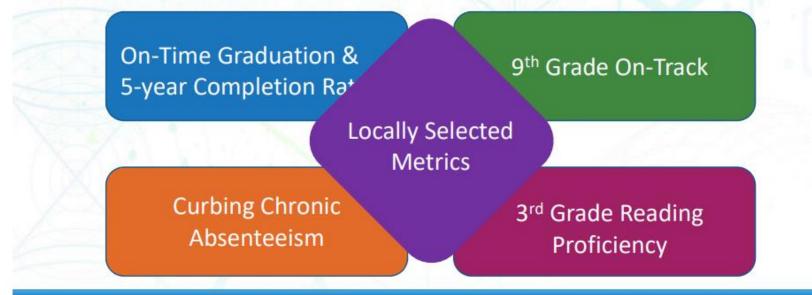


Student Success Act – SB 3427

Accountable to Improving Outcomes

There are two stated purposes for SSA funds:

- 1. Meet students' mental or behavioral health needs, and
- Increase academic achievement for all students and reduce disparities for: Students of color; students with disabilities; emerging bilingual students; and students navigating poverty, homelessness, and foster care; and other students that have historically experienced disparities in our schools.





Student Success Act (SSA) ODE Implementation Values



Equity

Education equity is the equitable implementation of policy, practices, procedures, and legislation *that translates into* resource allocation, education rigor, and opportunities for historically and currently marginalized youth, students, and families including civil rights protected classes.

This means the dismantling and restructuring of systems and institutions that create a dichotomy of beneficiaries over oppressed & marginalized peoples.

Hispanic & Non-Hispanic Student Growth in Reading and Math



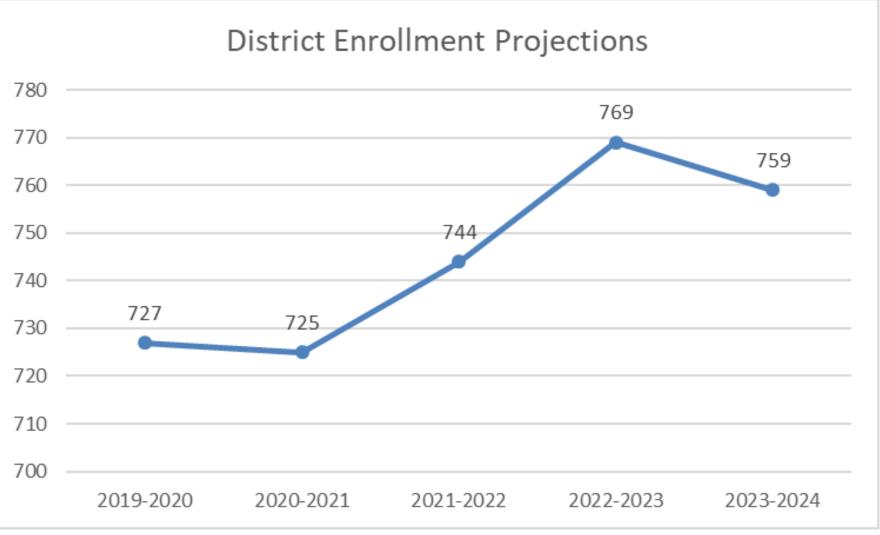
Continuous Improvement Plan (CIP)

- Goal 3: Establish sustainable systems for regularly reviewing data to support the district improvement process.



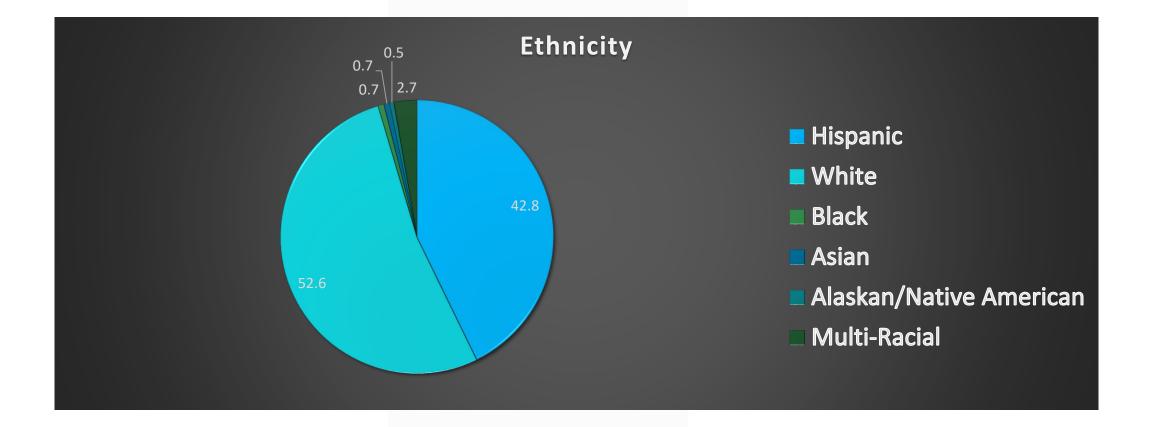
District Enrollment Trends

- Projections assume incoming Kindergarten classes of 60.



