Lessons

- Pupils may opt for one or two group lessons per week.
- A weekly Pony Club is available as part of the Stonar Clubs offering.
- Private lessons may be arranged for Saturday mornings, subject to availability.

Senior School Riding Programmes

- Group Lessons for four to six pupils of a similar standard and age.
- Half hour private lessons with the Director of Riding, Senior Coaches or Junior Coaches.
- Ideal for those wishing to take British Horse Society exams.
- Bespoke Package (Year 7 UVI) Three private lessons per week with a Senior Coach.
- **BHS Professional Pathway Course (Sixth Form)**
- Programme who would like to take BHS Pathway exams.
- A weekly **Pony Club** is available as part of the Stonar Clubs offering.

In addition, the Equestrian Centre regularly organises for external specialist coaches to offer clinics and lessons to pupils across a variety of equestrian disciplines.

Weekly Stonar Accumulator

Dressage and show jumping competitions are held every Wednesday evening throughout the School year for all Senior School riders of appropriate ability. It is open to those with their own horse or loaning a suitable School horse, in addition pupils without their own horse may request a School horse, subject to availability. Points are awarded to the top six riders in each event. At the end of the School year, a trophy is awarded to the horse and rider combination with the highest accumulated points in each discipline. The Stonar Accumulator gives a sense of achievement but also introduces riders to the rigours of competition.

Evening Dressage And Show Jumping At West Wiltshire Equestrian Centre

We are fortunate to have the West Wiltshire Equestrian Centre only 15 minutes from Stonar providing regular opportunities to compete in dressage and show jumping, typically on Tuesday evenings. Riders with their own horse on livery, or a Stonar loan horse, can join these trips, based on a competence assessment in both their riding lessons and in the Accumulator competitions.

A member of the coaching team accompanies the horses and pupils to support them with warming up and course walking, as well as debriefing after the competition.



The Stonar Riding Academy supports our most adept riders with a more dynamic competition experience and access to the highest levels of coaching expertise. Members of the Academy come under the direction of a dedicated Academy Coach who provides training sessions throughout the term and supports pupils at team competitions.

Teams are selected from our Academy to compete regularly in NSEA (National Schools Equestrian Association), British Show Jumping Just for Schools and British Dressage Team Quest and My Quest competitions.

Membership to the Academy is by invitation from the Director of Riding based on the following criteria:

- continuing participation in riding lessons and contributing to the equestrian community at Stonar;
- achievement of 3 top-five placings in any NSEA competitions within the current or preceding year;
- competing in BE 80 classes or above (for riders in Year 8 or below consideration will be given to equivalent level in unaffiliated or Pony Club competition);
- Intro/Preliminary will be considered);
- competing in BS British Novice classes or above;
- school teams.

Pony Club

Stonar is an official Pony Club Centre and membership is encouraged and offered through the School. Stonar riders who are members of the Pony Club have access to the fantastic benefits of structured learning in a fun and supportive environment, with the opportunity to progress through the Pony Club testing system.

The tests enable pupils to learn progressively about horse and pony care and riding. External examiners will attend on testing days to assess Stonar riders.





British Horse Society (BHS)

The BHS Career Pathway offers pupils the opportunity to progress their career with horses and learn practical, real-world skills within a structured platform.

At Stonar pupils work towards their BHS assessments alongside their academic studies. The Equestrian Centre is an approved training centre and holds assessments throughout the school year.

The exams are very hands-on and practical, and while a large amount of theory must be covered and learned, these qualifications are all about being able to care for the horse efficiently and competently following correct techniques and with a strong awareness of safety of self, the horse and others.

Ride Safe Assessment can be taken from the age of 11 years

Stage 1 from 13 yearsStage 2 from 14 yearsStage 3 from 16 years

Pupils work towards both riding and care sections in Stages 1 to 3.

BTEC Equine Management

Stonar offers Sixth Form students a Level 3 qualification in Equine Management.

This may be the course for you if:

- you are interested in following a career in providing care and management for horses;
- you are interested in developing specialist experience in managing and riding horses;
- you want the opportunity to develop your riding skills on the flat and over fences;
- you want to gain the academic skills and practical experience needed for a management role.



FAQs

What is the youngest age a pupil can ride?

Pupils from Reception class and older can take part in weekly Group lessons, which help them to learn basic skills with a sense of confidence, including walking and trotting.

How do I book lessons?

A rider registration form must be completed and returned to the Equestrian Centre. When pupils first join Stonar they will receive a riding assessment with one of the coaches, following which they are allocated a suitable riding lesson which fits in both the School timetable and the riding timetable.

What happens if a pupil is unable to attend a riding lesson?

If, for any reason, pupils are not able to attend a riding lesson the Equestrian Centre should be notified in advance. We are only able to make up a missed lesson if pupils are representing the School at a sports or other fixture, or if pupils are on a compulsory School trip or taking an exam.

Do pupils always ride the same horse?

The initial riding assessment will help the coaches to decide on the most suitable horse for a rider's capabilities, age, height and weight. Pupils may ride different horses to build up their skills and experience.

How many lessons should I book a week?

This will depend not only on age, but also on a rider's own goals. The rider registration form and Equestrian Centre fee sheet details the programmes and associated costs. Riders with their own horse on livery will typically arrange two to three lessons a week, in addition to free riding after school or on a Saturday. All Stonar horses will have one day off at the weekend. Pupils with livery can decide when to give their horse a day off.

When can I free ride?

Loaners and liveries have the opportunity to ride in their free time after school (between 4.05pm and 6.00pm) and during yard opening times at weekends. Hacking is permitted around the School site, in groups of two or three (weather conditions and daylight permitting). Jumping is not permitted unless you are riding in a lesson, or taking part in the Stonar Accumulator but for liveries there is the opportunity to join a supervised jumping session at the weekend if pupils wish to jump outside of their lesson times, usually made available on a Sunday.

Do you offer turn out?

We believe in the importance of turning horses out and allowing them time to 'be a horse'. However, this can be subject to change and restrictions due to weather, ground conditions, pasture/field management preparation.

How does loaning work?

Pupils may apply for a loan horse and will have a riding assessment during the first week of term, following which pupils are allocated a horse if there is a suitable horse available at the time. Once allocated, pupils are then responsible for the complete care of the horse or pony during term time. Pupils must muck out etc. in the mornings and evening, they can ride daily, enter the weekly Accumulator competition and join clinics. If the rider and horse are of a suitable standard they can compete at West Wilts fortnightly on Tuesday evenings.

Do you offer livery in the holidays?

We have a limited number of spaces available for liveries to stay at Stonar during half-term and priority is given to pupils based overseas. We are not able of offer holiday livery for Christmas, Easter and Summer Holidays.
