Looking Ahead to the Future

Last year at this exact point in time I wrote an article with the same title. Last year my key points included the landscape of public education, the need for more classroom space, a need for additional English Learner staffing and curriculum to meet the needs of this growing population, and an overall district update regarding school improvement efforts. Although I must admit that the sands of the educational landscape continue to shift, much progress has been made on the other topics since last year.

In reference to the shifting sands of public education in the state of Wisconsin, the following legislative changes have been enacted both for and to public education:

- A bill on transparency on property tax impact on voucher funding fell short maintaining the veil of secrecy around expenditures of public funds
- Bills restricting districts from going to referenda passed
- Voucher expansion continue to grow with the state tab increasing to over \$270 million
- The legislature approved a biennium budget giving some per pupil categorical growth toward district revenues
- Tax levies continue to come in well below inflation
- A Blue Ribbon Commission was created to once again consider how public schools are funded
- An announcement was made that 2019
 Federal funding of public education will be cut by more than 5%
- A School Safety package was approved with more restrictions than avenues by which to actually improve school safety
- A school-based mental health grant was created

So what does all of the above mean? Allow me to address these points in general, but not necessarily in their entirety.

The School District of Abbotsford has been notified that it will be invoiced for more than \$38,000 in 2018-2019 for a private parochial school outside of our school district's boundaries. These monies come right off of our

fund 10 educational revenues which are local taxpayers' contributions. The voucher funding we are being charged for is for students who do not attend Abbotsford but live within district boundaries and who have chosen, not necessarily this year, but in the past, to attend a parochial school in Colby. Private schools must apply to receive these vouchers, but in so doing, leverage local taxpayers. The only way for the School District of Abbotsford to recoup these funds is to increase our tax levy in 2019-2020, a year later. In essence, taxpayers will be asked for more money overall to fund voucher schools. As vouchers expand, taxpayers will pick up more of the tab. How will taxpayers know this? Well, they will not. Thus the request for "transparency" in regards to the property tax impact of funding vouchers which unfortunately failed this past year.

School funding continues to be a topic of great conversation across the state. It is not so much that the formula is broken. More so, school funding is "bleeding" our state, and the fact is, it doesn't come close to keeping up with inflation. As costs continue to rise all across the nation, but specifically in the state of Wisconsin, schools are held to an entirely different standard. Like any employee in the state, an expectation that salaries will go up by at least the rate of inflation exists. However, in the world of education, this has not been the case since 2011. Rather, teacher salaries have fallen behind, consequently removing many potential teachers from the market making it difficult to staff positions with qualified staff. This dangerous trend seems to show no slowing down in the near future. Prices for gas, electricity, school supplies, internet, equipment purchases, services, school safety, and the list goes on and on, continue to rise, while tax revenue and state and federal aids continue to come in well below inflation. Although I cannot predict the future, I can say that a 'breaking point' will come. Fortunately in Abbotsford, frugal spending, coupled with tight budgets, have maintained stability over the years, but the aforementioned trends should not be ignored, and a day of reckoning in the not too distant future awaits even

But let's move onto some more positive topics regarding school improvements. First of all, student enrollment in our small, rural district continues on an upward trajectory. In fact, we are one of the few districts in the state of Wisconsin that is posting yearly stu-

dent enrollment growth. There are, however, challenges that accompany our growth which I am proud to report on. If you have driven by the district lately, you have seen the quickly-rising walls of six classroom additions; two on the Middle School and four onto the Elementary School. These muchneeded classrooms will pull children out of converted store rooms and maintenance areas. Add these conversions to the almost 50 additional students over the past couple of years, and we should be opening school in the fall with a little more elbow room. Although these rooms should comfortably accommodate recent growth, the future will dictate whether additional expansion in years to come is warranted. The best of news is that the Board of Education did all of this while not going to taxpayers with another building referendum. The Board's continued oversight and vision in this realm clearly demonstrate its commitment to fiscal accountability to its district taxpayers.

