Ben Brannon is different. At the ripe old age of 21, he leads a life filled with compassion for others, compassion that is expressed through service.

Last year, every Friday after school, he volunteered for FISH food bank, "rescuing" boxes of unused food from Ida Namost peoples. This, his mother explained, makes expressive language difficult for him.

Brannon says it can be "hard to think", and says that "autism can be really exhausting sometimes."

Connecting with others, aside from his family he says, is difficult.

Here, I want to interject my own voice a bit more than may

son Aronica Elementary and bringing it back to the food bank.

The year before that, he worked as a volunteer at FISH's Picnic In The Park program, riding in vans and distributing food.

His mother, Nancy Brannon, recalls his time in

a kayaking camp when he was fifteen and living in Texas. After every excursion, he'd come back with a vessel full of litter he'd fished out of the Austin waterways.

All this, and more, sets him apart from most people his age.

Ben also has autism

He describes himself as being "built differently", and says his brain works in a fundamentally different way than

be journalistically sound: Ben is not a child, and is no less intelligent than any other 21 year old.

People with Autism are often infantilized in popular discourse as people with 'the mind of a child', or ' grown up children.' This is not the case. Infantilizing Autism by Jennifer L. Stevenson, Bev Harp, and Morton Ann Gernsbacher says: in arenas ranging from employment discrimination to forced sterilizations."

In conversation, he may take a while to respond. However, when he does speak, it is with economy, and demonstrates his humility and intelligence. And, his ac-

tions speak this a

hundred times over, louder and louder.

Per the Individuals With Disabilities Education Act, Brannon can stay in High School up to the year he turns 21 (this year). He spends time in math teacher Garret Harris' class.

Together, Brannon and Harris came up with the idea for a "Bulldog Pantry".

When asked where he has set these boxes up, Brannon said:

"Um... probably at the pet store... I'm trying to name names, but I just couldn't remember."

Mrs. Brannon jumped in, reminding him of a box at D&M Coffee.

"Oh yeah!"

Brannon said he "absolutely" has a box at the Early Bird cafe.

In addition to D&M Coffee, Early Bird, and the Pet Store on Pearl Street, Brannon has (or has had) boxes at Cornerstone Pie, Rossow's U-Tote-Em, the Methodist Church, and the Elmview Community Support Center.

When asked what challenges he's faced with his clothing drive work, Brannon explained that he has trouble with repetitive work.

"I gotta be honest... Well, there is this one thing. I had

prefers hands-on activities."

This energy is channeled into an obligation that he feels to help people, saying slyly:

"For one, I would like to just sit home and do my stuff, play my video games, but I don't know. I should probably do something with my life."

He has collected 283 pairs of socks in a sock drive, and 4,500 total servings of food. All of which were donated to the cold weather shelter. He is currently planning a food pantry at the High School, also under the name Bulldog Pantry.

Brannon plans to place a basket in the counseling office, and to keep it stocked with snack foods. If someone is hungry during the day, they can stop in and grab something. Then, they are encouraged to stock the pantry with food when they get a chance.

Ben Brannon is doing something with his life, something great, already. It's his world, we're just living in it.