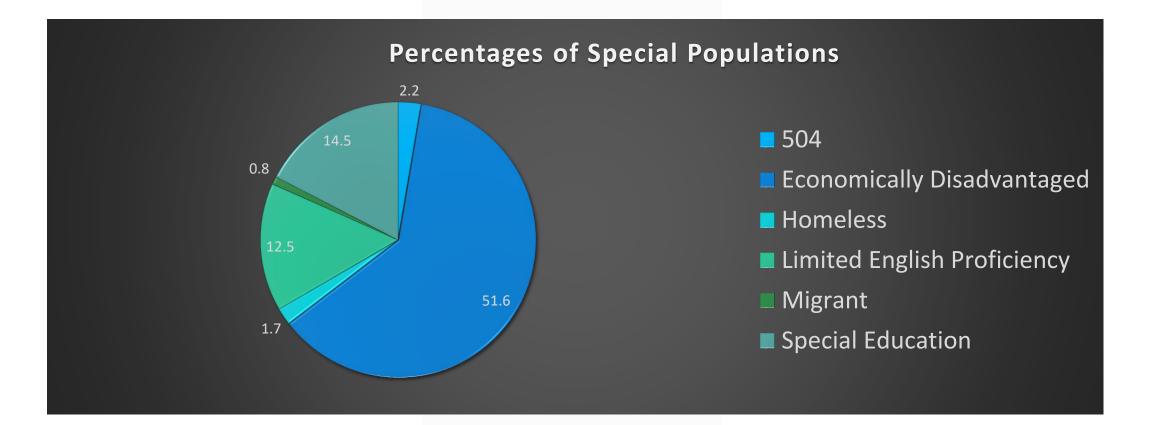

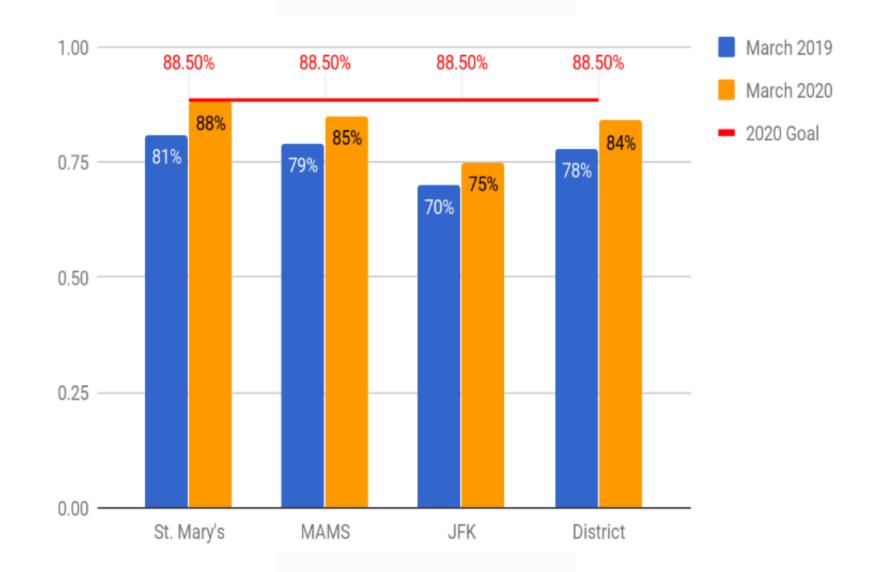

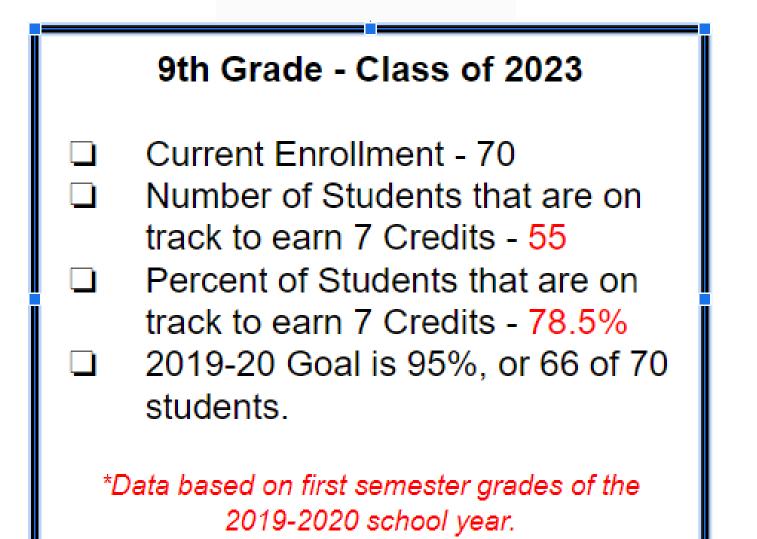

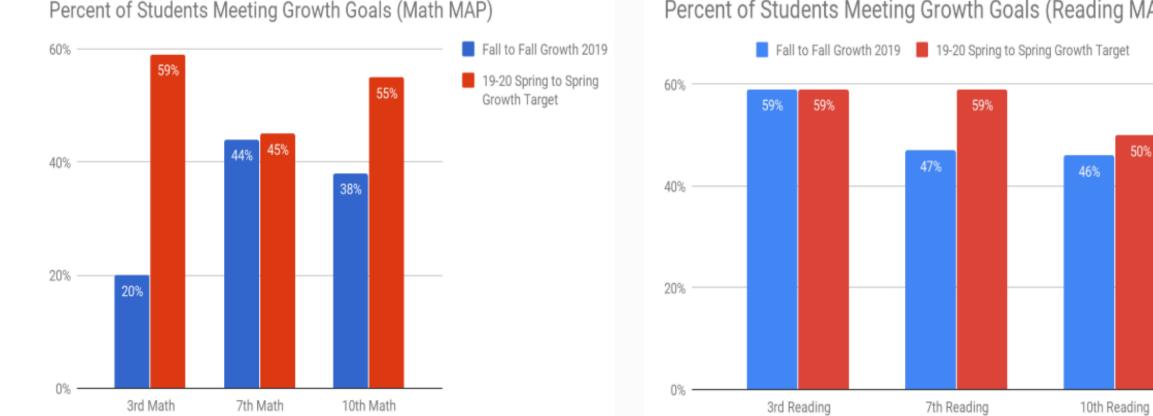
District Strategic Plan Indicator #3 – All 9th graders earn 7.0 credits.

