

### What is kindergarten prep?

Kindergarten Prep is a differentiated program that is designed to help the Kindergarten-aged child transition into a routine of everyday, all-day school.

Kindergarten Prep will provide a supportive environment for your child and will focus on social and emotional development, physical and motor development, as well as academic skills needed to prepare your child for kindergarten. Research suggests that children greatly benefit from programs that address school readiness. The children are nurtured emotionally, socially, and academically to achieve their potential and feel valued as learners. A combination of small group instruction and whole group activities allows the children to develop as cooperative learners. The Kindergarten Prep experience fosters a safe learning environment and fuels the children's natural curiosity and desire to learn.

### Ag in Action

Two sections of Wildlife and Fisheries are being offered during 1st block as half block classes. The students are learning about the importance of fish and wildlife management, comparing life patterns of fish and wildlife, identifying economic and social issues related to fish and wildlife as well as careers in wildlife and fisheries. The 19 students enrolled in 1A and the 10 students in 1B started the semester going over the basics of archery and had the opportunity to shoot bows. They are now going over the fish unit helping them become aware of the fishing regulations, fish identification and the different types of fishing techniques. They will have the opportunity to construct wood duck nest boxes before going over identification of various wildlife mammals and birds. The students will go on a field trip to the Outdoor Campus in Sioux Falls to try ice fishing and then stop at Archer's Addiction to shoot bows.

The sixteen students enrolled in Fundamental Ag Mechanics during 2nd block have had the ability to apply the skills learned in hydraulics unit when they constructed a hydraulic device using syringes. The students are now going over the lesson related to electricity and will have an opportunity to wire various types of electrical circuits. Other units covered in this class will include plumbing, concrete and metals. This full block class will last only for the 3rd quarter and the 4th quarter class will be Ag Systems Technology, where students will apply principles of operation, service and maintenance to mechanical equipment.

During 3rd block, 12 students are enrolled in Introduction to Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources. Those students have explored the role of the FFA organization in Agriculture Education. They will summarize basic principles involved in agricultural systems technology and will have the opportunity to learn about shop tools and shop safety, project design and construct a small wood project. Other areas covered this semester will include defining and discussing the concepts of natural resources, demonstrating an understanding of animal science systems, demonstrating an understanding of plant structure and function, relate basic food science technology principles to production agriculture and summarize basic food science technology,

One part of the FFA mission statement FFA makes

a positive difference in the lives of students by developing their potential for premier leadership, personal growth and career success through agricultural education includes developing leadership. The District 7 Leadership Development Events were held at Hartford on Nov. 22 with 6 Dells members participating. In the creed speaking event Alex Roelfsma placed 10th. In the Employment Skills event, Katie Scherff placed 4th and Cami Wolles placed 10th. In the Ag Broadcasting event, Katie Scherff placed 1st to advance to the state event and Audrey Cox placed 6th. Karlie TenEyck gave her prepared public speech and placed 3rd advancing her to the state event. Sadie Becker participated in the extemporaneous speaking event and placed 5th. The State Leadership event was held in Pierre on Dec. 4 & 5 where Katie Scherff placed 2nd in the Ag Broadcasting event and Karlie TenEyck placed 17th with her prepared public speech.

For the final meeting of 2022, the members met at Great Shots on Sunday, Dec. 18 for an hour of golf. A service project the chapter has done for a number of years is to sponsor a 3-point hoop shoot. The chapter held two hoop shoots with the money brought in on Jan 14 being matched by the chapter for a total donation to Cystic Fibrosis of \$292 and the money brought in on Jan. 21 was matched for a total donation to Multiple Sclerosis of \$328.

Sawyer Geraets and Cooper Hauglid participated in the livestock judging event held in conjunction with the Sioux Falls Winter Farm Show on Jan. 29. They had three classes of beef, 2 classes of swine, two classes of goats and 1 class of sheep to rank from best to worst in addition to two sets of questions related to a beef class and a goat class.

