### YES Prep Academic Policies

#### **Graduation Requirements**

YES Prep commits to preparing each student for success in college or university coursework. Therefore, in addition to the State of Texas diploma, to earn a YES Prep diploma, there are additional requirements each student must fulfill.

To earn a YES Prep diploma, a student must earn at least 26 credits of high school coursework including the specific course requirements and additional requirements listed in the table below.

### Grading and GPA Information

Grades at YES Prep are given on a number and letter system. Please refer to the table below for conversions; grade points are only awarded for courses taken for high school credit only. Some students enroll in

high-school level classes while still in middle school; number grades in these courses will be reported on the student's official transcript.

YES Prep does not award a grade of "D". Each assignment, including class work, projects, labs, exam and quizzes, and all other graded work, receives either a passing grade, meaning it meets YES Prep standards, or a failing grade, meaning it does not meet YES Prep standards.

For AP courses, 1 additional grade point will be added to the grade point scale for any course in which a student earns a passing grade. For example, a student who earns a B in an AP class will be awarded 4 grade points. "College-Ready" (formerly known as Pre-AP) courses are given a weight of 0.75 extra points. To qualify for the addition, the course must be represented on a student's official transcript as an AP or "College-Ready" course. A student who receives a failing grade in these courses is not entitled to the extra weight.

Frequently Asked Questions

Who can I speak with concerning questions about my transcript, graduation plan, or course requests?

Questions about your transcript, graduation plan, or course requests should be addressed to your campus Director of College Counseling.

## What is the difference between AP and on-level courses? How do AP courses benefit me in the college application process?

AP courses are classes you can take to help you prepare to sit for AP Exams. You may earn college level credit by getting specific scores on your AP Exams. Scores required for college credit vary among colleges/universities, but generally you need at least a score of 3 on an AP exam to be considered for college level credit. You can find more information about AP courses in the *Advanced Placement Information and Options* section below.

## Are the courses I select during the course request process guaranteed? Are they the exact courses I will be taking next year?

The courses you select during the course request process are not guaranteed to be on your final schedule. The course request process is simply a way for us to know which courses you would like to take. Each student's course requests will be compared to your transcripts and graduation plans to ensure the courses requested help you make progress toward completing graduation requirements. If you select a course that you do not need or a course for which you have already earned credit, someone from your campus College Initiatives Team will meet with you to ensure your final schedule meets your graduation requirement needs.

Other factors that may be considered in your final schedule include course offerings, course availability, and the priority of graduation requirements compared to elective credits you need. Meeting graduation requirements will always take priority over non-required elective courses.

#### What happens if I am not present for the course request process?

If you are absent for the course request, your campus Director of College Counseling will try to schedule a makeup session. If a makeup session is not available during the course request window, your campus Director of College Counseling will select courses for you based on any needs for graduation.

#### When will final schedules be ready?

Schedules will be finalized a week before schools return to campus.

#### What if I to request a schedule change after receiving my final schedule?

Campuses offer a schedule change process in the fall. Your campus Director of College Counseling will provide students with an opportunity to submit requests for schedule changes. Remember that request for schedule changes are also subject to the same conditions as course requests. This means that ensuring you meet graduation requirements will be prioritized over other requests.

Key differences between "regular" and AP courses:

- At the end of each AP course, there is an exam administered at your campus. You will practice for these exams on your Common Assessments. There are fees for the exams, but YES Prep will pay the exam fees.
- Opportunity to earn college credit: qualifying scores on exams earn college credit at most colleges and universities across the United States.
- The content covered in the course may be different. For example, in AP US History, you'll cover a longer timeline of history than US History, in AP English Literature you'll study different genres of reading and writing than Intro to Rhetoric and Composition.
- Prerequisites: Some AP courses have prerequisites (courses you need to take first) to make sure you're successful. For example, to take AP Calculus AB, you first need to pass Precalculus. To take AP Statistics, you first need to pass Algebra II.

#### Introduction

At YES Prep, students have three AP Math courses available to them: AP Calculus AB, AP Calculus BC, and AP Statistics. All three courses are rigorous courses which will prepare students for success in college and beyond.

For students to be on track for AP Calculus as a senior, students must take PreCalculus as a junior and Algebra II as a sophomore. Currently, for students to take Algebra II as a sophomore, they will need to double-up in Geometry and Algebra II. Starting in Fall 2022, 8th grade students who enroll in Algebra I will not need to double-up in 10th grade to be on track for AP Calculus in 12th grade.

#### AP Calculus AB

A sustained emphasis on clear communication of methods, reasoning, justifications, and conclusions is essential. Teachers and students will regularly use technology to reinforce relationships among functions, to confirm written work, to implement experimentation, and to assist in interpreting results.  Before studying Calculus, all students should complete the equivalent of four years of secondary mathematics designed for college-bound students:  • Algebra I  • Geometry  • Algebra II



### AP Statistics

Course overview	Learn about the major concepts and tools used for collecting, analyzing, and drawing conclusions from data. You'll explore statistics through discussion and activities, and you'll design surveys and experiments.

