In 1972, Charles and Irma Millard, a Lancaster County couple who lost their son, Christopher to cancer, established the Four Diamonds Fund. Their idea was to start a fund that would prevent financial devastation to local Central PA families whose children have cancer. The fund got its name from an essay that Christopher wrote after undergoing cancer treatment. The Four Diamonds are significant in meaning, representing courage, wisdom, strength, and honesty. Zoo America invades DCTS

On March 11, Tyler Bridgehouse from the outreach program at Zoo America came to DCTS. The presentation was given to the Veterinary Assistant students and focused on some of the North American wildlife animals they have at the zoo. Some of the animals Tyler brought along were a Red Tailed Hawk; Tortoise; Skunk; Owl; Black Rat Snake; Baby Alligator; and Ferret. The students learned nutrition facts, husbandry, behavior and handling, unique characteristics, anatomy, and history of each animal. Students also learned what it is like to be a Zoo Keeper. The presentation was very informative and interactive. Students left the auditorium with a new respect and gained new insight for the zoology and wildlife field.

Physics in Action

On March 23, the physics classes left the confines of room 2109 and invaded the program areas. The event was a demonstration of a lesson on the force of friction. In the arena, the students got to experience the reduction of friction first-hand on a hovercraft.

During classroom demonstrations and discussions, students learned that friction is a force caused by the interaction of other forces and the two surfaces in contact. They also learned that when two surfaces come into contact, they create a unique value called the coefficient of friction. Each physics student was given the opportunity to ride the hovercraft and experience this method of cheating friction.

The hovercraft used by the physics class is very simple to build. It is a disk of about four feet in diameter cut from thick plywood. The bottom of the disk is covered by a light canvas skirt with a few strategically placed holes. A single hole in the plywood gives the intake for the air pressure to lift the hovercraft off the floor. The air pressure is supplied by a cordless leaf blower.

PSBA Advocacy Forum, Monday, April 4, 2016, Capitol Complex, Harrisburg, Pa

On Monday, we attended the PSBA Advocacy Forum at the Pennsylvania

State Capitol. There were several speakers at the morning meeting. Representative

Kristin Phillips-Hill spoke as a former school board member and current

Representative about the need to voice our concerns at the state level. She

commented that advocacy is very important because we can tell our stories on why

increased school revenue is important. She said that sometimes legislators'

intensions are good, but the impact is negative. If we share our local school stories

with them, it can help legislators make better decisions.

Senator Jay Costa from Allegheny County spoke and took questions from the school board directors. He commented that the governor wants the new education funding formula to close the disparity in funding, and it would be layered on top of the old method. Someone commented that cyber-charter schools have issues. A child in her district logged in at 11:59pm and logged out at 12:01pm and got credit for two days of attendance.

PSBA representatives discussed with the group the critical issues: basic education subsidy; PlanCon reimbursements; pension reform; passing a '16-'17 budget that is timely, fair, and equitable; and passing the basic education funding commission's formula for calculating school funding. Attached are the handouts from the PSBA that outline these and more priorities.

In the afternoon, we delivered the attached "leave behinds" from the PSBA called "Critical Issues Facing Public Education" and "Legislative Priority Issues for the 2015-16 Session" to Senator Rob Teplitz and Representative John Payne.



Critical Issues Facing Public Education

<u>2016-17 State Budget:</u> Significant challenges are still ahead for school districts as our policymakers begin to work on the 2016-17 state budget. To ensure that schools can enter into the next academic year with confidence, legislators and the governor must work diligently to overcome these challenges and pass an equitable and fair budget by June 30.

<u>Pension Reform:</u> There is an urgent need for both short-term and long-term pension reforms beyond what Act 120 created. The current system is financially unsustainable for the state and local school districts. The 2016-17 state budget needs to address the current pension crisis.

- School districts need meaningful, comprehensive pension reform that provides both immediate and long-term relief by reducing projected costs to school districts and taxpayers over the next two decades, while maintaining an appropriate pension benefit for school employees.
- Pension reform will allow local district budgets to keep more state and local dollars in their schools.
- Enactment of substantial long term pension reform to address the legitimate crisis of uncontrollable costs.

<u>Basic Education Funding Commission Formula:</u> The new school funding formula uses factors to reflect student and community differences such as poverty, local tax effort and capacity, and rural and small district condition. The formula would help close funding shortfalls and narrow the growing gap between wealthy and poorer districts.

- The formula will help to close the gap between poor and affluent districts, and is an equitable, predictable and transparent plan.
- The lack of a reliable funding formula has led the state's property owners down a road of enduring tax increases.
- Enact the BEFC formula for funding schools and other measures that would ensure this crisis does not repeat in just a few months.

<u>PlanCon Reform:</u> The 2016-17 state budget needs to include reimbursement for school construction and renovation projects, as well as a plan that moves towards restructuring the PlanCon approval process. Maintaining a program for state reimbursement for school construction and renovation ensures that all school districts can provide appropriate school facilities and safe and secure learning environments for their students. School districts deserve to receive the reimbursement promised.

- School districts are owed billions of dollars in promised state reimbursement for school construction and renovation projects.
- The General Assembly and governor need to deliver on the promise of providing state reimbursement for school construction and reforming the PlanCon process.

<u>Reimbursement for Interest and Fees</u>: The legislature and the governor need to reimburse districts for any and all interest payments they have or will have to make as a result of borrowing money due to the state's lack of fiscal responsibility.

 School districts need to be ensured that they will not be forced into a similar financial crisis in future years.



Legislative Priority Issues for the 2015-16 Session

Founded in 1895, PSBA is the voice for public education and the work of strong local school boards in the halls of the Capitol. We are committed to supporting an effective child-centered public education that is adequately and equitably funded. Pennsylvania public schools are the driving force behind – our state's economy. PSBA has identified the following issues as legislative priorities for the 2015-16 session of the General Assembly and will work to bring focus to leverage change in these areas that will improve our system of public education.

Address Pennsylvania's Pension Crisis

The state must immediately enact meaningful school employee pension reform with the dual purpose of providing long-term relief by reducing projected employer contribution rate increases and reducing projected costs to school districts and taxpayers over the next two decades, while maintaining an appropriate pension benefit for school employees.

Enact Meaningful Charter School Reform to Remove Inequities Within the System

Pennsylvania's current law allows charter schools to operate under separate rules. PSBA wants to level the playing field between charters and traditional public schools. The state must enact comprehensive and meaningful reforms to the Charter School Law to address areas of charter school operations, funding and accountability. PSBA will seek changes that require charter schools and educational management organizations (EMOs) to be subject to the same laws and regulations that all public schools must follow, including the same financial, academic and ethical accountability standards as school districts.

Reform the Charter School Formula for Special Education

The current flawed special education tuition calculation requires school districts to pay charter schools regardless of the costs of special education services provided by charter schools. As a result, school districts overpay charter schools for special education students. The new special education funding formula creates three tiers of special education tuition rates based on actual special education enrollment and weighted costs of providing a special education program to each eligible student according to several factors. Not including charter schools in this formula creates another double standard by which a charter school and a traditional public school would receive different amounts of funding to educate the same child. This system must apply equally to charter schools just as it applies to school districts.

Provide Adequate, Equitable and Fair Funding

PSBA urges the General Assembly to increase state basic education funding for public school districts with distribution in a manner that is adequate, consistent, fair and equitable and that provides districts with the greatest flexibility to use their resources. Pennsylvania must develop and maintain a system of public school financing that emphasizes a sharing of costs between the commonwealth and local school districts, recognizing that the state must provide the majority of funding for public education.