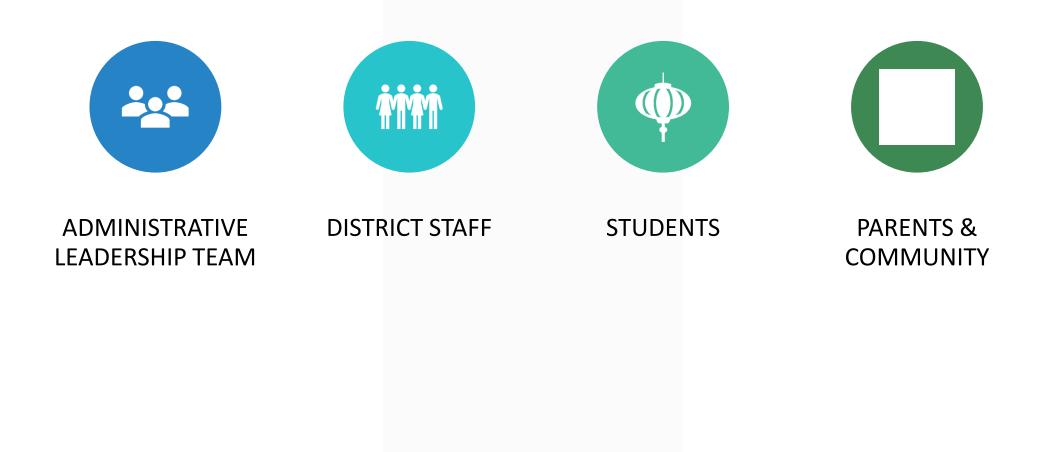

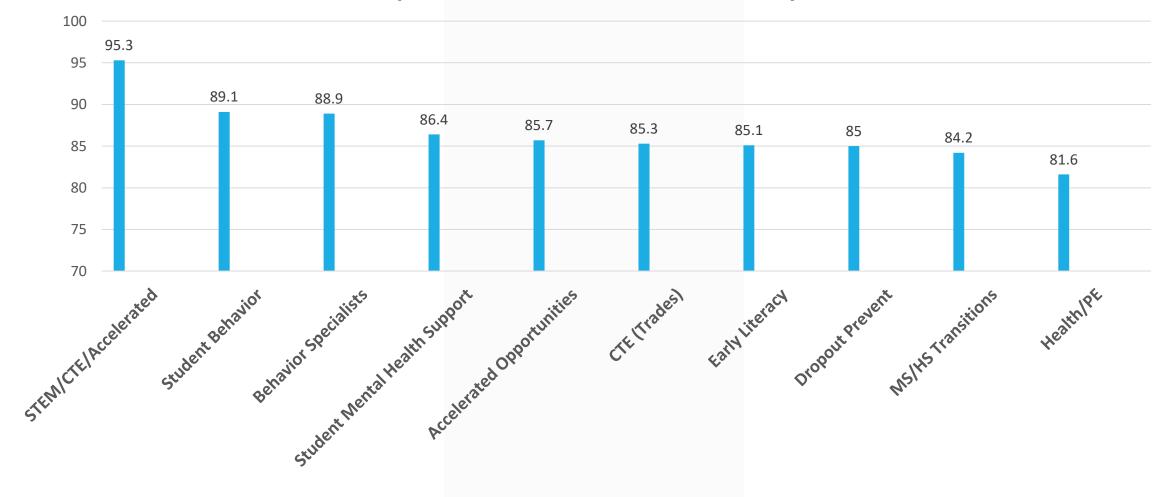

SIA Allowable Activities



Reducing Class Size

- Use evidence-based criteria to ensure appropriate student-teacher ratios or staff caseloads;
 - This may include increasing the use of instructional assistants.

Instructional Time



- More hours and/or days.
- Summer programs; before or after school programs.
- Technological investments that minimize class time used for assessments administered to students.



Health & Safety

 Social and emotional learning, trauma-informed practices; student mental and behavioral health.

Well-Rounded Education