#### AP US Government and Politics

Students will learn about the foundations of our government and debate the level of impact they have on our country today. Students will also get a deep understanding of how our political systems operate and develop the skills to analyze their effectiveness. By the end of the course, students will be able to understand how policy decisions shape our world and build their political beliefs to create change.
Course prerequisites	US History and especially AP US History are strongly recommended to provide background knowledge. Success in any electives related to law, current events, or social justice is encouraged.

#### Introduction

At YES Prep, students have four AP Science courses available to them that allow them to pursue interests in both Life Science and Physical Science while preparing to take rigorous college courses: AP Biology, AP Environmental Science, AP Physics 1, and AP Physics C. All courses are rigorous courses which will require students to do some work outside of school to prepare for class, and all four courses prepare students for success in college and beyond.

#### AP Environmental Science

Course overview	The AP Environmental Science course is the equivalent of a one-semester, introductory college course in environmental science, through which students engage with the scientific principles, concepts, and methodologies required to understand the interrelationships of the natural world.  The course requires that students identify and analyze natural and human-made environmental problems, evaluate the relative risks associated with these problems, and examine alternative solutions for resolving or preventing them. Environmental science is interdisciplinary, embracing topics from geology, biology, environmental studies, environmental science, chemistry, and geography.	
	The course includes a strong laboratory component that allows students to learn about the environment through firsthand observation. Experiences in the laboratory provide students with important opportunities to test concepts and principles that are introduced in the classroom, explore scientific problems in more depth, and gain an awareness of the importance of confounding variables that exist tin the "real world."

### AP Physics 1

Al Tilysics 1				
Course overview	AP Physics 1 is an introductory, algebra-based Physics course for Junior and Seniors. The course covers topics taught in introductory college Physics, including Kinematics, Forces, Momentum Energy, Simple Harmonic Motion, Universal Gravitation and Rotational Mechanics. While much of the content is identical to what is covered is regular Physics, students will be expected to reach a much higher level of conceptual thinking and will be assessed at the level of a first semester, algebra-based Physics course in college. The class has a greater emphasis on qualitative understanding while also requiring advanced quantitative reasoning. This course will push students to develop college-level study habits and force them to recalibrate their self-assessment as a strong science student. AP Physics 1 is a significant leap in rigor from previous science classes and most students who take AP Physics 1 find it to be the most challenging course they take at YES Prep.

### AP Psychology

Course overview	AP Psychology is an introductory college-level psychology course. Students cultivate their understanding of the systematic and scientific study of human behavior and mental processes through inquiry-based investigations as they explore concepts like the biological bases of behavior, sensation and perception, learning and cognition, motivation, developmental psychology, testing and individual differences, treatment of abnormal behavior, and social psychology.
	The AP Psychology course introduces students to the systematic and scientific study of human behavior and mental processes. While considering the psychologists and studies that have shaped the field, students explore an apply psychological theories, key concepts, and phenomena associated with such topics as the biological bases of behavior, sensation and perception, learning and cognition, motivation, developmental psychology, testing and individual differences, treatments of psychological disorders, and social psychology. Throughout this course students employ psychological research methods, including ethical considerations, as they use the scientific method, evaluate claims and evidence, and effectively communicate ideas

Students also explain how computing innovations and computing systems—including the internet— work, explore their potential impacts, and contribute to a computing culture that is collaborative and ethical. ### YES Prep Online Scholars Program



Beginning in the 2020 – 2021 school year, we have offered live, online courses to increase offerings to AP courses, electives courses, and World Languages courses. Enrolling in an online course is a great way to take a course that is not offered by a teacher on your campus, get to know students at other YES Prep campuses, and build valuable college-readiness skills.

Students will take an online course during a regular class period. During that class period, students are in a classroom with a teacher from their campus who is there to take attendance and support students while they engage in class; this teacher is the student's Learning Coach. Students will join a virtual call on Teams where they will work with their online teacher, students from their campus, and students from other campuses. Work for the online courses will be found in Schoology.

Like in person classes, collaboration and communication between the online teacher, the student, and classmates is very important. Students are expected to join virtual meetings every time the class is scheduled to meet, with their cameras on, and unmute themselves to participate in discussions.

# Key Differences between an online course and a regular in person course

- Online courses are primarily courses that are not currently offered at your campus. Just by signing up, you're immediately taking a class and learning things you wouldn't be able to otherwise!
- The YES Prep Online Scholars Program is something you can highlight on your resume and show that you've engaged in a variety of learning formats.
- The ideal YPOP student:
  - o Is in grades 9-12.
  - Understands the format of the course and understands that online courses require a high degree of student initiative and independence.
     Students will need to navigate online programs and proactively reach out to their teachers when they need support.

  - Has a strong record of attendance.