In the FFA, scholarships are available for senior members including 26 different scholarships varying in amounts for members who plan to attend a University or Technical Institute. A \$1,000 scholarship

is available for a member planning on majoring in Agriculture Education with these applications due Feb. 25. Younger members can apply for the six \$1,000 scholarships to attend the Washington Leadership Conference held during the summer with the application



deadline also Feb. 25.

The National FFA Week will be celebrated from Feb. 18-25. This FFA Week embraces more than 90 years of FFA traditions while looking forward to the organization's future. Designated a national week in 1947, the week of George Washington's birthday, National FFA Week runs from Saturday to Saturday and gives FFA members an opportunity to educate the public about agriculture. During the week, the chapter will conduct a variety of activities to help others in the school and community learn about FFA and agricultural education. Today's FFA members are the innovators and leaders of tomorrow. Through agricultural and hands-on learning, they are preparing for over 300 unique career opportunities in the food, fiber and natural resources industry.

In March and April, the Career Development Events take place in preparation for the State FFA Convention. There are 15 different areas that members can develop their skills in that can eventually lead to career success. The areas include: Ag Business Management; Ag Mechanics; Agronomy; Dairy Cattle Evaluation; Floriculture; Food Science; Horse Evaluation; Livestock Evaluation; Meats Evaluation; Milk Quality and Products; Natural Resources; Nursery/Landscape; Poultry Evaluation; Range Plant Identification; and Veterinary Science. The competitions will be: March 20 at Lennox, March 23 at Flandreau, March 27 at Tri-Valley, March 31 at Little I in Brookings and April 3 at Howard. The State FFA Convention will be held in Brookings on April 16, 17 & 18. The top placing team

in each event will advance onto the national event next fall during the National FFA Convention.

To recognize the members on their achievements from the year, the FFA will be holding the FFA Parent/ Member Banquet on Sunday, May 7 in the Middle School Commons at 6:30 pm.

The summer also has opportunities for members to develop their leadership skills by attending one of the State FFA Leadership Retreats. One retreat will be held at Swan Lake near Viborg on June 20-23 and the other retreat will be held at Storm Mountain near Rapid City on July 11-14. By attending one of these retreats, FFA members will develop and enhance their leadership skills and self-confidence through interactive learning. There will be workshops that help members discover the value of servant leadership, character, attitude, a focused vision, communication, trust, and responsibility. The Washington Leadership Conference is once again being held in our nation's capital. This conference is held seven weeks throughout the summer for FFA members to become engaged citizens who can make a measurable positive difference in their communities. FFA offers a wide variety of areas for students to gain knowledge and skills that they can utilize in their future. ### CHILD FIND

The Dell Rapids School District recognizes its responsibility to provide a free and appropriate public education to eligible students with disabilities within its geographical boundaries. The District has a "child find" process that is designed to locate, identify and evaluate children with disabilities residing within its geographical boundaries preschool through grade 12 or through age 21 if they have not received a high school diploma.

If you know a child who lives within the boundaries of the Dell Rapids School District who may be in the need of special education and/or related services, please contact the District's Office of Special Education by calling 605.428.5473 x346 for further information regarding the referral and evaluation process.

If the student is school-aged and attends a non-public private school that is not located within the geographical boundaries of the School District, the student may need to be referred to the school district in which the non-public school is located in order to receive an evaluation.

The District's Child Find responsibility extends to students with physical or mental impairments that substantially limit a major life activity. Such students may be eligible for services or accommodations pursuant to Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act. Section 504 is a Federal civil rights statute that prohibits discrimination against persons with disabilities and programs receiving Federal financial assistance. Please contact the District's Office of Special Education at 605.428.5473 x346 for more information regarding Section 504 eligibility and services.

The Dell Rapids School District also can screen and evaluate students aged 3-5 that live within the district boundaries. If you are concerned about your child's current level of development in the areas of personal-social, fine and gross motor, cognitive, and communication skills, we encourage you to contact the District's Office of Special Education by calling 605.428.5473 x346 to discuss your concerns and schedule a screening and potential evaluation.

For more general developmental checks the district Dell Rapids School District offers a FREE developmental screening for children ages 3 through age 5 that live within the school district boundaries that we typically schedule in the Fall. Check the District website or see the flyers posted in the community in the Fall (typically October)