In the realm of meeting student needs, the Board approved the hire of a muchneeded additional guidance counselor, an extra elementary teacher for a large fifth grade enrollment, an extremely valuable District Accountability Coordinator to address aging curriculum development and instructional improvement strategies, and additional supports for our growing English language Learner population. Currently, Theresa Reynoso-Doran, a dual language speaker of English and Spanish, has enriched our ability to meet the needs of students in our PK-12 learning environment; Dr. Georgia Kraus has brought a level of expertise to the district that has allowed for curricula oversight, data analysis, and instructional improvement, not to mention critical administrative team perspective; Karen Gunderson's move to fifth grade, reducing class sizes that had exceeded 30 students per class has greatly enriched that grade level's capacity to meet the needs of that age student; and finally, an intensive and critical look at how we meet the needs of our English language Learners has led to some key discoveries in meeting these students' needs while providing them optimal success, not only in learning English, but also in maintaining their native language. To

continue to grow in the mentioned areas, the Board of Education has approved a dual language instructor for next year, enhancement to our 4K programming (every other day to 4 days a week), and a part-time School Resource Officer that will be shared with the Colby School District.

In closing this already lengthy article, allow me to say how fortunate we all are to be a part of the Abbotsford community. In my short two years here, I grow to appreciate more everyday the staff, the students, the parents and extended families of our students, the businesses, and the diversity of culture that all play a crucial part in educating tomorrow's leaders. We are such a unique place in the middle of Central Wisconsin! I am blessed to be here and am reminded each day of the importance of the work which still remains.



The 2017-18 school year has flown by. The students have shown much growth and have taken part in many learning activities. In late May and early June, the students will be taking part in Olympic events, graduations, many outdoor field experiences, the PTO Carnival, and award assemblies.

There will be some changes to our school next year. The elementary portion of the school will have 4 new classrooms. Other rooms in the school will be set up for different uses than they have been previously. This new addition will provide much-needed space for today's learning environment. The district will also have four-day-aweek 4-Year Old Kindergarten. This was approved by the Board of Education in April. At this time, it looks like the First Grade classes will move to the new west section of the building and share the wing with 4K and Kindergarten.

With the ending of the school year, we turn our attention to summer school. Summer school runs from June 11th through June 22nd and August 6th through 10th. If you wish to have your child enroll, please stop by the elementary or middle/high school office for registration forms. There will also be open swimming from July 9th through

school, or know of somebody who does, please contact us for enrollment forms. The elementary building will have office personnel available for two weeks after school is out in June and again in August. The district office will be open throughout the summer, and you can pick up forms there as well.

Information will be coming home regarding the "Open House," which will be on August 22nd, from 4:00-7:00 pm. On this night, there will be an orientation for students and parents in 4-Year Kindergarten and Kindergarten at 5:00. The first day of school will be September 4th. Please be on the lookout for registration and school information coming in early to mid-August.

Please take time to continue reading and working with your children throughout the summer. Students will forget much material if not reviewing over a span of 2-3 months. The more time you spend reading and reviewing with your child, the easier learning will be for them.

study required and passing scores needed for this certification.



4th Grade Fun


The 4th Graders had an electrical safety presentation where they learned about safety near power lines and got to see the utility truck up close.



Abbotsford Elementary JUMP ROPE FOR HEART



Community Based mentoring has been in existence in Wausau for over 28 years and provides positive development, companionship and friendship for children ages 6 – 14 through a one-to-one relationship with an adult.

Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and agree to commit to a few hours a week in a year-long match, but it is hoped the friendship which develops will last a lifetime. Matching is based on interests, personality, geographic location, needs and expectations to ensure the best possible compatibility between the volunteer and child. Staff has regular contact with the parent, child, and volunteer for the duration of the match. Mentors are not parent substitutes but give the child an added sense of worth and responsibility by letting the child know someone else takes time to care. Through regular meetings the volunteer and child engage in activities of their choice, which may include attending sports or community events, biking, hiking, playing board games, etc

School Based mentoring is an expanding approach to improve the self-esteem, attitudes, attendance and achievement of children ages 6-14. Volunteers are matched in a one-to-one relationship with a child who has been referred by their teacher, guidance counselor or parent who could benefit from a mentoring relationship based on academic or social needs.