 Developmentally appropriate and culturally responsive early literacy practices and programs in pre-K through third grade.



- Culturally responsive programs and practices in grades 6-8, including learning, counseling and student support that is connected to colleges and careers.
- Broadened curricular options at all grade levels including: Art, Music, PE, STEM, CTE, engaging electives, accelerated, dual credit, IB, AP, Life Skills, TAG, dropout and prevention programs, and transition supports.
- Access to licensed educators with a library media endorsement.



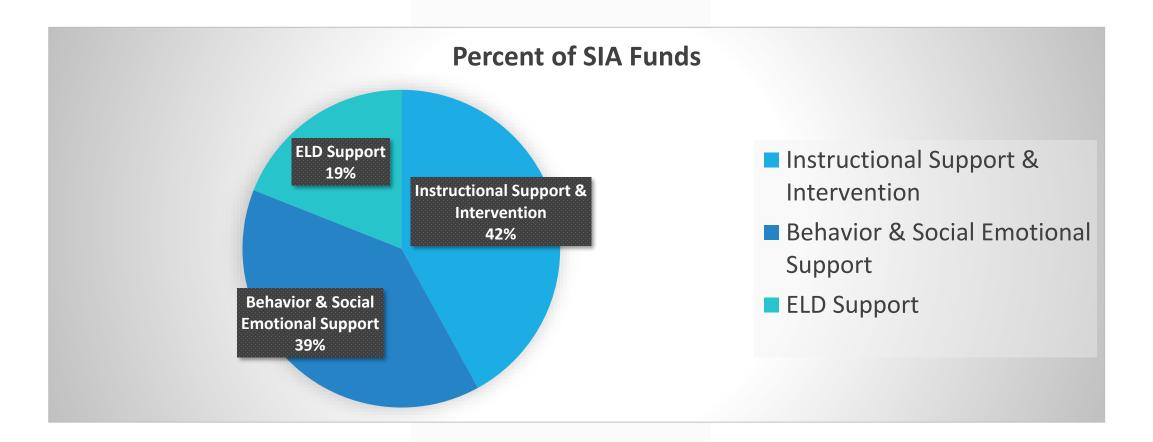

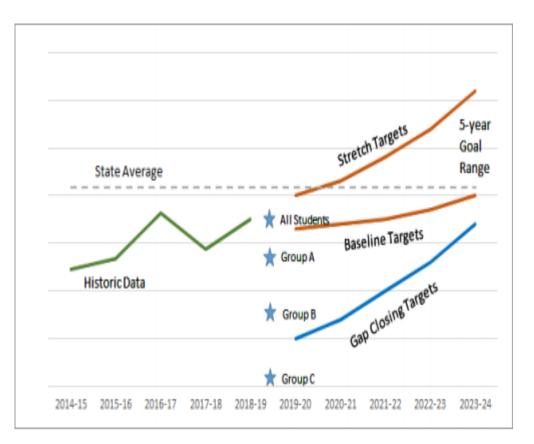