Both mentor and child make a school

Both mentor and child make a school year commitment to the program and agree to meet at least 1 hour every week at the child's school to help provide extra attention and support. The meeting times may occur before, during or after school. Partnerships with school districts allow volunteers to pick an elementary or middle school of their choice to mentor at. There are also ways to include community activities after being matched for at least 3 months.

La asociación con distritos escolares les permite a los voluntarios a escoger una escuela de nivel primario o secundario según su preferencia donde quieren ser tutores. Existen también modos de incorporar actividades dentro de la comunidad luego de haber sido emparejado por lo menos por 3 meses.

Las tutorías basadas en la Comunidad han estado en existencia en Wausau por más de 28 años y proporcionan un desarrollo positivo, compañía y Amistad para ninos en edades 6 – 14 a través de una relación individualizada con un adulto.

Los voluntarios deben tener por los menos 16 años y estar de acuerdo con comprometer unas cuantas horas a la semana en una relación de un ano, pero se espera que la amistad que se desarrolle les dure toda la vida. El emparejamiento está basado en intereses, personalidad, ubicación geográfica, necesidades y expectativas a lograr la mejor compatibilidad posible entre el voluntario y el niño.

El personal tiene contacto regular con los padres, niño, y voluntarios a lo largo del emparejamiento. Los tutores no son sustitutos para los padres, pero le dan al niño un adicional sentido de valor y responsabilidad al darle a saber que hay alguien más interesado en dedicarles un tiempo. A través de reuniones regulares el tutor y el niño participan en actividades de su elección, las cuales podrían incluir asistiendo a deportes o eventos en la comunidad, pasear en bicicleta, caminatas, jugando juegos de tablero, etc



UV Rays are strongest in the middle of the day. Plan indoor activities at that time or look for shade to prevent sunburn.

Wear a hat – preferably one that covers the neck and ears. When wearing a baseball style hat, remember to apply sunscreen to the neck and ears.

Sunglasses protect eyes from UV rays. Look for ones that wrap around & block nearly 100% of UV rays.

Keep the pee, poop, sweat, & dirt out of the water!

- •Stay out of the water if you have diarrhea.

- •Don't pee or poop in the water.
- •Don't swallow the water.

Every hour—everyone out!

- •Take kids on bathroom breaks.
- •Check diapers, and change them in a bathroom or diaper-changing area-not poolside-to keep germs away from the pool.
- Reapply sunscreen.
- Drink plenty of fluids.

> Cómo protegerse del sol Bloquear rayos UV -Excelentes consejos de OSHA

- Utilice prendas adecuadas. Haga uso de prendas tupidas que bloqueen los rayos del sol. Haga esta prueba: ponga su mano entre el tejido y una fuente de luz. Si puede ver su • mano a través del tejido, la prenda ofrece poca protección.
- Utilice protección solar. Un factor de protección solar (FPS) de, al menos, 15 bloquea el 93 porciento de los rayos UV. Se deben bloquear tanto los rayos UVA como los UVB para protegerse contra el cáncer de piel. Asegúrese de seguir las indicaciones que figuran en el envase.
- Utilice prendas de cabeza. Un sombrero de ala ancha (no una gorra) sería lo más adecuado, ya que protege el cuello, las orejas, los ojos, la frente, la nariz y la cabeza.
- Utilice gafas de sol con filtro UV. Las gafas de sol no Mito: Los piojos portan enfermedades. tienen por qué ser caras, pero sí deben bloquear entre el 99 y el 100% de las radiaciones UVA y UVB.
- Limite la exposición solar. Los rayos UV son especialmente intensos entre las 10 a.m. y las 4 p.m. Si no está seguro de la intensidad del sol, haga la prueba de la sombra. Lleve a los más pequeños al servicio con frecuencia.

- Revise los pañales y cámbielos en el baño o en un área específica para cambiar pañales (nunca junto a la piscina) con el objetivo de mantener los gérmenes alejados del agua.
- Aplique protección solar con frecuencia.
- Beba abundante líquido.


